GOLF IN AMERICA.

THE FIRST AMATEUR CHAMPION OF AMERICA.

(From our Correspondent.)

NEW YORK, September 11th.

Let me begin my notes with a word of advice to professional golfers, In a previous letter I remarked that American Golf was opening up a great field for English and Scotch professionals, but the opportunities thus offered can very easily be abused. For instance, the St. Andrews Club has been without a professional this season, simply because the man they were after was, as they considered, exorbitant in his demands. American golfers, to my certain knowledge, are liberality itself to their professional players, as they should properly be, considering that it is to them they owe their knowledge of the game, but they are not willing to be bled.

A very good performance is credited to a Hoylake player, settled in this country, Mr. L. B. Stoddart, who lowered the St. Andrews record from 96, held by Mr. J. B. Upham, to ninety. This was the more remarkable as Mr. Stoddart had only once before been over the links. He is a good deal fancied for the championship, which will be decided at Newport this month. The August monthly handicap of the St. Andrews Club ended in a tie between Mr. Livermore and Mr. Harper, the former being adjudged winner as Mr. Harper did not

The season challenge cup of the Shinnecock Hills Golf Club, at Southampton, Long Island, has been won by Mr. J. F. Gray, who has already won seven times, leaving only six more contests to complete the series. The match for the women's challenge cup of the same club, was won on Saturday last, by Mrs. Arthur Turnure, with a score of 55. Miss M. L. Harrison has now won twice; Mrs. S. C. Brown and Mrs. Turnure, once each. At the Meadow Club-house, the house of the other Southampton Club, a bal poudre was held last week, and was much enjoyed. A minuet, in which the dresses were of gay figured stuff with large paniers, as in Dresden China figures, was the distinguishing feature of the dance. By the bye, the Shinnecock Hills record came down to 90 for the eighteen holes this week.

Golf is quite the ladies' game at Bar Harbour, N.Y., among the best women players being Miss Hall, sister of the wellknown American tennis player, Mr. Valentine Hall, Miss Tolfree, Miss Stokes, Miss Louise Garland, and Miss Sturgiss, the beauty of the season, as she is described, from Phila-

delphia.

Many American daily papers display an amount of ignorance about Golf which is simply alarming. Of course they cannot be expected to really understand a game which is quite new to the country, but they make their want of knowledge worse by making a show of knowledge, and giving a lot of misleading information in so doing. One of the most glaring mistakes they have made is to describe the game as an imitation of Shinney, otherwise known as Hockey. This applies to New York papers, but Boston and Chicago papers, on the contrary, have quite gone out of their way to become informed and impart their knowledge to their readers.

William Campbell, the Essex County (Boston) professional, will play a match with William F. Davis, professional of the Newport Club, on the Newport Links this week. They played earlier in the season, when Campbell won a hard fight by 4

holes up. This time Davis is the favourite.

Newport has been the all-important spot for American golfers this week, the first Open Championship of the States being in progress there. The tournament was brought about by Mr. Theodore Havemeyer, a very wealthy patron of the game, who has given several cups for competition this season, including a silver loving-cup in the present instance. The entries were as follows: -Messrs. W. W. Webster and F. Towncliffe, Royal Montreal Club; Messrs. Charles Douglas Hilkes, F. J. Henny, and G. McC. Sargent, Essex County Club; Messrs. Foxhall Keene, Victor Sorchan, William Lawrence, and Winthrop Rutherford, of the Newport Club; Messrs. Herbert C. Leeds and Collins Curtis, Boston County Club; Mr. R. C. Trevor, Shinnecock Hills; Messrs. John Reed,

L. P. Stoddart, J. B. Upham, W. E. Hodgman, and F. L. Hoppin, St. Andrews Club; Mr. James Dwight, Woods Holl Club; Mr. A. G. Richardson, Warren Park Club; and Mr. Charles B. McDonald, Chicago Club. The method adopted was that all competitors played off together, instead of in heats, doing the double journey of eighteen holes once on Monday, and again on the following day. On the first day, the Chicago captain, Mr. McDonald, played a very superior game, and fully credited the name which he has obtained in the East as the best golfer out West. He did the eighteen holes in 89; Mr. Lawrence, of the Newport Club, followed him with 93. highest score was 136, hardly championship form, but it must be said that the weather was not of the best, a haze interfering a lot with the players. On Tuesday, conditions were much more favourable, and the contest between Messrs. McDonald and Lawrence was continued in all its interesting severity. Mr. Lawrence, however, played a remarkably steady game, and eventually won by I stroke only, with a total score of 188 for the thirty-six holes. KIRKALDY v. SAYERS FOR £100.

