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The West Cornwall Golf Club was instituted in December, 1889, the links being situated on the towars at Lelant. course, consisting of nine holes, was originally mapped out by C. Gibson, the professional of the Royal North Devon Golf Club, but they have been somewhat altered since, more ground having been acquired for the use of the club. Next year still further alterations and improvements will be made, as a further considerable tract of ground has been arranged for.

Lelant, which is conveniently situated on the little branch line between St. Erth and St Ives, is an interesting place. "The visitor," writes a local authority, "will wonder at the great distance between the church and the village. This is accounted for by a tradition that the church is all that remains of a once important maritime town, which was overwhelmed, within a short space of time by the vast sand-drifts which cover the spot. These hillocks of sand more or less cover the shore, from St. Ives to Crantock. Constantly encroaching up in the good meadow-land, the invasion of the sand was at length arrested by the wholesale sowing of the arundo arenaria, or sandy rush; but not until fields and farm-houses had been buried to the depth of many feet in some places. Lelant church was barely saved; and that of Phillack, on the opposite side of the Hayle estuary, is quite overshadowed by the high 'towans' (as the sand-heaps are called) which rise to the height of the steeple, at a very short distance from the church. The more modern village of Lelant consists of straggling rows of pretty cottages, often adorned with rich growths of the fuchsia and the honeysuckle and other flowers which in this part of Cornwall flourish in the open air.'

The church, which stands on the towans, and which becomes a very familiar feature of the landscape to anybody playing frequently on the links, is well worth a visit. It dates from Norman times, but a restoration in the fifteenth century destroyed much of the Norman work.

A comfortable and convenient pavilion and club-house on the links have recently been acquired by the club, of which Lord St. Levan is the president, and which now numbers 138 mem bers (83 gentlemen and 55 ladies). Visitors are always welcome, and full particulars as to annual or temporary membership can be obtained from the rector of the parish, the Rev. R. F. Tyacke, who is the honorary secretary of the club.

The following brief description will give some idea of the links, which are of a very sporting nature, the hazards being

both numerous and various:

Hole No. 1, 230 yards.-A drive of 130 yards lands on good ground. If you go too much to the right you may land in the St. Ives Road, which ranks as a bunker, and which is sometimes difficult to get out of. To the left are good lies. If your drive be short you may have to deal with two grass dykes and some rough, sandy ground. From a good drive it is a fairly easy approach to the green, a small but nasty sand bunker lying in wait for the player approaching too short. The green is in the middle of some small grassy mounds, which are not hard to negotiate.

Hole No. 2, 217 yards.—For this hole you tee off close to one corner of the churchyard, and if you slice badly and foozle the ball into the churchyard, your ball is considered as lost, and you may give up the hole at once. A drive of 100 yards should land you over some bad country on to a good lie, and, as you are considerably above the hole. you get a good iron shot on to the This green is close to the railway cutting, and you may be careful not to approach too hard, or you will have to deal with a wire fence, or, worse still, with the railway line.

Hole No. 3, 226 yards.—In front of the tee for this hole, and distant respectively about 50 and 100 yards, are two long, deep, narrow sand bunkers, in which it is quite possible to spend a mauvais quart d'heure if you are short. À drive of over 100 yards gives you a capital lie. The country beyond is not very regular, and if you go too much to left or right, you may get into the bents.

Hole No. 4, 209 yards.—About 70 yards from the tee slopes up gradually a sand-hill, about 20 yards high, covered with patches of bent. A drive of 70 yards makes you safe, while a longer drive ought to arrive on very good ground. The approach shot is over some hilly country, and inaccurate hitting may lead you into sand or bents.

Hole No. 5, 231 yards.—The first thing to do in connection with this hole is to get your ball over Bunker's Hill, another sloping sand-hill, about 40 or 50 feet high at its topmost point, and not unlike the famous Maiden at Sandwich. Round its base and on its near side is a good deal of bent. A drive of 100 yards lands over, and a long drive in the right direction should lie well. There are some small sand bunkers and other difficulties en route, and about 40 yards in front of the hole there is a fairly large grassy pit, out of which, however, under ordinary circumstances, it is not hard to extricate a ball. The near approach to a capital green is over splendidly level ground.

