

1970 MEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

Since its beginnings in 1958, the World Team Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy has been truly an amateur event, primarily for the players. It is also a gathering of the nations, to compete together and to enjoy one another's company—and also to provide entertaining watching for spectators who may attend.

It was therefore encouraging when representatives of 36 nations entered the sixth World Amateur Team Championship at the Real Club de la Puerta de Hierro in Madrid, Spain, in September, 1970. This was the most ever to compete, a circumstance that must give comfort to those farsighted pioneers who organized the World Amateur Golf Council at the dawn of the age of jet airplane travel.


No matter that the United States won its fourth Championship, and rather handily at that; the really important development was the interest shown in friendly competition by so many peoples of differing backgrounds, races and national origins.


Look at some of the countries who attended—Papua/New Guinea, Finland, Peru, Pakistan, Iceland, Korea, Bermuda, Italy, the Republic of China. How diverse a gathering.


And yet even this fulfilment of the competition's purpose could not overshadow the victory of the United States Team. The Americans had a total score of 854 and won by 15 strokes over New Zealand, with 869.

The United States brought a particularly strong team to Spain, including Lanny Wadkins, who had won the United States Amateur Championship earlier in the month, and Tom Kite, Jr., who had finished second to Wadkins by one stroke. The other members of the United States Team were Marvin Giles, III, runnerup in the U.S. Amateur the three preceding years, and Allen L. Miller, III.

At the end of the first round, however, it looked as if the Americans would be

rather hard pressed to defend the Championship successfully. A 70 by Wadkins, 71 by Kite and 72 by Miller gave the Americans a team total of 213, but they were only one stroke ahead of South Africa. Dale Hayes scored 70, and Dave H. Symons and Hugh J. Baiocchi each had 72.

From that point, however, the United States simply widened its lead, going seven strokes ahead after the second round, and nine strokes in front after the third round.

The real battle was for second place, and at the end of the 36 holes it looked as if some team from other than an English speaking nation might finish higher than fifth place. Behind a marvelous 67 by Victor Regalado, Mexico tied South Africa at 433.

Mexico had been fifth in 1962 and again in 1966, and Argentina had been fifth in 1958, and so the prospects were promising that Mexico might be the first to better fifth place. This was as high as Mexico was to climb, however, and eventually the team finished fifth once more, four strokes away from second place, but only two away from fourth.

South Africa went into the final round leading Australia by two strokes and New Zealand by three. New Zealand finished with a rush, scoring 217 and overtaking South Africa as Edward John McDougall scored 70, Stuart Jones 73, and Ross Murray 75. South Africa slipped to 221 for the final round, and barely managed to hold off Australia. The Australians finished fourth, one stroke behind South Africa.

The superiority of the United States team was further emphasized by the experience of Giles. He scored 73 in each of the first two rounds, and yet neither of those scores counted. The three lowest scores from each round count toward the team total for that round, and every other member of the United States Team scored better. And then Kite was ill during the final round and didn't play. This was the only time during the competition that the United States had to include a score as high as 73. It was played by Miller.

Because this is strictly a team competition, individual scores are not recognized officially, but the performance of Victor Regalado should not go un-noticed. His 67 was the lowest single round of the competition, and his total of 280 was the lowest individual score by six strokes. Wadkins had the second lowest 72-hole score of 286.

In addition, his 67 paced Mexico to the low single round team score of 212.

Delegates and Duffers Cup

The Republic of China has but 13 golf courses for its 5,000 golfers, but those who play them must play well. K.U. Dzung, who plays to a 15 handicap, had a 36-hole net score of 140 and won the Delegates and Duffers Cup. George Wardman, of Bermuda, was second with net 144. Wardman has a 4 stroke handicap. Edward L. Meister, Jr., of the United States, won the guest division with 139.


Meeting of World Council

At the biennial meeting of the World Amateur Golf Council the format for the World Senior Amateur Championship was changed. Beginning with the 1971 World Senior Amateur Championship at the Fuji Golf Course in Kawana, Japan, the format will be as follows:

Thirty-six holes of stroke play by each four-man team, followed by singles match play in flights of four. The Number 1 players on two opposing teams will compete for a point, the Number 2 players will compete for a point, and so on. The team with the most points will win. The four lowest-scoring teams in the 36-hole qualifying round will comprise the Championship flight.; the four teams in positions five through eight will comprise the Second Flight.; and so on.

