THE LADIES' GOLF CHAMPIONSHIP.

The proposal of the Championship Committee of the Ladies' Golf Union, to arrange the draw for the Championship so that the gold and silver medallists of the previous year should not meet in the upper or under half of the draw, has given rise to so much discussion that the opportunity seems a favourable one for having the matter ventilated among golfers.

It is pre-supposed by the writer that there is no opportunity of having either of the Championships decided on the system of the American tournaments, on account of the time necessary for that method. The committee seem to have acted under the same impression, and attempted to impose some condition by which the element of fortune would to some extent be eliminated as it is in the American tournament. The method proposed that the gold and silver medallists should be unable to meet each other until they had been successful in disposing of all the other competitors.

This method of arranging the draw has been objected to for the following reasons.

t .- That it is an innovation, and has no precedent.

2.—That all the players had not the same luck in the draw.3.—That it is a protection to the gold and silver medallists of

the previous year.

4.—That a stiff fight might so disconcert a better player, that an inferior player may have a better chance of beating her, or, in the words of the objector, "That gave somebody else a chance."

It is to be presumed that the object of such contests, is, both on the side of the proposers of this method of drawing, and that of its opponents, to find the best players of the year, and to them to award the gold, silver, and bronze medals of that year. Keeping this, as one of the great intentions of the contest, in view, let us examine the objections which have been made to the proposal.

1.—The argument of "innovation" needs no reply. It is an innovation admittedly, and as Professor Turner said, does not

stand condemned therefor.

2.—That all the players had not the same luck in the draw. What luck is it that any player is debarred from? That of having the gold and silver medallists of last year possibly drawn against each other, and by that piece of luck having one of them removed from the opportunity of meeting the other opponents. Should it happen, therefore, that the gold and silver medallists of the previous year are so far above the other competitors that the latter are out-classed, and that these medallists are in the same half of the draw, the silver medallist of the year must be an inferior player who has obtained her position solely by the fortune of the draw, and the great object of the contest, as above indicated—namely, determining who are the best players of the year—is counteracted. Nay, this

luck may extend still further, and reach the point mentioned as the fourth argument against the proposal, and in such a case even the premier position, that of Champion for the year, might be obtained by a second or third-rate player favoured by this "luck of the draw," so much defended by the opponents of the "innovation." Is this to be desired or is this to be prevented if possible? Will the golfing world be content with such an ending? Will the Champion who wins in such circumstances be proud of her position?

3.—That it is a "protection" to the gold and silver medallists of the previous year. In what way? From whom are either protected? They must fight their way through the other players, and, if successful, they must meet each other at the final. They are protected from no competitor, but only as to the time at which they meet. But how are the other competitors protected by the usual method of drawing? The protection seems to be all the other way, and, as pointed out by the opponents of the proposal, should the gold and silver medallists be in one half of the draw, the other competitors will be certainly protected from one of them at least, and possibly by the severity of the fight the runner-up may be protected from both, and so win the Championship. This is where the protection is seen, that is to say, in the protection of the other players from the gold and silver medallists of the previous year.

4.—That a suiff fight may so disconcert a better player that it "would give somebody else a chance." This is a ludicrous argument, scarcely calling for an answer. The competitor who would hope to win by such means—by the obstinate and brilliant resistance of a third competitor having so unstrung the nervous or muscular force of the opponent she is about to meet—would hope for the same opponent's disablement by a broken arm or a lightning stroke. She would, in fact, hope to win not by prowess, but by the luck of the draw and the

assistance of a third party

By the present method of drawing it might happen that the acknowledged best players, say, in the men's Championship all the former winners, may be drawn in the same half of the draw, and by this means "give a chance" to inferior players in the other half of the draw—in fact, protect them in the manner shown in answering the third and fourth arguments against

the innovation.

