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#### DOUGLAS ROLLAND v. PETER FERNIE-

This professional match took place on Wimbledon Common on the 22nd inst., starting from the Iron House, twice round the couse. We understand that the match was promoted by an enthusiastic supporter of the game in the London Scottish Golf Club. Rolland again demonstrated that he has few, if any, equals in any branch of the game, whether for long and straight driving, marvellous approaches, or in putting on the green. Fernie played a sound, straightforward game, as he always does; but whether from a feeling of being over-matched, or what, certain it is that he failed to do himself justice. Although the game was played in a very strong and chilly north-east wind, with slight rain falling nearly the whole time, there was a very good following of spectators, who highly appreciated the marvellous play on the part of Rolland. Had it not been for bad luck on the greens, Rolland would certainly have scored a record round on his second attempt, and, considering the course was new to him and is not easy at present, his score as it is is of great excellence.

First Round.—Both led off well with good drives, but Rolland always had the advantage in distance throughout the play, and the hole was won by Rolland in 4 to 5. Second hole was halved in 4. Third hole was won by Rolland in 4 to 5, through Fernie having a rough lie for his third stroke. The fourth was won by Fernie through Rolland lofting his ball into the enclosure in front of hole. The fifth was won by Rolland through Fernie going much past the hole in his drive, and not recovering well. The sixth was won by Rolland in 5 to 6, although both were well to the hole in 2; but putting badly cost Fernie the hole: 3 up to Rolland. The seventh and eighth were both won by Rolland in 5 to 6 each, also the last, in 4 to 6, through Fernie playing his second into the ditch beyond the hole: 6 up to Rolland at the turn. The tenth hole was won by Fernie in 3 to 4, and eleventh and twelfth halved in 4 each. At the thirteenth Fernie came to great grief amongst the whins, and gave up, Rolland holing out in 5, making him 6 up again. He also won the fourteenth in 5 to 6, and halved the seventeenth hole in 6 to 7, although he played his third into the long grass alongside the Windmill enclosure, thereby losing two strokes getting out. The eighteenth was halved in 5, making Rolland 8 up on the first round. Scores:—Rolland—Out, 4 4 4 6 4 5 5 5 4=41; in, 4 4 4 5 5 5 3 6 5=41; total, 82. P. Fernie—Out, 5 4 5 4 5 6 6 6=47; in, 3 4 4 lifted 6 5 3 7 5 —.

In the second round, Rolland played with exceptional brilliancy, having got accustoned to the course, and although Fernie at starting made a better fight of it, the match was won by Rolland at the tenth hole, when 10 up in the score. Both started this round with good drives, and, thanks to the objectionable incident called a "stimy," Rolland only made a half of it in 5. The second was well played, and halved in 4. At the third hole, in spite of Rolland making, for him, an unaccountably bad tee shot, he recovered himself by a grand approach and halved in 4. The fourth hole was remarkable for the excellent approaches made by both, but Fernie, by good putting, won by 4 to 5, thereby reducing the lead to seven holes. The fifth was, however, won by Rolland in 3 to 4, again making him 8 up. The sixth hole was a very extraordinary hole on the part of Rolland. His drive carried him over the fifteenth green, away to the right, with the whins close in front of him. Taking his iron, he played a most wonderful shot, which carried him clean over the whins, and landed him with a good opening to the hole, about 100 feet away. With his mashie, he made such an approach on to the green that he holed the ball, making him out in the unprecedented number of 3 strokes. Fernie who had had bad luck in the matter of lies, did not play out the hole. Rolland 9 up. At the seventh hole, Rolland had bad luck in the lie of his tee shot, and Fernie, playing splendidly, won by 4 to 5. This turned out to be Fernie's last chance however, as at the eighth hole, in spite of Rolland having to lift his ball, after his drive, out of the water on to the road, thereby losing a stroke, he yet won by 5 to 6. Fernie's play for this hole after his drive was, however, unaccountably weak, and he ought to have won it easily. The ninth hole was halved in 5, although Rolland's third shot upon the green, struck the hole without going in; and using his iron for the next putt, failed to hole out. Rolland now dormy. The tenth hole won by him in 3 to 4, won the match by making him 10 up with 8 to play. Continuing the remainder of the round, Rolland displayed exceptional skill, especially in his long and straight driving against the strong wind. On several occasions his putt on the greens struck the holes without going in, otherwise his score would have been even still more wonderful than it is. Score:—Rolland, out 5 4 4 5 3 3 5 5 5=39; in 3 4 4 5 5 5 3 4 5=38, total 77; Fernie, out 5 4 4 4 4 litted 4 6 5; 4 4 5 lifted 5 5 3 5 6.

