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#### GOLF IN AMERICA.

THE AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP. - A DIAMOND MEDAL.

(From our Correspondent.)

NEW YORK, October 19th.

Mr. Archibald Rogers, of the Shinnecock Hills Club, has made a good score over the home links, doing the eighteen holes in 90. His score by holes was: -5 5 6 4 4 5 6 4 5

An important tournament has just been decided on the Shinnecock Hills links. The most interesting of the competitions was between the five leading professionals of the States. Dunn, of Shinnecock Hills, proved to be the winner, with a score of 94; Campbell, of Boston, was second with 100; Davis, of Newport, 114; Tucker, of St. Andrews, 119; and Fox, of Meadowbrook, 132. entrants from Tuxedo, St. Andrews and Newport.

The Morton cup for women, to date, stands as follows -Mrs. C. S. Brown one win; Mrs. A. B. Turnure two wins; and Miss Harrison three wins. The best attested score over the White course of twelve holes during September was by Mr. A. Rogers, 58; Mr. W. S. Rainsford came next with 61.

One open handicap tournament, under the auspices of the Essex Country club, was played at Manchester-by-the-Sea, for three cups, the first valued at 100 dols., the second at 50 dols., and the third at 25 dols. Competitors went eight times round the links with the following result-Mr. F. A. Shaw, jun, first, with a score of 434 net; Mr. John Moorhead, jun., second, with 437 net; and Mr. E. C. Hedges, third, with 487.

The monthly handicap match of the Shinnecock Hills Club, for men, resulted in a win for Mr. H. G. Trevor. His gross score was 66, less 8=58 net. His figures were :- 5 7 5 6 6 6 6 6 5 6 5 3. Mr. R. H. Robertson, made the best gross score, 65, less 5=60, and tied with Mr. J. B. Lee for second place.

The monthly handicap match for women gave Mrs. E. Bell a victory. She scored 66, less 20=46. Hers was also the best gross score. The scratch player, Mrs. C. S. Brown, scored 57.

The St. Andrews September handicap match was one of the most interesting of the series. There were nine entrants, with Mr. J. B. Upham at scratch. This player did exceedingly well, too, but found the handicapping against him too strong. His gross score, 96, was the best made, but in the handicapping he took second place to Mr. A. L. Livermore, with a gross score of 99, less 10=89 net. The full scores were:—Mr. A. L. Livermore, 99, less 10=89; Mr. J. B. Upham, scratch 96; Mr. James A. Wright, 124, less 24=100; Mr. H. O. As the score stands at present only Mr. Livermore has won more than one game, the other being a tie which went to him by default, and as the October contest decides the custody of the cup, he would appear to have an excellent chance of winning. By the time this reaches you, the St. Andrews Open Championships of the States will have closed. There appears to be every chance of the competition proving a complete success, as there are thirty-two entries for the Amateur Championship, including the winner (Mr. W. C. Lawrence), and the runner up (Mr. McDonald, of Chicago) in the Newport championship, as well as nearly every name of prominent golfers in the States.

For the Professional Championship the four best professionals are entered, Dunn, of Shinnecock; Campbell, of Boston; Davis, of Newport; and Tucker, of St. Andrews. This event will practically close the Golf season till the spring, for, although the game will be played in a desultory way throughout the winter, the game is too much confined to Society (with a big S) to last throughout the whole of the year. Society must have variety, and although the indications are good for a busy Golf season next year, it would be too much to expect them to play Golf right along at the risk

of being bored.

