



#### THE DORNOCH TOURNAMENT.

Dornoch possesses one of the best natural links in Scotland, and yet it is little known. Therein lies its charm. The green is not crowded. There is no grand fashionable club-house. The men wear their oldest clothes, and enjoy themselves. The women leave society gowns and fashions behind, and the children build mud-houses by the sea-shore, or baths without machines in the full enjoyment of unconventionality. Dornoch is seven miles from a railway station, and lies on the northern shore of Dornoch Firth, in Sutherlandshire. It is quite a little town, possessed only of a couple of churches, some dozen shops, a country inn, and a few cottages where people lodge. It is very quiet, very primitive, and very healthful.

It is a twenty-hour journey from Euston, through Perth and Inverness. A long and tedious journey no doubt, but the traveller is well rewarded in the end, for no prettier spot, with diversified attractions, could possibly be found. A'though Dornoch stands on the sen-shore, it is surrounded by mountains and heather, pine woods, and trout streams.

Tom Morris laid out the links, and a tiny little Golf pavilion was erecte l in 1877. It is a full course of eighteen holes, and the distances between the holes vary from 145 to 430 yards. There are plenty of hazards, some of which are very sporting, and a burn. The round can be played by professionals in 76 strokes, covering a little over three miles. The links are along the sea-shore, and in many ways resemble St. Andrews, but the natural position of Dornoch is much more beautiful. Of course the town itself does not compare with its older rival. Dornoch is merely a modern village, after the stately towers and gateways of the township of St. Andrews. There are no houses or shops worth speaking about in Dornoch; but, as Mr. Marcus Brown remarked at the tournament, after thirty-five years' experience of all the links of Scotland, Dornoch was the best he had played over, and, although not so "trappy" as St. Andrews, was decidedly a better green. The caddies are all smill boys, who receive sixpence a round, and they have a curious characteristic, viz., they never speak. The interfering advicegiving caddie, does not exist, for the Dornoch boys never venture a suggestion. They carry and nothing more. The links are on the outskirt of the town, and no houses overlook them Cows and horses graze on the putting-greens at sundown, and the women wash their clothes in the burn. To do this they tuck up their petticoats, and, in the usual shoeless Highland fashion, step into the stream, and dance on the well lathered clothes until they are clean. The cows and the washing show how primitive the place still is. The cows show their appreciation of Golf by eating the flags, which have been replaced so incessantly that an iron set has just been bought to take the place of the waving red or white squares.

Dornoch suddenly woke up in the last week of August. The Golf tournament was the cause; golfers came from far and near to play for the Northern Counties challenge trophy. There were not sufficient rooms in the little town, and some of the men had to be billeted like soldiers on the residents. The night before the tournament Mr. Frank Crawford opened proceedings with his pipes, which rang merrily with Highland airs through the whole length of the town.

The 24th opened badly in respect of weather, for it rained hard till about twelve o'clock, when out came the sun, and we had a lively afternoon, but the second day made up for all delinquencies. It was simply perfect, the colouring of sky, sea, and mountain being something to be remembered for its beauty.

Mr. John Sutherland was the hero of the course. He won the club silver medal for the fifth time in succession. This clever young golfer, who is secretary of the club, has done a good deal for its advancement, and well deserves his success.

After the silver medal the most coveted prize was Dr. Murray's handsome challenge vase (handicap), and the Ospisdale

silver quaich, or drinking cup, at scratch. A silver inkstand was given by Mr. Gilchrist for the two days aggregate score (handicap). The challenge gold medal, competed for by Northern and Southern teams, was won by the Dornoch team. There were ten other handicap prizes, consisting of clubs and balls, and a handsome lamp presented by Mrs. J. Barrow, of the Castle.