PLAY AT NORTH BERWICK.

The opening rounds of the important home and home Golf match between Andrew Kirkaldy, St. Andrews, and Ben Savers, North Berwick, upon the challenge of the former, were played over the North Berwick Links, on Wednesday the 19th inst. The stakes amount to £,50 aside, and the conditions are two rounds over both North Berwick and St. Andrews. The second half of the match was played vesterday (Thursday) at St. Andrews. The match was favoured with capital golfing weather. There was little wind to trouble the players, and there was no sunshine to make the exercise of the game fatiguing. One can always reckon on a "gallery" at North Berwick on such an occasion as this. Visitors and townspeople turned out in large numbers to witness the play, and the crowd on the whole conducted itself with due regard to the comfort of the players. At the very outset of the match Sayers had reason to be on the very best terms with himself. Kirkaidy appeared to be guilty of an error of judgment in taking the brassey to reach "Point Garry"; at all events, he sliced the ball somewhat, and was so much too strong that he had a wretched lie underneath a seat on the far edge of the green. Sayers, on the other hand, took a far safer line with his second, and, laying a long downhill putt almost dead in fine style, he won the hole in 4, and went on his way rejoicing. Through the green to the "Sea Hole" the advantage was Kirkaldy's, but in his long putt he gave the first sign of weakness in the short game, and Sayers, who had a very pretty approach, was able to get a half in 5. There was no change in the position of matters at the "Dyke," which was halved, although Kirkaldy played the hole rather better than his opponent. The "Trap" was as good as it name. Both men fell foul of the hazard. Neither, however, gained any advantage in getting clear of the sand, and it was left to the St. Andrews representative to throw away a half by foozling an easy putt. Loose in a wrist approach to the "Angle," Kirkaldy was obliged to play 2 more on that green; and practically dead in 2, the local man pocketed the hole without playing it out, and was now 3 up. Both men gave the plantation a wide berth going to the "Low Bents," where Sayers did the first really good thing of the round. After a second, which was not all it might have been, he holed a putt half the length of the green, and added the hole to his lead. This aggressive action on the part of his opponent seemed for the moment to do Kirkaldy good, for immediately following it he fairly excelled himself. From the tee he was unfortunate enough to be bunkered just short of the seventh green, and his ball lay badly. He made a most wonderful recovery. He reached the green, and lying within holing distance got down in 3, and had the satisfaction of seeing 1 knocked off the lead. But a hole later the St. Andrews man was again altogether outplayed on the green. The chance of a half was given him, and he threw it away. Sayers, how-ever, did exactly the same thing at the "Quarry," and the players proceeded to the end hole with the local man 3 up. There Kirkaldy was beaten completely in approaching; and, down in a perfect 4, his opponent turned four holes to the good. Loose as had been the visitor's play up to this point, it was slacker still at the first of the ingoing holes. He approached the "Quarry" green in wild style, and followed this by a run up lamentably weak. In these circumstances, Sayers' pretty 4 easily secured for him the hole, and the "Pit" also went to him, although Kirkaldy, after foozling his second, had an exceptionally fine recovery crossing the dyke from a lie which appeared to render it impossible to reach the green in 3. With Sayers now dormy 6 on the round, the "High Bents, "Perfection," the "Redan," and the third last hole, were halved. To "Point Garry" the local man had a picture of an approach, while Kirkaldy duffed his badly, and made matters worse by putting so much into his next that he overran the green into sand. The hole, of course, went to Sayers, who, however, lost the last, very much owing to a pulled drive. Consequently, the round ended with Sayers 6 up. The scores (approximating where the holes were not played out) were:—



