CHELTENHAM LINKS ON THE COTSWOLD HILLS.

I have lately paid a visit to Cheltenham, during which I spent four days on the Golf links. Two of them were as hot as midsummer days, and two cold and windy as in March. I therefore saw the links under different aspects. These links are to my mind the very best of the inland links that I have visited or heard of, combining the most splendid golfing turf with natural hazards in abundance. I know of several very good inland links, but those which have good turf are poor in hazards, while those with good hazards afford execrable turf. Cheltenham stands out facile princeps because it abounds in both these requisites for good Golf. The Cotswold Hills around Cheltenham are of bewildering extent to the laver-out of a Golf links. Too much praise, therefore, cannot be given to the man who selected the present course; it is admirably chosen; but no man can on a short visit at once lay out the most perfect course. The most skilful would require several weeks' residence and daily play before he was able to determine exactly the best and most advantageous positions for the greens. Seldom, if ever, does a professional get such a chance as this of perfecting his work. The expense of his visit and his other engagements prohibit more than a visit of a few days. Thus while Cheltenham Links are better even than I have described them, coming up to the standard of a seaside course, barring the sand bunkers, it is a very disappointing links, simply because a player who knows Golf thoroughly sees such enormous capabilities, and observes that so many of them are missed. Probably the course has not been improved since it was first laid out because the club has no resident professional. The gentlemen, therefore, who gave me so hearty a welcome to their club, and made my visit to their links so enjoyable that long time will pass before it fades from my memory, will, I feel sure, kindly pardon the few remarks I venture to make on their links if only from the fact that I think them worthy of criticism in the pages of GOLF. If, moreover, what I write meets with their approval, and leads to certain alterations, their own game will be vastly improved, and their links be unequalled by any inland links, not merely in capabilities, but in actual fact.

The first and most obvious fault is the use of so many sloping teeing-grounds. Nothing is more fatal to a good drive from the tee than for the stand to be six or eight inches below the ball. Very little labour in the winter would set all these bad tees straight. The tees are well chosen, as there lies a hazard in front of each; but at the third hole the hazard from the tee is manifestly an unfair one. The hazard is a deeply-cut road track, which in itself is a good hazard, in as much as the ball can be easily played out with the top of a stroke; but in this sunken road are deep cart-wheel ruts, nearly a foot deep. In these the ball is not playable. These cart-wheel ruts should be filled up with stones, or, better still, with bushes, and the stones laid on the top of the bushes. The bushes keep up the stones, and make the roadway solid. When once down it would last a long while, as the carts must keep in the same track. This should be done everywhere where the cart-ruts cross the course. Where they are parallel to the course they make a good fence, and are a premium on straight driving. two of the tees might with advantage be set further back from the hazard. I refer specially to such a tee as that at the seventh hole. The carry over the hazard might well be 100 or 120 yards. Bad foozles would get a second chance, as they would

not get so far as the quarry. I should be inclined to give up the first hole, and to return to the original green as selected at the time the course was made. If the hazard is too hard for second and third-rate players, an alternative tee might be arranged for them in ordinary match play, whereby the hazard is totally or partially avoided. The weakest point of the course is the approach to the greens. All but two or three are far too open; in fact, they are not protected at all. Any one with very little practice might approach with a putter from almost any distance, and only use a lofter three times in the round. This is much to be deprecated; in fact, it just spoils the links. The greater part of the pleasure of Golf lies in lofting, because of the skill of it. It is so sad to see the beautiful hazards utterly ignored in the approach to the holes by the good golfers of Cheltenham. Then I cannot help pointing out how easily this weakness may be overcome. I was, on my first round, utterly sick of lofting up to open greens, where a putter or a baffy would have served me better; so, on my second round, I kept my eyes open to look for improvements. At the fifth hole I noticed a lovely green right down in that noble hazard called "Vesuvius," beautifully turfed, about 50 or 60 yards by 30, just such another as is at Littlestone, towards the end of the round. If on reading this, the Green Committee do not take a holemaker the very same day, and adopt that green, I shall be much

surprised. It will be the best green on the course.

Nor do I see why at the seventh hole the green should not be taken over the hazard. This would bring this green out of the category of a drive and a loft-of which there are too many at Cheltenham. The second shot would require some headwork as to whether it be wiser to carry the hazard or drop short and loft over. This is Golf: it is found on all the best links, and is sadly wanting at Cheltenham. The hazard, then, would be used (as it is a long one) both for the approach to the seventh and for the tee shot to the eighth. Then, again, why, at the eighth hole, is not that splendid piece of flat ground used for the green, which lies about thirty or forty yards above the present green, and which is fenced all round by the little grass dells, probably the remains of an old Roman camp? (of which there are several round about these hills). Very little new turfing would make this a perfect and very sporting green, such as must be approached by a well-judged loft. The beautiful hazard at hole eleven is altogether neglected. The green should be on the other side of the hazard about thirty yards above the present plain open green. This would be two drives and a loft. The cart-ruts at the base of the hazards could easily be filled up, and until that is done a rule to lift without penalty out of these particular ruts could not be abused. The green at the Camp hole, which is a very sporting hazard and has to be played for to ensure a safe approach, is not well designed; it is far too small, and therefore gives no credit to good play, as however well a ball be lofted over the hazard, it is sure to run off the green. To enlarge this green would be easy work. The ground should be lowered at the Camp end of the green. By this means the give-and-take of the ground would save the bank at the end from being unduly steep. The "Punch Bowl" (I forget its number), is a stupid drive. It is an iron shot over a very deep quarry, in which men are constantly at work. It is a neck-or-nothing shot. If the ball is foozled, down it drops into the quarry, and there the matter ends. Either the men pocket it (and I do not blame them, for they stand the chance of an unpleasant knock on the head as it falls), or if followed and found, it is unplayable by reason of the stones and high cliff in front; it is a mere trap. As an alternative, I would suggest the use of a fine piece of turf lying to the left, as one faces the "Punch Bowl," which would require a driver shot for the carry over that part of the quarry which is disused, and which in many places is overgrown at the bottom with turf, and so affords a fair hazard lie for the playing of a foozled ball. It might be possible to find a green in the hazard itself, and so play out of the hazard to the piece of grass I have spoken of, if it is desired to keep the next hole a long one. I walked over the hazard to view, but I had not time to go into the matter sufficiently to see if this can be done with good effect. I should not, however, be surprised to find it successful, and probably the better course to be adopted. On thinking the matter over, I cannot agree with the opinion of many of the members of the club that the last hole is unsatisfactory. I am sure it is a good one, and pays

