Bunkers shown on the putting green plans will have faces of the depth shown on the plans. All others will have a minimum face of 0.75 m., except those at the which will have a minimum of 1.00 m.

All bunker faces will of course be re-vetted with turf or heather sods, as laid down in "Instructions and Conditions". You will doubtless await suitable weather before proceeding with this part of the work.

Regarding paths and steps, you have a letter and a plan on this subject, and a great deal of thought has been given to it. No wide departure should be made from the decisions already reached unless after consideration you see any possibility of improvement. In this latter case, perhaps you will be so good as to write to me explaining the changes which you wish to make. If your son is in charge of this part of the work he should look at him the plan, read the letter again, and have a copy with him. In looking at him the beginning which has alreading been made with paths steps, the principal points which struck me are:-

- 1. Players wish to go as straight as they can from one point to another, except in the case of very pronounced gradients. They will not tolerate a path which wanders about for no definite reason. In this respect a golf course differs from a garden.
- 2. Narrow grass paths are not much use anywhere, and are particulary useless on ridges. In such places wooden paths are the things to use, 0,60m. broad, solidly made, and treated with some satisfactory preservative.

The other principal points which we noted on the course are as follows:-

Ist Green. The slope on the left is too steep. The top of the cut should be carried back at least another 5 metres, and the foot of the slope should be carried out to the outer edge of the white sand lying along the water trench.

6th Hole. The nose in front of T.C. should be removed.
The hollow in the left on the fairway is much too deep.

8th Hole. Remove large bush on right near green.

9th Hole. Make the championship part of the tee a bit bigger.

10th Hole. T.B. points too much to the left, The second T.B. has not yet been begun.

13th Hole. Tees not begun yet.

14th Hole. T.B.not flat and not high enough. It is aimed too much to the left. The lump in front of it is too high and too flat.

Fairway 15m. broad will be required at the foot of the big bank to the left of the approach, and steps up it.

16th Hole. T.A. Should follow the line of the dune.

I hope that you will keep me informed once a week about the seeding situation. Wilk I Will go over again at any moment when a visit would be of use, but, so far as I can foresee the future, the end of October or beginning of November would be about the right time. If any points of doubt arise, please do not hesitate to write to me.