#### THE "CHECK FLIGHT" GOLF BALL.

Mr. Arthur G. Ellis, a member of the West Herts and Richmond Golf Clubs, has patented a contrivance for practice which he has called the "Check Flight Golf Ball." It is really a modification of the "Captive" Golf ball, and the idea is by no means a new one. A good many months ago we published some correspondence describing a "Parachute" Golf ball, and this is practically what the patent of Mr. Ellis amounts to. A short length of stout fishing cord is fixed by means of a looped screw pin into the Golf ball, and at the other end it is attached to the centre of a circular piece of tin, about the circumference of an ordinary tea-cup. It is claimed for this means of amusement that a golfer may utilise his lawn, by practising all sorts of strokes except putting, the cord and the piece of tin attached serving to bring a tee shot up "dead" within 40 yards. It does all this, it is true; but at the best the sport must, of course, be a mere makeshift. The ball is n-atly enclosed in a small box, and is sold at the very moderate price of two shillings by Messrs. Wisden and Co., of Cranbourne Street, Leicester Square.

#### GOLF AT DINARD.

Visitors to this corner of Brittany have found the St. Briac links in splendid order and condition. The new club-house meets all the requirements, and is the popular resort of an afternoon for golfers and their friends. The weather has been all that could be desired, and as the result several tournaments have been played, some producing a great deal of interest and exc tement. The principal one, a handicap sweepstake on the American principle, occupied an entire week, the winner eventually proving to be Mr. Faithful Begg. Among the other players were Capt. Edie, the secretary of the club; Sheriff Henderson, of St. Andrews, and his son; the Rev. Mr. E. Clements, of Grantham; Mr. Murray, of Edinburgh; Capt. Ramsbotham, Mr. Powell, Dr. Law, and Mr. Randolph Want. Concurrently a ladies' handicap on the same principle was played, when Miss Henderson proved victorious, the other competitors being Mrs. Clements, Mrs. Colville, Mrs. Henderson, Misses Edie (4), Miss Carver, and Miss Want.

At the close of these matches driving competitions for ladies and gentlemen respectively were arranged, the prizes having been given by one or two of the visitors. Miss B. Edie and Miss Want secured the first and second trophies for the ladies having made the best averages of three drives. Mr. Randolph Want secured the gentlemen's trophy by a drive of 165 yards against a slight head-wind. In this competition several other players joined, including Mr. McGarrell, and Mr. Hood and Col. Bevington and Mr. Lockwood, of Sheffield. Several other competitions are being arranged for, and are likely to be played during the remainder of the season. Coaching arrangements for transport of players to the ground, about five miles, have also been made. The seenery in the neighbourhood is attractive, and the greens

are in excellent order.

Troon.—The usual monthly competition for the Sandhills gold medal took place on Saturday. Notwithstanding boisterous weather in the early part of the day, there was a large field in the afternoon, when the weather conditions were all that could be wished for. Mr. William Mackie was first—score, 100, less 24—76. Mr. John Shaw was next with 97, less 12—85; Mr. James Hutcheson, jun., secured third place—score, 103, less 18—85.



The Richmond Athletic Association have decided upon forming a Golf club, and have secured the Old Deer Park for their links. There is at present a club at Richmond, which uses Sudbrooke Park, but it is some distance from the town. In spite of this, however, it has been exceptionally successful, and now, we believe, has put on an entrance-fee, as the appli-cations for membership became so numerous. In these circumstances it is not too much to expect that the latest venture of the Richmond Athletic Association should meet with even greater success, seeing that the links are within three minutes of the stations, and in the midst, almost, of the town itself. The first hundred members will be admitted without entrancefee, the annual subscription being one guinea. In the case of members of the present Richmond Golf Club, the subscription will be fifteen shillings, but this does not entitle them to play on Saturdays. If they wish to include that day they must pay the full guinea subscription. All particulars as to membership can be obtained from Mr. Edwin Ash, at the offices of the Richmond Athletic Association, Limited, Grove House Club, Richmond.

The auxiliary course of nine holes, recently laid out on the Carnoustie links for the special benefit of beginners, has again been cut, and is now in fine condition. Till now the short course has not been taken advantage of to such an extent as was expected, and complaints are occasionally heard from the regular frequenters of the links that "duffers," instead of playing on the short course, go out on the long one, and thereby hinder and annoy good players. Now that the nine-hole course is in such good order, it is to be hoped that there will be no more cause for complaints.