The hope must have been general among the onlookers, who were golfers at least, that the afternoon would witness an improvement in Kirkaldy's "form," so entirely one-sided had been the forenoon game. Though later on some improvement did take place, there was no indication of it at the opening of the second round. No doubt Kirkaldy was unlucky in getting a lie from the tee in sand, but even then the ball was not a bad one to play, and he did not make half so much of it as he might have. Sayers again played "Point Garry" perfectly in 4; and, when Kirkaldy was guilty of the weakest of long putts at the "Sea," the North Berwick player was no fewer than 8 up on the twenty holes played. From this point Kirkaldy played in a style much more like his own. Running up in the prettiest fashion with his cleek to the "Dyke," he won the hole in 3; and the game stood where it was when the round began after the "Trap" had been negotiated, for there Sayers fell foul of the hazard, and lying, as it seemed, too well in sand, did not make much of a recovery. During the remainder of the round the play was of a give-and-take character. Sayers approached the "Angle" better than Kirkaldy, and secured the hole in 3. Kirkaldy, in turn, regained part of the lost ground. He drove a magnificent ball to the "Low Bents," and was down there in 3, against Sayers' 4. At the "Far Bents" Kirkaldy experienced the same ill-luck that he had in the forenoon—his drive was trapped. Again he made a splendid recovery, which was instrumental in saving a half. At the "Hole Across," Sayers played badly, having a miserable ball from the tee, and an indifferent second. This opened up the way for Kirkaldy. who, profiting by the mistake, won the hole in 3, and reduced his opponent's lead on the day's play to 5 up. On the ninth green the St. Andrews man offered Savers a fine chance by giving his long putt far too much. The chance Sayers gave away and the hole was halved. Sayers, not now playing quite his strongest game, miscalculated line in approaching the end green. Kirkaldy, on the other hand, played the hole faultlessly, and he was down in 4, the match accordingly turning with Sayers 4 up. A nice half in 4 saw the players under weigh for home, and Sayers, after a sliced drive, secured a hard half of the "Pit" in 4 very cleverly. The "High Bents" ought also to have been halved. Kirkaldy had an easy chance of a 3, which he missed, and the hole went to Sayers in that figure. The local man was now in the comfortable position of dormy 5 on the day's play, and when at "Perfection" his opponent again missed his chance of a half, he was sure, come what might, of leaving his own green with something in hand. A topped ball from the tee on the St. Andrews man's part at the "Redan" carried with it its own penalty. Sayers was on the green with his drive, and the hole went to him in 3. Pulling himself together, Kirkaldy played the "Gate" perfectly in 4, and won it, for Sayers was trapped with his second, and did not make the best of recoveries. Still, the St. Andrews man had succeeded in doing no more than hold his own on the round, and when "Point Garry" was halved in 6-one too many-and the home hole in 4, the day's play was at an end, and Sayers was left with a lead of six holes to fall back upon at St. Andrews if need be. ROYAL WEST NORFOLK GOLF CLUB.

Mr. S. Mure Fergusson has been paying a visit to the Brancaster links, and on Tuesday, September 18th, a match was arranged between him and Tingey, the club professional, much to the enjoyment of a comparatively large number of spectators. A good fight was anticipated, local knowledge counting in the scales against superior power on the amateur's side, and the anticipations were realised. Mr. Fergusson started badly, topping his drive at the first hole, and taking 2 to get out of the bunker, while at the third he foozled his approach, and Tingey, taking this in a perfectly played 4, stood 2 up. Mr. Fergusson, with a fine second, cleared the bunker at the fourth hole, which Tingey essaying came to grief. Both players were on the green at the fifth with their first shots, but Mr. Fergusson here began a series of magnificent putts, and was down in 2 to Tingey's 3 -all square. The next two holes were give and take, but Mr. Fergusson, aided by fine driving and putting, placed the eighth and ninth to his credit, and was 2 up at the turn-Mr. Fergusson 41, Tingey 44. At the tenth hole Mr. Fergusson increased his lead with a perfectly played 3-3 up. The eleventh was holed in 5, but Mr. Fergusson over-drove the strath at the twelfth, and took 2 more to get on the green, while Tingey, playing correctly, was down in 4. The thirteenth was halved in 4. At the fourteenth, Mr. Fergusson attempted to carry the chasm with his second-a feat which has not yet, we believe, been accomplished—and it cost him the hole—7 to Tingey's 5, Mr. Fergusson's lead being reduced to 1. The fifteenth was halved in 4. Mr. Fergusson's putt just failing to stay in the hole; but driving on to the green with his first at the sixteenth, and playing a perfect approach, Mr. Fergusson secured this in 3, and stood The seventeenth was halved in 5, thus giving the match to Mr. Fergusson by 2 up and 1 to play. Finishing the round, Mr. Fergusson holed out the eighteenth in 4 to Tingey's 5, both players coming home in 41. Mr. Fergusson, 82; Tingey, 85. But for his bad start and his bold attempt to carry the bunker at the fourteenth hole, Mr. Fergusson would certainly have lowered the record, which Tingey holds with 79. The spectators made up a little purse for Tingey, to show their appreciation of his plucky fight.