## ROLLAND v. TAYLOR AT MITCHAM.

If Rolland was seen in brilliant form on Tuesday at Wimbledon, he was very far from being in his game on Friday at Mitcham, where he played J. Taylor, of Winchester, a thirty-six hole match for a small purse presented by the Prince's Golf Club. In addition to being a good deal off his game, particularly from the tee, Rolland was quite unfamiliar with the course, while Taylor had wisely taken the precaution to play round twice the previous day. Those two facts combined were a serious handicap for Rolland against Taylor's play, which was steady, consistent, and several times brilliant, especially in his approaches to the hole with the mashie. The result of the first round was to leave Rolland 6 down -a most unusual position for him to occupy, though it is but fair to say that he had, of the two players, probably the harder luck in the matter of lies. In the afternoon he played in something like his old form, and very nearly made a close match of it; but the leeway he had to make up was too great and too arduous for even a player of his calibre, and the match closed in favour of Taylor by 3 and I to play. Mr. Mure Fergusson and Mr. J. R. Hutchison acted as umpires.

The first hole out, with a strong wind dead ahead, was halved in 5, chiefly owing to Rolland's fine second shot with the cleek and a good putt, for he practically missed his tee shot. Taylor used his driver to the second hole, which is a short one, and got beyond the flag. Rolland was well up with his cleek, but lay in heavy, rough ground, bordering the green to the right; he foozled his second badly, Taylor lying within two club lengths of the hole, and though Rolland tried to recover by a good putt, he failed, and Taylor won in 3 to 4. Taylor had a beauty for the next hole off the tee, Rolland pulling away to the left, in a deep ugly ditch, which he got well out of. He had a hanging ball, and in attempting to get it away with the brassie he topped, the ball striking the rushes and only going a few yards. The cleek took him up to within an easy pitch of the green; but no effort now availed, as Taylor got easily home in 6 to 8. Off the fiext tee Rolland sliced his shot, and got under a whin to the right of the green, ran over the hole with his second, laid Taylor a stime with his third an obstruction which Taylor played round with great judgment and dexterity in the like—and won the hole in 3 to 4. Three up for Taylor. The next hole was also won by Taylor chiefly through a piece of good putting, and though Rolland, by a bold putt with his wooden putter at the next hole, tried to reduce his opponent's lead, he just missed it, and got his second half. At the next hole Taylor was again straight as an arrow off the tee, while Rolland pulled his ball into the whins, being scarcely able to clear the clump with his niblick. Taylor landed in the mud on the edge of the small pond at the green, and, chiefly owing to the mass of dirt adhering to the ball, he lost the hole in 6 to Rolland's 5. Again Rolland sliced and got in the whins, a really bad shot, and his cleek shot also buried him in the whins, which necessnot, and his cleek shot also buried him in the winds, which necessitated lifting and losing a stroke. Taylor eventually won a somewhat indifferently played hole in 6 to 7, Rolland winning the next hole, after very much the same kind of play, in 5 to 6. Taylor 3 up at the turn.

Homeward the play on Rolland's part did not improve very much

Homeward the play on Rolland's part did not improve very much. He lost the two next holes after some indifferent give-and-take play, and his progress homeward, as it had been outward, was to him practically a series of disasters so far as retrieving his position was concerned. He finished the first round 6 holes down—a somewhat chastening experience for so fine and hitherto victorious a player. The scores were:—Taylor, out, 5 3 6 3 3 4 6 6 6=42; home, 4 4 7 4 5 5 4 5 5=43; total 85. Rolland, out, 5 4 8 4 4 4 5 7 5=46; home, 5 5 7 6 4 7 5 5=49; total 95. Taylor 6 up.