A Golf course is in progress of being laid out for the newly-formed Hamilton Golf Club at Barmichael Plantation, within Hamilton Park. It is to consist of nine holes, with room for eighteen if required, and a ladies' course will also be formed if a sufficient membership is found. Nearly ninety gentlemer have already enrolled. A shocking Golf accident is reported from County Clare. Mrs. O'Donnell, wife of a magistrate, was taking part in a Golf match with her cousin, Mr. Frost, when the latter, who wielded his club with great force, missed the ball, and struck the lady on the forehead. Mrs. O'Donnell fell to the ground unconscious, and bleeding freely from a severe wound inflicted by the club. Medical aid was promptly summoned, and the lady was removed to her home; but there is said to be little hope of her recovery.

An advertisement in this week's GOLF directs attention to the Irish Amateur Championship, which will be held next week on the links of the Royal County Golf Club, at Portrush, county Antrim. The game has become so popular in Ireland that the various clubs in the country combined last autumn to form the Golfing Union of Ireland, for the purpose, among other objects, of establishing an Amateur Championship, to be played annually in the Emerald Isle, but to be open to amateur members of all recognised Golf clubs, so that Irish players might have the advantage of competing with well-known English and Scottish golfers. The Golfing Union decided that the first Champion-ship competition should be played on the Portrush Links, which rank among the best in the United Kingdom. Portrush is the most popular and invigorating seaside resort in Ireland, possessing abundant hotel and lodging-house accommodation, and is within two hours' rail from Belfast. The Royal County Club is the largest in the Sister Isle, having nearly five hundred members, and its recently erected club-house being most complete and commodious, golfers from England and Scotland may rest assured that they will receive a hearty welcome.

A new sulphur spring has been discovered at Strathpeffer, which surpasses in excellence all the other curative springs in the Bristish Isles. There is only one sulphur spring in Europe which surpasses it—that of Aix-les-Bains, in Savoy. The newly-discovered sulphur well at Strathpeffer contains ten grains of sulphur per gallon, four grains stronger than the well at Harrogate. It has been christened the "Cromartie Well," after the Countess of Cromartie. Many persons have testified to the benefit derived from the Spa, and a cleryman, the Rev. Mr. Carlyon, has stated that after having been a martyr to eczema for thirty years, he had come to Strathpeffer nine years ago, and had been entirely cured. Regular visitants come not only from Scotland, but also in ever-growing numbers from England, America, and Australia. This season the number of visitors has been unusually large. Hotels and lodging houses have been full to overflowing. The Strath is not only a refuge for rheumatic invalids and dejected hypochondriacs; its pure, dry, and bracing air, its fine drives, its puzzling Golf course, its bowling green, and its pleasant social life offer attractions to the care-worn merchant, the jaded journalist, and the over-worked clergyman, the value of which it would be difficult to estimate too highly.

The new course of the Rothesay Golf Club at Westland was opened on Saturday afternoon by Mr. Graham Murray, M.P., in presence of a number of members and friends. The new course, which is one of nine long holes, and within fifteen minutes' walk of Rothesay, is expected to prove an additional attraction to this popular resort. Mr. Graham Murray, after being presented with a club by the members, gave a short address, thanking them for their gift and for electing him their first captain. He wished success to the new course. After Mr. Graham Murray had driven off the first ball amid applause, play was engaged in.

We learn that Baron Playfair, of St. Andrews, who may be regarded as the highest living authority on dietetics from a chemical and therapeutic point of view, has from a love of the science taken an interest in the company, Bovril, Limited, ever since its inception; and on the first of October next that interest will take a more pronounced form by his becoming the Chairman of the Company. Baron Playfair was a student under Baron Liebig at Giessen, and no one could be better qualified than he to advise technically in the development of the improvements initiated by Mr. J. L. Johnston, the present chairman of the Company, who, out of courtesy to the newly created peer, has volunteered acceptance of the vice-chairmanship.

On Monday forenoon Andrew Kirkaldy, in playing with Mr. Johnstone, Glasgow, over the St. Andrews links, made the remarkable score of 73 strokes, which equals the record score of the green previously held by his brother Hugh. Andrew's figures were:—Out—3 4 3 4 5 5 4 3 4=35; in—3 3 3 4 5 5 5 5 5=38; total, 73.