Previously the format for the World Senior Amateur Championship was four rounds of stroke play with the three lowest scores from each team counting toward a daily Team Score.

THE 1970 WOMEN'S TEAM CHAMPIONSHIP

In the mid 1930s one of the bitter battles of the Spanish Civil War raged over the valleys near what is now the R.S.H.E. Club de Campo.


Playing the fourth Women's World Amateur in such a setting brought home to the participants once more the principal purpose behind formation of the World Amateur Golf Council: to promote friendship and sportsmanship among people.

Twenty-two countries entered teams, the most since the inaugural Championship in Erance in 1964 and it was good to see

among them three countries that had not sent women's Teams before—Uruguay, Switzerland and Norway.

In contrast to the men's event a week earlier, competition in the Women's Championship was intense, and the issue was decided on the very last hole when Miss Martha Wilkinson sank a two-foot putt to give the United States a one-stroke victory. The United States had a team total of 598 and France 599. South Africa was another seven strokes behind France at

France took a four-stroke lead in the

Miss Sally Little of South Africa was the only player who managed to score the R.S.H.E. Club de Campo course,

first round behind a 70 by Mrs. Claudine Cros-Rubin and 71 by Miss Brigitte Varangot for a team total of 141. Miss Jane Bastanchury and Miss Cynthia Hill, meanwhile, combined for 145 for the United States.

France then increased its lead to seven strokes as Mrs. Catherine Lacoste de Prado scored 74.


The Americans cut their deficit to two strokes after 54 holes as Miss Bastanchury shot 75 and Miss Wilkinson 75 in the third round, setting the stage for the dramatic final round and a confrontation between Mrs. de Prado, the 1969 United States Women's Amateur Champion, and Miss Wilkinson, her successor.

They were grouped together for the fourth round, and after nine holes they were stroke-for-stroke. Then on the final nine holes Miss Wilkinson played steadily but Mrs. de Prado could not keep control of her game. She missed a 30-inch putt on the 10th, was short coming into the 491-yard par 5 12th, missed a three-foot putt on the 15th, and three-putted from 25 feet on the 16th. She was then four strokes behind Miss Wilkinson and the good French lead was gone. The French trailed by one stroke at the 18th, and to bring on a tie Mrs. de Prado had to hole a 30-footer. When it missed, and Miss Wilkinson sank her putt from two feet the United States had won its third straight women's Championship.

Individual awards are never given, but it is worth noting that Miss Sally Knight Little, of South Africa, was the only player able to break 300. Miss Little scored 76-74-74-75-299. Mrs. Rubin had one high round, and 81 but the others were so well played that she finished with 301.

Everyone seemed to enjoy their golf, under 300 for the four rounds on not the least Miss Masuyo Toyama, whose scores made an admirable downward progression-91-87-83-76.

ARTICLES

OF THE WORLD AMATEUR GOLF COUNCIL

Adopted May 2, 1958. Revised: October 7, 1958; October 6, 1964; October 26, 1966; October 8, 1968; and September 22, 1970.

ARTICLE I

The name of this council is The World Amateur Golf Council.

ARTICLE II

Object

Section 1. Friendship and Sportsmanship through Golf

The object of the Council is to foster friendship and sportsmanship among the peoples of the world through the conduct biennially of an Amateur Team Championship for the Eisenhower Trophy.

Section 2. Rules of Golf

The Championship shall be conducted in accordance with the Rules of Golf as approved by The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, and The United States Golf Association; however, if those organizations should have differing codes, the code of the host country shall apply.

ARTICLE III

Membership

Section 1. Eligibility

Membership in the Council is open to any organization which:

- (a) Constitutes the sole central authority for amateur golf in its country; and
- (b) Has adopted and administers the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association.

Section 2. Election

An application for membership shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines.

An applicant may be elected to Membership by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

Section 3. Finances

(a) Member Organizations shall pay annual dues of \$50, payable in January of each year in the ourrance of the Carratary's country unless withdrawal occurred.

prohibited by law or government regulation. Income from dues shall be used to defray all Council expenses relating to men's events. If expenses in a given year result in a deficit in the Council's account, which shall be located in the Secretary's country, the deficit shall be shared by those Member Organizations participating in the men's event held that year.

