

1966 MEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

The greatest international golf gathering in history occurred in October, 1966, in Mexico City. Nineteen women's teams and 32 men's teams came together for World Championships in successive weeks. Officials accompanying them shared insights and experiences. They were all together at one memorable dinner with 700 guests at the Mexico City Country Club.

All this could only have been brought off by a people as warm-hearted as Mexicans

and by an organization as efficient as the Mexican Golf Association.

Above all, the occasion was one to be treasured in memory because it brought to many participants a rediscovery of their common humanity. Divisive artificial barriers with which men separate themselves from one another crumbled away before the warmth of good fellowship and sportsmanship.

From the playing standpoint, one of the most significant developments was that after the first round in the men's World Amateur Team Championship, the eight leading teams came from six continents of the earth (and the United States was not among them).

The widening influence of golf was never more conspicuous.

This was the fifth World Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy, and it produced Australia's second victory, the first having come in the inaugural event in 1958. Australia's win was a true team effort by Harry Berwick, Phillip Billings, Kevin Donohoe and Kevin Hartley, with Daniel H. Dwyer as non-playing Captain.

In the end, Australia won by two strokes over the United States, 877 to 879. Great Britain and Ireland was third with 883 in defending the Championship. The Champion-

ship was played over the wonderful course of the Club de Golf Mexico.

Australia's lone sub-par round was a 68 by Hartley on opening day, and it paced his side to a six-stroke lead over South Africa, 214 to 220.

After the second round, Australia was seven strokes ahead of South Africa, but

both Britain and America had vaulted over all others to be tied for third.

South Africa made a great move the next day, producing two splendid 70s, one by Bobby Cole, its 18-year-old prodigy who held the British Amateur Championship, the other by Dave Symons. With a round to go, the standing was: South Africa 657, Australia 658, United States 663, Great Britain and Ireland 666, Mexico 667.

And so the stage was set for a great finale. The three leaders were drawn together, and this produced an important grouping in Harry Berwick, a 43-year-old Australian who first won his nation's Amateur Championship in 1950, Bobby Cole, and Deane Beman, of the United States. Berwick closed with a steady par round of 72, and it turned out to be the best for his side. No Australian was over 74 in the decisive round.

Beman nearly brought it off for America. He caught fire with four birdies in the


last nine, and his 69 was the best American score of the week.

There is no individual prize in the World Team Championship, but it must be noted that R. D. B. M. Shade, of Britain, had 283, five below par, and it was easily the best score for 72 holes. It is not for naught that Shade's initials and his skill have earned the young Scot the nickname of "Right Down the Bloody Middle."


Second best score of 290 was produced by Patrick Cros, of France, whose sister was a member of France's ladies' team. Next at 291 were Deane Beman and Ginjiro

Nakabe, of Japan.

The Mexican Golf Association, under the presidency of Benjamin Burillo, had a most effective tournament organization. Julio Orvananos was overall Chairman, with Rodolfo Patron as Chairman for the Women's Championship, Raul Valdes as Chairman for the Men's Championship, and Alfonso Estrada rounding out the Executive Committee. A former President of the Republic, Miguel Aleman, lent his presence and the Government's blessing to two eminently happy and successful weeks.

Delegates and Duffers Cup

A side event to the men's World Championship is the Delegates and Duffers Cup 36-hole competition, among delegates, non-playing captains and officials of the host association. In 1966 it ended in a tie at 143 net between Seymour Marvin, of Brazil, and Richard Mackie, of New Zealand.

After a nine-hole play-off they were still tied at 36 net, so it was decided to have no further play-off but to enter both names on the trophy. Marvin, the first winner in 1958, graciously arranged for Mackie to hold the trophy for the next two years. Third place went to Juan Antonio Andreu, of Spain, with 144 net.

In the guest division, John D. Ames, United States, a founder of the World Council, was low with 147, followed by Hord W. Hardin, USA, 148.

Meeting of World Council

The Biennial Meeting of the World Amateur Golf Council was held at the Club de Golf Mexico on October 26, 1966. Among the actions were:

- 1. Decision to institute a men's Senior World Amateur Team Championship in 1967, to be played every other year in alternate years from the Men's and the Women's Championships, along the same lines as the Eisenhower Trophy event. Minimum age would be 55 years. An invitation from the United States to entertain the first event was accepted.
 - 2. Acceptance of Australia's invitation to

entertain both Men's and Women's Championships in 1968.