The last important meeting of golfers for the season concluded last week at Yonkers, New York, when the Amateur Championship of the States was decided. Unlike the Newport Championship, the St. Andrews committee decided that their championship should be decided on the regular lines in vogue in the English, Scotch, and Irish meetings, that of scoring by holes instead of aggregate scores. At Newport the method adopted had the effect of destroying much interest in the competition almost from the commencement of play, as more than one of the best players entered started off badly on the strange links, coupled with an unpleasant haze, and never regained their The wisdom of substituting the match game was abundantly proved last week, when interest was kept up in almost every match, and in the final especially such excitement in connection with Golf has never been seen in the States. There were, in all, thirty-two entries, including representatives from Boston, Newport, San Francisco, Washington, Shinnecock, and elsewhere, and the only notable absentee was Mr. H. Sargent, of the Boston Country Club. The early rounds were principally noticeable for the unexpected defeat of Mr. J. B. Upham, of St. Andrews, by a club-mate, Mr. D. Henderson, of the Anchor Shipping Line, Mr. Henderson making the best show of the day. Mr. G. Hunter, of St. Andrews, was also an unfortunate. The second day's play left Mr. L. B. Stoddart, of St. Andrews, late of Hoylake, to contest with Mr. Archibald Rogers, of Southampton, and Mr. Chas. B. McDonald, of Chicago, to compete with Mr. W. L. Lawrence, of Newport, for the semi-finals. The last-named two were the runner up and winner respectively of the Newport Championship.

A great deal of rain had fallen before these matches were played, with the result that the ground was unpleasantly soft, and, in places, under water. Notwithstanding this, however, the play was of a very high order, and fully worthy of the important occasion. In the game between Mr. Rogers and Mr. Stoddart, the latter started off by winning the first hole by 5 to 6, but Mr. Rogers equalised matters by winning the second, 3 to 4. The players were again level at the fourth hole, but from this point there was very little doubt about the result, and Mr. Stoddart eventually won by 5 up and 4 to play. The match between Messrs. McDonald and Lawrence was far more exciting, and, although, Mr. McDonald was the favourite, Mr. Lawrence looked exceedingly dangerous until towards the close, when Mr. McDonald came in a winner by 2 up and 1 to

Although a member of the home club, Mr. Stoddart had no advantage over Mr. McDonald on that account in the final. He has not previously played in more than four games on the links, and Mr. McDonald has been seen there quite as often. With conditions equal, therefore, a fine game was both expected and witnessed. The first hole was halved in 5, and the second in 4. Then Mr. McDonald won the third in 4, Mr. Stoddart taking 6, on account of his ball striking the limb of a tree at the first stroke. Mr. Stoddart drew equal at the fourth, taking it in 4, the Chicago captain not playing out; and he increased his lead by winning the fifth by 4 to 5. He also won the sixth by 5 to 6, Mr. McDonald having bad luck at the outset. The seventh was a repetition of the sixth, Mr. Stoddart winning by 5 to 7, and the score being 3 up in favour of the St. Andrews Mr. McDonald then captured the eighth by 5 to 7, and the last hole of the first round was halved in 5. The tenth and eleventh holes were halved in 5 and 3, but Mr. McDonald won the twelfth by 5 to 6. Mr. Stoddart regained his lead at the next by 4 to 5, but Mr. McDonald missed the hole by two inches only at the fourth stroke. Mr. McDonald won the fourteenth in 4 to 5, Mr. Stoddart the fifteenth, Mr. McDonald the sixteenth by 5 to 6, and the seventeenth by 5 to 7. This made the players all square, with one hole to play; but the first stroke for the last hole gave Mr. Stoddart the Championship, as Mr. McDonald had the bad luck to drive into a cornfield, and lost the hole, Mr. Stoddart holing out in 4. The result was popular, but Mr. McDonald deserves the warmest congratulations for

his close fight, both at Newport and Yonkers. At Newport he

lost by 1 stroke, and at Yonkers by 1 hole.

The trophy which accompanied the Championship was a diamond medal, which was presented by the president of the club, Mr. Reid, at the close of the day's play. A series of foursome matches was also played, but, as it was late when the semi-finals were finished, it was decided to play these off at a future date, especially as the two pairs left in for the finals were St. Andrews players, Mr. Stoddart and Mr. Upham, and Mr. Hodgman and Mr. Ten Eyck. A professional match, between Davis, of Newport, and Tucker, of St. Andrews, was also on the programme, and resulted in a win for Davis by 3 strokes, the scores being 92 and 95.

The Tuxedo Club tournament was a very interesting affair, and brought out some good entries. The principal event was a match for teams, Boston Country, St. Andrews (2), and Tuxedo entering, and the first-named winning the final by 6 holes from the St. Andrews first team. The medal play, for eighteen holes, was won by Mr. L. B. Stoddart, with a score of 101. Mr. Archibald Rogers, Shinnecock, was second, with 104. The driving competition was won by Dr. E. C. Rushmore, Tuxedo, with a drive of 514 feet, Mr. Rogers being second, with 510 feet, and Mr. R. Bacon third, with 480 feet. The September monthly cup was won by Mr. L. B. Preston.