According to the proposed method of drawing, the medallists have to fight their way through to reach the highest positions just as they did before, and all it provides for is that they shall not lend their assistance to the other players by crushing the other already proved most dangerous competitor, and at the same time being so shattered in doing so that, by their own efforts, they have rendered themselves unfit to cope with a player who, if subjected to the same trial, would have succumbed to the defeated one. In short, the competitors are not to try to kill each other for the benefit of the poorer players. By the suggested method the time of the meeting of the medallists, should they again be successful, is provided for, and that is all. By it the "luck of the draw" is eliminated as far as possible. There is quite sufficient luck in the game from the physical conformation of the green, and there should, in the opinion of the writer, be as little luck as possible apart from that. The medallists are entitled to say to the other players, "We have, as far as possible, proved that we are at present the best golfers, and if you are equal to us and able to take the positions we took last year, play us, and beating us you have won with-out the benefit of the luck of the draw, but do not ask us to put one or other out for your benefit. We are willing to meet you all, one after another, but that is what you, who oppose this method of drawing, wish to avoid if the draw will favour you." That is, at least, what this method says for them.

Are there any better methods of arriving at the best players? Would the method of allowing the runner up or Champion of the previous year the power of challenging the runner up of the present year for second place be better? Would it be an improvement to have, previous to the tournament, one day's play of thirty-six holes by score, and allow the first sixteen or eight to compete in the match tournament, placing the odd numbers in one half of the draw and the even numbers in the other half and then drawing? Or would it be better to abolish the silver and bronze medals and have one trophy only for the Champion-



The sixth annual grand tournament over the (Edinburgh) Braids course takes place on Saturday, June 16th, when the Kinloch-Anderson scratch medal and the Colston handicap medal, with numerous other prizes, are to be competed for. Entries (2s. 6d each) require to be made by Monday, June 4th, with Mr. George Robb, 2, Magdalene Cottages, Musselburgh. Competitors play one round of the green, eighteen holes, counting strokes, and 18 is the maximum allowance. There is expected to be a greatly increased list of entries, and the occasion will doubtless bring out some fine scoring, as the number of good players is yearly increasing on this crowded course,

The "cold wave" which has recently swept across the United Kingdom keeps up the abnormal reputation of the weather, the frost of a morning averaging from twelve or ten degrees downwards. Much damage has been done to horticulture and agriculture, more, indeed, than is at present apparent. Had curlers been early enough astir, they might have had a game several mornings on artificial ponds, but they are too disgusted with the erratic conduct of John Frost. The old gentleman has scarcely interfered with Golf for a single day during the last twelve months. Perhaps he has caught the "craze."

Dr. Almond explains, in relation to the report of his assertion of the rights of his Lorretto boys to Golf over Musselburgh, independent of the new regulations, that it was only the game of "dex" that was being played. If this game, he says, is to be disallowed, he intends to encourage Golf among his boys, and the prospect of waiting their turn behind 130 Lorrettonians would not be pleasant to golfers. The worthy doctor, it appears, desires to give the new rules every chance, and a number of tickets have been taken out for the boys. No doubt the Council will also provide for "dex."

The Edinburgh Outdoor Recreation Union, encouraged by what the Corporation has done for golfers, met recently to "give expression to a widespread feeling that greater interest should be taken by the Council in promoting recreation grounds for the people, and putting the existing public parks

in a suitable condition for games." All success attend the laudable effort; but those who are jealous of the privileges of golfers ought to remember that the Braids course is only a payment by the Council to golfers for the rights they enjoyed over Bruntsfield. If cricketers and others have fields open for them on Bruntsfield they ought therefore to remember that the golfers gave these up for what they now possess.

In the lease of Gullane, which the club approved at the last annual meeting, the club agree to pay the proprietors of Dirleton estate "the sum of $\pounds 5$ per annum, and such further sum, not exceeding $\pounds 50$ per annum, as shall be collected by them for the use of the green, after deducting the expense of collecting the same at the rate of $\pounds 52$ per annum."

So great is the flow of silver and gold into the coffers of the club that they will in all likelihood not only be able to pay £55 per annum for the green to the proprietors, but have a handsome profit over. In moving the adoption of the lease, the ex-captain said that the club had "no desire to make money out of the unattached players who came to Gullane." This will be therefore against their desire, but not, surely, disagreeable.

The Gullane golfers at a recent meeting objected to the charges, and the right of the club to levy them, but to avoid any disturbance, the members of the club paid under protest. The first annual ticket-holder is the minister of Athelstaneford, the Rev. Mr. Stevenson.