On starting for the second round, Taylor half-topped his ball off the tee; Rolland's drive was a beauty. Taylor had played his third before he got up to Rolland's first. Rolland, seeing he was safe to win the

Rolland, seeing he was safe to win the hole, played short of the bunker in his second, and holed out in 5 to Taylor's 6. Going to the second, Rolland was on the green with his cleek, while Taylor was a little short, and to the right, in some rough ground. Taylor played a beautiful approach, laying his ball dead; the hole was halved in 3. It looked now as if Rolland was going to show a little of his well-known form. Driving off to the third hole, Rolland led off with a raking long drive. Taylor's shot was equally good, though not so far. This hole was halved in 6. The fourth, fitth, and sixth holes were halved. The seventh hole, which is 400 yards, Rolland won in 3, two drives and a putt the length of the green. The eighth and ninth holes were halved—each in 5—making Rolland 4 holes down and 9 to play. He won the tenth, however, in 4 to 5; halved the eleventh in 4, and won the twelfth in 4 to 5. The thirteenth hole was halved in 4. Rolland won the fourteenth in 4 to 5. Taylor won the fifteenth in 4 to 6. The sixteenth was halved in 4, leaving Taylor dormy. Taylor won the seventeenth in 4 to Rolland's 5, winning the

match by 3 up and 1 to play. Scores: -Rolland-Out, 5 3 6 4 4 4 3 5 5=39; in, 4 4 4 4 4 6 4 5 7=42; total, 81. Taylor-Out, 6 3 6 4 4 4 5 5 5=42; in, 5 4 5 4 6 4 4 4 5=41; total, 83.



When, nearly four years ago, this journal was started, a doubt was expressed among a section of golfers that we would have difficulty in filling the columns with material of interest exclusively to the game and its players. That was not our opinion, otherwise the enterprise, difficult and delicate as it has been, would not have been undertaken. The last four years have witnessed an enormous development of the game, not only in England, Wales and Ireland, but in the home of Golf itself, north of the Tweed, and in our colonies beyond the sea.

Contributions of much interest to golfers have reached us from all parts of the world. A few years ago, the number of Golf clubs barely reached a couple of hundred, and these were scattered pretty widely over the globe. To-day, the number of Golf clubs has increased in such a rapid ratio in this country alone, that it is difficult to find a town of any considerable size without its Golf green. The number of players has mounted from a few thousands (and these for the most part exiled Scots), until to-day players must be numbered by several hundreds of thousands; and scarcely a week passes without our columns chronicling the birth of three or four new Golf clubs, either on private domain land, or on public commons.

Taking these facts into account, along with the other important fact that a revival of the highest professional Golf is taking place, notably in England, we think that, looking to the future progress of the game, to the many important questions affecting its government and regulation waiting for discussion and solution, and to the paramount consideration that golfers have a newspaper entirely devoted to their interests, the time has now come when the originally modest scope of our programme ought to be enlarged. We have, therefore, decided, as was announced last week, to publish the paper twice a week, on Tuesdays and Fridays. By this means we shall be enabled to supply prompt and detailed news of all important contests wherever they take place, together with all items of interest, either arising from points of divergence in the discussion of the game, or between players in the course of play. The success of the alteration can only be justified by the hearty co-operation of all golfers who are interested in maintaining the high traditions of the game, or in promoting much-needed reforms in its government. To all golfers who have so kindly supported us hitherto, we make an earnest appeal to continue that support in the new arrangement. As hitherto, the policy of the paper

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will be, "Nothing extenuate, nor set down aught in malice,"; but whether support be cheerfully given, or capriciously withheld, we shall, in the best golfing spirit at our disposal, play to the last hole undaunted!

A very useful little novelty, which all golfers ought to carry in their pockets, is a six-inch stimy measure, sent out by A. Teen and Co., club-makers, 18, Eastcombe Terrace, Blackheath. It not only serves the purpose of measuring disputed stimies, but it can also be used as a book or paper cutter. It is called "the Stymie Gauge and Paper Cutter," and consists of two thin strips of celluloid or ivory, joined together in the centre by an eyelet, and so capable of being folded into very small bulk and stowed away in the waistcoat pocket. The stimy measure is exceedingly useful as well as ingenious.