At the Morristown meeting Miss A. Howland Ford easily

won the ladies' match.

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#### THE SCOTTISH GOLF CLUB MANUFACTURING COMPANY, LIMITED.

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The work of this company, whose formation we announced some time ago, is now in full swing, and an opportunity was given to the Press on Friday last of inspecting the various appliances used in the new style of club-making. The business is no longer to depend on hand-work, but on machinery, and the company claim that they can provide the goifer with an exact reproduction of any favourite club. The machinery now erected is capable of turning out five hundred clubs per week. Very shortly the company expect to turn out double that quantity. Machinery is also being laid down for turning out all kinds of iron clubs on a large scale. In the various operations little skilled labour is required, the only part where it comes in being the tapering of the shaft of the club so as to bring out the correct balance and spring. Club-makers may, therefore, comfort themselves that in future they will not be at the mercy of strikers, and golfers may surely hope that, when clubs can be turned out at such a rate, they will be considerably cheapened. Though scarcely needed, there must also follow a considerable increase in the present number of players. As a brief description of the operations of the company, we may say that they start with 20,000 blocks of wood, seasoned for their purpose without artificial heat. The wood is brought into the yard in planks of about 11 inches. These again are marked out from a pattern and cut into blocks with a handsaw. The blocks are placed for a time in drying-sheds. When thoroughly seasoned, they are brought back into the works. Then they are placed in the machine patented by Mr. Fraser of Edinburgh (the rights of which the company have acquired). In this there is a model head-mould, and the machinery is so arranged that it turns out an exact fac-simile of said model. By another machine a place is now cut out for the lead, another for the horn, and the "skair" cut to a certain angle: the holes are then bored through the horn and heads, and even the pins which assist in binding the horn to the head are made by machinery-all being of the same shape and size.

The head is now ready for the lead, which is quickly poured in through a mould. After this the lead is trimmed off and the head sent to the buffing machine. On leaving this it is now ready to be attached to the shaft, which has, from the square as it comes into the works, been put through a machine which is self-acting, and in one operation turns and tapers it. Instead of the head and shaft being tied with a piece of twine when the glue is applied, they are securely held together by powerful clamps. Even the holes for the screws in the brassies are bored by machinery, and it is intended to apply machinery for putting on the warping and the leather handles. The company, whose future will be regarded with interest by all golfers, have acquired extensive premises for storing and seasoning the wood they require. Their offices is at 19, Albert Street, Edinburgh, where Mr. Cochrane, the manager, in the most courteous manner welcomes golfers and others who wish to see this era-making machinery-destined, no doubt, to rival the introduction of gutta-percha in its influence on the progress

of Golf.

#### NEW AYRSHIRE GOLF COURSE.

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The Kilmarnock Golf Club, who have for some time been prospecting for a new course, the ground they have hitherto been playing over in the neighbourhood of the town being too limited, and otherwise not suitable for playing Golf, have fixed upon a course which is likely to suit their purpose in every respect. Situated on the Ayrshire coast within seven miles of Kilmarnock, and as close to a railway station as it could well be, the new links is in respect of convenience of locality as favourably placed as could be desired. The ground taken up by the club extends to ninety acres, forms part of the lands of Hillhouse, and occupies the angle formed by the Glasgow and Ayr, and Ayr and Kilmarnock railways, where they join at Barassie Station. The complexion of the ground is of the character usual to seaside surfaces, and in the nature of its covering, it is eminently adapted for the making of a good Golf course. It is somewhat like its near neighbour, the Gailes course, over which the Glasgow Club play, and while there is a fair show of natural sand hazards, the ground has but to be scratched to get at more of them at any point. In addition to this, however, there are hazards in the shape of rushes, whins, and ditches, so that there is in the meantime no need of making the course artificially more difficult than it is naturally. The length of the course is about three miles, slightly shorter than the average, but it is quite long enough in its present slightly crude state, and there is room for expansion. The putting-greens are all natural, and careful nursing for a season will improve them. The long spell of dry weather and the prevalence of east winds, with frost at nights, has been very much against them; but more suitable weather conditions will have the