No. 6, 283 yards, is the longest hole, and requires a drive of 112 yards to secure a good-lie for a second shot. This lands you over some very nasty country, the hazards being broken ground, some capacious sand bunkers, and bents, while about 50 yards from the tee to the left is a cow-shed with a small enclosed yard, which is a decidedly awkward place to get out of. Once landed over these difficulties you are rewarded with splendid lies, and your brassie has a good time over some level The approach to the green is a very pretty one, as it is possible to take advantage of a bank in front, and cushion

off to the flag.

No. 7, 202 yards.—The drive for this hole may be of almost any length, long or short, providing that you do not go too much to the right into bents. Lies are good. Approach shots over some slightly hilly country should land you with a low score on the green, which is (pro tem.) at the bottom of a large pit. A judicious cushion back from the further bank of this

will often secure a very close lie up to the hole.

No. 8, 170 yards.—This hole is known as "Hades," as to manipulate it satisfactorily you have to drive over a large "crater," up the sides of which, if you land inside, it is sometimes quite easy to "toil in vain" for a time. A drive of 100 yards lands you clean over this, and over a grass dyke at the top; if you slice, your ball may go over a stone wall into a difficult lane. The approach to a good green requires care, as there are some keen slopes close around, from which it is very easy to over-shoot the hole when putting.

No. 9, 271 yards.—This is an inland course suddenly introduced into a seaside links; 117 yards away is a grass dyke about 4 or 5 feet high, so that you should be able to drive over this. Failing, it is better to be short than nearly up. About 112 yards from the first dyke is a second and similar one, and 50 yards from this is the green. A very bad slice may land you in the St. Ives Road, which has already been referred to. A pull may take you over a dyke running at right angles to the others, but into capital country, and some players play to the left to avoid the dykes.

The amateur record for the eighteen holes (twice round) is 86, while Bennetts, the young professional attached to the club,

has done the double round in 83.

A RECORD SCORE. - In a match at St. Andrews on the 5th inst., Mr. Macfie and Mr. Cunningham achieved the distinction of making a record score for foursome play, doing the round in Their opponents were Mr. P. Anderson and Mr. F. A. Fairlie, and, conceding an allowance of four strokes to Mr. Macfie and partner, they lost by 7 and 6 to play.

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How to keep the sea from encroaching on the links is a difficult problem for the conservators of many Golf courses. How much money e.g. has it cost Dunbar to protect the promenade that leads to the links there. A still more interesting problem is, How to help the links to encroach on the sea. This is a case where the power of "littles" is manifest, if we are to believe the following from Mr. D. Hay Fleming's excellent "Guide Book to St. Andrews":—"Immediately to the north and west (of the links) a good deal has lately been reclaimed from the sea. A small quantity of strong, rough grass, which grows as rank as wheat and has tremendous roots, was sown at the north-east corner of the links about thirty-five years ago. Since then it has spread wonderfully, and encroached greatly on the sands, which it does not cover like ordinary grass, but, aided by the wind, raises huge mounds which effectually keep back the sea."

At this time of the year, when the season's play is past and the improvement of the green is under consideration, let green-keepers, with an eye on the ocean, take a note of this wonderful "blade o' grass." It ought to be patented for the purpose of links-annexation. Old Tom's patent, shall we call it?

Messrs. Longman, publishers, we believe, have in preparation a new edition of the Badminton volume on "Golf," which is to contain additional matter, and is not merely a reprint of the original volume. The same competent hands who compiled the popular work are now engaged on the new edition, for the appearance of which every golfer will look forward with much interest. It is not a great many years since the book was published, but as golf has so rapidly developed, "many things have happened since then," and the writers will have to speak of new patents, new rules, new champions, and of new greens, whose name is legion.

The current Fortnightly has an article by Mr. Caspar Whitney on the development of athletics in America. The universities, according to the writer, are "our only salvation for amateurs' sport in the United States." As regards Golf, the land has still evidently to be possessed, for we do not hear of the capture of the Yankee, though there are Golf clubs in Chicago and New York. With all its progress the game cannot yet sit down and "bubble," as Alexander did. There are more worlds to be won.