THE OPEN CHAMPIONSHIP.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—With reference to what appeared in the last issue of GOLF, I shall be obliged if you will kindly publish the following statement.

Every golfer knows that in the ordinary course of events the Open Championship Cup, instituted in 1872 by the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers, the Royal and Ancient Golf Club, and the Prestwick Golf Club, would have been competed for over this green, and in the "Golfing Annual" for 1891-92 it is stated that, "This year the Championship falls to be held at Musselburgh."

It is also known that the first-named club (which hitherto played exclusively over Musselburgh) recently acquired a private green at Muirfield, but the members have nevertheless always declared that the club did not intend to desert this links.

About the spring of the year rumours began to circulate to the effect that the Honourable Company intended to transfer the play for the cup to Muirfield, but no distinct or reliable information on the subject could be obtained. At the request of some of the golfers here I wrote to your paper a letter, which appeared on 20th April, asking where the cup was to be played for. To this there was no reply. The Honourable Company thought fit to pursue a Gladstonian policy of silence till 1st July, when an advertisement appeared announcing that the meeting was to be held at Muirfield. This was the first notice we had of their intention to break through the old rotation of play. Immediately thereupon steps were taken to ascertain the general feeling here, and whether sufficient support could be relied on to justify an attempt being made to retain the Championship; or, failing that, to enable an independent competition to be held. The result was more favourable than any one could have anticipated.

Matters having arrived at this stage, communications were opened with the Honourable Company with the view of ascertaining whether an arrangement could not be come to for their meeting being held here as formerly. The substance of the proposal was that we should guarantee a sum of not less than, say, £60 or £70, to be added to their championship prizes in such way as might be arranged, provided the play took place over Musselburgh Links. In the letter making this proposal various reasons (which I afterwards mention) why the meeting should be here and not at Muirfield were stated. The Honourable Company, however, did not see their way to accede. It was accordingly resolved to hold the tournament now being advertised in GOLF.

The newspapers in Edinburgh took an interest in the matter, and there appeared in the Edinburgh Dispatch, which is largely devoted to Golf, a long paragraph from the pen of their own reporter. The position was there discussed in a tone which indicated sympathy with our movement, and the opinion that the Honourable Company should accept the offer made to them. In consequence of this and of the views which had been generally expressed since communications first passed, I wrote to the Dispatch on 24th August, a letter, publicly renewing to the Honourable Company the offer previously made, and pointing out that there was still time to make the necessary arrangements.

In the same issue the Dispatch was good enough to support my offer by a leading article which is so important that I quote it at length :- "We publish to-day an appeal by Mr. I. Anderson, solicitor, Musselburgh, on behalf of that community, entreating the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Golfers to reconsider their determination to hold the competition for the Open Golf Championship at Muirfield, and to resort to the accustomed course. It is sincerely to be hoped that this appeal may yet be listened to. Nobody supposes that the Honourable Company are influenced by any feelings of hostility to Musselburgh. They have been associated with that burgh and its Golf course for a period extending over the golfing lifetime of the oldest members, and their memories of it are of the kindliest. Nor can anybody suppose that they have not the same kindly interest in professional golfers all over the country, as well as in the noble game itself. The question therefore arises, why alter the scene of play under circumstances which, in the first place, strike a serious blow at the prestige of Musselburgh Golf course, or, as it may be said to be, the course of Edinburgh; and, in the second place, put to much personal inconvenience and expense a large number of very poor people who cannot well afford to be subjected to either? It cannot be doubted that the selection of Muirfield course, without any accommodation for players or visitors, must result in much inconvenience, in the case especially of a two-days' competition; and as all that can possibly be gained is simply to identify the new course with the Championship match, it does not appear as if this ought to weigh against the serious objections. The Honourable Company do not require any fictitious prestige. Their position in the golfing world has long been established, and if they would desire to still further enhance their popularity with golfers, they would listen to the respectful appeal which Mr. Anderson now makes. For a body of gentlemen, however distinguished, to place themselves in antagonism to the majority of golfers, and that too for a mere sentimental reason, is very undesirable. There is still ample time for a reconsideration of the matter."