effect of bringing them into first-rate playing condition. The course was formally opened on Saturday, October 20th, when, favoured with dry weather, there was a large turn-out of the members and others to take part in the inauguration. The club were assisted in the opening ceremony by Willie Fernie, the Troon professional, and by Willie Auchterlonie, professional, St. Andrews. In the forenoon a foursome was played, two members of the club, Dr. Lawrie and Mr. A. Yates having for their partners Willie Fernie and Willie Auchterlonie respectively; and in the afternoon the two ex-Champions played an exhibition single. In the forenoon match, Dr. Lawrie drove the first ball, and in doing so, declared the course formally opened. The match that ensued was characterised by very good Golf, both amateurs and professionals showing to good advantage. The game was very close all round, and, each partnership going round in 81, the match was halved. The wind, which had been blowing half a gale, did not abate when, after lunch, the second stage of the day's proceedings were entered upon; indeed, if anything, the force of the wind had increased, and at those holes where the wind was against them, the professionals found two long shots necessary to get over the distance that a drive and a short approach would have accomplished under ordinary circumstances. Going out, Fernie had the best of the play, his driving from the tee being exceptionally long and accurate. At the sixth hole he laid himself a stimie which cost him the hole, and by laying his opponent a stimie at the seventh he secured a half where he would otherwise have lost the hole. At the tenth hole, which he reached in an average of 4's, he was leading by five holes, but when it is noted that by the time they played off to the seventeenth hole the match was all square again it may be judged that, while Fernie's form was not noticeably weak, Auchterlonie played a very strong game. He indeed played a game that could not be beaten, as is indicated by the fact, that including the tenth hole, he played the seven holes on an average of 2 under 4's. He also won the seven-teenth hole, and thus stood dormy I. Fernie, however, secured the last hole in 4 to Auchterlonie's 5, and the match thus finished all square. The feature of Auchterlonie's game on the inward half was his deadly approaching, and it was in this respect that Fernie came so near losing the match. The most recent addition to the club's attractions is that of a substantial club-house, which was thrown open to the members on Saturday afternoon, October 20th. The opening was made the occasion of a pleasant little ceremony, when Mrs. Alfred Darbyshire, wife of the late treasurer, was presented with a silver key by Captain Haig, with which she opened the door of the club-house and admitted the members. To the gift made by Captain Haig the club added a charming bouquet. Mrs. Darbyshire afterwards entertained a numerous company to afternoon tea in the club-house, and during the day the ladies and gentlemen present were photographed.

The first monthly handicap for the thirty-ninth season of the Pau Golf Club will be played on the first Monday in November, by which time the links will be in good playing order, as some heavy rain has softened the ground, which was very hard from the prolonged drought. The club has rented the ground along the railway, by which much crossing will be avoided, and the eighteen-hole course be made most perfect. Already some thirty members have arrived, and the prospects for the season are most encouraging. Information as to rules, matches, &c., can be obtained from the assistant secretary, Mr. T. Ketcher, 2, Boulevard du Midi.

On Saturday, October 20th, a match of thirty-six holes was played over the Staines Golf course, between the professional of the Staines Golf Club, Alex. Thomson, late of North Berwick, and Killick, the professional of the Aldeburgh Golf Club. Thomson had the advantage of knowing the course, but he played a very fine game, and beat his opponent by 13 up and 11 to play. Thomson's first round of nine holes was played in the record score of 37.

The annual meeting of the Harlech Golf Club will take place on the St. David's Links, Harlech, Merionethshire, on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, November 1st, 2nd, and 3rd. On the opening day there is a silver bowl to be competed for which has been presented by members of the Harlech Club, for best score, open to amateur members of all recognised Golf Clubs. On Friday there is a competition under handicap, open to amateur members of all recognised clubs, for cup, value £55s., presented by the Hon. Harold Finch-Hatton, president of the club, and on Saturday a competition under handicap, open to amateur members of all recognised clubs, for gold medal, presented by the Harlech Club. Mr. John Ball, jun., Mr. C. Hutchings, Mr. Mure Fergusson, the Hon. Harold Finch-Hatton, the Hon. Stormont Finch-Hatton, and other leading golfers will attend this meeting. This coast course is one of eighteen holes, well varied, and of a thoroughly sporting character.