The caddies advised my playing to the top end, but I firmly believe the proper course is to drive the lower end whence an accurate loft lands ball at the top of the sloping green, and prevents the ball from leaving the green; whereas an approach from the top end causes the ball to travel down too fast to the dangerous end of the green. I like the green simply because good lofting is rewarded, and the most difficult of all lofts is required, namely, that which soars high, pitches dead and has a bit of a cut upon it. But what I said about the eleventh hole, as regards the cart-ruts, should be the rule with the cart-ruts below the eighteenth hole. If the player will approach from the higher ground, and sees his ball go over the green down the hill, it is penalty enough that he has to loft back again, and the cart-ruts should not interfere with his play. I am sorry to see, as an old golfer wedded to natural greens, that the club should have chosen to make so many artificial billiard-table ones. One great pleasure of Golf is thereby destroyed namely, the picking out the course of the ball, which course in a natural green is not always direct to the hole. As they are made, however, I must say that they are fat too small. No artificial green should be less than forty or fifty yards square Now that I am speaking about greens, I must not omit to mention that the turf of the Cotswold hills, which is exactly right for the course, is extremely disappointing on the greens, because it carries no grass. The ball, with the slightest touch, if it misses the hole, travels along, and no one can guess when it will stop. It gets no bite of the turf whatever, which turf by constant walking over gets as slippery as though it were greased. This might, I believe, be much improved by dressing with artificial manure. The soil is very shallow and porous. Artificial dressing and the sowing of grass seeds, must in course of time strengthen the soil and promote the growth of the grass. Anyhow, it is worth trying. But care must be taken to ensure the right dressing, and to dress in the right way. The soil could be inspected by the Agricultural Association of 3, Creek Road, Deptford, and the right mixture supplied, with full instructions how to use it. Amateur experiments would possibly result in making the matter worse. It must be the right stuff or nothing-put on at the right time and in the right quantities. Should the Green Committee pay me the compliment of taking my suggestions into consideration, one or all of them, I venture to prophesy that the links will be hard to beat, if perchance it can find an equal other than at the sea-

PROFESSIONAL MATCH AT ST. ANDREWS.

On Saturday evening the two Kirkaldys, Andrew and Hugh, had a foursome with Willie Fernie and Alec Herd. At the beginning of the match the play was characterised by great steadiness, and the first three holes were halved. At the Ginger Beer hole the brothers took one stroke above par, and it fell to Herd and Fernie in 4 strokes. Matters were equalised at the High hole, and at the Short and end holes Andrew Kirkaldy got in long putts, which enabled his side to turn 2 ahead. The Kirkaldys also won the first inward hole. From this point Herd and Fernie began to pull up, and they secured three of the next four holes, which made the match again all square. At the Dyke both were bunkered, but the Kirkaldys managed to get better on the green out of the hazard, and they were credited with the hole. The Burn was halved in 5 strokes, but in putting up to the final Andrew Kirkaldy was weak, and the match finished all square.

BROMLEY AND BICKLEY GOLF CLUB.

The monthly medal was played for on Saturday, June 1st, when Mr. J. F. Tattersall was the winner, with a score of 92, less 14=78.

A club tournament was held on Whit-Monday, when the "Bogey" competition was won by Mr. W. Tattersall, 2 down, after a tie with Mr. A. J. Greig. "Bogey's "score of 74 is a very low one for the course. The driving competition was won by Mr. A. Hicks, with a drive of 196 yards 2 ft, what little wind there was being against him. The approaching and holing-out competition resulted in a tie between Mr. A. T. Drysdale and Mr. A. S. Gedge.

Play is now allowed on Sundays at the club.

OPENING OF THE NEW COURSE AT NORTH BERWICK.

The week before the Open Championship meeting at St. Andrews has seen North Berwick en fête over the opening of the new extended course by which the town, already fashionable as a summer wateringplace and Golf resort, may fairly be said to occupy a position second to none-not even to the Royal and Ancient home of Golf, to which the eyes of all who follow the game are again turned in connection with the award of the blue ribbon of the game for 1895. North Berwick is to be heartily congratulated that the Green Committee had "squared" the clerk of the weather, and that the arrangements, which covered nearly the whole of one week, were all carried out with the greatest success. In the year 1877, when the course was extended to eighteen holes, a competition of the Tantallon Club took place on May 5th for the handsome Croall medal, presented to the club in honour of the occasion, and for other prizes. The minute of that date records that "the weather was of the most delightful character, there being an entire absence of wind, while in the pure, pellucid atmosphere the beautiful surroundings of the Golf course were set off to their fullest advantage. . . . The full course of eighteen holes, including the recent addition to the links, was played, and those who enjoyed for the first time a taste of its quality were more than charmed with its fine golfing capacities." It is interesting to read that record, and after eighteen years to note its appropriateness to the opening day of the course, which has had to be greatly lengthened to bring North Berwick course, which has had to be greatly lengthened to bring North Berwick up to the requirements of the day. We have already fully described the changes on the links, and detailed the excellent rules drawn up by the Green Committee.

