
Dear Sir:

Dear Mr. Boehm,


I received the copy of your letter of the 9th to the Museum Het Markiezenhof and since we had a meeting of the exhibition committee last week we agreed that the museum would send you the catalog as requested and that I would answer the remainder of your letter.

There have been several requests from your country and from Britain for the exhibition to be sent there on loan. I am afraid that in its present form this is quite impossible. The objects, now on view, have been lent to the exhibition committee for a very limited period and on stringent conditions. This alone would impede their being sent abroad. On top of that some of the exhibits are very old panels which are too delicate to travel, seeing how easily they might crack in changes of climatic conditions. Finally, if the exhibition were to be staged in your country or Britain it might well need some adaptation to the interest there to produce it at its most attractive. The cost of transportation and insurance would be yet another matter.

All this does not mean that an exhibition on the same theme and equally attractive could not be set up for the special purpose of being on show in your country. Preparation however would need quite some time. Within a short time I hope to produce an illustrated book on the lines of the exhibition in English. This might well form the basis of further consideration of an exhibition in the U.S.A. I am enclosing a pamphlet which we produced to announce our display here and if it says that it is unique—that is exactly what it is.

I do not think that the transportation of objects and their insurance from here to there and back could be covered from an exhibition in one place only. You must have had some idea on the financial background. Please let me know about it.
