## A NEW GOLF PICTURE.

Barrauds, Limited, the well-known photographic artists, of 263, Oxford Street, have long been known for the high-class finish of their work, and the bold, striking combinations of some of their difficult and complex composite pictures. Following the precedent set in the case of large club groups of the Royal Liverpool and the Royal Blackheath Clubs, Messrs. Barrauds have set themselves the task of commemorating the inauguration of the Parliamentary Golf match by a photographic picture, on the same lines as the others. This picture of the players who took part in the competition is now ready, and certainly a more handsome piece of artistic work could not be conceived. In the foreground is the captain of the Tooting Bec Golf Club, the Marquis of Granby, who is represented holing out the ball. On the left stands Mr. A. J. Balfour, while next to him are Sir Herbert Maxwell and Mr. Seton-Karr. On the right stands Mr. John Penn, in a characteristic attitude, Mr. Milvain, Q.C., Lord Balfour of Burleigh, Mr. T. W. Legh, Mr. Broadhurst, Captain McCalmont, Mr. Bigwood, Mr. S. Hoare, Mr. Donald Crawford, Sir W. Houldsworth, Mr. Shaw Stewart, and Mr. H. Tollemache, the winner of this year's handicap. The grouping has been carried out with great care and judgment. wealth of oak foliage forming the background to the picture makes as pleasing a setting as the eye could wish to dwell upon. The picture is a permanent one, and for the purposes of club-house decoration no more fitting memento of an interesting match on the old Tooting common could be hung on the walls.

#### HUDDERSFIELD GOLF CLUB.

Final round.—There was a great deal of speculation as to the result of the final, Dr. Mackenzie gaining considerable support on account of his steady play, and Mr. Woodhead on account of his brilliancy. Both qualities were shown, for as the result of a fine 87 for the first eighteen holes, Mr. Woodhead lead by 5, while in the second, Dr. Mackenzie took the first five holes, and made the game all square. From this point it was pretty much of a neck-and-neck race, Mr. Woodhead, however, coming in the ultimate winner by 2 up and I to play. He thus becomes entitled to hold the Dartmouth bowl for the year, and wins outright the silver tankard presented as a memento by Mr. A. L. Woodhead.

On Friday evening of last week the first annual dinner of the members of the Huddersfield Golf Club took place, at the George Hotel,

the Earl of Dartmouth in the chair. Covers were laid for between sixty and seventy gentlemen, and an excellent dinner was served by the management of the hotel. The president and the captain wore their Golf coats.

After the loyal toasts had been proposed by the president, he proposed "The Huddersfield Golf Club," and, in doing so, remarked that the game had been described as an excellent one for old men and for invalids, and that as a game of skill croquet was much superior; and he was bound to admit that until recently he was one of that class of people who believed that. He described his own experience of introduction to Golf, and said that those who imagined that slavery had gone out in this country would find themselves mistaken, for once they began to follow the Golf ball they would feel bound to follow wherever it might lead them, for the rest of their natural existence— (applause)—and from that moment their troubles began. He had been endeavouring to think of some crumb of comfort to those who suffered like himself, and were somewhat in the habit of commencing with a putt, but the only crumb he could think of was the feeling that the worse they played the more play they got. He thought he might commend to the notice of Golf-players the lines -

> "Hope springs eternal in the human breast, Man never is, but always to be, blest.

He had endeavoured to study works which had been written about the game by various authors, but without any satisfactory results; but among other things he came across a French version of the game, which was that the first year's player was described as "a bunkerre," a second year's player "a putterre," and a third year's player "a cadie"—(laughter)—and he was further told that the title was derived from an Eastern potentate. From whatever point of view they looked at it, they might congratulate themselves on the success that the Huddersheld Club had attained. He thought it was a matter of great satisfaction that the ladies had taken up the club in the way they had, and both as regarded the number and quality of players they were in

an eminently satisfactory position.

Mr. A. L. Woodhead sang the song entitled "Round the Links," written by Mr. Harry Huth, to the tune of "A Fine Hunting Day,"

and it was received with much applause.