Let it now suffice to say that after the opening ceremonies are all past we hear nothing but praise of the new green and the new rules. The caddies, with their brand-new badges, looked the picture of happiness, the "first-class" men smiling softly on their "second-class" fellows. The muster of the members of the local clubs to play two rounds for a handsome challenge medal was thoroughly representative, including such names as Mr. J. E. Laidlay, Mr. A. Ross, Mr. A. Stuart, Mr. L. Stuart Anderson, Mr. J. M. Williamson, Mr. D. M. Jackson, Mr. Gordon Robertson, Mr. John Penn, M.P., and many others equally distinguished. others equally distinguished. It was particularly pleasing to see such veterans as Mr. J. R. Whitecross and Mr. Edward L. J. Blyth, who have played over the links for the last forty or fifty years, and seen all the changes that marked their evolution into the present first-class form, taking part in the competition and making creditable scores. Provost Brodie, whose influence over the progress of North Berwick has been greater than that of any other man, was also present watching keenly the play. Mr. Laidlay and Mr. A. M. Ross, to judge by their following, were the favourites, but the former had the worst of luck in his putts, though playing a good steady game, while fortune, on the return half of the first round, seemed game, while fortune, on the return half of the first round, seemed Eventualso determined to punish the latter for no fault of his own. ally young North Berwick came to the front, and compelled all the leading lights to take a back seat. The winner, Mr. J. H. Outhwaite, is quite a young man, but he has been heard of before, having been one the entrants for the last Amateur Championship. Then he was bowled over in the first round, but "Jack," as his compeers know him, has a future before him; he is a son of Colonel Outhwaite, who is well known both as a golfer and a curler. Like "Freddy" Tait, he is a soldier, and that his Monday's play was nothing beyond him may be inferred from the fact that on the following Thursday he was first in the Tantallon Club competition, which was one of the fixtures in connection with the opening week. This young player's three winning rounds may be taken as a fair indication of the play expected from a strong amateur over the new green. This gives an average of 843, which, at present, may be accounted fine scoring over the new course. As might be expected, the very dry season has been against getting the course, and especially the putting greens, into the best condition, but Tom Anderson deserves great credit for bringing them into such fair form. With their improvement a score of 82 or 83

will be first-class amateur form.

For the professional tournament on the Wednesday more spoil was offered them at the Championship itself, namely, about £80. It was, therefore, not surprising that a very large field entered, among the number being the distinguished holder of the trophy—Taylor, of Winchester, and most of the great players from across the Border. The largest gallery followed Taylor, who played with Paxton, of Tooting; but a good number, believing in the local man, Ben Sayers, who was drawn with another fine player, Toogood, of Minchinhampton, gave their attention to this couple. All over, the professional play was of the finest description, a stiffish breeze on the return journey being the only factor militating against good scoring. There was not much to choose,

after the forenoon round, between A. Herd, Bernard Sayers, R. Kelly, W. Fernie, the brothers Vardon, D. Brown, and the Champion, whose scores ranged from 80 to 83. Taylor, however, started badly on his second round (he evidently suffered from an Ahithophel of a caddie), and fell out of the running, while Herd, whose prowess as a score player is of the highest description, repeated his 80 score, and won the first prize of £25, which, added to his £15 of spoil in the West, makes a week's work as good as the Championship victory, while he thereby installs himself a "hot favourite" for the same. A finer muster of players (one could not but admire their appearance and manners), and a finer crowd of well-behaved onlookers one could not wish to see anywhere, and the day will doubtless remain a red-letter day in the annals

To a good many it was a disappointment that a local professional did not carry off the chief prize, but the regret was tempered in the minds of many of the onlookers by the irritating fidgettiness which seems to grow on the leading local player every year, and hinders many from enjoying his performances. To wait till two lovers have done whispering, or a blue-bottle has become silent, or to draw attention to some lingering trait of influenza in the crowd by the remark, "Geordie, ye've surely got a sair hoast this mornin'," is not good enough æsthetic form for a player who has beaten the challenger of the world. Few, again, would sympathise with the other local hero who reflected on the agreen committee for "no' keepin' their ain fishguts to their ain sea-mews," and refused a silver crown of consolation, telling the secretary to hand the money over to the parish minister to distribute among the poor "as in his wisdom he micht see fit." These are but flies in the pot of ointment-insignificant spots in the sun. From first to last the opening week was a pronounced success, and there could be no doubt to all who played over it that North Berwick was now fairly installed among the first-class greens of the world. It may be noted that, as against the lowest 82 of the amateurs, the lowest score of the proagainst the lowest 52 of the amateurs, the lowest score of the professionals was 80. This again may be reduced a few strokes with the improvement of the green, but it is also a good indication of the excellent test of Golf furnished by the course. Of the two gatherings several excellent photographs were taken, and one or two of these we may, perhaps, be able to reproduce on a future occasion.