- 3. Amendment of Articles to create a Women's Division of membership.
- 4. Decision not to sponsor a Junior Team Championship.

1966 WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

The seed planted in 1964 blossomed two years later into the first Women's World Amateur Team Championship to be sponsored by the World Amateur Golf Council. Representatives of 19 countries met at the Mexico City Country Club. The inaugural event for the Espirito Santo Trophy in 1964 had been held at St. Germain, near Paris, under the good auspices of the French Golf Federation.

The 1966 Championship was won by the United States with a score of 580. Canada was second with 589, followed by France, with 597. The French ladies had won the 1964 event in their homeland.

The United States ladies played without tain of the American team. Mrs. Donald R. Carner, then their National Champion. Seventeen-year-old Miss Shelley Hamlin, who replaced Mrs. Carner shortly before the team left for Mexico, scored 72s in the last two rounds, the best scores for the American team over the final 36 holes. Mrs. David Welts and Mrs. Teddy Boddie each had 71s earlier.

Under the Rules of the competition, each team was allowed three players, with the two best scores counting in the daily total. Mrs. Boddie's score counted in each of the four rounds.

The United States team led every round, taking a one-stroke lead over Italy with 145 the first day. A second round of 144 put the Americans in front by eight strokes over France. By the end of the third round the United States was still in front by eight strokes over Canada, which moved into second place on the strength of Mrs. J. Douglas Streit's 70. The United States team scored 145 again in the final round. Mrs. Theodore W. Hawes was non-playing Cap-

Mrs. Streit, Canada's petite star, had the low individual score of 289, one over par. Mrs. Boddie was second with 292, and Miss Catherine Lacoste, of France, was third with

1967 SENIOR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

Competition was added in 1967 the Senior World Amateur Team Champion-ship for golfers 55 years of age and older. It was inaugurated by the World Amateur Golf Council on a suggestion of the United States Golf Association.

The event was played for the first time in November, 1967, over the No. 2 Course of the Pinehurst Country Club, Pinehurst, North Carolina, one of America's great courses. It was won by the United States with a team score of 903. Canada was second with 920, and Australia third with 940.

Eleven countries were represented in the competition for the Shun Nomura Trophy, which was presented by friends of golf in Japan through the Japan Golf Association.

Japan through the Japan Golf Association.

Each team was allowed four players; each day the three best individual scores made up the team's score. The sum of the four daily

totals determined the winner.

Robert B. Kiersky and Raymond Palmer led the United States to the victory. Kiersky the 1965 Senior Amateur Champion of the USGA, scored 297 for the four rounds, and Palmer, the current USGA Senior Amateur Champion, scored 301. Those were the low individual scores. Lionel Bowditch, of Australia, was next with 302.

The United States took an eight-stroke lead over Canada and Great Britain and Ireland in the first round when David Goldman, Kiersky and Palmer combined to score 226. George C. Beechler and Palmer had 74s in the second round, and with Kiersky's 75, the Americans had a second-round score of 223, to lead at 36 holes by 12 strokes over Canada, 449-461. The advantage increased daily the last two rounds. J. Ellis Knowles was non-playing Captain of the American team.



ARTICLES OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

Adopted May 2, 1958. Amended October 7, 1958, October 6, 1964 and October 26, 1966.

ARTICLE I

The name of this council is THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL.

ARTICLE II OBJECT

SECTION 1. FRIENDSHIP AND SPORTS-MANSHIP THROUGH GOLF. The object of the Council is to foster friendship and sportsmanship among the peoples of the world through the conduct biennially of an Amateur Team Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy.

SECTION 2. RULES OF GOLF. The Championship shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, and The United States Golf Association; however, if those organizations should have differing codes, the code of the host country shall apply.

ARTICLE III MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. ELIGIBILITY. Membership in the Council is open to any organization which:

(a) Constitutes the sole central authority for amateur golf in its country; and

(b) Has adopted and administers the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association.

SECTION 2. ELECTION. An application for membership shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines.