The annual report of the Church of Scotland Commission on the religious condition of the people, submitted to the General Assembly now in session, states that in the discussion on the Sunday schools, the question of Golf caddies came up. As regarded the caddies on North Berwick Links, the claim was made that in respect of habits and conduct they stood high, and were quickly improving. The claim was endorsed by a Commissioner, while the minister of Dirleton stated that as a class they were well-behaved in his parish, and gratefully acknowledged the kindness of players who had procured good situations in Edinburgh for many of the boys. He added that all he would ask was that gentlemen should always be careful to speak properly before them.

The Second Division of the German Fleet, in visiting the Forth, were not behind the First Division in the matter of taking an interest in Golf. When Lord-Provost Russell and his party visited the flagship, König Wilhelm, on which they were received by Rear-Admiral Diedrich, one of the officers in the course of conversation questioned the Lord-Provost about Golf, and his Lordship, with paper and pencil, constructed a diagram of a Golf green, and explained how the game is played. We may expect shortly to hear of the "boom" in the Fatherland, especially among the military forces. Club and ballmakers might take the hint.

The officers of the German Fleet it appears, not only got instructions on paper about the theory of Golf, but some of them, under the guidance of Councillor Kinloch Anderson, visited Mortonhall, and tried their hands at tee shots with dubious success. One of them described the game as polo à pied, another expressed astonishment that the players did not immediately run after their balls; but they agreed, on hearing how it was done, that it was a good game, and like all British games, developed the physique of the players.

The sub-committee of the Glasgow Town Council, appointed to consider the advisableness of drawing up rules for regulating play at Alexandra Park, have submitted their report. After considering the suggestions of the Glasgow Golf Club, the committee have resolved to recommend that the course, including putting-greens, shall in future be maintained and kept in good condition by the Corporation. To meet the expense, a charge of one penny is proposed; the members of

the Glasgow Golf Club being exempted in respect of the payment by the club of the annual sum of £150, or any other such sum as the Corporation may fix. Members of other clubs making a like arrangement will have the same privilege. It is also proposed that the portion of the lands of Easter Kenmyhill recently acquired shall be laid out as a free course for "persons under fifteen years of age." The regulations also provide for the appointment of persons by the Corporation to see that the rules are carried out, to clear the course of loiterers and pitch-and-toss players, and to protect the sheep grazing on the park. It is also proposed to bar single players and three-ball matches.

On the 23rd, Mr. A. S. Johnston, whilst playing with Mr. C. G. Tunks, lowered by I stroke the previous amateur record of 75 for the Eltham course, made by Mr. A. D. Blyth, going round in 74, which is the professional record, made by A. Toogood in April last. The score was made up as follows:—Out, 5 4 4 3 3 4 3 4 4=34; in, 4 6 3 4 5 4 3 6 5=40.

The death is announced, at Littlestone-on-Sea, of Dr. George Gumbleton, barrister-at-law, one of the oldest members of the staff of *The Times* law reporters. He was pretty well-known among southern golfers, and was a frequent contributor to Golf, particularly of Latin verse.

A coast course of eighteen holes (upwards of three miles) has been laid out at Harlech, Merionethshire. The links are picturesquely situate skirting the famous "Morfa," taking in portions of the sand dunes, which are a feature of the place, and commanding extensive views of the Merioneth and Carnarvon Mountains. The land presents great natural advantages for good golfing; the course is well varied and drained, and is conveniently situate close to the Railway Station. Experts speak highly of the course and its capabilities, special praise being given to certain guarded greens. Harlech has good accommodation for visitors, who can obtain further information from the hon. secretary of the Golf club.