As illustrating the completeness which characterised the various arrangements of the Green Committee it may be added that on the opening the professionals and caddies were entertained to supper in the Oddfellows' Hall, when a pleasant evening of song and sentiment was spent, closed with a hearty vote of thanks to the committee for their

A Golf tournament, open to all amateur and professional golfers, and on lines similar to the competitions in former years, was held over Musselburgh Links, on June 7th. In previous years the date fixed upon has been towards the end of the year, but owing to the date of the Championship meeting, at St. Andrews, having been fixed for this month, the committee wisely arranged to have their tournament the week before that event. Arrangements were also made with the committee in charge of the tournament at North Berwick so that players were able to attend consecutively at North Berwick, at Musselburgh, and this week at St. Andrews. The moving spirits in the matter were members of the Royal Musselburgh Golf Club, who formed a committee which included representatives from the Musselburgh Town Council, and such of the clubs connected with the links as were willing to support the movement.

That the tournament has been eminently successful may be seen from the large number of players who entered, no fewer than thirty-three couples competing - the largest number that has ever played in any competition over Musselburgh Links, and credit is due to the executive committee for the successful manner in which the players were despatched, and the business of the day carried through without the

As will be seen from the annexed list, the field, on its professional side, included every player of importance with the exception of J. H. Taylor, of Winchester, the Open Champion, who would have been present had it not been for his match over St. Andrews with Andrew Kirkaldy on Monday, 10th inst., and that he thought it his duty to get as much practice over that green as possible. Another figure much as much practice over that green as possible. Another figure much missed at Musselburgh was that of young Willie Park, who is at present in America in connection with his club-making business. On the other hand, the field included Tom Morris, who has not been at Musselburgh since six years ago, and there was a good representation of the English players, in whose play a great amount of interest was evinced. The ama eurs, though few in number, were more representaevinced. The amageurs, though lew in indined, were those the representative than in former years, and included Mr. A. Stuart, of the Honourable Company of Edinburgh Gollers, Mr. J. H. Outhwaite, of Elie, who carried everything before him at North Berwick on the previous couple of days, and Mr. Munro, of Rothesay, besides the well-known local players.

Musselburgh is always a hard green, and the last couple of months of dry weather has rendered it still more "cast iron" than usual, but Galloway, the green-keeper, had got the links into first-class order. The putting-greens, though keen, were true, thanks no doubt to the repeated watering they had received, and Tom Morris observed, after playing round, that no one could blame the state of the green for a bad score, and the truth of his remark is proved by the remarkably fine rounds made by the winning players.

A fairly large crowd witnessed the play, the most of whom threw in their lot with Herd, and followed his game throughout the day. pleasing to note that no partisan feeling was shown, and Herd's wonderful scoring was warmly applauded over the green, while at the last hole in his final round, when it was recognised that his score could not be beaten, he received quite an ovation. Andrew Kirkaldy, too, was loudly applauded for his last round of 35, which would have been a 34 but for missing a short putt at Forman's. This was the best round of the day.

Douglas McEwan played a brilliant game in his first round, and although he fell away slightly in succeeding rounds, he would have secured second place but for a 43 to his last nine holes.

Bright sunshiny weather favoured the meeting, which made it pleasant for spectators, but a trifle too warm for the players.

Against the easterly wind that prevailed, although it was comparatively light, the worst part of the round was that from the starting point to "Mrs. Forman's," and those who got to the third hole in an average of 5's had reason to be on good terms with themselves. Among the players who opened the round in this fashion were Andrew Kirkaldy, Tingey, of Brancaster, and Vardon, of Ilkley, each of whom did the nine holes in 39. Tingey, who, though an Englishman, picked up most of his Golf at St. Andrews, where he learned clubmaking with Tom Morris, did not make a single slip until he reached the home green; and remarkably steady, too, was the play of Vardon, who had nothing above 5's. Kirkaldy's form was also grand, and indeed his round was, except at the "Bathing Coach," where he spared an approach and was bunkered, almost without fault. But even better work was done by Douglas M'Ewan, the local club-maker, who did a 37, the best score of the round. There was just one incident in his journey of the links. This was at the "Graves," where he had a nasty lie from a pretty drive, and failing to get the ball away sweetly, he found himself bunkered with the approach. Then he set himself to work in earnest, and keeping clear of traps and playing with confidence on the greens, he finished in 37. A good deal was naturally expected of Herd after his brilliant victories at the Bridge of Weir and at North Berwick. True he did nothing sensational, but at the same time he did nothing to impair his chances to any extent. He came to grief at "Linkfield," which was stretched out to its utmost, and took 6, while his score at "Pandy" was again one above par—the round being a 42. Among the 40's, of which there were several, was that of Sayers, who would have been one less had he not failed with a simplelooking putt on the home green. In all probability, too, his opponent, Hugh Kirkaldy, would have stood higher in the list had he not got into trouble at the "Gasworks." His drive was bunkered, he took 2 to get clear, the hole was a 6, and his total 43. Tom Morris, who entered into the tournament with great zest, found the greatest satisfaction in the fact that he got "Mrs. Forman's" in 4, a feat not accomplished often during the day. Of the amateurs, the best for the round was Mr. W. Turpie, a local player, with 42.