In order that there might be no dubiety as to this second offer being known to the Honourable Company, I sent a copy of the paper, having the paragraphs marked, to the secretary of the club. I have not received any acknowledgment or answer; but I observe that, in Saturday's newspapers, the advertisement of 1st July, to the effect that the "Open Golf Championship Competition" will take place at Murfield, is repeated. This I take to be a decisive reply.

The above is a bare statement of facts.

Now, it appears to me that the Honourable Company can hardly justify the course of action which they are taking.

Since the institution of the Championship cup, Musselburgh has been one of the three greens on which the play has taken place. To alter the fixture only makes confusion. Besides, there are other reasons.

It has of late years been the subject of comment that the Golf Championship should carry with it so small a prize as that at present awarded, while in other sports the inducements to competitors are much greater. Now, the substantial addition which we offered to guarantee to the prize fund would have enabled attractions to be offered to the best talent to come forward, and the amount of the prizes would also have had the effect of helping to encourage and develop young professional golfers, of whom there are now, it is universally admitted, comparatively few.

The Honourable Company have imposed an entrance-fee of 10s. However expedient it may be to limit the number of competitors, it is extremely undesirable to exclude any professional who is likely to be in the prize-list. We, therefore, proposed that entry-money from professionals should be dispensed with.

I may here state that many golfers have expressed their wishes that the meeting should be held at Musselburgh, as

usual.

With regard to what you say about a nine-hole course being "no longer, from a variety of causes, a first-class green, qualified to test the capabilities of players who aspire to the position of Open Champion," I think the argument you use to rebut this statement, viz., that "the green in the past has been found equal to settle the claims and the playing calibre of a long list of leading professional and amateur players," is unanswerable. Musselburgh has been tried, and well tried. Muirfield is untried—practically unknown.

The committee in charge of the tournament arrangements have spared no pains to bring Musselburgh Links into first-rate condition, and their efforts have been eminently successful—so much so that players of long experience have expressed the opinion that the green is in better condition now than it has been in for very many years; and I have no hesitation in saying that the improvement will be greater before our tournament comes to be played.

You state that objections are raised to the number of persons who attend at Musselburgh to see the Championship played for. It seems to me that the large attendance of spectators is a strong argument in favour of Musselburgh Links. Who ever heard of a proposal to exclude the public from an important football or cricket match, or any other sporting event? Good players glory in a large gallery, and many times have I heard some of our best gollers speaking with great satisfaction of the

multitudes attracted by their matches.

I would quote another paragraph from the *Dispatch* in fovour of Musselburgh. "It is always desirable to have a tournament of first class importance on a green that is fairly known to golfers, for the reason, if for no other, that a great many keen players, unable to be personally present to witness the play, have to depend on the descriptions of others; and when the green is well known it becomes an easy matter to fellow their descriptions, and to form an estimate of the play."

I hope Mr. Horace Hutchinson is not serious when he

I hope Mr. Horace Hutchinson is not serious when he says "It has even been whispered to us that a fair trial was not possible on the old Musselburgh green," and that we Musselburgh folk will "no' let an ootside mon win." Since 1872 the Championship has been played at Musselburgh six times, out of which local men have won four times. It has been played at St. Andrews seven times, out of which St. Andrews men have won six times. Musselburgh players have won eight times in all, four times at Musselburgh and four times on other greens. In face of these figures it is a little difficult to see how we are more "selfish" at Musselburgh

than others are at, say, St. Andrews.

But the main reason why Muirfield is so unsuitable for the Championship is this—the green is about four miles from Drem, the nearest station, five or six miles from North Berwick, and about a mile from Gullane. Now, what is the result to the competitors? Gullane is a small village, where the prospects of obtaining lodging for players are very slight; failing Gullane, North Berwick must be resorted to. This means driving five or six miles to and from the green every day. All this, together with the entry fee of 10s., now imposed for the first time, puts golfers to considerable expense, and if the cost be deducted from the prize offered, I fear the Honourable Company's Champion will find the honour an empty one indeed. No doubt amateur golfers can be quite regardless of expense, but what about the professionals? It seems to me that when professional golfers, who are dependent on their skill and successes as a means of livelihood, are invited to take part in a competition, a greater inducement should be held out to them than the chance of winning a comparatively small prize, from which has to be deducted relatively large expenses.