The first annual general meeting of the Wanstead Park Golf Club was held in the club-house on Saturday, October 27th, the captain, Mr. Gurney Fowler, presiding. After the business of the meeting the chairman announced that there were still vacancies for new members, which he hoped to see filled during the ensuing year. Mr. Fowler was re-elected captain, and the hard-working hon. secretary and hon. treasurer, Messrs. R. B. Johnson and R. A. Ellis, were also unanimously re-elected. The assistant hon. secretary is Mr. Harold Smith.

St. Andrews is to have a Girton college of its own, to the west of the town, outside the burgh boundaries, Mr. Gillespie, architect, having prepared plans for a residence for lady students attending the University. £5,000 has been raised for the cost of the buildings, but a good deal more will be spent. "Sweet girl graduates" will in future be able to add to their accomplishments the beautiful effects of Golf playing at this "academic city by the sea."

Mr. R. B. Finlay, Q.C., has made a distinct score by a speech he delivered to the Forres Golf Club, as their President, on the occasion of its annual meeting. With such a "spate" of political oratory, as we are having during the recess, it is quite refreshing to find one of our most promising politicians following in the footsteps of Mr. Balfour, and giving such an exposition of the faith that is in him as a Golf enthusiast, for Mr. Finlay knows what he talks about when Golf is his subject. Mr. Hutchinson should not only go to the North of Scotland in summer, but even in winter, according to Mr. Finlay; when "in search of a climate" he ought to sojourn there, and especially at Forres.

Glasgow has lost one of its best citizens by the sudden death of Mr. John Guthrie Smith, late Dean of Guild, which took place last week at his residence, Mugdock Castle. Mr. Smith was at once a successful business man, a cultured author, and one of the most social and kindly souls one could meet. In the parish of Strathblane, whose "History" he wrote, he was the leading spirit in everything that was for the good of the community. As president of the Golf Club and the Curling Club, he was highly esteemed by the members of both, who will long miss his genial presence.

In view of the general meeting of the Edinburgh Burgess Golfing Society, which has to settle regarding the proposed Barnton Course, the members of the club were afforded an opportunity on Thursday last, of inspecting the course. On all hands it seems to be agreed that the club will be exceedingly fortunate in getting such excellent ground within easy reach of Edinburgh, and that the fine old traditions of the Burgess will have justice done to them by having the beautiful grounds of Barnton for their future keeping. The members of the council deserve much credit for the careful and business-like manner in which they have carried out the negotiations.

It is satisfactory to note that among Edinburgh maidens there is growing a love for the royal game of Golf. The sisterhood who are members of a club have just erected a club-house at the base of Blackford Hill, on the south side of the city, where James IV.'s army encamped prior to marching to dire disaster at Flodden, and close to the house tenanted by the famous surgeon, James Syme. It was intended, when the club was started this year, that the membership should be limited to 300, but it is now agreed to extend the number in the face of the numerous applications from golfing ladies to be allowed to join. The club-house was opened by the Lord Provost of the city. The cost was about £350, and for that sum the building is very handsome and convenient.

Mr. Macpherson, the proprietor of Balavie (in the Badenoch district of Scotland), has a private Golf ground laid out in his

policies, consisting of eighteen holes. Recently he invited the members of the Newtonmore, Alvie, and Kingussie Clubs, to have a game over the course, offering three handsome prizes for the best scores. Refreshments on a liberal scale were provided for all the players. The day was a delightful one. Owners of private courses might do well to follow Mr. Macpherson if they wish the benediction of their fellowgolfers.

The Dumfries Club has resolved to remove to Summerhill, and to meet expenses in connection with the new green, the subscription is raised to £1 11s. 6d. Mr. James Smith, Commercial Bank, is secretary.

Litigation has been going on in the Scottish Courts over the estate of the late Sir Hugh Hume Campbell of Marchmont, who settled a considerable amount on his grandchildren, binding the heirs of entail who succeeded him to pay the sum of £15,000. It was held that he was entitled so to bind his heirs, on condition that such provision for his grandchildren, with that for his daughter, did not together exceed three years' rental of the estate. Some interesting Marchmont family papers have recently been published.