Expenses of the Council shall be limited to the following:

- (1) Insurance and maintenance of the Championship trophies;
 - (2) Provision of prizes for individuals;
- (3) Cost of stationery, postage, printing and other communications incurred by the Secretary of the Council.

Income shall be limited to dues and monies accumulated to eliminate a deficit.

No Member Organization may incur any expense for the Council, and no representative of the Council shall have authority to incur any expense except as expressly stated herein.

- (b) Any other expense incident to the affairs of the Council shall be borne by the Member Organization whose representative incurs such expense.
- (c) The expense of conducting the Championship shall be borne by the Member Organization entertaining it.

Section 4. Obligations and Discipline

The acceptance of membership in the Council shall bind each Member Organization to uphold all the provisions of these Articles and any rules or actions of the Council or the Administrative Committee.

Any Member Organization failing in these obligations or ceasing to meet the eligibility requirements may be suspended or expelled by the Council.

Section 5. Withdrawal

Any Member Organization may withdraw from membership by notifying the Secretary to that effect.

Any Member Organization so withdrawing shall remain obligated for its share of the Council's expenses for the year in which

ARTICLE IV

Championship

Section 1. Time

The Championship shall be held biennially, starting in 1958, on such dates as the Council shall determine. Normally, the Championship shall be held in the second or the third week of October.

Section 2. Place

- (a) The Championship shall be rotated among the three following zones in the order stated:
- (1) European-African Zone Countries of Europe, Africa and the Middle East.
- (2) American Zone Countries of North America, Caribbean America and South America.
- (3) Australasian Zone Countries of Asia, Australia, New Zealand and Oceania.
- (b) The location of each Championship will be determined by the Council at its Biennial Meeting immediately preceding.

Invitations to entertain the Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the Biennial Meeting. The Secretary shall inform all Member Organizations of such invitations at least one month in advance of the Meeting.

Championship invitations shall not be issued and pertinent advertising/promotion shall not be engaged in more than 3½-years in advance.

ARTICLE V

Amateur Team Championship

Section 1. Entry Dates

Each Member Organization shall inform the Secretary blennially as to whether or not it will enter the Championship; such notification shall reach the Secretary not later than three months before the Championship. Later entries may be accepted if the Member Organization entertaining the Championship approves.

Each Member Organization which enters the Championship shall inform the Secretary of the personnel of its Team not later than one month before the Championship. Substitutions may be made at any subsequent time at the pleasure of the Member Organization.

Section 2. Qualification of Players; Amateur Status

The players comprising each Team shall be:

- (a) Amateur golfers under the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews or The United States Golf Association; and
- (b) Citizens of the country of the Member Organization represented, except that in cases

players normally resident in the country may be included.

Each Team shall have a captain, who may be either a player or a non-player.

Section 3. Form of Play

- (a) Each Team shall consist of three or four players.
- (b) The Championship shall consist of 72 holes stroke play: 18 holes each on four consecutive days of the Championship period. All the players of each Team shall be eligible for all four rounds; disqualification of a player under the Rules of Golf in any round shall not be effective for any subsequent round unless the Administrative Committee determines otherwise.

In each 18-hole round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

The total of the three-player Team Scores for the four rounds shall be the Team's score for the Championship.

The Champion shall be the Team with the lowest such total score for 72 holes.

- (c) If a tie for the Championship occurs, the Teams concerned shall play off at 18 holes stroke play, the exact day to be determined in advance by the Member Organization entertaining the Championship. The Team with the lowest total score by three players shall win the playoff. Should an 18-hole playoff result in a further tie, the Teams so tied shall immediately continue to play off hole by hole until the winner is determined; the total of the three lowest scores will be the Team score for each hole.
- (d) Any tie for second or third place shall not be played off.

Section 4. Prizes

- (a) The Eisenhower Trophy, presented to the Council by friends of golf in the United States through The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.
- (b) A uniform type of prize for individuals shall be awarded to the players and the Captain of the winning Team, the second-place Team and the third-place Team.
- (c) No other prizes may be accepted from any source, except symbolic gifts by a Member Organization to its Team.