An applicant may be elected to Membership by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

SECTION 3. FINANCES (a) The expenses of the Council shall be limited to the following:

(1) Insurance and maintenance of the Championship Trophy:

(2) Provision of prizes for individuals;

(3) Cost of stationery, postage, printing and other communications incurred by the Secretary of the Council.

All such expenses shall be shared equally by the Member Organizations and shall be payable annually in November to the Secretary. Each such payment shall be in the currency of the Secretary's country, unless prohibited by law or government regulation.

The income of the Council shall be limited to reimbursement of or other provision for the foregoing expenses.

No Member Organization may incur any expense for the Council, and no representative of the Council shall have authority to incur any expense except as expressly stated herein.

(b) Any other expense incident to the affairs of the Council shall be borne by the Member Organization whose representative incurs such expense.

(c) The expense of conducting the Championship shall be borne by the Member Organization entertaining it.

SECTION 4. OBLIGATIONS AND DISCI-PLINE. The acceptance of membership in the Council shall bind each Member Organization to uphold all the provisions of these Articles and any rules or actions of the Council or the Administrative Committee.

Any Member Organization failing in these obligations or ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements may be suspended or expelled by the Council.

SECTION 5. WITHDRAWAL. Any Member Organization may withdraw from membership by notifying the Secretary to that effect.

Any Member Organization so withdrawing shall remain obligated for its share of the Council's expenses for the year in which withdrawal occurred.

ARTICLE IV CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. TIME. The Championship shall be held biennially, starting in 1958, on such dates as the Council shall Jet ...

mine. Normally, the Championship shall be held in the second or the third week of October.

SECTION 2. PLACE. (a) The Championship shall be rotated among the three following zones in the order stated:

(1) European - African Zone -Countries of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.

(2) American Zone—Countries of North America, Caribbean America and South America.

- (3) Australasian Zone—Countries of Asia, Australia, New Zealand and Oceania.
- (b) The location of each Championship will be determined by the Council at its Biennial Meeting immediately preceding.

Invitations to entertain the Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the Biennial Meeting. The Secretary shall inform all Member Organizations of such invitations at least one month in advance of the Meeting.

ARTICLE V

AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. ENTRY DATES. Each Member Organization shall inform the Secretary biennially as to whether or not it will enter the Championship; such notification shall reach the Secretary not later than three months before the Championship. Later entries may be accepted if the Member Organization entertaining the Championship approves.

Each Member Organization which enters the Championship shall inform the Secretary of the personnel of its Team not later than one month before the Championship. Substitutions may be made at any subsequent time at the pleasure of the Member Organization.

SECTION 2. QUALIFICATION OF PLAYERS; AMATEUR STATUS. The players comprising each Team shall be:

(a) Amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews or The United States Golf Association; and

(b) Citizens of the country of the Member Organization represented, except that in cases where a Team of citizens would be impracticable, players normally resident in the country may be included. ond and third in each Championship.

Each Team shall have a captain, who may be either a player or a non-player.

SECTION 3. FORM, OF PLAY. (a) Each Team shall consist of three or four play-

(b) The Championship shall consist of 72 holes stroke play: 18 holes each on four consecutive days of the Championship period. All the players of each Team shall be eligible for all four rounds; disqualification of a player under the Rules of Golf in any round shall not be effective for any subsequent round unless the Administrative Committee determines otherwise.

In each 18-hole round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

The total of the three-player Team Scores for the four rounds shall be the Team's score for the Championship.

The Champion shall be the Team with the lowest such total score for 72 holes.

- (c) If a tie for the Championship occurs, the Teams concerned shall play off at 18 holes stroke play, the exact day to be determined in advance by the Member Organization entertaining the Championship. The Team with the lowest total score by three players shall win the play-off. Should an 18-hole play-off result in a further tie, the Teams so tied shall immediately continue to play off hole by hole until the winner is determined; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.
- (d) Any tie for second or third place shall be determined by a hole-by-hole play-off immediately after conclusion of the Championship proper and on the day of the fourth round; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.

SECTION 4. PRIZES. (a) The Eisenhower Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in the United States through The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

(b) Miniature replicas of The Eisenhower Trophy shall be awarded for the permanent possession of the Member Organizations whose teams finish first, sec-

(c) A uniform type of prize for individuals shall be awarded to the players and the Captain of the winning Team, the second-place Team and the third-place Team.