A new edition of Lord Trayner's celebrated work on "Latin Maxims and Phrases" (the fourth) has just been issued. The book is quite a classic in its department, and interesting to the general reader as well as to the lawyer. His Lordship is one of the most devoted admirers of Golf, and his recreation-time he devotes almost entirely to the game. Such a "Maxim gun" ought to make some fine "shots."

At the last meeting of the Forfar Golf Club sixteen new members were admitted. It was agreed that if thirty ladies were anxious to join, the club would admit the "fair persuasion" to its membership. It is not supposed that the sufficient number will be found.

A nice little half-course has been laid out at Cumnock, in Ayrshire, and it was opened on Saturday by Mrs. Galbraith, of Holmside, wife of the president. Over fifty gentlemen and a good number of ladies have already enrolled as members of the club. Mr. D. A. Adamson is secretary and treasurer to the club.

The keen tussle which has been going on between Mr. J. E. Laidlay and the Right Hon. A. J. Balfour against Mr. W. M. De Zoete and Mr. John Penn, M.P., was renewed at North Berwick on Tuesday of last week. In this case the last-named couple had rather the best of it, being 5 holes up on the three rounds played. In the first round their score was 72.

The "Golfers' Rest," at the Braids, has been enlarged for the proprietress, Mrs. Brown, by Messrs. Dunn and Findlay, architects. The Civil Service, Teachers', and Blackford Clubs have each rooms provided in the "Rest," which is a delightfully snug resort.

The Hawick Club prospers—fifty members having been added during the year, and out of nine matches played the club were eight times victorious, winning 296 holes against 101

The Langholm Golf Club, to encourage the game among working men, have instituted a special subscription of 5s. a year for artisans.

The Peebles Club, out of seven matches of the year, won four and lost three. The membership is 193, slightly less than last year.

The Darwen Golf caddies, who struck for a rise of 2d. on the present 4d. per round, have, like the Scottish miners, been beaten. The pickets were not strong enough to stop the free workers who sought the vacant badges, and so the strikers are back to work on the old terms.

A proposal to admit "gentlemen-Associates" is favourably entertained by the Burntisland Ladies' Golf Club.

The November number of the English Illustrated Magazine is chiefly noteworthy for a handsomely illustrated, and appreciatively written article on Lord Russell of Killowen, better known at the Bar and in Parliament as Sir Charles Russell. "Caged in China," by Stanley Lane Poole, comes seasonably to show us how the Chinese treat their prisoners; and another instalment from "The Memoirs of a Minister of France," entitled "The Tennis Balls," by Mr. Stanley J. Weyman, is an artistic crayon sketch, in the best style of that master of archaic fiction.

While playing on the Warwickshire Golf Links, on Thursday, October 25th, with Mr. A. C. Lyon, of the Albrighton club, S. J. Cooper, professional, made the record of the course —4 5 4 5 5 5 4 4 4=40; 4 4 3 6 5 5 4 5 4=40, total 80. There was a very heavy gale of wind, and it was raining most of the time.

Messrs. W. & G. Ashford, Golf club makers, Birmingham, are sending out a new illustrated catalogue of their goods, which is very interesting and well done. Players should note their improved method of forming the leather grip, much in the same way as the handle of a whip; so that there is no danger of untidy or loose leathers. The firm also makes a speciality of left-hand clubs, and of ladies' clubs both in wood and iron. The "Skibbie" is a new club of their invention with which we make acquaintance for the first time. It is an ordinary bulger or driver head, but the fastening to the shaft is by means of an iron socket like an iron, and there is a sole plate. It is useful not only off the tee, but through the green where lies are bad or heavy, and as the inventors say, "it combines the durability of an iron with the driving power of a wooden club." Another advantage is that when once a player is suited both as to lie and balance, the club remains the same indefinitely, for, with the exception of the face, the club is practically indestructible. There is also a choice selection of caddie bags, a Golf ball cleaner, a leather case containing good ball paint, brushes and soap, leather strap racks for hanging clubs on the wall of a room, hole-cutters and flags, Ashford's paint, and paint remover of old balls, and tins of Ashford's "Pearlac," an admirably clean and quick method of whitening balls. The prices of all these articles in the golfer's equipment are withal reasonable and moderate.