The crowd of spectators appreciably increased in numbers during the The crowd of spectators appreciably increased in numbers during the time that the second round was in progress, and their observance of the etiquette of the game was very noticeable. They were not slow to express their appreciation of specially fine strokes, but they were careful to do so at the proper time, and to do it, too, perfectly impartially. After the splendid appearance that Douglas M'Ewan made in the previous round, a good deal of interest centred in his play. He was not in such remarkable fettle as before but still they were appearance. not in such remarkable fettle as before, but still there was not much amiss with his round-a 41, which gave him the low total of 78 for the eighteen holes. Herd, on the other hand, with some leeway to make up, applied himself with determination to the task before him. So often has he come to the front in these competitions that he is always a often has he come to the front in these competitions that he is always a factor to be reckoned with, and this was never more plainly demonstrated than it was yesterday. He played a grand round. Down to "Mrs. Forman's" in 14, he took a 4 at the "Hole Across" and at "Pandy," and after a 6 at the "Bathing Coach" he made a magnificent finish with three 3's. With a card of 79 for the eighteen holes he was but a stroke behind M'Ewan, and it was quite on the cards that he might do even more effective work still. Tingey again played singularly pretty Golf. He had only one 6—and that at "Mrs. Forman's"—in his card. His round was 39, which with his previous card made him 77—a total which was not beaten when all the players had completed the first half of the day's play. Another man who well maintained his place was the elder Kirkaldy, who repeated his former performance—there being only one 6 in his 39—at "Linkfield," a difficult hole with the wind in the direction it was. Both Hugh Kirkaldy and Sayers did better in this case, the former having a 41 and the aldy and Sayers did better in this case, the former having a 41 and the

latter a 40. When the whole of the competitors had finished, the state of matters was that the Brancaster professional was first with 77, A. Kirkaldy and Douglas M'Ewan next with 78, Herd fourth with 79, and T. Vardon next with 80. Of the amateurs Mr. Williamson, the well-known Royal Musselburgh player, with a 41 for the round, led by two strokes from Mr. Turpie, who took 44 in this case.

The great feature of the third round was the splendid exposition of Golf which was given by Herd. In the previous round he had done a good deal to improve his position, not so promising in the first instance by reason of his having opened the day's play with 42. But to a golfer of his standing it makes little difference, though he has somewhat uphill work before him. He is a player who is good for a sensational round at any time, and his best performances are usually accomplished when there is the most need for them. To those who followed him he afforded a grand object lesson in Golf. He began the round with a 5, and although he was bunkered at "Linkfield," he succeeded in getting a 6. To "Mrs. Forman's" he topped his second, but he had a splendid recovery in approaching, and got a 4, so that he got over the worst part of the journey in 15. From this point he played an ideal game, and when he completed the round in 36, it was seen that there was more than a probability of his capping his successes at the Bridge was more than a probability of his capping his successes at the Bridge of Weir a week ago, and at North Berwick on Wednesday. Tingey, who on the first eighteen holes had the pull of Herd to the extent of a couple of strokes, came to grief at "Linkfield," where he took 7, and again at the "Bathing Coach," which hole was a 6. A slight falling off, indeed, all round was apparent in his game. His aggregate was 4 strokes worse than Herd's, which gave the latter a considerable advantage, with but nine holes to play. Douglas M'Ewan, however, was, taken on his previous form, a still more dangerous man. He was again at the top of his game. Down to "Mrs. Forman's" in 15, he played a consistently steady game till the finish, and his card of 39 placed him but two strokes behind Herd in the competition. Among those who improved their position was Brown, of Malvern—an old Musselburgh Champion—who, with a 39, stood five strokes behind Herd; while B. Sayers was next with 122; Pulford fifth, with a stroke more; and A. Kirkaldy, Kay, Toogood, and Paxton all on the same footing, with aggregates of 124. Mr. Williamson still stood best among the amateurs, with 124 for the twenty-seven holes—Mr. J. H. Outhwaite, failing to meet with the success which attended him at North Berwick this week, having now retired from the field.

It was at this stage quite apparent that the race for the first place lay between a few, and, moreover, that, given Herd in the same magnificent fettle as he showed during the two previous rounds, his position was well-nigh impregnable. A great crowd followed this player. They was well-nigh impregnable. A great crowd followed this player. They were not disappointed. He again played with the greatest confidence, and with dash and brilliancy. His very start was auspicious, for he had a 4 at the "Graves." Bunkered at the second hole, he took a 6; and a 6 followed at "Mrs. Forman's," his approach to this hole getting a very nasty kick. Then he came away in beautiful fashion with a 3 for the "Hole Across," a 5 for "Pandy" and at the "Bathing Coach," and a 2 for the hole before the "Gasworks," to which his drive lay a yard and a-half from the flag. A 4 and a 3—all but a 2—completed the round, and the spectators surrounding the home hole completed the round, and the spectators surrounding the home hole raised a hearty cheer in recognition of his success. For his victory was all but assured, as Douglas M'Ewan required a 36 to tie, while Tingey had to do three under 4's for the round to beat the Huddersfield man. M'Ewan was playing with Andrew Kirkaldy, and this game, too, was witnessed by a numerous crowd, who saw the St. Andrews professional at his best and the local man considerably under the game he had played earlier in the day. It was not possible for Kirkaldy to displace Herd, but he did his utmost to make his position on the prizelist good. He played his strongest game, his putting being deadly to a degree. In his exceptionally low round of 35 he made but one mistake at "Mrs. Forman's," where a ridiculously easy putt beat him. Kirkaldy's aggregate of 159 placed him next to Herd, but later on Davie Brown, with a 39, put himself on an equal footing with the St. Andrews man, and M'Ewan was relegated to fourth place. Peter Paxton, another old Musselburgh player—who partnered Toogood, and who is now stationed at Tooting Bec—did well, playing steady Golf, particularly in his second and third rounds, and was just out of the His form shows that he has not lost the game he acquired in his youth on his native green. The burden of upholding the credit of the amateurs fell mainly on Mr. Williamson and Mr. T. T. Gray, who tied at 167.

