



Review.

FISHING EXPERIENCES OF HALF-A-CENTURY. By Major F. Powell Hopkins. (London: Longmans, Green & Co.; and New York.)

Fitly enough in this tercentenary of the immortal Izaak, does Major Hopkins present us with a volume of his fishing reminiscences of fifty years. And yet to suggest any parallelism, however remotely, to bring into juxtaposition these two lovers of the angle, were surely the ne plus ultra of incongruity. ancient writer, numbering amongst his friends staid divines, men like Dr. Donne, Dr. Henry King, Bishop Sanderson, and John Hales, the "ever-memorable" Canon of Windsor, has given us a book which shall be an English classic for all time, one which appeals not to the fisherman alone, but largely also to the general reader, to all those lovers of nature who appreciate his pure, moral sentiments and piety. Major Hopkins cannot be said to approach his theme from the same quarter, but he has the advantage (an indispensable condition of success) of thoroughly understanding his subject; his heart is in his work; he provides us with a fund of anecdote, with moving adventures, which he describes in natural language, never striving after artificial effect, and ignoring the conventionalities of style. Indeed, almost at the outset he disarms criticism, appealing as he does to his readers' "charity to forgive the literary blunders contained in the text." It has, however, been our fate to review many a book containing far more of these than are here to be met with; but perhaps, as one instance, it might be well in another edition to revise such a sentence as this: In describing his visits to his earliest mentor in the art, the Major says: "He used to regale my senses, ears, eyes, and open mouth with his wondrous performances in deceiving the few trout to be found in the county." One can in a way regale another's open mouth, but it would be by the more material process of feeding it with one or more of such trout as aforesaid-or otherwise. Here and there a discordant note is struck, due to the introduction of sentences conspicuously lacking in refinement and good taste; blemishes these, in our opinion, far less venial than an occasional deviation from the rules of strict grammar. As to these, he will be a cantankerous critic who will not shut his eyes to them, redeemed as they are by the entertaining anecdotes, couched in vigorous (assuredly the Puritanical will say too vigorous) diction, which are scattered through the book.

As a boy, the author catches his first trout in a mill-dam, assisted by the miller with a landing-net, "and to give you some faint idea of my feelings on that occasion, I placed in the floury palm of that miller a sixpence, the last of my allowance for the month, though it left me penniless for fourteen days. The miller expectorated on it, I presume for luck, seemed rather disappointed I thought, at the amount, and abruptly left me for his mill, muttering something about 'luck,' and 'young beggar.' I learnt afterwards that he was a sad poa her, and had for some time fixed his alcoholic eye on that

Our author joins the army as an ensign in Her Majesty's 15th Regiment, and is ordered to join at Brecon, where his real fishing experiences begin. Becoming now an adept, he lands fourteen pounds of fish in twelve hours, and also a £5 bet against this performance, which he accomplishes with the assistance of a poaching rascal, "prickly with flies, and smelling of worms and whisky." Next we are taken to Ceylon, and told of the extremely ingenious device by which the skipper of the vessel took vengeance on a pertinacious shark. Arrived at his destination, an adventure with an alligator is narrated; and while A. D. C. to the Governor, the major has capital sport, remains three years, and finally returns to Cork. Chapters on pollock (Query, should not this be spelt with an a?) and pike, barbel, and ranger fishing off Gibraltar follow, for all fish come alike to our author's net. Anon we find him "back again" in Cork, in the course of which chapter he misquotes Tennyson, but subsequently makes amends by giving us an amusing experience at p. 92. He goes to Achill Island, sees a man in a boat, on Lake Doogort, who turns out to be Captain Boycott, whose exclusive dealing with large trout, larger than the major could