At the Kirriemuir Ladies' Golf Club, one of the prizes offered by a generous friend is a diamond ring, which is to become the property of the lady golfer who gets married whilst holding it. The first winner of the ring was the club secretary Miss Cowpar, of Migvie, but as she failed to fulfil the conditions of retaining it the trophy has just passed into the hands of Miss L. Gillespie, who has a year to make up her mind whether single blessedness, without a diamond ring, is to be preferred to matrimony with a diamond ring.

This is quite a new distinction for "Thrums," which Mr. Barrie has done so much to make famous. The *Woman*, from which we get the interesting bit of news, must inform us from time to time as to the diamond ring. We should suppose it will rather hinder than help matrimony to have a bribe of this kind offered. Perhaps this is the "generous friend's" object.

Bridge will be played for on the first Tuesday of every month, commencing on November 6th. Lady Louise Loder's challenge prize will be played for twice yearly, in the spring and autumn. First competition, November 15th. There are already more than forty ladies in the section, while several others await election.

#### ANSWERS TO CORRESPONDENTS.

W. C. Thomson (Port Elizabeth).—When a ball lies on patches of grass in the circumstances you describe, it is permissible to lift "break clubs," within a club-length of the ball, in the same way as if lying on the course itself.

IGNORAMUS.—If you are playing by the St. Andrews Rules, every ball, with the exceptions you mention, must be played wherever it lies, or the hole given up, in match play.

W. B.—The point you mention has been discussed over and over again, in early volumes of the paper. See Vols. I., II., and V., for analogous instances of worse than downright hardship. With your view we entirely agree that qui facit per alium facit per se; but if a player is so unsportsmanlike and so ungrateful as to claim the penalty, the law is on his side. The moral with such a player is—refuse to help, and claim the hole at the end of five minutes' search,

TOPPER.—You will find it exceedingly difficult to obtain what you want near London now. There is a club at Norbury, a morning club at Clapham Common, and another on Tooting Common. You might try Bromley and Bickley, or Sidcup. Please write again.

SOUTHSEA.—Presumably B based his objection on the construction of Rule 37; but we think that the rule can hardly be stretched to apply to the search for a lost ball. It would have been more sportsmanlike, as well as more courteous to his opponent, if B had allowed the ball to be found.

MR. FINLAY, Q.C., ON THE GAME.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,-Many of your Northern readers will, no doubt, have by this time read with intense interest and pleasure Mr. Finlay's recent speech at the annual dinner of the Forres Golf Club. It goes without saying that it was brimful of genial humour and kindly fun. But in one connection it seems questionable if he were speaking entirely by the book; and this is doubly strange, as not only is he himself a player, but has long associated himself with North Country greens. He may or may not be correct in his supposition that the original home of the game was Fife, but when he goes on to say that in the North of Scotland it was almost entirely unknown it is putting it far too strongly. Thus, in venerable Aberdeen, in 1642, we find it enacted that one John Dickson should be permitted to exercise the trade of making Golf-balls. Of Dornoch, 1630, Sir Robert Gordon writes:—"About this town, along the seacoast, are the fairest and largest linkes, or green fieldes of any pairt of Scotland. Fitt for archery, golfing, ryding, and all other exercises, they doe surpasse the fieldes of Montrose or St. With the truth of the latter assertion we have nothing to do here; but Mrs. Tweedie claims that it is authenticated that Lord Strathnaver golfed there three centuries ago. And of Montrose itself we have interesting golfing notes connecting the green with the famous Marquis of that ilk, say some fifty years later. In Perth, 1604, we read that some graceless urchins were punished, and made repentance in church, for golfing on Sunday. It would, therefore, seem that in old times the folk of the North Countree were no whit less keen than their brethren in the South. And it may be added that according to Mr. Fleming the earliest document relating to the Golf on the "Linkis of Sanctandrois" is of date 1552-say somewhat similar to Dornoch in antiquity.