Mr. Huth, the captain of the club, said when he was first asked to become captain, he asked, "What has the captain to do?" and the best answer was to be found in the question, what has a captain not to do? The captain had to be prepared at any moment to listen to the grievances of the members, and endeavour to find a remedy for them; and, like the policeman in the opera, the captain's life was not a happy one, although he must say that he had at the same time many agreeable one, although he must say that he had at the same time many agreeable duties to perform. A very gratifying feature of the club was the number of lady-members, who took great interest in the game and were very enthusiastic; but he could not help thinking, without any disrespect to the lady-members, that they would much more enjoy the play on the longer course if they learnt to play on a shorter one. (Laughter.) He expressed the pleasure he personally felt at the way in which their professional. Head had come out in the competitions in in which their professional, Herd, had come out in the competitions in which he had been engaged, and said he was exceedingly pleased to find him mentioned in the papers as Alec. Herd, of Hudders-field, because it would be of considerable benefit to the Huddersfield

Lord 'Dartmouth then distributed the prizes - a challenge bowl (handicap) and an Oxford silver pint, presented by the club, to Mr. Harold Crosland, and the Dartmouth challenge bowl (scratch), accompanied by an Oxford silver pint presented by Mr. A. L. Woodhead, to Mr. F. E. Woodhead.

Mr. J. Shaw Gaunt then proposed the toast of "Golf," and confessed at the outset that he was a great enthusiast at the game, which he contended was one of the pleasantest of outdoor pastimes.

The chorus of the song, "Round the Links," was once more sung,

Mr. J. E. Webb proposed, in very felicitous terms, "The Committee and Officers," and it was responded to by Mr. J. H. Dransfield and Mr. F. H. Shaw.

Dr. MacKenzie proposed, in a speech largely interspersed with Golf

anecdotes, the health of the president.

# A FOLDING GOLF CADDIE.

On links where caddies are not readily procurable, various devices have been resorted to in order to lessen the burden of carrying clubs by the player himself, who has to continually lay them flat on the



ground, and then stoop to pick them up. We have noticed several Golf club rests in these columns from time to time; but one of the best and simplest is the "Folding Golf Caddie" recently brought out by the Scottish Golf Company, 5, St. Vincent Place, Glasgow. It is really a walking-stick with an automatic arrangement to let down and fold up as shown in the accompanying sketch.

If golfers will turn to the advertisement on another page, they will see how the caddie works

The advantages claimed for it are these:-1st, It is light, portable, and reliable; 2nd, It can be put in position or folded up in a single movement, and can be used as a walking-stick between stokes; 3rd, It can be strapped up with the clubs, or put in a bag, without receiving or causing injury; 4th, It can be used in addition, and as accessory to usual caddie bag; 5th, By using the Automatic Caddie, the club-handles never get wet or require to touch the ground; 6th, It gives every facility for a quick selection of clubs; 7th, It removes all cause of stooping to lift clubs, an advantage which all players will readily admit; 8th, It is cheap, will repay its cost in a few weeks, and will not easily get out of repair, having no complicated movement.

No arrangement could be more simple or more economical. By using this caddie the labour of carrying one's own clubs is reduced minimum, rendering the attendance of the paid caddie practically superfluous.