In our notice of the "Golfer's Guide to the Game and Greens of Scotland," last week, we omitted to notice, in addition to the other features of the book, a very interesting article, contributed by the Rev. John Kerr, Minister of Dirleton, entitled "Golf in East Lothian." Residing as he does in the heart of a famous golfing district, a keen, stout-hearted player, member of many of the East Lothian clubs, no writer more capable than he could have been selected to supply that instructive chapter. Starting from North Berwick, golfers can play over eight or nine Golf courses, all within easy reach in the district; and if they consult Mr. Kerr's itinerary, a good many of their initial difficulties will be smoothed away.

Golfers and Golf club executives in search of appropriate novelties for prizes at competition times cannot do better than send to Messrs. Henry Fitter and Sons, jewellers, Hylton Street, Birmingham, either for one of their hall-marked sliver match-boxes or cigarette-cases. Each article has in front a hand-painted figure of a golfer, coloured in detail, driving a ball off the tee. In order to suit the tastes of ladies, the same firm has silver card cases showing a lady golfer in full rolling costume. These articles are certainly a welcome variation to the stereotyped reward of cups, medals, spoons, and candle-sticks at large competition meetings of Golf clubs.

J. Ross, the professional at the Seaford Golf Club, in playing round the Newhaven Links on May 23rd, made a record for the course, going round in 77, made up as follows:—Out, 42; home, 35.

The professional of the Wallasey Golf Club, R. W. Kirk, made a record score in a match with one of the members, played a few days since. The figures were as follows:—Out, 6 5 3 3 5 5 3 5 3=38; home, 4 5 6 5 4 4 4 2 4=38; total, 76.

A special house dinner will be held at the Golfers' Club, Whitehall Court, on Thursday, June 7th, at which Mr. Horace G. Hutchinson has kindly consented to preside.

Mr. Mure Fergusson, playing on May 22nd on the Ranelagh Club Links, established a record by going round the course in the fine score of 69. The details of the score were as follows:

—Out, 4 3 4 3 6 4 2 5 4=35; home, 4 4 4 4 3 3 4 3 5=34; total, 69. Mr. Fergusson made this score by good, sound Golf, without any luck, excepting at the seventh hole, where a slightly wide shot was retrieved by a beautiful approach shot which went into the hole.

J. Hunter and J. Scott, Prestwick, playing an exhibition game over Ayr Golf Links, each established new records over Willie Fernie's, which was 75. The details were:—J. Hunter first round, 5 3 5 3 3 3 4 4 4=34; second round 5 5 3 4 3 4 4 3 3=34, total 68. J. Scott, first round, 5 3 4 5 4 4 5 5 2=37; second round, 5 4 3 4 3 4 4 5 3=35, total 72. The game was witnessed by a large following.

On Monday last, R. B. Wilson, and Linton of Beckenham, paid a visit to Blackheath, and joined in a foursome with Mr. C. Pett Triscott, and W. J. Walker (professional to A. Teen & Co.) Wilson partnered Walker, and Mr. Triscott took Linton. The match was a very close one from start to finish, Wilson and Walker eventually winning by 2 holes up, their score for the twenty-one holes being 115, Mr. Triscott and Linton not being far behind with 122. The greens being very hard, putting was very difficult, and as many strokes were lost in consequence, the scores may be considered very creditable for foursomes.

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On Friday afternoon, 18th inst., old Tom Morris made a score which is well worthy of being recorded, and shows that the grand old golfer has still a good deal of life in him, despite his advanced age. Playing a three-ball match with Mr. Everard and Captain Stewart, Tom did the round in 86. This score, for Tom, is very creditable, as next month he enters his seventy-third year. The details were:—Out, 4 5 5 5 5 5 5 3 4=41; in, 5 3 5 5 7 5 4 7 4=45, total 86.

A correspondent writes from Florida, U.S.A.:—"Here I in vain try to get the native to take an interest in the game. Golf is as hopeless here as cricket or football, so I have to content myself with swiping up and down an open space near my house consisting of very white sand, which is poor fun."

Seven ladies from the Lytham and St. Anne's Golf Club have entered for the Ladies' Golf Championship, to be played for on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, at Littlestone in Kent, on the coast, about eight miles from Folkestone. The seven are—Mrs. Miller (Singleton Park); Mrs Catterall and Mrs. Ernest Catterall (St. Anne's); Miss Mugliston and Miss May Mugliston (Lytham); Miss Turnbull (Manchester); and Miss E. Terry (St. Anne's). Last year, the Championship was played for, for the first time at St. Anne's-on-the-Sea, and was won by the Lady Margaret Scott (Cotswold Club), beating, in the final, Miss Isette Pearson (Wimbledon Club). Miss E. Terry (Lytham and St. Anne's Club), and Miss Florence Carr (Formby Club), were also in the semi-final. There are nearly forty entries for this year's play.