The greens at Brancaster are not yet all that the members could desire, but the committee will soon start laying the worst ones, in readiness for the spring. Otherwise the links are most enjoyable, and some forty players have played there daily throughout September, being in excess of the numbers that visited Brancaster in August. An "overflow" house has been built close to Dormy House, giving eight additional bedrooms.

A WEEK'S PLAY ON THE BRAIDS.—During the week ending the 15th, a great many golfers who came up to the Braids to get a round went away disappointed. On Monday, about ten o'clock, eighty were waiting at the first teeing ground. Tickets issued for the day, 460, including 38 to ladies; Tuesday, 356 (ladies, 3); Wednesday, 472 (ladies, 53); Thursday, about three o'clock, 180 golfers were waiting their turns—for the day, 491 (ladies, 58); Friday, 468 (ladies, 52); Saturday, 628 (ladies, 22); total for the week, 2,875, including 260 to ladies. Nine competitions were played.

The Prestwick Club may be congratulated upon the success of their meeting held on September 13th. In truth a prosperous future seems to be opening out before them; their former difficulties in respect of the strip of debateable land near the wall by the Sea Headrig hole have been satisfactorily adjusted; they are enlarging their club-house, a great improvement, while as to the course itself, new bunkers here and there have been judiciously opened up-a fact which several competitors, to the detriment of their respective scores, could not fail to note, though they might perhaps have derived consolation from the reflection that their punishment was not undeserved. Doubtless it was satisfactory to the courteous secretary that a large field entered to com-pete for the scratch and handicap prizes, a field of twentynine couples-if report speak truly, a record. Among the number were to be found local golfers of merit; reinforced by players of wide reputation, such as Mr. J. E. Laidlay, Mr. Alexander Stuart, and Mr. F. A. Fairlie, this being, if we mistake not, the first appearance of the last named gentleman in the 1894 competitions, owing to private reasons of a pleasant nature, as Mr. Hutchinson phrases it. The weather was all that could be desired, though perhaps the earlier starters had what advantage there was in this respect; for there was not a breath of wind, and the light was perfect. About midday the sun shone out brightly, and with a power which rather incommoded those under its influence, for Prestwick is a heavy course to walk over; while if one has the misfortune to fall foul of obstructions such as the "Himalayas" or the "Alps" (where with kindly consideration the bunker had been freshly dug out), it requires considerable resolution to persevere with card and pencil to the bitter end.

A London correspondent says he was told the other day that the increasing popularity of Golf among young men in the higher ranks of society was diminishing the day receipts from the billiard tables of some of the best London West-End clubs. Whether that be so or not, it is undoubtedly the fact that many young bloods who used to spend an hour or two in the early afternoon walking round the green table are now getting up a little earlier and pursuing in the open a healthier form of sport.

At the close of the professional match at North Berwick, Messrs. A. M. Ross, with Mr. De Zoete, played a round against Mr. J. M'Culloch and Mr. Stuart Anderson. After being 4 down the latter squared the match at the turn, and at the finish the players were all square. Some superior play was witnessed on both sides.