The Mitcham Golf Course, while a long course, and having room for driving of the ordinary scratch kind, cramps such drivers as Rolland or Mr. E. Blackwell, on account of the way the hazards have been placed. The first hazard is carried easily by a moderate shot from the tee, and the second hazard by another moderate shot; but here the difficulty for the great driver comes in, as he can frequently reach the second hazard from the tee, as Rolland did last Friday at the fifth, sixth, eighth, tenth, the "Woodite" hole across the wall, and the eighteenth hole. At the eleventh and fifteenth holes he used a cleek from the tee instead of the driver, so as to be short of the hazard. It is like playing at a game with certain shots barred. The rule of compulsory litting from the gorse hazards, (designed no doubt, to preserve the bushes) also cramps Rolland, as a powerful man like him can play well out of a hazard, and the playing from a hazard is a part of the game as well as the avoidance of a hazard. The law as to compulsory lifting applies only to certain gorse hazards, and not to others which should in the game be avoided as much as those from which the player is compelled to lift-the eighteenth hole, for example, where Taylor could play from gorse bounding the green, while Rolland had to lift from the gorse, which he reached from the tee. The club, which is a strong one in point of playing ability as well as numbers, is managed with great

Chislehurst may now be reckoned amongst those places whose attractions have been greatly increased by the addition of Golf links. An excellent nine-hole course has been laid out in the charming park belonging to Camden House, formerly the residence of the late Emperor of the French. The club was formally inaugurated by the first meeting of the members, held on Saturday last, at which a provisional committee was elected, with Lord Walter Gordon Lennox, M.P., as president, and Sir Patteson Nickalls as vice-president. The course is now in good order, and, with a variety of natural and artific al

bunkers, forms a most sporting and attractive one, whilst a charming club-house has been formed at Camden House, overlooking the links, which has been most tastefully redecorated for the purpose.

Playing a three-ball match on Thursday evening, Mr. J. H. Andrew made the following good score over Prestwick:—Out, 4 4 5 4 4 4 3 4 4=36; in, 4 3 4 4 5 5 5 3 5=38; total 74. This is the amateur record, which is two strokes better than the previous record held by the same player.

The nine-hole course of the West Cornwall Golf Club on Lelant Towans has been extended to eighteen holes, but it will be nearly a year before the complete extension is available. The eighteen-hole course will be a very fine one. The lengths of holes range from 150 to 436 yards, but three holes will cost some hundreds of pounds to clear out the rabbits and their works. The course has been so arranged that with one (not always good) junction hole players will manage always to have the home green near the club house while the course is being

always good) junction hole players will manage always to have the home green near the club house while the course is being gradually increased. Mr. A. East's picture, "A Sunlit Harbour," in the Royal Academy this year, gives a notion of what will be the fifth hole. It is just over the boats, and the approach hazard—a road cutting—is shown.

While playing against Mr. Offley Cramp on Tuesday, Bob Simpson, the Carnoustie professional, equalled the record of the green, 73, which was previously held by his brother Archie Simpson. 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THE RULE AS TO STARTING TIME.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR, -On Friday morning last I went down to Brancaster, to play that afternoon and the following day at the Whitsuntide meeting of the Royal West Norfolk Golf Club. On my arrival at the club-house at twenty minutes to three, with the gentleman who had waited at Hunstanton to drive me over and play with me, I was informed that I was too late, as half-past two was the latest time allowed for beginning. I am a member of four Golf clubs, and at one time belonged to a fifth, and I have never heard of such a rule before, and it was not till Friday that I heard they had any rule of the kind at Brancaster. The rule does not appear in the printed rules of the club, issued about two months ago, and was not on Friday even on the noticeboard at the club-house, and certainly has never been communicated to me. Now, sir, this is an important point for members of Golf clubs, for although, no doubt, the committee of a club have a perfect right to make by-laws, yet I submit that they should not be binding on the members until they have been communicated to them. If I had not been thus disqualified, I should have won the silver medal and the first club prize, for I handed in my round duly authenticated, which showed me to be one point better than the gentleman who has been declared to be the winner. As I was informed by the powers that be that this was almost a universal rule, I am writing to ask you what are your views on the subject. I would further ask you whether half-past two is not a great deal too early for this time of year, when we are within a month of the longest day? and whether you do not consider it rather hard on business people, who can hardly ever play in the morning, to virtually exclude them from competitions by fixing the latest starting time so early in the day that there is actually time after the hour fixed, to play two whole rounds before dark. I hope I shall not be misunderstood in writing this letter, for it is not the loss of the prizes which troubles me, and if my name had been placed at the top of the list, with a note that I had been disqualified for commencing my round after half-past two, I should not have troubled you, for that would have brought the matter to the notice of the members of the club, and others interested in the welfare of golfing. The reason given me for not doing this was that as I had not begun in time, my score must be disregarded altogether. That, instead of being disregarded altogether, it was very much regarded for one particular purpose, though not for the one I wanted it to be, will appear when I say that in consequence of this very score my handicap was reduced for the purposes of the next day's com-