It will please many golfers to find that Mr. Finlay gives the weight of his authority in favour of the hole game, as opposed to the stroke; and that he is opposed to the abolition of the stymie. And surely everyone will admit the touch of human nature in the words:—"I do not disparage an approach shot or a long putt, but the long drive gives the choicest satisfaction." It was a Fife man who carried this still further:—"Man, if I get a guid drive I dinna gie a hang for the hole!"

#### HEADINGLEY GOLF CLUB.

Thanks largely to his tuition, the club can now turn out a team of really first-class golfers, seven of whom administered a very severe defeat to the Sheffield team on Saturday, October 13th.
The match with Sheffield was made the occasion of the formal open-

ing the new club-house, a ceremony in which Mr. Gerald Balfour, M.P., took the principal part prior to the comencement of the contest. Mr. Balfour made the acquaintance of the links in the forenoon, and played a round with Mr. H. J. Palmer. Luncheon was served shortly after one o'clock, and a large company, including the members of the Sheffield team, captained by Mr. H. W. Leader, sat down. Mr. F. H. Mr. Beckett, M.P., proposing the health of the principal guest, gave Mr. Balfour a cordial welcome to the club. He said the name of Balfour was almost as well-known in connection with Golf as it was in relation to politics—(cheers)—and that it was therefore peculiarly fitting that the Member for Central Leeds should be invited to identify himself with a function which marked the growing popularity of the

game in Yorkshire.

Mr. G. W. Balfour, M.P., began a humorous speech with the confession that he had that morning enjoyed a good beating at the hands of Mr. Palmer, but maintained that Golf was especially a game for persistency in the face of discouragement. Mr. Beckett had referred to his connection with Leeds. If, when he first came to Leeds, he had been told that in the year 1894 he would be asked to inaugurate a Golf club-house here he would have been very much astonished. In truth there was really nothing more surprising than the history of Golf during the last decade. Ten years ago the name of the game was almost unknown in this country, and even among the better-informed Golf was looked upon as a sort of "Scotch croquet," as he once heard it described. (Laughter.) Happily that state of things had changed. There was now a Yorkshire Championship; there were clubs in Leeds, Sheffield, Huddersfield, and elsewhere, and, in fact, the game had spread not only over Yorkshire but over the whole of England. Having caught the infection of the "divine madness' (laughter)—England had certainly caught it to the full. (Hear, hear.)
He did not know if it had ever fallen to the lot of any of those
present to have to induce a friend, not a golfer, to take an interest in
the game by a description of it. He had tried once or twice, and he could not say his efforts had met with success. (Laughter.) endeavoured to describe what Golf was-that you hit the ball with a club from one hole to another hole about a quarter of a mile off, and tried to get it into the hole in as few strokes as possible. "I don't see much in that," their friend was apt to say, and perhaps he humoured them so far as to try. How that demon Golf played upon their inmost feelings and emotions, and even upon their passions! Just think of the hopes it raised, only to dash them down. (Laughter.) Think, too, how occasionally it roused the angry passions. Even the cloth was not always safe. (Laughter.) He once heard of a minister of religion who aways sate. (Batgliet.) The once heard of a minister of religion who took to Golf. He was a man who was easily exasperated, and Golf was not altogether a soothing game. Though he was a very moral man, the minister's language was such that at last his friends were obliged to tell him that he must choose between Golf and his orders. (Laughter.) I am given to understand, on the best authority, that his name is no longer to be found in the Clergy List. (Renewed laughter.) If he was not mistaken he had heard of a club in which one of the laws of etiquette to be observed was to this effect:—"In your behaviour to your adversary you should endeavour to comport yourself as much like a gentleman as is consistent with the trying character of the game." (Loud laughter.) At the same time it must be admitted that some of the Christian virtues—though perhaps not charity—(laughter)—were promoted by the game. Faith that they would play better was a virtue that was absolutely necessary in Golf. Hope, too, sprang eternal in some breasts. These virtues of faith and hope they might at least attain to, even if they could not aspire to charity. (Laughter.) While Golf did not come to all of them as a blessing—sometimes it came in another guise—(laughter)—it always came as a boon, especially to those who lived sedentary lives. The mania was spreading immensely in the House of Commons: there seemed to be something in the air (Loud laughter.) 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