catch, was perhaps due to the fact that he caught them with grasshoppers. Major Hopkins gives his experiences in South Wales, on the Cothi, the Towy, and the Taff, and narrowly escaped being cut to pieces in a tunnel, where he passed as exciting a couple of minutes as may well be imagined. After a spell on the Itchen, he settles down in Devonshire. "near B —," where are to be found the advantages of a good school, fishing in two rivers, as well as the harbour, "and Golf on one of the finest links in the world, though at that time I was sadly ignorant of that first-class game. How well I remember disgusting my old friend Colonel H-, when on a visit to Westward Ho! by saying, on seeing two elderly gentlemen with clubs under their arms going to Golf, 'Why, bless me! those two old fools are going to play hockey.' It is pleasant to reflect that since then the Major has seen the error of his ways. Later on we have a splendid, nay thrilling adventure off Lundy Island with a conger, excellently told, and with much humour; illustrated also, as is the whole book, by the author, whose golfing pictures are also known to many. The monstrous eel turned out to be some fifteen feet long, as thick as a man's body, and weighed 72 lb. Bass fishing of course claims attention, and the Major is the proud inventor of an artificial sandeel, two together, to be correct, which does infinite execution. He calls it "Tickle-Toby." We must make room for one more capital story. The Major, when on fishing bent, was in the habit of taking with him a boatman named James Scilly, a character. Like Mr. Smouch, he was possessed of no very enchanting conversational powers, smoked a deal of very bad tobacco, drank whisky, but hated dirt, and kept his boat in apple-pie order, as clean as a new pin. The Major had a young lady staying with him, whom he took on one of his expeditions, but as the boat of James did not happen to be readily accessible from shore, that worthy carried the damsel through the water, and was about to deposit her on board, when he spied some mud on a pair of pretty boots she had on, so "stooping he dipped both her feet above the ankles in the sea, paddling them backwards and forwards to remove it, the owner meanwhile banging his old head, and calling him all the names she could think of. His only remark was, as he put her in the boat, 'Bless yer, Miss, salt water won't give yer the snuffles,' meaning a cold." The concluding chapter is one on Fishery Boards, which are adversely criticised.

If asked for our opinion, we would say to our readers, get this book. There is hardly a dull page in it; those who are fond of fishing will find "wrinkles"; those who care not for it, will yet in all probability enjoy it, pervaded as it is by an atmosphere of rollicking fun, while the genial, if somewhat aggressive bonhomie of the author himself, is throughout apparent.

SEATON CAREW GOLF CLUB.

HUGH KIRKALDY V. J. KAY.

Mr. F. Ellis, of the Oxford and Alamouth Golf Clubs, Mr. F. Ridley, of the Tyneside, and Hugh Kirkaldy, with the local professional (J. Kay), played a foursome on Tuesday, the 8th, and one of the members of the Seaton Club, anxious to measure the strength of his tutor (J. Kay) against that of the better-known player, offered a substantial inducement for them to compete together on Wednesday over two rounds of the course. Considerable interest was evinced in the contest, but so short was the interval between the arrangements and the play that it was impossible to give formal notice to all the members, and although some 150 members and visitors followed the players in the match, many others have expressed their regret at not having known of the game. The hon, secretary of the Seaton Club (Mr. Chas. Cooper) having kindly 'consented to act as referee, the players struck off from the first tee at 1.45 p.m. Kirkaldy is a young man of thirty years of age, 5 feet II inches high, rather spare and lithe, and of athletic proportions, from which one would judge that he could as easily run 100 yards in ten seconds as drive a ball 300 yards, and if his first drive was short of the latter distance, it must have been very little. Kay, we should think, is something past the forties, and being rather short of training, carried more "adipose tissue" than was