ARTICLE VI

Conduct of Championship

The Member Organization entertaining the Championship shall have the honor of and be responsible for planning and conducting the where a Team of citizens would be impracticable, Championship, subject to the applicable provisions of these Articles and approval by the Administrative Committee, and for all the expenses in connection therewith except the expenses of the Teams. Such Member Organization may charge admission to spectators and otherwise raise income as it may desire, and any excess of the proceeds over the expenses shall be disposed of as the Council may determine.

No financial liability shall attach to either the Council or to any Member Organization other than the Member Organization entertaining the Championship.

ARTICLE VII

Expenses of Teams

Each Member Organization shall be responsible for the expenses of its Team's players and captain.

ARTICLE VIII

Council Meetings

Section 1. Biennial Meeting

The Council shall meet biennially on the day before the start of the Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting of the Council each Member Organization shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization, and who shall be present at the Meeting in person. Appointment of Delegates shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

Section 2. Quorum

Ten Member Organizations represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting of the Council.

Section 3. Action Without Meeting

Between Biennial Meetings, the Council may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the Member Organizations by the Secretary pursuant to direction of the Administrative Committee.

Section 4. Majority Decision

A majority vote of the Delegates at a Biennial Meeting of the Council at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the Member Organizations in cases of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Council, subject to any additional requirements of other provisions of these Articles.

ARTICLE IX

Administrative Committee

Section 1. Composition

There shall be an Administrative Committee of nine persons representing seven Member Organizations; at least one Member Organization in each of the three respective Zones shall be represented. Each such person shall be a citizen or normally a resident of the country of the Member Organization he represents.

Section 2. Nomination; Election

- (a) The Administrative Committee shall serve as a Nominating Committee and shall propose to the Biennial Meeting a slate of Member Organizations to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee. Additional nominations may be made by delegates to the Biennial Meeting. The country entertaining the next Championship shall be represented in the Administrative Committee.
- (b) At each Biennial Meeting five Member Organizations shall be chosen, by ballot, to receive the right to appoint one representative each to the Administrative Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years. The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association shall each be permanently entitled to appoint two representatives.
- (c) Each Member Organization so chosen shall promptly appoint its representative to the Administrative Committee and give the Secretary notification of the appointment. If a Delegate of any Member Organization so chosen is present at the Biennial Meeting, he shall thereupon become the appointee of his Member Organization to the Administrative Committee.
- (d) A Member Organization shall have the right to change its appointee to the Administrative Committee at its pleasure; any such change shall become effective when the Secretary receives notification thereof.

Section 3. Duties

The Administrative Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Council, subject to the provisions of these Articles and to directions of the Council.

Section 4. Meetings

The retiring Administrative Committee shall meet immediately prior to the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

The Administrative Committee newly determined at the Biennial Meeting of the Council shall meet immediately after the Biennial Meeting of the Council.

Section 5. Quorum

Three members present in person representing at least three Member Organizations shall constitute a quorum of the Administrative Committee.

Section 6. Action between Meetings

Between meetings, the Administrative Committee may take action by mail vote on resolutions submitted to the representatives to the Administrative Committee by the Secretary.

Section 7. Majority Decision

A majority vote at a meeting at which a quorum is present, or a majority vote of the entire Administrative Committee in case of action by mail, shall determine any question before the Administrative Committee.

ARTICLE X

Officers

Section 1. Titles; Election

- (a) The officers of the Council shall be two Joint Chairmen who shall be representatives of The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews and The United States Golf Association, and a Secretary. The Joint Chairmen shall each be one of the representatives to the Administrative Committee. At each Biennial Meeting the Council shall determine by ballot the Member Organizations whose representatives to the Administrative Committee shall hold such respective offices for the ensuing two years. If any Member Organization concerned changes its representative to the Administrative Committee during such period, the successor shall assume the office concerned.
- (b) The Secretary shall be appointed by the Administrative Committee.

Section 2. Chairman

One of the Joint Chairmen shall preside at meetings of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, and in general shall perform the customary duties of his office.

Section 3. Secretary

The Secretary shall keep the records of the Council and of the Administrative Committee, give notices of all meetings and conduct all votes by mail, carry on the correspondence of the Council, and perform all other customary duties of his office.