(d) No other prizes may be accepted from any source, except symbolic gifts by a Member Organization to its Team.

ARTICLE VI

CONDUCT OF CHAMPIONSHIP

The Member Organization entertaining the Championship shall have the honor of and be responsible for planning and conducting the Championship, subject to the applicable provisions of these Articles and approval by the Administrative Committee, and for all the expenses in connection therewith except the expenses of the Teams. Such Member Organization may charge admission to spectators and otherwise raise income as it may desire, and any excess of the proceeds over the expense shall be disposed of as the Council may determine.

No financial liability shall attach to either the Council or to any Member Organization other than the Member Organization entertaining the Championship.

ARTICLE VII

EXPENSES OF TEAMS

Each Member Organization shall be responsible for the expenses of its Team's players and captain.

ARTICLE VIII

COUNCIL MEETINGS

SECTION 1. BIENNIAL MEETING. The Council shall meet biennially on the day before the start of the Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting of the Council each Member Organization shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization, and who shall be present at the Meeting in person. Appointment of Delegates shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

SECTION 2. QUORUM. Ten Member Organizations represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting of the Council. tee.

SECTION 3. ACTION WITHOUT MEETING. Between Biennial Meetings, the Council may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the Member Organizations by the Secretary pursuant to direction of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 4. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote of the Delegates at a Biennial Meeting of the Council at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the Member Organizations in cases of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Council, subject to any additional requirements of other provisions of these Articles.

ARTICLE IX

ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. COMPOSITION. There shall be an Administrative Committee of nine persons representing seven Member Organizations; at least one Member Organization in each of the three respective Zones shall be represented. Each such person shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization he represents.

SECTION 2. NOMINATION, ELECTION. (a) The Administrative Committee shall serve as a Nominating Committee and shall propose to the Biennial Meeting a slate of Member Organizations to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee. Additional nominations may be made by delegates to the Biennial Meeting. The country entertaining the next Championship shall be represented in the Administrative Committee.

- (b) At each Biennial Meeting five Member Organizations shall be chosen, by ballot, to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association shall each be permanently entitled to appoint two representatives.
- (c) Each Member Organization so chosen shall promptly appoint its representative to the Administrative Committee and give the Secretary notification of the appointment. If a Delegate of any Member Organization so chosen is present at the Biennial Meeting, he shall thereupon become the appointee of his Member Organization to the Administrative Commit-

(d) A Member Organization shall have the right to change its appointee to the Administrative Committee at its pleasure; any such change shall become effective when the Secretary receives notification thereof.

SECTION 3. DUTIES. The Administrative Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Council, subject to the provisions of these Articles and to directions of the Council.

SECTION 4. MEETINGS. The retiring Administrative Committee shall meet immediately prior to the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

The Administrative Committee newly determined at the Biennial Meeting of the Council shall meet immediately after the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

SECTION 5. QUORUM. Three members present in person representing at least three Member Organizations shall constitute a quorum of the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 6. ACTION BETWEEN MEETINGS. Between meetings, the Administrative Committee may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the representatives to the Administrative Committee by the Secretary.

SECTION 7. MAJORITY DECISION. A majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the entire Administrative Committee in case of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Administrative Committee.

ARTICLE X

OFFICERS

SECTION 1. TITLES; ELECTION. (a) The officers of the Council shall be a Chairman, a Vice-Chairman and a Secretary, and the Chairman and the Vice-Chairman shall each be one of the representatives to the Administrative Committee, provided, however, that until at least the Biennial Meeting in 1962, there shall instead be two Joint Chairmen, who shall be representatives of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association. At each Biennial Meeting the Council shall determine by ballot the Member Organizations whose representatives to the Administrative Committee shall hold such respective offices for the ensuing two years. If either its representative to the Administrative Committee during such period, the successor shall assume the office concerned.

(b) The Secretary shall be appointed by the Administrative Committee.

SECTION 2. CHAIRMAN. The Chairman shall preside at meetings of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, and in general shall perform the customary duties of his office.

