Collector Keeps Up With Clubs

SANTA ANA-The philatelist has the pleasure of acquisition and admiring his stamp collection.

- Some collectors of ancient guns will occasionally take their muzzle loaders or cap and ball revolvers out to the shooting

But Gene Hitt, 69, is a collector of vintage golf clubs who three times a week uses a couple of his hickory shafted "cleeks."

"Cleek," he explains in his tiny, crowded museum, "means hook in Scotch. It is what in modern golf is called an iron. In the old days, it was used to hit a golf ball out of wagon ruts.

In his collection, he even has a short faced iron which is called a "rut club." Its vintage is 1825 and is the oldest club in Hitt's collection.

But the two clubs he carries in his bag for his rounds at Willowick Golf Course are a "pitcher" and a "mashie."

The pitcher compares in use to the modern pitching wedge. However, it has the shallower loft of an 8-iron. Instead of small grooves in the face, it has widely etched ribs.

The mashie is marked as a 5-iron, but Hitt uses it more like a 7-iron.

Gets Backspin

"I use them because they give the ball back-spin," said Hitt. "For instance, they'll stick on Willowick's flat No. 1 green. Usually, a shot will hit and run there.


"With the pitcher, I can take a full swing from about 50 yards out."

Once a year, Hitt gets to use more than just those two clubs. He belongs to the Golf Collector's Society which has an annual international mail-in tournament in which all players use wooden - shafted clubs made before 1930.

"I've spent all the money I'm going to spend on old golf clubs. I won't buy, and I won't sell."

Hitt likes to research his golf clubs.

"The problem is, few books are available. Libraries clean out their old books. I write to manufacturing companies, but it costs them money in time spent researching to give me information. I have some old catalogues, some from manufacturers, some from friends. This way I can at least date the clubs. We collectors exchange information.'

"I used to be a 9-handicapper, but now I'm lucky to break 90. In that particular round, my trouble was distance and the putter. I kept coming up short of the green with the club I selected and I couldn't putt with the putter I picked."

Tires Easily

He continued, "I didn't try the clubs out at a driving range before the round because at my age I tire

Hitt said a fellow collector playing with him that day shot a 79 with his own set of vintage clubs.

Who was he?

"No names," Hitt said. We don't want the price clubs to skyrocket," he said. "If I mention a name, someone will try to sell

him a club at a high price.
"We have little idea how much these vintage golf elubs are worth. I've bought armloads for 25 cents apiece. A fellow gave me a club once. I took it to Willowick to show around and was offered \$300 for t. I refused to sell. I didn't have another club like it. And, besides, it had been given to me."
The international Golf

Collectors Society is having a convention in October at Morris Plains, N.J., and one of the hopes of the convention is to establish

a price for vintage clubs.
"I have no idea what this collection is worth. It could be \$5,000 or \$100,-000."

As he spoke, he waved his arm above his "museum."

The "museum" is an 8 by 20 foot corridor, part of his garage. It used to be his office before he retired from the landscaping business.

The museum has displays upon displays. His exceptional clubs, are mounted on boards, two to a board. They go from floor to ceiling. At the entrance way, about 50 putters are stacked. The back of the room looks like a club storage area, except that it is vintage, hickoryshafted clubs by the hundreds which are stored

He has a 32-book catalogue of every club in the "museum."

'Playing' Club

He started his collection on Feb. 15, 1965, paying \$1 for a women's niblick (9iron or sand iron) made by George Nicoll of Scotland. His most recent acquisition is a "playing" club (driver made by A Patrick (Scotland), vintage

That club has a long (about 5 inches), narrow head. It has a leather toe ("to protect the ball, balls were valuable then") and a half sole of bone.

The grip has a foundation of cloth, then a wrapping of sheepskin, "easy on the hands, but it does-n't last long."

The back of the head has a strip of lead in it, much like the lead tape golfers add to their clubs today. Even in 1860, they were looking for distance through club head weight.

This club was given to Hitt by a friend who had gotten it on a recent trip to Scotland.

Hitt did not know where his friend got the club, if he payed for it or how much. "He has a technique of digging through attics and places and finding old clubs."

Nowadays, all of his clubs are given to him by friends. The gift, the recognition, are important to the 69-year-old man who spends his days put-tering in his "museum," cleaning up vintage clubs for other collectors, and


After that? "There'll be something else, I'm sure."

Hitt is not too concerned about burglars breaking into his "museum."

He said, "For one thing, I have a secure lock. But mainly, it would take a bunch of men to carry all this stuff out. And they could never do it quietly

How much really, is this collection worth?

"It might be \$5,000 or \$100,000. At least, there's a small fortune in scrap metal."