# GOLFING BY MOONLIGHT.

Four Edinburgh golfers one night last week, taking advantage of the favourable opportunity, had a moonlight round of the Braid course, and the result of their play will no doubt prove interesting to our readers. The match was a foursome, and, as such, the count was by holes; but, out of curiosity for the purpose of seeing what could be done, the scores were kept, and these we append. Every hole was played out. Out, winners, 8 8 5 7 7 6 5 6 5=57; In, 6 4 7 7 6 5 7 4 6=52; total, 109. Out, losers, 8 13 6 7 6 6 7 6 5=64; In, 8 7 6 8 8 7 6 5 9=64; total, 128. In justice to the latter it should be stated that they were quite unacquainted with this novel style of play, which their opponents, on the other hand, had a decided advantage in so far as previous knowledge and experience, gained through playing under similar circumstances about a year ago, enabled them to overcome nearly all the difficulties presented, difficulties which were only encountered on the putting-greens. Only one fore caddie was employed, and his duties certainly were not of an insignificant kind. Amid dead silence all the strokes were made, and the mode of procedure was for the fore caddie to listen for the stroke, and when the ball dropped to indicate by whistle that he had ascertained its locality, after which the next drive was sent off, and not till the signal had again been given, was the teeing ground deserted. Slow as this process may appear, it is a striking fact that the round took no longer than usual, namely, 2 hours 25 minutes, and those who know the Braids will be all the more interested in the result. Strange to say no balls were lost, although ample provision was made for this; and perhaps more remarkable still a "gutta" was found by one of the players, while another peculiar feature of the game was that not a single ball had an unplay able lie, giving a clear game all through without any penalties, a feat seldom accomplished even in ordinary play. A cloudless sky and a seldom accomplished even in ordinary play. A cloudless sky and a brilliant moon gave all concerned no cause to complain. With these favourable accompaniments the line of drive was almost invariably defined, and in the case of the half strokes the ball itself could in the majority of cases be distinctly seen. A gusty wind troubled the players for several holes out, and this undoubtedly had a detrimental effect on the scores. The only club used was the iron, but from the experience gained, the cleek for driving purposes, it was considered, would be of material advantage. The low scoring gives birth to an idea which may yet be countenanced by golfing enthusiasts, and that is the novelty of playing a certain number of club competitions au beau clair de lune. this is possible has been proved, and an amusing feature of this match is that in the case of two of the gentlemen concerned better individual results were attained with the one club in the moonlight than has on many occasions followed them when playing in broad daylight with a fully-equipped bag. Taken collectively, the foursome was but an average one, and the accomplishment is therefore all the more sur-With a picked team a record score is not at all impossible. On crowded greens, as in the case of the Braids, where a two or even a there hours' wait is quite a common occurrence, this innovation might be worth a trial. Moreover, as a factor in keeping up "form" during the close season the novelty is valuable, and ought in the end to tell in favour of the "moonlighter."

MORTONHALL GOLF CLUB, EDINBURGH.—The competition for the monthly medal took place on Saturday at Mortonhall. Twenty-eight members started, and play was, for the first time, over the extended course of eighteen holes. From Saturday's play the new course would seem to be considerably easier than the old one; for while the lowest scratch score returned in a competition hitherto has been 100, made by Mr. John Turner at the autumn meeting, the round was completed on Saturday in 83—a figure which will presumably be reduced when the new greens have been brought into the same good state as the old greens, and other contemplated improvements are carried out. The results of the competition were:—Medal and first prize, Mr. Alex. Black, 83, less 8=75; second and third prizes (tie), Messrs. John Johnston and F. J. Walden, 84, less 2=82.

The first Golf championship tournament ever held in South Africa took place over Kimberley course at the end of September. Six couples competed, representing chiefly the Kimberley, Capetown, and Port Elizabeth clubs. The play, which extended over four days, and was under hole and scratch conditions, excited not a little interest. After a keen contest, the winner of the gold medal and championship of South Africa proved to be Mr. George Denholm Walker, a young gentleman who hails from North Berwick, and some two or three years since held the appointment of organist in the U. P. Church there. Mr. Walker had quite a severe struggle for victory, as in the first round of the tournament he won by a single hole; in the second round the result was similar, in the third round he drew a bye, and in the final he won the championship only at the home hole.

Moonlight matches appear to have grown fairly popular in North Berwick since the recent foursomes in which Mr. Gordon Robertson and Sayers were partnered against Mr. Stuart Anderson and Davie Grant. On Friday evening last some of the members of the Bass Rock Club were out in foursome play in moonlight, and a return match was played on Saturday evening. On the same night, Mr. Gordon Robertson and Mr. Stuart Anderson also enjoyed the novelty of a moonlight game, the weather being delightfully fine

John Donald, Lossiemouth, has been appointed greenkeeper and club-maker to the Peterhead Golf Club.

One of the peculiarities of the great increase of Golf in recent years has been the opportunities which the enthusiasm for the game has afforded to writers to enlarge more or less veraciously on the fascination which it somehow exercises over those who take it up. The Scotch, with their habitual economy, have condensed the experience into one picturesquely descriptive phrase current as a proverb, "Once a golfer, always a golfer;" but some writers, prodigal of words if not of humour, and with an eye to the outside public, try, with no great measure of success, to raise a laugh at the expense of those who are undergoing a rigorous schooling in the technicalities of a the game.