ARTICLE XI

Language

The official language of the Council is English.

ARTICLE XII

Care of Trophy

Section 1. Protection

The United States Golf Association shall retain title to the Championship Trophy, and shall make arrangements for its insurance and for its safekeeping during any suspension of the Championship.

Section 2. Dissolution of Council

In the event of dissolution of the Council, such use or other disposition of the Championship Trophy shall be made as The United States Golf Association may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XIII

Amendments

These Articles may be amended by action of the Council; provided, however, that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the Rules of Golf and the Rules of Amateur Status shall not be amended without the unanimous affirmative vote of the Member Organizations; that the provisions of these Articles with respect to permanent representation to Administrative Committee and those with respect to the Joint Chairmen until the 1962 meeting shall not be amended without the affirmative votes of the respective Member Organizations concerned; and that the provisions of these Articles with respect to the ownership and custody of the Championship Trophy shall not be amended without the affirmative vote of The United States Golf Association; and provided further, that any amendment of these Articles increasing the monetary obligations of Member Organizations shall not be binding upon any Member Organization which voted against the amendment.

ARTICLE XIV

Women's Amateur Team Championship

Section 1. Regulations

The Council shall conduct biennially a Women's Amateur Team Championship for the Espirito Santo Trophy, open to Teams representing Member Organizations of the Women's Division.

All relevant provisions and principles of Articles IV, V, VI, VII and XII shall apply except as follows:

Each Team shall consist of two or three players. In each 18-hole round, the total of the two lowest scores by players of each Team shall constitute the Team score for that round.

Section 2. Place and Time

The place and the time of the Women's Amateur Team Championship shall be determined by the Council. The Championship shall be held as near as feasible geographically to the Men's Championship and in an adjacent week or concurrently but preferably before the Men's Championship.

Section 3. Prizes

The Espirito Santo Trophy, presented to the Council by the family of Ricardo Espirito Santo through The Portuguese Golf Federation, shall be held for the ensuing biennium by the Member Organization whose Team is the winner.

In the event of abandonment of the Women's Amateur Team Chapionship, such use or other disposition of the Espirito Santo Trophy shall be made as The Portuguese Golf Federation may in its discretion determine.

ARTICLE XV

Women's Division

All relevant provisions and principles of the Articles shall apply to the Women's Division except as follows:

Section 1. Membership

Membership in the Women's Division is open to any organization which either:

- (a) Is a Member Organization of the Council and has jurisdiction of women's amateur golf in its country. An application from a Member Organization of the Council for membership in the Women's Division shall be granted automatically.
- (b) Constitutes the sole central authority for women's amateur golf in its country and has adopted the Rules of Amateur Status of either The Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, Scotland, or The United States Golf Association. An application from such an organization shall be supported by copies of the applicant's constitution and by-laws or similar documents and such other data as the Administrative Committee determines. Such an applicant may be elected by the Council after determination by the Administrative Committee that the requirements for membership have been met.

Section 2. Finances

The principles of Article III, Section 3 shall apply to Women's Division Members to defray all Council expenses relating to women's events.

Section 3. Biennial Meeting

The Women's Division shall meet biennially two days before the start of the Women's Amateur Team Championship and at the place of the Championship.

At a Biennial Meeting each Member Organization of the Women's Division shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate, who shall be present in person and whose appointment shall be certified to the Secretary in advance.

Eight Member Organizations of the Women's Division represented by Delegates present in person shall constitute a quorum at a Biennial Meeting.

Section 4. Women's Committee; Chairman

There shall be a Women's Committee of nine persons representing nine Member Organizations of the Women's Division, three from each of the three respective Zones. At each Biennial Meeting there shall be chosen by ballot the nine Member Organizations which shall be entitled to appoint representatives to the Women's Committee, to serve for the ensuing two years.

One of these nine Member Organizations shall be chosen by ballot to receive the right to have its representative serve as Chairman of the Women's Division and the Women's Committee,

Section 5. Duties of Women's Committee

The Women's Committee shall conduct the affairs of the Women's Division, subject to directions of the Council, and shall advise the Council on matters relative to the Women's Amateur Team Championship. Matters of policy shall be determined by the Council.

ARTICLE XVI

Senior Amateur Team Championship

Section 1. General

The Council shall conduct a Senior Amateur Team Championship, open to Teams representing the Member Organizations.