WILLIE PARK IN AMERICA.

WILLIE CAMPBELL DEFEATED BY 6 UP AND 5 TO PLAY-A RECORD DRIVE OF 248 YARDS - CAMPBELL IN POOR HEALTH, BUT HIS WORK IS EXCELLENT ON THE PUTTING GREENS.

There was both sport and instruction in the match at the St. Andrew's Golf Club, Yonkers, U. S. A., on May 30th, between Willie Park, jun., and W. Campbell. It was a meeting of experts, and the most important professional game ever arranged in the United States. Park is a double winner of the Scotch Championship, in 1887 and 1889, and Campbell, although defeated by Willie Dunn last season, by his defeat of J. Lloyd last week at the Brookline Country Club, established his fame as the actual resident Champion. He is the instructor at the Brookline Club.

Park scored a decisive victory, winning by 6 holes up and 5 to play, after leading from the first tee. His drives and iron play through the green were a revelation to the amateurs who followed the men over the links. On the putting greens the men were more equal. Three new records for the links and a phenomenal drive were also made by the ex-Scottish Champion. The drive was from the Road hole tee beyond the putting green, 248 yards, which has never been equalled in an American game. Park also, on the second round did the Gate hole in 2 strokes, and he made the first two rounds in 81 strokes: both new records that will probably stand for some time.

Campbell was not in the best of condition. His right hand was swollen, due to blood poisoning, and was wrapped in bandages. A lump of sticking plaster on Park's neck showed the place of a troublesome boil, but otherwise his form was fit for a sprint on the cinder path. He played in a red coat with blue collar, exactly like the St. Andrew's uniform but for the embroidered motto, "Far and Sure," on the right lapel.

"That will suit you, Park, but would not look well on us," said Mr. Tallmadge, and there was a laugh from the group of red-coated St. Andrews men about the Champion.

The first round began at 11 o'clock. There was a notable gathering of golfers to see the play, and many followed the match throughout. Among those who trudged over the links were Mr. T. A. Havemeyer, president of the United States Golf Association; Mr. A. D. Park, of president of the United States Golf Association; Mr. A. D. Park, of London, who was with James Park and George Armstrong, of the Richmond County Country Club; The Rev. W. S. Rainsford, Mr. Arthur Fox, Judge Horace Russell, Mr. Walter Jennings, Mr. Harry Holbrook, Mr. H. O. Tallmadge, Mr. B. S. de Garmendia, Mr. J. B. Upham, and Mr. W. E. Hodgman. Others present were Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Innis, Mrs. John Reid, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Phillips, and Miss Schuyler. After the first half there was a two-hour rest and a luncheon in the club-house.

Second hole.—Park drove well over the bunker. A fine approach

shot reached the green, and he holed out in the next. Campbell was not so fortunate; the drive brought the ball into the wall on the right

not so fortunate; the drive brought the ball into the wall on the right of the bunker. He got out nicely and on the putting-green in three strokes, but too late, for Park had the hole, making his score 2 up.

Third and fourth holes.—Good drives were made by both men, but Park's play through the green gained the holes in three and four strokes. Campbell's approach play was not good; 4 up for Park.

Fifth hole.—Both drove well up the hill, and were on the putting-green in two strokes. Campbell played the odd from the far edge, and ran over the hole. Park's putt lacked force, and left the ball on the verge of the hole. The hole was halved.

Sixth hole.—Two strokes brought the men on the putting-green.

Sixth hole.—Two strokes brought the men on the putting-green, both making good drives and fine approach shots. The putting was equally good, and the hole was halved in 4.

Seventh hole.—This is the "Dell" or long hole, about 520 yards.

The hazards are an old stone wall on the hill slope and an earth bank, faced by a sand bunker. Long drives brought both men clear of the wall. Here Campbell played with a brassie, and made a low shot to the left edge of the bunker, a safe place to play from on the next approach shot. A half-shot with the iron lofted the ball on the edge of he green, and two shots saw his ball at the bottom of the hole. Park's drive was followed by a full swing with the lofter, in the attempt to raise the ball over the earth bank, but it failed to quite clear the hazard, and fell back into the bunker. Eighth hole.—Good drives and approach shots brought the men on

Campbell's drive was poorly directed, pulled over by the heel of the club, and the ball landed in the corner of the stone wall. Campbell tried to chop it out with the mashie, but the position of the ball was so bad that the blow lacked force, and it only jumped up a few inches, rolling back behind the stones again. Campbell then gave

up the hole. Three up for Park.

Tenth hole.—Both men drove high in the face of the wind, Park landing on the side of the ploughed field, a good position for the approach shot. They were on the putting-green in 4 shots, and Park secured the hole in 5, Campbell's putt having too much force. Four up

for Park.

Eleventh hole.—This was very pretty Golf. Park drove from the new tee in the woods, over the gate hazard, a carry of nearly 200 yards, the rebound rolling the ball well on to the putting green. He holed out in the second stroke, a record never equalled on the grounds in a match, although the hole was once made by dumb luck in one stroke. This was before the tee had been moved back into the woods, however. Campbell's drive landed the ball about twenty feet to the left of the green. He tried a long putt on the off chance, but failed to get

Twelfth hole.—Nice drives and approach play landed the two balls on the putting-green in 3. Campbell holed out by a long and fast shot, Park missing the hole by an inch, thus failing to halve it. Four

Thirteenth Hole.—An unlucky number for Campbell. He had the honour, but the drive was too high, and the ball was carried by the strong wind into the stone wall. It was hard work to chop over the double wall with the mashie, but Campbell did it in two shots, and was on the green, by a very good iron shot, in the next stroke. A long, quick wrist shot holed the ball in 5, remarkable work considering his poor luck with the drive. Park should have holed in his third shot, but made a poor putt, finally winning the hole in 4. Park 5 up.