[We sympathise with our correspondent in the hardness of the fate which has overtaken him, but in a matter of this kind the committee is supreme; and no doubt the rule has been made only after good cause shown for its necessity in the interests of the members as a whole. Ample notice of such a law ought certainly to be given to members, and knowing something about Brancaster, we think that such a notice has been issued to members some time ago. On the general question we agree that 2.30 is too early an hour to close the competition list at

this period of the year, especially in view of the fact that some consideration is due to members who have to travel a long distance to Brancaster, which is not so accessible as the bulk of other important courses. Four o'clock would be a more suitable hour to close the list in summer, and if the hour were so extended, visitors coming from a distance would have the opportunity of competing, if they so desired. There is no universal rule on the subject; it is a question on which the committee have to average the opinion of their members, and to decide accordingly. Our correspondent ought to ventilate the question at a general meeting of the club.—Ed.]

ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

WEST DORSET.—You are quite in error in attributing the clashing of the statements to us. Please refer to the issues for April 27th and May 25th. Your contention that an intentional miss could be claimed as "no stroke," or alternatively as the playing of a partner out of his turn, cannot be upheld, in face of the rules you quote, as a tenable doctrine.

S. S. G.—We think that a player, placing the shaft of his club in the circumstances described, would lose the hole in match play, as the ball is lying in what is admitted to be a hazard. The intention is the same as if the head of the club were really grounded—namely, to test the character of the lie and the bunker.

T. W. GODDARD.—This point has often cropped up before, and has been answered several times in previous volumes of the paper. If the rule is strictly applied, the hole would be lost to the player whose caddie was struck. It is a very hard case, and it would be more equitable if a player who asked his opponent's caddie to stand at the hole, and the boy was struck by the ball, should be made to count the stroke as a rub of the green. But the law is on his side, and in order to avoid the contingency of a lost hole, or a dispute, it were better that each player should have the assistance of his own caddie only in such circumstances.

YORKSHIRE UNION OF GOLF CLUBS.

In furtherance of the scheme of forming a union of the Golf Clubs of Yorkshire, a second meeting of delegates was held at the Queen's Hotel, Leeds, on Wednesday, May 23rd, to receive the report of the sub-committee appointed to draw up the rules and regulations, and to decide on future action. Many of the clubs which sent delegates to the first meeting were unrepresented, but they had expressed approval of the scheme by letter, and their willingness to join the Union if formed on the lines suggested by the sub-committee. Dr. F. L. Mackenzie (captain of the Huddersfield Club) was elected to the chair, and Mr. A. L. Woodhead (Huddersfield) continued to act in the capacity of secretary. There were also present:—Messrs. A. D. Stuart (captain of the Headingley Club), H. Oxlev (secretary of the Headingley Club), J. G. Ronksley (secretary Sheffield Club), C. R. Hemingway (Sheffield), A. J. C. Stanfield (secretary Wakefield) Club), T. L. Chadwick (captain Dewsbury Club), Dr. J. Liddell (captain Harrogate Club), G. M. Morrell (Harrogate), and Wm. Exley Mr. Hemingway moved, and Mr. Chadwick seconded, that a Union be formed on the lines laid down in the draft scheme. This was unanimously carried, and the meeting then undertook the final alterations of the rules and regulations. These were comparatively unimportant, and the main features of the scheme as finally adopted were that the Union should be open to all recognised clubs in Yorkshire, that the representation and subscription of each club should be in accordance with the playing strength of its male membership, that a Championship meeting should be held in the spring of each year, at which there should be an amateur county championship competition, a club championship competition by teams of four, and a competition by handicap, the last to be under the entire management of the club on whose green the meeting is held. A number of regula-tions were agreed on, and after c nsiderable discussion fairly satisfactory conditions of bond fide membership were also agreed on. As the year is already far advanced it was decided to recommend the holding of a county meeting in the autumn. A meeting to consider this matter and to elect the first officers of the Union will be held early in July.