Misfortune at once laid her hand on Kay, and his first ball lay in a small patch of loose sand, which ought not to have been there, requiring the use of the niblick to place his ball on the grass close by, having to play another shot short of the Shepherd's bunker, which he carried in his fourth, and lay on the green; the putt lipped the hole, and 6 were registered, whilst Kirkaldy, taking the longer and safer course round the right of the house, misjudged the distance for his approach, laid his mashie shot dead, and won the first hole in 5. Both men made excellent drives for the second, Kirkaldy not allowing sufficient for the wind, which was blowing strong from the east across the course, was taken well to the right, and, approaching short, took 5 to complete, whilst Kay played a long cleek shot (120 yards) within one yard of the hole, and holed his putt, thus winning the hole in the perfect score of 3. which he repeated at the third hole, against his rival's 4, Kay being now 1 up. Driving in the teeth of the wind from the Battery, the balls both lay in the rushes, Kay getting out in the shortest distance with his second, and lay on the left of the hole with his third, and holed out in 5; whilst his opponent made deadly use of his cleek and holed in 4, again being all even. The next four holes were divided in 5, 5, 4, and 5 respectively, and playing for the last hole out, Kay made an exceedingly long brassey shot, which, by about 6 inches, failed to carry that excellent trap, and remained partly imbedded nearly at the top of the parapet; trap, and remained partly imbedded nearly at the top of the parapet; this was sore luck, indeed, and, requirir g two more strokes to get on to the green, took 6 to hole out, against his opponent's 5, Kay thus turning for home one hole down, each player being 42 strokes for the nine holes. The next hole was halved in 4. At the eleventh hole the long driving of Kirkaldy made telling effect, his ball reaching within twenty yards of the green; whilst Kay's, going rather high, dropped into the bunker some 120 yards from the hole, and, being short in his approach, took 5 against his opponent's 4, being now two holes down. Although long driving has the advantage when straight holes down. Although long driving has the advantage when straight with such a wind as was blowing, it was very dangerous, as from the next drive the elements took possession of Kirkaldy's ball over the railings, and carried it away into the rushes to the left, and enabled Kay to gain a stroke, finishing in 4, and being now only one down. Kirkaldy's next drive of 250 yards was, like his other drives, quite refreshing to witness, and took him within a few yards of that little trap which is so tantalising to the indifferent iron shot; this hole was halved in 4. Kay's iron shot for the Pond hole took him to the left, and, failing to lay his third dead, he lost the hole in 5 to his opponent's 4, Kay being now two down. Whilst Kirkaldy cleared the Doctor's Bunker in excellent style, Kay just pitched on to the sand beyond, and, although his recovery was good, he had his patience sorely tried by his putt just lipping the hole, and curling round, gave himself a stimie about 18 inches from the hole; but, taking his mashie, Kay played one of the prettiest strokes in the match by lifting his ball over that of his opponent clean into the hole, which piece of good play was greeted with well-deserved applause.

The Bowl hole was halved in 4, and the Sh pherd's Cottage hole lost to his (Kay's) opponent's 4, his drive being again within thirty yards of the hole, in fact, such driving we have never seen before. Kay was now 4 down. Kirkaldy took his cleek to drive to the Home green, but overshot it by some fifteen yards, and the ball being brought out

from the green, which is under the care of the conservators of the ground, by the instructions of the referee, Kirkaldy laid his ball dead, and holed in 3 against Kay's 5, thus completing the round 5 holes to the good, his score being 35 against Kay's 39 home, total 77; and Kay, 81. Although this is good play, it is much below Kay's record of 68.

After a short interval play was resumed, and the ranks of the spectators were greatly increased; we noticed several members of the Whitley Club, and some even from Newcastle (co. Down). The first hole was halved indifferently in 6, both players having foozled their short putts, but this seeemed to nerve Kay to some better form, and he won the next hole in 4 against his opponent's 5, and repeated it at the third hole, having thus reduced his deficiency to 3. The fourth hole was divided in 4, whilst the fifth hole was won by Kay in 4, he being now only 2 down. The next three holes were divided, whilst Kay repeated his brassey shot to the lost hole, but, gaining by the experience of the first round, put in a little extra strength, and carried the bunker in the second shot, winning the hole in 4, and thus turning for home I down. First hole home was halved; second, won by Kirkaldy in 4, the following two holes halved, the Pond hole being perfectly played by Kirkaldy in 4, against Kay's 5, making Kirkaldy now 3 up. Both men carried the Doctor' bunker and divided the hole in 3, and also the next hole in 4, whilst at the seventeenth Kay heeled his ball and got to the right of the cottage, and, failing in his recovery, lost the hole in 5, against his opponent's I less, Kirkaldy being now 4 up, and the last hole being halved perfectly in 3.

Very heartily did the spectators appreciate the play of the exchampion, and cheered him considerably. Kay came home in 39 against his opponent's 36, thus making the round, 78, against Kirkaldy's 80. The gross scores for the two rounds were: Kay, 159, and Kirkaldy, 157. So keen were the spectators that the prize was supplemented by a liberal collection amongst the members present. Another member immediately offered another substantial prize for the men to play together again in the course of a few days, when it is hoped that it will be convenient for Kirkaldy to come from Alnmouth, and also to give a little time for Kay to get into training.

They placed it unreservedly in the hands of the committee, to be competed for annually, on the adjacent links, upon such terms and conditions as the committee may think best in the interests and welfare of the club. He hoped they would accept this cup in the spirit, and with as much gratification as the townspeople now offered it to them. (Hear, hear.) He hoped it might prove to be the object of many a keen and spirited and interesting encounter upon their links, not only by the members of the local club, but that it might be an inducement and incentive to members of other clubs in distant parts of the country to pay these links a visit, and that in coming here they might not only enjoy the benefit of our pure and bracing air, and of the health-giving atmosphere that we enjoy here, but that it might tend also to increase and to spread the fame of the already well-known Cinque Ports Club, and that it might add to them fresh laurels and fresh distinctions in the contests, in which he hoped this club might come out victorious.