Competitors shall be at least 55 years of age on the first day of the Championship.

All relevant provisions and principles of Articles IV, V, VI, VII and XII shall apply except as follows.

Section 2. Time

The Championship shall be conducted biennially in the Autumn, in alternate years from the Men's and Women's Championships. Specific dates should be subject to approval of the Administrative Committee.

Section 3. Place

(a) Each Member Organization will be invited to send a delegate to a meeting to be held during the Senior Championship to consider invitations to entertain the next Senior Championship. The recommendation of the delegates at this meeting shall be subject to approval of the Administrative Committee.

(b) Invitations to entertain the Senior Championship shall be submitted by Member Organizations to the Secretary at least three months in advance of the meeting of delegates.

Section 4. Form of Play

(a) Each Team shall consist of four players.

(b) The Championship shall consist of a 36-hole stroke play qualifying competition over two days, 18 holes on the first Championship day and 18 holes on the second Championship day, followed by two rounds of match play over two days in flights of 4.

(c) In each 18-hole qualifying round, the total of the three lowest scores by players of a Team shall constitute the Team's score for that round. The total of a Team's three-player scores for the two rounds shall be the Team's qualifying score.

(d) Teams shall be placed in flights for match play according to qualifying scores, with the four lowest-scoring Teams comprising the Championship Flight, the Teams in positions 5 through 8 comprising the Second Flight, and so on.

(e) In event of a tie for last place in the Championship Flight, there shall be a sudden-death playoff among all players of the tied Teams, with the three lowest scores by players of a Team constituting the Team's score for a hole. A tie for last place in any other flight shall be decided by lot.

(f) In each flight, Teams shall be numbered 1 through 4 based on qualifying scores. In event of a tie, Team numbers shall be decided by lot. In the first round of match play Team No. 1 shall play Team No. 3, and Team No. 2 shall play Team No. 4. In the second round of match play, the first-round winners shall play for first place and the first-round losers shall play for third place. Prizes shall be awarded to each member of the first, second and third place Teams in each flight.

- (g) The winner of a match shall be determined as follows: Prior to each match, each Team Captain shall present to the Committee by a specified time his Team's line-up, i.e., a list of his players numbered 1 through 4. The No. 1 players of two opposing Teams shall play an 18-hole match for one point, the No. 2 players shall play for a point, and so on. In event of a tied match, each player shall be awarded ½ point. The Team with the most points shall be the winner.
- (h) In event of a tie between two opposing Teams in the Championship Flight, there shall be a sudden-death playoff among all players of both teams, i.e., the first Team "up" after a hole shall be the winner. For example, if the No. 1 player of Team A wins the first extra hole from the No. 1 player of Team B, the No. 2 player of

Team B wins the first extra hole from the No. 2 player of Team A, the No. 3 player of Team A wins the first extra hole from the No. 3 player of Team B and the No. 4 players of the two teams halve the first extra hole, Team A would be the winner. Ties in other flights shall be decided on a margin-of-victory basis. If the opposing Teams are also tied on a margin-of-victory basis, there shall be a sudden-death playoff as in the Championship Flight. The winner on a margin-of-victory basis is the Team with the highest figure when the margin-of-victory figures of its winning players are totaled. For example, if players No. 1 and 3 of Team A win by 4-2 and 2-1 and players No. 2 and 4 of Team B win by 3-2 and 2-1, Team A would be the winner as the total of its margin-of-victory figures is 9 (4+2+2+1) compared with 8 (3+2+2+1) for Team

- (i) All matches in a given flight will tee off in immediate succession. If necessary, play shall be in groups of four, i.e., the No. 1 players of two opposing Teams would play their match concurrently with the No. 2 players of the same Teams. They would be followed immediately by the No. 3 and 4 players of the same Team.
- (j) If the total number of Teams entered is divisible by 4, each flight shall comprise four Teams. If the total is not divisible by 4, the following schedule will be used. In flights of less than four Teams, bye(s) shall be used for the last place(s):



Section 5. Prizes

In the event of abandonment of the Senior Amateur Team Championship, such use or other disposition of the Shun Nomura Trophy shall be made as the Japan Golf Association may in its discretion determine.