Fourteenth and Fifteenth holes.-Good drives, backed up by neat approach shots, brought the players on the green in 3, and it was halved in five shots. The fifteenth was won in 3 by Park, his drive up the hill being one of the best of the game. Campbell's drive was too short, and he lost a chance in the approach. Park 6 up.

Sixteenth hole.—Both cleared the old wall by long drives, and were

over the earth bank in the second. Park played better than Campbell on the putting-green and won the hole. Park 7 up.

Seventeenth hole.—Park would have holed in 5, but his ball jumped out after running around the top of the hole. It was halved in 6.

Eighteenth hole.—Park drove badly and landed on the tilled ground to the right. Two approach shots landed him on the green, and his putt ought to have reached the hole, being well directed, but stopped a trifle short. He forgot the "Be Up" rule. Campbell drove nicely and reached the green in 2, although the position of the ball was bad for the second shot, being cupped in the turf. He won the hole in 4, leaving Park winner of the first half of the match by 6 up, made

rin eighty-one strokes, the best record for the links.

Play in the second half began at 2.45 o'clock. Park foozled his drive and landed in the ploughed field. It took him 3 to get out and 5 to reach the green, nine strokes in all.

Campbell drove finely, landing in a good position, and holed in 5. Park, by poor direction, got into the woods in the play for the high hole and surrendered it to Campbell. The Hill hole was divided, the others going alternately to each man, leaving the total score at the end as it was in the morning,

In playing from the foot of the Quarry for the Road hole, in the last round of the second half, Park's drive landed the ball over the puttinggreen by sixteen yards. From tee to hole is 232 yards, which makes the carry 248 yards, the longest on record at the grounds.

"That is Golf, indeed!" said Dr. Rainsford, who was standing

near the green.

Campbell was up in time to halve the hole in 3, very good play also. This gave Park the match by 6 up and 5 to play, but the men decided to play out the round. The bye holes were in Park's favour by 2 up. The long drive by Park was the feature of the last round. The drives and fine approach play by Park were the features of the match. In putting, the experts decided that Campbell fully held his own with the ex-Scottish Champion. As a matter of record, the following is the score :-

TAYLOR v. A. KIRKALDY FOR £100.

The Open Championship meeting at St. Andrews was worthily begun on Monday with a professional match for £50 aside between J. H. Taylor, of Winchester, the Champion, and Andrew Kirkaldy, a full account of which will be given next week. The match was as close and exciting as could be desired, the issue being left in uncertainty until the last hole was reached, when Kirkaldy won by one up. matter of play there was little to choose between the two men. In the long game each proved a master, and it was generally when the putting green was arrived at that the competition commenced. The putting, rendered extremely keen and uncertain on account of the recent drought, was a matter of extreme difficulty, and, as a consequence, both players betrayed a lack of confidence in the vicinity of the hole. Taken all over, the match produced a splendid exhibition of the game on the part of both men. So close was the contest that Kirkaldy only gained a hole in the first round, and in the second just managed to hold his own, the match finishing at the last green. Roughly speaking, Taylor had the run of the green against him all day, especially in the morning. He deserves great credit for only losing by 1, though 4 down at one time. Kirkaldy was lucky on several occasions. In the morning Andrew was 75 for seventeen holes; in the afternoon, Andrew, 88, Taylor, 89. The green was very difficult to play; there was a halfgale of wind. No harder luck could have been meted out to anyone than Taylor's last putt of forty yards or so; it hung on the lip, and if it had gone in (in 3) he would have halved. Many players are inclined to think that he played the better Golf. The weather experienced was satis'actory. both from the point of view of the player and the spectator. The only complaint the players could indulge in was against a rather gusty wind, which blew with some force in the face of the men on the outward journey.

Kirkaldy opened by taking two out of the first three holes, and when the end one was reached he had increased his lead to 4. On the return journey so well did the Englishman play that at the home green the Scotsman was only left with a hole in hand. On the second round Kirkaldy again began well and stood 3 up at the fourth hole. The Englishman then showed splendid form and drew level at the seventh. From this point the Scotsman just managed to get ahead, and the result of an exceedingly close and most exciting contest was a win for Kirkaldy

by a single hole.

ROYAL WEST NORFOLK GOLF CLUB.

The foursome competition at Brancaster for the handsome challenge cups, presented by Mr. Harold Wilson, was concluded on Monday last, when Messrs. S. M. Mellor and Horace Mann, giving four strokes, defeated Messrs Harold Wilson and G. M. Rutherford at the nine-teenth hole, after a tie. The competition was most successful throughout, the matches being close and evenly contested, and the victors only winning after several hard fights. Twice their matches were carried to the nineteenth hole, and once to the twentieth.

On the same afternooon an extraordinary general meeting of the club was held, at which a resolution was carried, with only one dissentient, raising the short-term members' fee from 5s. to 10s. per week. There is no doubt that, considering the advantages of the fine club-house and links, they have hitherto been admitted at too low a subscription.

QUESTIONS ON THE RULES.—ETIQUETTE OF THE GREEN.