Captain Eccles said the gift was only one more of the frequent instances of good will which had been shown them at and since the formation of the club. They had met the members—he was not speaking of the Corporation only, but of the inhabitants also—with an evident wish to help them in every possible way in the formation, and in fact they always met the club in the most liberal and kind-hearted manner. The committee thought the best thing they could do was to supplement this very handsome cup by a small, but similar cup, which the winner could take away and call his own. The original, of course, would remain in the possession of the club, and be played for annually, according to the wish of the townspeople. Captain Eccles concluded his speech by remarking that he felt that if the hotel accommodation of the place were extended the town of Deal would become one of the great golfing centres.

TOURNAMENT AT LUFFNESS.

The tournament for the Hope challenge medal never fails to bring to Luffness the cream of East Lothian golfers. The medal was presented by the late Captain Hope, R.N., and the competition is open to members of any county club. A gold pendant is given to the winner by the Hope family. The full medal course was played, and from the favourable conditions under which the meeting took place, low scoring was expected. The winning score last year was 75, compiled by Mr. J. Forrest, and this fine card left little room for improvement. The ballot gave Mr. L. Stuart Anderson an early start, and he proved in his top game. At the fourth green he was 3 under 5's, and this fine start was fully maintained. At the Ladder two other strokes had been knocked off the average, and three 4's took him to the half-ground in 37. A 3 and two 4's followed, and, maintaining his steady play, Mr. Anderson holed out in 77. In the course of the round the player made several splendid recoveries, which stook him in good stead. Mr. A. M. Ross had also an early start, and those who followed were treated to a brilliant performance. The first three holes were taken by Mr. Ross in faultless 4's, and the somewhat indifferent 5 and 6 which followed were more than wiped off with a 2 for the Ladder hole. The seventh hole was taken in 3, and a 5 and 4 for the next two holes saw Mr. Ross complete the half-round in 37. A possible 3 was just missed on the next green, but a 4 for the Sea hole and a 3 for the hole across improved his card. A 5, a 4, a 5, and two 4's brought Mr. Ross in sight of home, his card for the seventeen holes being 70. A magnificent drive carried his ball to within a wrist shot of the last green, but here a considerable wait took place before he could play the stroke. The hanging over the ball at this critical part of the game proved very unfortunate for Mr. Ross, who foozled the shot and took 6 to the hole, where a 4 should have been the figure. A "RAPHAEL" AT GOLF.

In the museum at Venice there is a drawing, of which the accompanying print is a reproduction. The figure was traced off the original; and, since Raphael was the author of that original, it is entitled to be held in some respect, even by a golfer, who should hold few things in respect which are not Golf. Apart from its artistic merits, which could not fail to be great, there are points of interest about this drawing. In all essentials, the swing is evidently the golfing swing. It does not matter by which name the game was called. It may have been the Italian equivalent of Golf, or of chole (the game they played in French Flanders), or it may have been jeu de mail. By the bye, in this jeu de mail, according to the old French book of rules, they played with a wooden



ball through the green, as one may say, but when it came to the putting, they might change the wooden ball for a steel one; which, as they seem to have thought, putted better. They putted at a thing which was virtually a croquet hoop—not at a hole in the ground. It is open to the golfing "sea-lawyer" of to-day, after driving through the green with a far-flying Slazenger, to say that he thinks it is cracked, and to substitute a "putty" for it, which is a better thing for putting with. But this is a result of the new rule (a necessary and excellent rule) for changing a cracked ball, which opens a door for the unscrupulous—one door only, however, for no man should play twice with a practitioner of this sharpness.

It is not very obvious what the exact shape of the head of the club may be with which Raphael's man (who seems,

by the way, to have just stepped out of a Turkish bath) is playing. Probably it is a hammer-headed kind of thing, such as they used for playing jeu de mail; and such as Sir Walter Hamilton Dalrymple has recently adapted with but moderate success, for Golf. The most interesting point to note is the correctness, judged by the modern golfing standard, of the swing. The most noticeable point of difference is the height to which the hands are raised above the shoulder. There is no fear of this golfer breaking his club on his right shoulder-blade; he has none of that vice of swinging the club round the shoulder, instead of over and above it. Rather we should say that his club had been brought up "ower straight," as the golfing professors phrase it, and that he would consequently bring it down "ower straight" also, and very likely slice the ball. But then we must always remember that neither this man nor Raphael, his maker, had had the inestimable advantage of reading the Badminton book on Golf, nor any other of the kindred works which teach the grammar of the noble game.