Thus, in one of the reviews, Mr. R. C. Lehmann, discourses upon what he calls the danger of the "golf bacillus." This is what he says on the point:—" The bicycle-chest may be dreadful, but I think the golf-straddle, the golf-waggle, and the golf-twist are at least as alaiming. Whenever I meet a friend golf-twist are at least as alarming. Whenever I meet a friend coming along Pall Mall with his legs wide apart, his head and shoulders twisted round backwards, and his hands aimlessly swaying his umbrella, I know at once what has happened to him. The golf bacillus has got him. Henceforth, though he may be a good husband, an indulgent father, a kind friend, and a sound man of business, he is lost-hopelessly, irretrievably lost. beautiful sights and sounds of nature have for him no sweetness (unless, indeed, that sweetness be linked and drawn out over eighteen holes). He who in happier days was content to argue on foreign policy or the latest literary marvel now discusses with a fatal zest the last attempt of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club to codify its rules and bring them down to the level of the Southern understanding; his dreams are disturbed by nightmare visions of bunkers; his days are made hateful to him by stimies; and he would think nothing of losing the world if only he could manage not to miss the globe."

\* \* \*

This, of course, is humour pure and simple, though Mr. Lehmann's Pall Mall friend, with "his head and shoulders twisted round backwards," reads like a splendid derangement of epitaphs. Such a sight would, indeed, evoke the commiseration of any kind friend, and possibly the guardians of public order might have something to say to the eventual disposal of such a sorry spectacle. But Mr Lehmann's object was to tickle the ears of the groundlings, not to draw a portrait approximately true, either in perspective or humourous suggestiveness of detail. That is evident enough; and the funny thing is that a nation which prides itself upon possessing the faculty of readily perceiving a joke should have a newspapaper which takes Mr. Lehmann au serieux. In commenting on the above passage, a southern newspaper says: "Everybody who has been in the society of golfers will recognise the truth of this picture. . . Golf threatens to alter the physique of the race, and to enslave its mind. . . . If this malign supremacy of a single pastime should endure for the next ten or fifteen years, we shall see a younger generation totally incapable of any idea or exertion outside the links." Really Mr. Lehmann owes it to his countrymen when next he draws a Golf picture, to think seriously of Artemus Ward's advice, and add to his description, "This is a goak."

Owing to the exceptionally heavy rainfall of the past few weeks, and the incomplete drainage works, the new ground of the Tooting Bec Golf Club has become so sodden that the committee have thought it advisable to postpone the autumn meeting, which was to have taken place on the 10th, 11th, and 12th inst.

A few months ago we showed in an article how intimately local prosperity in some quarters was bound up with Golf and the promotion of its interests by those who had the power to do so. In an article in the *Journal des Etrangers* setting out the advantages which have accrued to Pau by the Golf Club and fox-hunting attracting rich English visitors during the winter, crowding the hotels and lodging-houses, we find this passage:—"Le Golf est un sport sérieux, passionnant, fort pratiqué en Angleterre et l'on peut assurer hardiment que pour le moment et jusqu'au jour où la transformation radicale de Pau, la création d'amusements sédentaires qui manquent, la construction, qui s'impose de plus en plus, d'un grand Casino, auront attiré une nouvelle clientèle dans notre ville, les quatre cinquièmes des étrangers qui arrivent sont attirés par le Golf et la Chasse."

# GULLANE COMMON.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—As the secretary of the committee appointed to safeguard the right of the golfers and the general public in the Gullane links, I have read with some surprise the notice under the heading "Tee Shots" in your impression of the 28th ult. I would have written to you on this subject before, but I did not see the notice until it was too late to have my letter inserted in last week's GOLF.

I believe it is quite true that certain of the "local golfers," namely, some of those who reside in Gullane in summer, would have no objection to the public generally being excluded from the links, and these being made a private green. A number of these gentlemen refused all subscription whatever towards the movement to protect the interests of golfers.