Writing from Stanmore, a golfing correspondent says:—
"Golfing here this year has been a frost. The greens have been so hard and burnt up—especially on clay land—that it has been very poor fun indeed. On the course there are some cracks where you could almost hide yourself, not to speak of the ball. If you get in to these you can't play it out, but may lower the caddie down by the heels to fish out the ball. That jumping Johnny, of Roman history fame, would have been useful as a fore caddie at Stanmore. That picture in the Comic History of Rome would be a grand crest for the club."

On Gullane links last week might be seen quite a notable gathering of golfers from many parts. These included Lord

George Hamilton, ex-First Lord of the Admiralty, Lord Ernest Hamilton, The Hon. Ivo Bligh, Captain-D. Kinloch, Mr. F. Kinloch, Mr. Ernley Blackwell, and Mr. A. J. Robertson. The green was in fine order, and some of these players made good scores.

The new hotel at Gullane continues to prosper in the hands of Mr. Bissett, the proprietor. During the past season, its first year, the hotel has been quite full, and golfers have found it very comfortable and well appointed in every respect. Even now an extension of the accommodation might with safety be carried out. The new water supply, which is being arranged for, will greatly benefit the hotel and the village. Most of the visitors who reside at Gullane in the summer season have now taken their departure.

As an excellent finish-up to the season, the visitors at Gullane played the residents, both sides fighting against a "Bogey" score of 78 for the green. Against the "Colonel" the visitors were 44 down, the residents 43, the residents thus winning by 1 hole. The "Bogey" score, which we believe was compiled by Mr. Sydney Mitchell, architect, was as follows: 5 4 4 6 5 4 5 5 4 4 3 3 4 5 5 5=78 Against this score Mr. J. Brotherstone, one of the local cracks, made the best appearance, he being only one hole down.

Two well-known members of the Furzedown (Tooting Bec) Club, Mr. J. P. Croal and Mr. A. J. Robertson, have been enjoying a golfing holiday in East Lothian, and showing good form on the various greens—North Berwick, Archerfield, Muirfield, Gullane and Luffness. On Archerfield, Mr. Croal, with Mr. T. D. Thomson, captain and secretary of the local club, played two rounds against Mr. A. J. Robertson and Rev. J. Kerr, each couple securing one round. At Luffness, Mr. A. M. Ross partnered Mr. Croal against the Rev. J. Kerr and Mr. Robertson, to whom they conceded a third. The latter couple after being 2 up with 5 to play, succeeded in losing the first round at the last hole, but won the second round by 2 up and 1 to play. In a single at Gullane, Mr. Robertson and Rev. J. Kerr were all even on the day's play, each winning a round and a bye at the same stages of the round.

On Thursday, Mr. J. P. Croal had two rounds with Mr. James Law over Muirfield course, in both of which he was successful.

Mr. A. M. Ross, giving Mr. A. J. Robertson a third, at Luffness on Saturday forenoon, won by 2 up and 1 to play, the scores being 80 and 85. In the afternoon Mr. Ross and Mr. J. P. Croal played Mr. Robertson and Mr. J. G. Croal, to whom a third was conceded. The latter couple were dormy 2, but by brilliant play Mr. Ross and his partner won the last two holes and halved the match, their score being 80.

The question of the regulation of the caddies is likely to be considered very shortly by the authorities at North Berwick. This was indicated by Provost Brodie at the recent October meeting of the North Berwick Town Council and Police Commission. Alluding to the work with which the board would soon have to deal, the Provost said the links were very important to the welfare of the town. He had had no end of complaints as to the conduct of the boys there; but they would be able, under the Burgh Police Bill, to grant licenses to all the caddies, and draw up a code of regulations. This, he hoped, would prove satisfactory, and he thought they should invite a deputation of the New and Tantallon Clubs to meet them and draw up a code of regulations.

The extension of the links 'beyond the End hole is also very much desired in North Berwick, so as to improve the course and relieve the block in the height of the season' arising from the succession of short holes. In connection with the "purging" of the Town Council at the recent meeting, Treasurer Shiel incidentally remarked that the board would be more than fortunate in having the services of Provost Brodie

in considering the question of the Golf links. He hoped that before long they might see the extension of the course proceeded with.