For the rest, however, Old Tom Morris would pass this Raphaelesque man sound enough. That turning on the left toe, with the heel well off the ground, is as perfect as it could be. There is no fault to be found with the turning of the body on the hips; and the eyes, glancing over the top of the deltoid muscle, are kept well fastened on the ball. This is all as it should be, and we may congratulate Raphael and his man. And even if his hands be thrown somewhat away above his shoulder, in a manner which does not suggest the best execution, may not this after all be attributable, perhaps, to the greater freedom of swing which must accompany such total freedom from garments. This, perhaps, is how we all do it in those practice swings, which we take when we get out of our morning tubs -how unfortunate that there is no one there ready to "kodak" us in the act!

At all events, this creation of the artist is a very superior person, golficè speaking, to those men of Van der Neer and Van der Veyde, who play a spurious sort of Golf, with a half-swing, upon the ice; or to those quaint figures on the encaustic tiles, whose chief characteristic is the Dutchness of their outlines. These latter, in fact, are no doubt only too accurate representations of "Golf as she is played." Raphael, with a true artistic instinct, has gone to the region of the ideal, and shown us, according to his conception of it (which seems but little at fault), "Golf as she should be played." We shall not go far amiss, in our golfing aims, if we strive to realise, in our swings, this ideal of the great designer.

As regards attendance we may safely say that the Braids (Edinburgh) course holds the record. It has been calculated that since March, 1891, when the ticket system was introduced, up to August of this year (1893), the grand total of players has been 210,000; average number per week about 1,750, per day about 290. The highest number of golfers out in one day was about 880; in one week, over 3,200. Ladies in one day numbered about 45; in one week, about 217. On one Monday there were about 60 clergymen of all denominations, and a few professors. The record score at present is 71. A clergyman has scored 74, and a lady 92.

The Rev. Professor Story, of Glasgow University, who is said to be next on the list as Moderator of the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland, has recently been on a visit to Gullane. He has engaged in several Golf matches, being a fairly good player, and he has been so taken with the links that he has secured a house there for September. The course, owing to its popularity, is becoming more and more crowded, and with the probability of a water supply being provided at a cost of £3,000, and the extension of the present drainage system, something will have to be done to regulate play on the green. The question is sure to come up for discussion at the September meeting of the Gullane Club, but there is little prospect of its being settled by the proposed lease of the links to which we have formerly referred. Some other and better plan will, it is hoped, be devised without any dangers to the golfers' rights on the green.

Aberlady has lost Mr. Peter Brown, a gentleman who did much to bring the Luffness Links to its present popular position. Mr. Brown was the chief agent in having the club formed in 1867, and ever since he has been one of the keenest members and a prominent prize-winner. In his light-blue coat he was often to be seen on the links with Lord Wemyss and other members of the Wemyss family, and he was also a zealous defender of the action of Mr. Hope, of Luffness, in connection with the club, being one of the witnesses for Mr. Hope when the Aberlady Railway lately came before a Committee of the House of Commons.

Mr. A. Stuart, who last year won the Championship of Ireland, will again enter the field in this year's competition, which is to be held at Newcastle, County Down. Mr. Stuart has been spending a holiday in Islay, and has had several rounds over Machrie Links, his first score being an 85. He has expressed in unstinted terms his admiration of the Islay Green; and at his suggestion, and that of other players, some alterations will, we believe, be made by the committee, with the view of improving the course. The chief of these is that a start be made at the present No. 3 Hole, and that No. 1, the splendid Island hole, shall come last but one in the list, the round finishing at the present No. 2 or Strand hole. A small bunker is also proposed at the Short or twelfth hole, to give the same more of a sporting character.

Numbers of Golf balls have been found at Ardmore, a point to the South-East of Islay. It is supposed that these have travelled by sea from Machrihanish, a distance of thirty miles; but to verify this, players who are in the habit of losing balls at this famous links should mark them, and they may hear of something to their advantage. It appears that there is also a short course laid out on the island of Gigha, between Cantyre and Islay, and some of the gutta-percha travellers may hail from that island.