It is, however, contrary to the fact to say, or to hint, that there was any intention on the part of the committee which I represent to seek to obtain a decision which would enable the green to be made into private links. This is fully apparent from the result of the case. The sole object which the committee has in view, and to which the subscriptions will be applied, is to maintain the right of Mr. Cowe, the respondent, and of the public generally, to golf over the links without any restriction whatever. The efforts of the committee in this direction have been successful. What has been now decided is that Mr. Cowe was not entitled to train his horses on the Common, while interdict (or injunction) against trespassing on

the links, which necessarily includes golfing, has been refused.

The case thus, as a whole, has resulted in maintaining the status quo as regards Golf, and disappointing the wishes and hopes of Mrs. Ogilvy and the private green men.

# To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—I have played Golf for thirty-three years, and am just mastering the rudiments of the game. I cannot, therefore, aspire to rank among first-class players, but I claim to be well to the fore as a Christian of upwards of sixty-five summers. On principle I would not play Golf on a Sunday, unless I was near a good links and certain of a competitor worthy of my iron. Yet, because I thus restrict myself on account of my own conscientious convictions, I see no reason why I should dissuade my brother-golfer from harmlessly enjoying himself on a Sunday, if he entertains no such scruples. What greater harm there is in the quiet exercise of Golf than in the beating of drums, the banging of tambourines, the howling in the parks, and the outdoor exercise of the lungs, either to the individual or for the public, it is hard to understand. Golf has its moral aspect

as well as its physical. To play well, it is incumbent upon a player that he possess most of the Christian's virtues; and it would be well, if he plays on a Sunday, that he should devote that day to an examination of how he has been playing during the week. If he has taken his Maker's name in vain because a slow couple have kept him back; if he has sworn because he has found his ball in a heel-mark; if he has become furious and lost his temper because he has topped his ball into a bunker and taken three to get out; if he has wrongly accused his caddie of moving when he missed his putt; or cursed an innocent sheep for stopping his ball, let him reflect and endeavour to bring his mind and body into subjection, remembering that to be a good golfer he must become a good Christian, and exercise all those virtues which appertain thereto I could draw a picture of golfers in their easy chairs, with pipes in their mouths, *The World*, *Truth*, *Punch*, and sporting papers in their hands, and whisky and soda by their sides tired and wearily waiting for dinner-time to come-and the joyous golfer striding over the springy turf, breathing the pure air under the roof of heaven, with the green globe under him and the white little globe ahead. Talk of "insinuating profanity!" Look upon one picture and the other, and see where the profanity comes in.

# QUESTIONS ON THE RULES.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Has it ever struck you that the present usual system of handicapping against "Colonel Bogey" seems to be unfair? I will endeavour to explain what I mean by an illustration Playing lately on a nine-hole course, my handicap against "Colonel Bogey" was 9. These strokes were given in the usual manner, viz., a stroke at the second, fourth, sixth, and eighth holes for the first round, and at the first, third, fifth, seventh, and ninth holes for the second round. The day was wild and stormy, and all in "Bogey's" favour. Consequently at the end of the eighteen holes I was 8 down to "Bogey"; and now comes the point of my complaint. On looking over my score I find that if the order in which the 9 strokes were given had been reversed—that is to say, if I had had a stroke at the first, third, fifth, seventh, and ninth holes for the first round, and at the second, fourth, sixth, and eighth for the second round, I should have been only 3 holes down instead of 8. Now it appears to me that when pure luck, apart from skill, can make so material a difference in the same score as 5 holes, there must be something very faulty in the system. Has the method of giving strokes like bisques, to be taken at the

player's discretion, ever been tried? I cannot help thinking this would be fairer, and a truer record of the play, as it would minimise the luck. I enclose my card, and beg to remain,

[At present there is no uniform method of handicapping against "Colonel Bogey." The table of strokes is fixed by the committee of each club, who ought to take into consideration the length of the holes, the variety and nature of the ground, and the weather, in fixing the scratch round of "Colonel Bogey." (See an article on this subject, page 348, Vol. III.) Obviously the handicap of our correspondent was not judiciously allocated when it produced such a disproportionate result. He ought certainly to have had the five strokes in the first nine holes; and if a uniform table for handicap match play, similar to that recommended by Mr. H. H. Turner in a letter on p age 106, Vol. II., had been in force, our correspondent will see that the battle with "Colonel Bogey" would have been more equal. So far as we know, the bisques have not been introduced against "Bogey," and as yet they are not very popular in private match play.—ED.]

