Also let me say I big Hhank you for offering me the

If possible it should also be very windy with rain in the air!!

I get a little sad when I hear of the new balls, balls which fly so far and clubs with graphite heads etc. You know around the turn of the last century Thomas Hodge gave up golf because he said there's

now real golf played nowadays, what would he say today?

Mr. van Hengel, before I close will you allow me to ask you a very personal question? The question is: - You are allowed to play just one more round of 18 holes and then you must glue up golf. Dear Mr. Turner,

This is to thank you for your letter of the 5th of this month. You are certainly lucky in having some scared-head clubs of Edward Davies since he is one of the very few who still knows how to make them.

If you interest is in the time you decribe it may amuse you to know that I have club models of Harry Vardon, J. H. Taylor and James Braid and equally of their somewhat later American counterpart as a triumvirate: Walter Hagen, Robert T. Jones and Tommy Armour.

Coming to your penetrating question of the 18 holes: where and with whom. I would certainly have liked to play a round with Willie Park Jr., the best putter ever (and that when greens were not what they are today). That round I would like to play on my own club here, the Kennemer at Zandvoort and there on the old Orange Course.

The reasons? Willie Park because I would hope to pick up a tip or two, which even he did not mention in his little book 'The Art of Putting', which I have here, and also because I would like to see if he, being the putter he was, could break the course record on the Orange Course (one of the masterpieces of Harry Colt). That record stands at 65 off the tiger tees since 1935! In that year Sid Brews established it and no player in the 10 Open Championships held over it since then, has managed to break it. The players did include guys like Bobby Locke, Flory van Donck, David Thomas, Gary Player, Peter Thomson, Ramon Sota, Severiano Ballesteros, Bernhard Langer and quite a few others of great quality. Practice has it that if you want to go for less than 68 strokes it all depends on your putting, so it would take an outstanding putter to do the trick. Hence the choice.

If the match could not be held on the Orange Course at Zandvoort my next choice would be Lundin Links in Fife, which you may or may not know but which I think to be one of the most beautiful links courses of Britain.

So there is an answer which may surprise you slightly. If you come this way, give me a ring or drop a line in advance since I am away quite often.