SECTION 3. VICE-CHAIRMAN. During the absence or inability of the Chairman, the Vice-Chairman shall perform the duties of the Chairman.

SECTION 4. SECRETARY. The Secretary shall keep the records of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, give notices of all meetings and conduct all votes by mail, carry on the correspondence of the Council, and perform all other customary duties of his office.

ARTICLE XI

LANGUAGE

The official language of the Council is

ARTICLE XII

CARE OF TROPHY

SECTION 1. PROTECTION. The United States Golf Association shall retain title to the Championship Trophy, and shall make arrangements for its insurance and for its safekeeping during any suspension of the Championship.

SECTION 2. DISSOLUTION OF COUNCIL. In the event of dissolution of the Council, such use or other disposition of the Championship Trophy shall be made as The United States Golf Association may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XIII

AMENDMENTS

These Articles may be amended by action of the Council; provided, however, that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status shall not be amended without the unanimous affirmative vote of the Member Organizations; that the provisions of these Articles with respect to permanent representation to the Administrative Committee and those with Member Organization concerned changes respect to the Joint Chairmen until the

1962 meeting shall not be amended without the affirmative votes of the respective Member Organizations concerned; and that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the ownership and custody of the Championship Trophy shall not be amended without the affirmative vote of The United States Golf Association; and provided further, that any amendment of these Articles increasing the monetary obligations of Member Organizations shall not be binding upon any Member Organization which voted against the amendment.

ARTICLE XIV

WOMEN'S AMATEUR TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

SECTION 1. REGULATIONS. The Council shall conduct biennially a Women's Amateur Team Championship for the Espirito Santo Trophy, open to Teams representing Member Organizations of the Women's Division.

All relevant provisions and principles of Articles IV, V, VI, VII and XII shall

apply except as follows:

Each Team shall consist of two or three players. In each 18-hole round, the total of the two lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

SECTION 2. PLACE AND TIME. The place and the time of the Women's Amateur Team Championship shall be determined by the Council. The Championship shall be held as near as feasible geographically to the Men's Championship and in an adjacent week or concurrently but preferably before the Men's Championship.

SECTION 3. PRIZES. The Espirito Santo Trophy, presented to the Council by the family of Ricardo Espirito Santo through The Portuguese Golf Federation, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

Symbolic miniature trophies shall be awarded for the permanent possession of the Member Organizations whose teams finish first, second and third in each Championship.

In the event of abandonment of the Women's Amateur Team Championship, such use or other disposition of the Espirito Santo Trophy shall be made as The Portuguese Golf Federation may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XV

WOMEN'S DIVISION

All relevant provisions and principles of the Articles shall apply to the Women's Division except as follows:

SECTION 1. MEMBERSHIP. Membership in the Women's Division is open to any organization which either:

(a) Is a Member Organization of the Council and has jurisdiction of women's amateur golf in its country. An application from a Member Organization of the Council for membership in the Women's Division shall be granted automatically.

--- OR ---

(b) Constitutes the sole central authority for women's amateur golf in its country and has adopted the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association. An application from such an organization shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines. Such an applicant may be elected by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

SECTION 2. FINANCES. Expenses of the Women's Amateur Team Championship as described in Article III, Section 3 shall be shared equally by the Member Organizations of the Women's Division.

SECTION 3. BIENNIAL MEETING. The Women's Division shall meet biennially two days before the start of the Women's Amateur Team Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting each Member Organization of the Women's Division shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be present in person and whose appointment shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

Eight Member Organizations of the Women's Division represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting.

SECTION 4. WOMEN'S COMMITTEE; CHAIR-MAN. There shall be a Women's Committee of nine persons representing nine Member Organizations of the Women's Division, three from each of the three respective Zones. At each Biennial Meeting there shall be chosen by ballot the nine Member Organizations which shall be entitled to appoint representatives to the Women's Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years.

One of these nine Member Organizations shall be chosen by ballot to receive the right to have its representative serve as Chairman of the Women's Division and the Women's Committee.

SECTION 5. DUTIES OF WOMEN'S COM-MITTEE. The Women's Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Women's Division, subject to directions of the Council, and shall advise the Council on matters relative to the Women's Amateur Team Championship. Matters of policy shall be determined by the Council.