On the Machrie course a golfer some time ago lost his ball in a rabbit-hole, and as he was giving up the search for it, a startled rabbit dashed out of a neighbouring hole. On looking into this he saw to his amazement a perfect magazine of lost balls, and succeeded in raking out no fewer than twenty-seven!

There is said to be "nothing like leather," but gutta-percha threatens to "take the cake." One day lately some players at Machrie were thoroughly drenched, and on reaching the clubhouse no fuel, not even peat, could be got to make a fire in the stove. A happy idea struck one of the players who gathered together a lot of old Golf-balls and speedily had a capital fire going, round which the company gathered and dried themselves, and their garments. This experience should be made a note of.

Islay was renowned for whisky long before Golf was known there, and a glass of Lagavulin, or other of the noted products of its numerous distilleries, is, perhaps, as useful as a guttapercha fire when the golfer has got a drenching. A party who had braved the elements all day, and were returning to the waggonette sent by "mine host" of the White Hart to drive them home, had a small parcel handed to them by the driver. Judge of their delight when they unrolled a phial of the precious dew, sent by thoughtful friends to help them home, with this impromptu label thereon:—

Take, oh take this powerful potion, Never mind the Golf-ball's motion, For though playing by the ocean, You're nane the waur o' Lagavulin Golfers gallant, oh!

A few months ago we chronicled a fresh record for the Wimbledon green, made by Mr. T. R. Pinkerton, a member of the London Scottish, and a golfer well known to Edinburgh and East Lothian players. The score on that occasion was 75, but this record has now been broken once again by Mr. Pinkerton, who, while playing on July 29th with Mr. Woodford, went round in the phenomenally low score of 74. The details are as follows:—Out, 4 4 3 4 3 5 5 5 4=37; in, 3 3 4 6 4 4 3 5 5=37; total, 74. Mr. Pinkerton would be a great acquisition to the ranks of competitors at championship meetings, for as a match player he is equally brilliant. He is, however, a busy man, and cannot afford the time for a week's Golf on end far away from home. We hope he may find time and opportunity to enter for the Amateur Championship one of these days.

"There can be no doubt" (says the Pall Mall Gazette) "that lawn-tennis has had its day. Enthusiastic votaries of the game still exist, it is true; but the fact remains that society is crying out for a new pastime, and that no one seems equal to the task of inventing one. Golf, though steadily gaining in popularity, can never take the place of lawn-tennis and croquet, the large area which is required for playing it being an insuperable drawback where space is limited. 'Tea and tennis' are compatible and not altogether uninviting, but 'tea and Golf' strikes one in altogether a different light. Every year, how-ever, the number of Golf players increases, and they appear to find it a most enthralling pursuit. When one reflects that during the last twenty years no less than five hundred new Golf clubs have been inaugurated, one can but feel that the game of Golf is possessed of marvellous vitality. It is not the modern game that many people seem to imagine; indeed it boasts an ancestry of some four hundred years in Scotland, where it first originated. Women are no less ardent devotees of Golf than men, and some of them play a first-rate game. Nowhere does a woman neatly turned out—bien chaussée, bien gantée—appear to greater advantage. That skirts must be made well to clear the ground goes without saying. Bodices, too, should fit easily, the sleeves being sufficiently loose to allow

of free action for the arms. Blouses are undoubtedly the most comfortable garments to play in. A gown that we met with the other day was neat and workmanlike for bad weather, being composed of fawn and blue homespun. A band of tan leather bordered the skirt, and the coat turned back over a tight-fitting vest of pliant leather, open at the throat to show a collar and tie. Many gowns are made of waterproof tweed or serge, so that the wearers are prepared for all weathers, for the idea of wearing a cloak or mackintosh is not to be thought of. Golf will form one of the principal amusements at many of our holiday resorts this summer, for quite a number of the large seaside towns have started links of late."

We have just seen some new designs in Golf jewellery, medals, and badges, by Vaughton, Gothic Works, Birmingham. All the designs are artistically executed and full of golfing appropriateness. There is a handsome shield of the Links Golf Club, and a medal of the Weston Caddie Golf Club and Charnwood Forest Golf Club. There is also one of a ladies' Golf club showing the figure of a lady in Tam-o'-Shanter, swinging at the tee, and another of a gentleman, showing the undulating sweep of the links receding in the background. There is a large pedestal ornament of a golfer, a cup, several designs of brooches in Golf club and ball arrangements, an inkstand, a candlestick, and several appropriate ornaments for hanging at the watch chain.