You say, though not in the same words, there cannot be two champions. I quite agree with you, and I have no hesitation in saying that playing on the same green, rather than playing for the same prize, will regulate the Championship for 1892; and that the winner of the Championship medal at the Mussel-

burgh meeting will be recognised as the Champion.

Mr. Horace Hutchinson gives a quasi invitation to Willie Park to attend at Muirfield; allow me to reciprocate, and to say that I hope we may have the honour of Mr. Hutchinson's presence at our meeting here.

## THE MATCH AND MEDAL RULES.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Have I discovered a mare's nest? I ventured to point out, a few days since, to some eminent golfers, that Rule 14 of the St. Andrews Rules, as revised in 1891, does not forbid the grounding of the club in a hazard in medal play. My reason for this statement is, that the whole sentence must be read together, and it is clear, from the conclusion of the sentence, "under the penalty of the loss of the hole," that match play only is there referred to. It was suggested, as an answer to my question, that Rule 12 of the special rules for medal play applied; but I submit that there is no rule against grounding the club which applies to medal play, and, further than this, one does not see the reason why grounding the club in match play should only involve the loss of the hole, and in medal play absolute disqualification. That the rules were not read as above suggested before I mentioned the matter, is pretty clear, for the professional, who is a Scotchman and, I believe, a native of St. Andrews and a first-class player, when appealed to, said the penalty was the loss of a stroke, and when I handed him a copy of the rules to point out to me where the rule to that effect was to be found, he took the rules off to his den to study them; but, as he never came back to tell me what he had discovered, I presume he is either studying them still, or that he has given it up as a bad job. Another point which does not seem to be provided for by the rules cropped up when I was playing, also on a medal day. My opponent's caddie trod on his own master's ball, nearly burying it in the ground. Could he loosen it, or take it out of the hole? and was there a penalty for his caddie so treading on the ball? are questions which the rules do not appear to answer.

SIR, - As an aspiring golfer I am sometimes - nay, frequently-in difficulties; but I don't think I ever was in a much queerer quandary than the other afternoon, playing here at Eastbourne. I was playing towards the hole called of gods and men "Paradise," which, of course, implies the proximity of angels. As a matter of fact you generally find crowds on and about the teeing ground. With my second or twenty-second shot-which it does not now matter-1 found myself behind the bunker which guards the sacred wood of the Hesperides-the temporary resting-place of so many a duffer's ball-then, putting forth my countless might, I smote the ball, which, ungrateful beast, rebounded off the hurdle, but not in its original, pure state. The entrance into "Paradise" is often, as every divine will tell you, hindered by feminine entanglements. Is it not a matter of history that a woman hastened our exit from Paradise? Here it was evident that it was the caprice of a female which wished to deter my entry to that blissful abode. For, on approaching my ball, I found it entangled four or five times round with a black skein of feminine worsted. Now, Sir, what was I to do? Was this a "rub on the green"? Who can unravel such a knotty point? Had I been at leisure, and very deft of fingers, I might have unwound the worsted from the sphere without moving it "Another good golfer gone woolgathering "would, perhaps, have been the passing sarcasm of Horace G. or Johnny Ball If you, Sir, could solve the problem,

I might be, perhaps, tempted to tell what I did.

No one is bound to criminate himself, according to the fundamental laws of our Golf, following the wholesome example of the Common Law Supposing I had placed my ball on the green, close to the entrance of the realms above, would that little ball have trickled quite truly to its natural resting-place? We must, even under adverse circumstances, strive after truth. My "record round" might have been quite ruined. The encumbrance on the globe was nothing growing; it was not a flower of the field, or of the earth, earthy: nor a thing which, if Paxton and his myrmidons had done their duty, should have been found

on the green at all. "Not being led to expect any such thing from the picture outside," as Mrs. Gamp pathetically remarked, was I forced to play the rest of the round with this additional weight and parasite hanging on? If the round were re-opened on which the money (and long drinks) have changed hands, that novel and intricate question might not be raised of law, morals, etiquette, and manners. Some answer to the above questions is, Sir, with much respect, awaited by yours interrogatively.