North Berwick folks will be pleased to hear that Mr. A. M. Ross, the eminent player, has given a pledge of his attachment to the place by purchasing St. Helen's, the villa which he has for some time occupied as tenant.

The committee of the Luffness Club have agreed to recommend to the annual general meeting that Lord Wemyss be elected captain, and that Mr. John Congalton be re-elected

secretary and treasurer. Mr. James A. Robertson, the retiring captain, was nominated as a member of the committee, and it was resolved to recommend that Messrs. George Dalziel, John Lees, and A Dryburgh should be appointed to fill the other vacancies.

Tom Morris has recently been giving particular attention to the new green laid out at Luffness by Mr. Hope, and with a large staff of workmen, he has made a considerable number of improvements, especially in the way of bunkers. Mr. Hope is evidently determined to have the green made perfect; and, from what we hear, the new Luffness course will throw the other greens in the neighbourhood quite into the shade.

A good foursome was played over Luffness on Tuesday last, Mr. A. M. Ross with Mr. J. P. Croal, London, against the Rev. John Kerr and Mr. A. J. Robertson, London. The latter couple, who were receiving a third, managed to halve the first round after their opponents had been dormy 2, and they won the second round by a hole. The Rev. W. Proudfoot and Mr. J. G. Croal, Haddington, receiving 3 strokes from Mr. Ross and Mr. J. P. Croal, at Gullane, on Thursday, won the first round

by two holes, and lost the second by the same amount.

A Long Drive.—At Carnoustie, a few days ago, Mr. David Ramsay, the captain of the Carnoustie and Taymouth Golf Club, playing from the tee to the twelfth hole, favoured with a stiffish breeze from the north, drove about twenty yards past the hole. The exact distance was measured, and found to be 270 yards. The majority of players require a full club shot and a three-quarter iron.

In the report furnished to us last week of the Aldeburgh Golf Club competition, the name of Mr. E. N. Scott was by error placed second in the score list for the Pearson cup contest. Mr. Scott is not a member of the club.

PORT-ERROLL.—GREAT NORTH OF SCOTLAND RAILWAY COMPANY'S NEW COURSE.—T. The turf is found to be most suitable, and the links in every way adapted to the formation of a first-class course. The work is to be commenced soon, and will be carried out at a very considerable cost. Morris was met on the ground on Saturday by the Earl of Erroll, Mr. Ferguson, the chairman of the directors; Mr. Thomas Adam, director; Mr. Moffatt, the Company's manager; and Mr. Woodman Smith, Lord Erroll's Commissioner. Morris played a round on the present course with Mr. C. E. Stephens, Uxbridge, and expressed himself quite satisfied.

We are informed that the professional match between Paxton and Rowe, mentioned last week in connection with the opening of the Sydenham Hill Golf Club, will not take place until the end of October, as the pavilion will not be finished until then.

RECORD BREAKING AT DORNOCH.—Mr. Malcolm Macdonald, Chief Constable of Sutherland, has succeeded in accomplishing the round of the Dornoch course in the phenomenally low score of 72. REMOVAL OF STONE IN A HAZARD.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,-Being very much interested in the correspondence which has recently taken place in your columns on the interpretation of Rule XI., and being convinced that your view was not only traditionally correct, but was the only true interpretation of the rule, I wrote to ask the view of the Green Committee of the Royal and Ancient Golf Club on the subject. What surprises me is that Mr. Hall Blyth, himself one of the makers of the rules, and an old golfer of the highest repute, should agree with the view of Mr. Horace Hutchinson and Captain Robin that anything in a hazard may be touched in the circumstances of the case originally presented to you. Here is the reply of the Royal and Ancient, and from it your readers will see that your view of the case was the strictly correct one :-

In answer to your question, it has always been customary on this green, under the circumstances you mention, to move nothing in a bunker. Should a dispute arise, the last paragraph of Rule XL. would, I fancy, settle the question.

The last paragraph of Rule XL, states that "Should the dispute not be covered by the Rules of Golf, the arbiters must

decide it by equity.

No one can doubt that the rule, the playing traditions of the best golfers everywhere, as well as equity, called for the prohibition of the removal of the stone in the bush as described in the letters of Captain Robin.
