## Papers of Robert Seton, Archbishop (1839-1928)

As a golf historian I would be much obliged for your help in the following matter:
In the Golfers' Magazine(Chicago, U.S.S.) of April 3rd 1914 the following entry may be found on page 75:
Archbishop Seton of New Jersey, in reorganising his family archives, discovered that one of his ancestors introduced golf from Holland into Scotland at the beginnings of the fifteenth century. The Archbishop has determined to pursue his investigations.

I have tried to find the Archbishops papers and in so doing found that upon his death in January 1928 at the Convent of St.Elisabeth, Convent Station, N.J. they were split into 4 parts which went to 1.the Convent, 2.the Seton Hall College, South Orange N.J., 3.the New York Historical Society, New York and 4.to your University. In investigating the 3 former lots I have not found his family papers or notes on them. In New York however I found a note of his to the effect that there was a box containing his family papers. Precise man that I have learnt him to be I am hoping that that box is in your keeping.

The search need not be too complicated. The reference in the above journal is correct. If this happened, it must have happened between 1400 and 1450 so only papers from that period or later notes on papers of that period are relevant.

Could you kindy inform me if your share in Robert Seton's papers includes that box and if so, whether the document or a reference is in it. If so I would be obliged for a photocopy of whatever you find relevant. Needless to say that I will be happy to reimburse you for the expnses incurred.