[The skein was a "loose impediment," and could have been removed, provided the player did not touch his ball so as to cause it to move. Alternatively, he had to play the ball as it lay, excrescence and all, trusting in Providence and a heavy iron; or he might have borrowed from the nearest female within hail a pair of scissors, and re-shorn the fleece within which the ball was embedded (always providing the ball was not touched or moved); or, again, he and his caddie could have lighted a match or two (a by no means easy task on a windy links; but that is a detail), and valiantly burned his way to the ball—utrum horum mavis accipe. #### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Your ruling on the following point will oblige:— A and B are playing a hole match, and both their balls are on the putting-green. A plays before the flag-stick is removed, and his ball strikes it. Is there a penalty, and if so, what is it? In other words—Is it, or is it not, a rule of the green, under the new Rules, that the flag-stick must be removed before putting; and if it is a rule of the green, what is the penalty for the breach of it, supposing a player putts and his ball strikes the flag-stick?

[There is no rule as to the flag being removed, except in medal play; but it is part of the etiquette of the game not to play at the hole with the flag in it. The opponent, in his own interest, should see the flag removed before the player tries to hole. In this case it was a rub of the green, and has to be submitted to. There is no penalty for striking the flag.—ED.]

#### REPLACING TURF AFTER PLAY.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—Now that Golf is in such full swing I think it is time to put in a word for the poor turf. I know that letters have appeared in your columns often before, but it is a case that I think cannot be brought too often before golfers. I do not think that a notice or two put up in the clubs are half sufficient. Caddies ought to have most strict injunctions to replace divots, and should they be detected not doing so, where badges exist, have their badges taken away. One often sees a divot flying away and simply no notice taken of it. On one green, where I constantly play, there is a hole about 280 yards, with a hazard, in the shape of a pond close to the hole. About 160 to 200 yards from the tee there used to be a beautiful bit of turf, and after a fair drive you used generally to find your ball lying nicely, but now owing to iron shots and divots not replaced, the probability is that you find your ball in one of these ironmarked holes, and in consequence have to take a niblick, and

thus make the place worse than it was before. Lately, among some players a diabolical practice has come into fashion of approaching the hole with a niblick or mashie often considerably to the detriment of the turf. These heavy tools were meant for extricating a ball out of long grass, mud, cart-ruts, sand, or some such hazard, and ought only to be used for such purposes. It is a great pity the old-fashioned baffies have gone out of fashion. In conclusion, I may remind golfers, especially beginners, that, as Mr. Horace Hutchinson says, "Golf is not Agriculture."

#### A NEW GOLF CLUB.

In ignorance of this patent, as well as of the club made by Mr. Robertson, my son during this spring had the notion that a club so made would be a good one, and has himself made and tried several. These he showed to Forrester and Jack Simpson of Elie, and also to Mr. Brand, who tried the club and thought well of its driving power, but a great drawback exists, and is difficult to overcome, from the fact that however dry the wood used for heads may be, a shrinkage takes place when made, and the lead becomes loose. The patentee of this club is not so enamoured of it, chiefly from this difficulty, as to have pushed it into the market. I will send a club head if you wish.

#### TEES.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—I think a great deal too much is spoken and written about tees. It is well known that the best players are easily pleased with a tee, and never use any of the fancy articles sold for this purpose. Those who go in for a sand mountain of a tee will find it very difficult to play well through the green when good lies are not often got. The habit of driving from a low tee, enables the player to make better work over the green. An old friend with whom I often played, has a very simple but most useful way of making tees; he had a piece of wood about the length of a pencil, and thickness of the smallest part of a club-shaft, sharpened at one end. This he inserted at the teeing ground, in an angle say of 45, and from the side he was

to drive over. This, pressed down, raised a neat little knob of grass or soil, and made a capital tee; the foot could press down any mark. This we dubbed the "Lawson patent tee." If your readers who are troubled about tees will try it they will find a simple and satisfactory result.