The Alfreton Golf Club, which was only started last year, is in a flourishing condition. There is a large number of members, including many ladies. The captain is keen, and the committee work well. To the secretary, Mr. L. S. Stroyan, is mainly due the successful formation of the club, and to his unwearying labours its present state of efficiency is due.

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The links of the Hitchin or North Herts Golf Club, situated within ten minutes' walk of Hitchin Station, and five minutes from the centre of the town, though not much known, have been in existence some two years. The course a nine-hole one, now compares favourably with others in the counties of Hertfordshire and Bedfordshire. The distances between the holes vary from 170 yards to 330 yards, and much care has been taken by the green committee in placing the tees so as to give each hazard its proper value. The hazards consist of a road and iron fence, crossed three times, a hedge and ditch, twice, a dry ditch, twice, besides a pond and several ditches, which are not crossed, but which catch the crooked strokes. The lies are good for inland links, the majority of the holes being on common land, and the greens show immense improvement. Great credit is due to the hon secretary, Mr. William Lucas, of The Firs, Hitchin, who originally laid out the course, and on whom all the work of improving and keeping the greens in order has practically fallen.

A very strong gale has been blowing at Littlestone. The links are in excellent condition for the Ladies' Championship which is in progress, and there is a large gathering of lady golfers. There are sixty-four entries for the Championship. No byes. The first half of the draw does not contain such strong players as the second half. Lady M. Scott has drawn Mrs. Catterall, who tied last year with Miss Pearson), which will be a most interesting match. Miss Pearson plays Miss Rowlandson; Miss Starkie Bence meets Mrs. Ryder Richardson; Mrs. H. C. Willock plays Mrs. Wilson Hoare (also a good match); Miss Blanche Martin plays Mrs. Laurel; Mrs. Sanderson, Miss Jeffreys; Mrs. Gordon Dill meets Miss Dawkins. There are some very valuable prizes presented by the Ladies' Golf Union, and by Mrs. R. Hedderwick, for competition apart from the Championship.

TOMMY MORRIS'S RECORD BEATEN.

### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR;—The following notice of Tommy Morris's record score appears in *Boys* for May, 1894, page 490:—"Spofforth on his best day, or in his best season, was incomparably the finest bowler that ever donned cricket shoe. What cricketer will ever forget that famous first appearance at Lords? No event in the record of ball games—in our memory at all events—ever created such a *furore*. The nearest approach to it that I can think of is when in golfing circles it was passed from mouth to mouth, in awe-struck whispers, that Tommy Morris had done the medal round at St. Andrews in 7,774. But as Golf had not then taken the deep hold on the public fancy that it since has done, the excitement in that case was more or less of a local character. Moreover, since poor Temmy's death, we believe that his record has been broken."

Yes, sir, that record has been broken, and broken by me. My friends generally, and those persons who know my play, may believe it or not as they please, but I declare to you, on the faith and honour of a gentleman, that I once did St. Andrews in 7,773. I found the course a little tiring, it is true, and there was one bunker ("The principal Nostril," I think it is called) that took me a good many strokes to get out of, but the day was fine; the sea calm; the larks singing all round me; the breeze soft and sweet; the landscape most beautiful; I had a capital caddie; and, on the whole, I enjoyed my outing immensely, and all the more that I felt myself to be going so strong. There was one drawback, however, to my several hours of entire happiness on St. Regulus's historic links. Just behind me two persons were playing, who, I found afterwards, were "scratch" players belonging to the Royal and Ancient Club. These so-called gentlemen seemed to wish to have the course all to themselves, and their manners not only lacked the repose which stamps the caste of Vere de Vere, but were most vulgar and uggressive; while as for their language in the latter part of the round-well, sir, I will content myself with calling it as regrettable as it was discreditable and disgraceful. Of course, I took no notice of them, but I hope they will read this and learn what I think of them.

Perhaps I may add that I have not managed to beat Tommy Morris's record since, though I have often "donned" Golf shoes in the hopes of doing so.
