Kennemer G. & C.C. /Famous Golf Courses in the World.

Dear Miss Webber,

Further to my letter of the 19th instant and in reply to your request which reached me through ABC Press in Amsterdam, I am enclosing:

1. A topographical photograph of the course;
2. A press hand-out made for the 52nd Open giving a diagram of the course and the length of the course from medal tees and championship tees;
3. The programme of the 52nd Open, please refer to page 22 and further;
4. A separate diagram of the course;
5. Three current scoring-cards of the course (men's (standard medal), ladies- and back-tees);
6. Two postcards depicting a. the clubhouse;
b. an old painting therein.
7. A draft article for the 57th Open, to be held on the Kennemer this year;
8. A photostat of the article on the Kennemer as it appears in Shell's International Encyclopedia of Golf 1975 on pages 210 and 211; the diagram is quite pretty but the write-up is - unfortunately - incorrect in some places.

The club was founded by a number of men (inter alia G. J. van der Vliet who was the first Chairman) in 1910. For the first 18 years it possessed a 9-holes course at Santpoort, Northwest of Haarlem. In 1927 it acquired the links land of the present course and had an 18-holes course designed by H. S. Colt of Alison, Colt and Morrison. The clubhouse was designed by Mr. Smits a well known Dutch architect at the time. In 1928 the whole club moved from Santpoort to Zandvoort. In 1942 the German Army took over the course and clubhouse, and made it into part of the Atlantic Wall. The remaining details may be found in the enclosures.

I would ask you to please take particular care of enclosure No. 1 and return it to us after use. (The other enclosures with this letter may be retained).


The club gives your company the copyright of the enclosures and those enclosed with my earlier letter for the publication of this book in return for two free copies of the book once printed and published.