Mr. Ramsbottom, The Sportsman's Depôt, 81, Market Street, Manchester, is sending out a beautifully moulded, hard, well-seasoned Golf ball at half a sovereign a box. They keep their shape well, do not hack, and have been well and thoroughly painted. Mr. Ramsbottom has also a fine stock of Golf clubs by many of the best and well-known makers.

For players who like an artificial tee, uniform in height, and indestructible, nothing could be better than the cones of indiarubber, with a piece of red worsted attached to facilitate recovery, which Mr. Ramsbottom keeps in stock. In the Manchester district both the balls and tees are largely patronised.

Tom Dunn has been lately engaged in laying out a nine-hole course at Wanstead Park, near Snaresbrook. The ground is very suitable for the game, the turf being good with plenty of variety in the hazards. He has also rearranged the green of the Epping Club, which consists of nine long holes, full of interest and variety. A course has also been marked out by Dunn for the club at Hurlingham.

On Thursday afternoon an interesting foursome was played over the old links at Sauchope Crail, the players being Tom Morris, the veteran professional, and Mr. T. Brown, against Mr. Duncan, Boghall, and Mr. A Scott, Crail. The game had a good following over the green, and some good play was exhibited on both sides, the match ending 2 up for Morris and Mr. Brown. It is understood that Tom Morris' visit was in connection with a proposal for a ladies' course to be laid out on the "Braes."

A professional match for £5 was played over Dunbar course on Wednesday evening, the 9th, between Jack Kirkaldy, St. Andrews, and J. Cummins, Dunbar, the former winning by 7 up and 6 to play, his score being 74.

The resignation of Willie Campbell as green-keeper and club attendant has been received and accepted by the Ranfurly Castle Club, Bridge of Weir.

GOLF IN IRELAND.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—I started some weeks ago with the intention of visiting and playing on the principal links in the North of Ireland. My good genius led me first to this lovely spot, and here, unless my present sentiments greatly alter, I am likely to remain till the termination of my visit to Ireland. So charmed am I with the place, the beauty of its scenery, nestling at the foot of lofty Slieve Dmard, that I cannot refrain from writing you a short account of its attractions, knowing how many true lovers of the "Ancient Game" are on the look-out at this season of the year for pastures new.

Newcastle is a large village on the North-East Coast of Ireland, about thirty-three miles from Belfast. It is surrounded by lovely scenery, including the mountain already mentioned. It

is a seaside resort of some note, and as for the links, no description of mine could do justice to them. I can only say to golfers peripatetically inclined, "Come and see them for yourselves." The links are situated quite close to the railway station, and not far from the "Annesley Arms," a very comfortable hotel. They run for the greater part of the way along the seaside, trending inland, of course, occasionally. It is not wha would be called a long-hole course, not more than half a dozen holes being much over three hundred yards; but, on the other hand, there are some exceptionally fine hazards, where it is simply a question of do or die; in other words, if you don't get over in your drive, you are done for.

The putting-greens present, perhaps, the most admirable feature of this admirable links. They are equalled by very few in the United Kingdom, and surpassed by none.

I came and saw, but I could not conquer the Newcastle bunkers; they conquered me!

We had supposed the inhabitants of that favoured spot to have been quite sufficiently supplied with links already, for to say nothing of the rival charms of Willesden, of Bushey, of Northwood and of Twyford Abbey, all within quite easy distance of the famous spire, are there not Chorley Wood and the new links at Stammore, the former of which are certainly inferior to no inland links in England, and the latter of which, if only a profuse expenditure of capital could make a green, would shortly yield in excellence to none whatever? But, apparently, as with the Queen in Hamlet,

"Increase of appetite has grown By what it fed on,"

and Harrow now has links of its own. The site which has been chosen is on the south side of the hill, where a pellucid brook, or what should be so, gently meanders between breezy uplands, and affords good hazards, a full drive being required to carry across the ravine. There are nine holes, the said ravine being crossed no less than five times altogether, and forming hazards for the second, third, fourth, seventh, and ninth holes; a gap in a hedgerow flanked by a pond, affords a very satisfactory hazard for the eighth hole; the first, the fifth and sixth are plain.