# To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—I should be glad if you would decide the following puestion:—

In a match between two clubs, played under the St. Andrews Rules, the ball of one player fell into a hole, the nature of which was such that the ball was absolutely unplayable. May the ball be lifted out—and if so, what is the penalty for so doing? The two players agreed to refer the matter to the captain of one of the clubs (the other members of one of the teams subsequently objected to this). The captain decided that the ball might be lifted under the penalty of two strokes. If the Rules of St. Andrews say that the penalty be the loss of the hole, can the person to whom the matter is referred decide against those rules; and can the individual players agree to refer the point to anyone without the permission of the whole team?

[According to the St. Andrews Rules of match play a ball must be played wherever it lies or the hole be given up. Accordingly the player could not lift his ball and count two; and it was ultra vires for the captain or any members of the respective teams to arbitrarily over-ride the express provision of the rules. The rules and conditions of play governing the match having been selected before the start, the players must abide by the penalties enforced by those rules.—ED.]

# To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—In playing for a medal my opponent, while addressing his ball for an approach, accidentally hit it some yards backwards. Was it not right to count this as a stroke? The rule and practice in match play, in my experience, have been to count a stroke if the ball is moved from its position, and I should not have thought it necessary to refer to you had not considerable doubt been thrown upon the matter by several golfers of long experience, to whom the case was put at the time.

About a month ago, on the occasion of competing, for the fiftieth time, for the silver medal presented to the club by the Misses Kinloch of Kinloch and Carnoustie, it was thought that some public celebration should be made of such an interesting event in the history of the Carnoustie and Taymouth Club as the attainment of its jubilee. After consideration, it was decided that the event should be commemorated in a twofold manner—namely, by a competition for prizes, and by a dinner. The club was formed about the year 1838, and was then and for many years called the Carnoustie Golf Club. These gentlemen, who were frequent visitors to the Golf course at Carnoustie, were enthusiastic golfers. Another of the earlier members of the club was Captain John J. Dalyell, who is still alive, and is still remembered as a good all-round athlete. The late Mr. George Pattullo and Mr. Robert Millar, who were members in the earliest years of the club, are still remembered by most Carnoustie people. Regularly, twice a day, in all weathers, these two gentlemen, who were inseparable cronie were to be seen indulging in their favourite game on Carnoustie Golf course. In 1862 the Taymouth Club was formed, and a few years later the Carnoustie Club and that club amalgamated, at which time the compund name was assumed. On Friday night the members dined in the hall of the Panmure Arms Hotel, when there was a large turn-out of members and representatives from other clubs. Among those present were — Provost McCorquodale; Commissioners Ramsay and Souter; Mr. R. B. Sharp; Captain, and Mr. D. M'Intyre, secretary of the Dalhousie Golf Club; Mr. D. M. Boath; Captain, and Mr. J. P. Bruce, secretary of the Caledonia Golf Club; Mr. J. R. Fairweather, of the Monifieth Golf Club; Mr. M'Lean, of the Montrose Mechanics' of the Monifieth Golf Club; Mr. M'Lean, of the Montrose Mechanics' Golf Club; Captain James Mitchell, R.N.R.; Mr. John Dewars and Mr. David Kidd, Captain and secretary respectively of the Carnoustie and Taymouth Club. The company numbered between fifty and sixty. Provost M'Corquodale occupied the chair, and Mr. Dewars and Commissioner Ramsay acted as croupiers. Mr. R. B. Mr. Dewars proposed "The Sister Clubs," coupling the toast with the names of Mr. Daniel M'Intyre, secretary of the Dalhousie, and Mr. D. M. Boath, captain of the Caledonia. Both these gentlemen replied, and stated that it gave them great pleasure to be present. "The Police Commissioners of Carnoustie" was proposed by Captain Mitchell, to which the Provost replied. Commissioner Ramsay proposed "The Stranger Clubs," coupling the toast with the names of Mr. Fairweather, of the Monifieth Club, and Mr. M'Lean, of the Montrose Mechanics.