A new course at North Berwick has just been laid out, to the east of the town. It is known as the Rhodes Links, and consists of nine very sporting holes. From the commanding position of the green, the marine view is magnificent. The putting-greens and tees have been very carefully and successfully made, and once the course is toned down, a charming little links will be provided. So think Ben Syers and Davie Grant, who have already been round in friendly matches. The course will not be formally opened until after the winter.

A lease of the Rhodes Links has been secured from Sir Walter Hamilton Dalrymple by the Lord-Advocate, Professor W. G. Blaikie, Mr. Shaw-Stewart, Mr. George Dalziel, Mr. Hall Blyth, and Mr. John Oswald of Dunnikier. The joint-secretaries are Mr. C. L. Blaikie and Mr. R. M. Mackechnie.

A silver watch was last week offered as a prize by a travelling concert company in North Berwick for the best swing of a Golf club, and a good many caddies mounted the platform. Amusing imitations of the swings of well-known players were afforded, including those of Sayers, Davie Grant, and Mr. Laidlay. The award was given to Private Bertie M'Leod, of the 72nd Highlanders, formerly a Golf caddie.

Mr. John Wharton Tod, the well-known Edinburgh golfer, who is also a keen disciple of Izaak Walton, has just made a "record" in salmon fishing. On Thursday last he landed from the Spey a magnificent male fish which weighed 48 lb, and was in girth 28 inches. The catch was made with a Limerick hook, mounted with a grey heron fly on a single gut cast. The monster was sent on to Messrs. R. Anderson & Sons, the noted firm of patent Golf-club makers, to have a cast made.

On Thursday, October 5th, at St. Andrews, a capital four-some was played between Mr. F. A. Fairlie and Mr. P. C. Anderson, the Amateur Champion, and Mr. A. F. Macfie and Mr. James Cunningham, the latter couple receiving four strokes. Messrs. Macfie and Cunningham played a fine game, and won by 7 and 6 to play. They made a record for the round, viz., 76 strokes, or one lower than the previous best in a foursome. Their figures, giving a 4 for the fourth hole coming home, were—out, 5 5 3 4 6 5 3 3 4=38; in, 3 3 4 4 5 6 4 5 4=38. Total, 76.

It is reported that during the forenoon of the 4th inst., while two gentlemen from Kirriemuir were playing over Elliot Links previous to the match with the Arbroath Club, a rather curious incident took place. After driving from the tee for the "Girdle" (fourteenth hole) they were surprised to see that a crow had carried off one of the balls about 300 yards in the direction of the hole. When nearing the place where the crow had alighted, they were further surprised to see a number of crows fighting for possession of the ball. Next!

The annual business meeting of the Peterhead Club was held on 19th September, when the following office-bearers were appointed:—President, Col. Ferguson; captain, Mr. Robert Gray; secretary, Mr. W. L. Scott; treasurer, Mr. J. Pyper; committee, Messrs. A. W. Robertson, W. Martin, J. J. Milne, J. A. Fairlie, W. McKay, and J. Gibb.

It has been arranged to have a home-to-home match competition, thirty-six holes, and to establish a record of the links, between W. Thomson of North Berwick and Eltham Clubs, who became ground man at Sidcup after the 2nd of October, and J. Pierson of the Rochester Club. The first match will take place on the Sidcup Links to-morrow. On the same day a driving competition open to all members (ball with longest carry within a marked area) will be held for a prize presented by Messrs. J. W. Fry and M. Hewitt.

# A GOLFING BISHOP.

# To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—It may interest some of your readers to know that Canon A. H. Baynes, who on Friday last (September 29th), was, at St. Paul's Cathedral, consecrated Bishop in Natal, was in his day an enthusiastic golfer. He was the founder of the Golf club at Oxford University about 1878, and was one of the small band who used to play the game over Cowley Marsh, in spite of the jeers of the 'Varsity papers, which used to describe us as a "lot of lunatics hitting a ball about on Cowley Marsh." I well remember Mr. Baynes presiding at a meeting held with a view to forming a Golf Club, and shortly after matches were commenced with Cambridge University, amongst the earliest of our representatives being Mr. H. G. Hutchinson and Mr. A. Stuart. Golf has been, and still is, played by many Scottish ecclesiastics, but I expect this is the first instance of a golfer attaining the dignity of Bishop.

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
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
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