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—May I ask your ruling on the following point? In a recent foursome competition, one of the pairs, in the antepenultimate round, wished to scratch to their opponents, after defeating them, on the ground that they would be unable to play the following day. The matter was not brought before the committee, but, in view of the strong feeling expressed by the other pairs still remaining in, the defeated pair declined to avail themselves of the offer. The question I would ask is, whether, in these circumstances, the defeated pair could continue in the tournament? While there is much to be said against it, it must be remembered that, if disqualified, one of the pairs in the semi-final has a walk over, which is undesirable, and that, from the point of view of the committee, they would not be anxious to meddle with any private arrangement any couples chose to make, provided it did not interfere with the general run of the tournament.

I was anxious to see if the new North Berwick rules provided for the contingency, so often arising in a competition, of a selfish couple monopolising half the green, while the rest of the players are penned up behind them. I have just witnessed (to my discomfort) a single couple, with three clear holes in front, on a large green, and a ruck of players lying down beside their balls behind, whose feelings I need not describe. I sometimes think that committees might be vested with discretionary powers of disqualifying players whose selfishness really prevents those behind them from returning good scores. Perhaps, Sir, you can throw out a suggestion.

[We do not think that the defeated pair could remain in the tournament after being beaten, for the result of the match which was played, ipso facto, put them out, and no private arrangement could resuscitate their lost status. It would have been different if the match had been a tie; then one of the couples was within its right in scratching, without prejudice to the position of the other competing couple. But, in the good government of the tournament, the committee could not, in fairness to the players who remained, overlook the fact that a defeated pair could not by means of a private agreement take the place of a winning couple. The winning couple may scratch to their next opponents, but they cannot certainly go back upon the match which was played, and reinstate in their places a couple whom they had beaten. (2.) If the committee have good evidence to go upon, fortified by wellfounded complaints on the part of other players, they can, first of all, call the attention of the offer ding couple to the well-known and generally well-observed etiquette of the green. If that is not enough, the committee and the members themselves can raise the whole point for discussion in general meeting, for, inasmuch as the club generally must look to the playing welfare of the bulk of members, they would be well within their right in reading a salutary lesson to a selfish couple who in a competition think only of themselves. It is not a question so much of rule as of etiquette; and some players need a little wholesome penal legislation on the part of their fellow-members to convince them of the fact. Make a firm, courteous representation first, and then if unsuccessful, arraign the offenders before their fellow-clubmen.

THE PRONUNCIATION OF "GOLF."

To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—The correct pronunciation of the word "Golf" must surely be a matter of some interest to golfers. Your correspondent of "120 Years' Stance" has written a very amusing and very sarcastic letter, which amounts to this, that English golfers have a right to pronounce Scottish golfing terms in their own way. This is a rather peculiar position to take up, but I do not wish to enter into it at present, and merely want to discuss now whether the letter "1" in "Golf" should be sounded or not. So far as I can find from my Scottish friends, no Scotchman, from the peer to the peasant, ever sounds or ever did sound it. Will our golfing friends in Scotland kindly come forward now, and tell us whether that is true or not? for undoubtedly on that the question hangs. Both the word and the game were practically unknown in England twenty years ago, and, whatever changes we may introduce into the game, every fair-minded person must admit that the correct pronunciation of the word must be that which is in vogue among educated Scotchmen.

The Ladies' United Service Golf Club receives visiting members at one shilling a week or three shillings a month. Entrance-fee, five shillings; annual subscription, five shillings. Capt. W. H. Henderson, R.N., 2, Belmont Villas, Anglesey, Portsmouth, is the hon. secretary.

LINKS.—(1) This is the longest driving club for carry and run, and Wilson's mashie cleek is particularly useful, owing to the breadth of the blade. No. 3, in the hands of some strong players, who hit their balls clean and true, carries nearly as far, but it is a more uncertain club. No. 2 is the weakest of the three, but for forcing a fair shot out of a bad lie it is as good as No. 3. If you cannot play a brassie, stick to No. 1.

LOFTER.—Yes; we think it is the best cleek for long-driving at present in play. This results from the shortness of the socket, and the fine balance and spring.

There was a pleasant little gathering at the Dulwich and Sydenham Hill Golf Club on Friday last, when Mrs. H. C. Willock and Miss Lena Thomson, of Wimbledon, two of our best lady golfers, fresh from their struggles in the Ladies' Championship at Portrush, played an exhibition match for the benefit of the Dulwich and Sydenham Hill ladies. There was a fair turn-out of local ladies to see the play in the forenoon, which resulted in a halved match. The play of both ladies was much admired; they drove good-length balls, approached with precision, and holed out with the greatest confidence on the hard, keen greens. At the luncheon, which followed, both Mrs. Willock and Miss Thomson were elected honorary members of the club for the remainder of the year. In the afternoon Mr. Rand and Miss Thomson, playing against Mrs. Willock and Mr. A. J. Robertson, won a hard-fought match by 2 up and 1 to play, after the last named couple had been 4 up. Mrs. George, Mrs. Wollerson, and the other ladies of the local club, were indefatigable in their kind attentions to the visitors. The green is most picturesquely situated, and is a good one for ladies who wish to make themselves acquainted with all the delicate and difficult points of the game, as both ladies and gentlemen play over the same course, the only difference being a slight shortening of the tees for the ladies.

One of the places near London (says the London Correspondent of the Scotsman), which Golf has done much to bless is Richmond. There golfers find themselves playing under very fit conditions, for they are the direct tenants of the Crown; they play the Royal game in a Royal park, and a very pleasant park besides. The Old Deer Park is really one of the best discoveries of the last six months. Golf was begun there a year or two ago, but for a while little was heard of the club. It remained largely in the hands of quiet Richmond people, who probably knew very little of the game, but were content to enjoy it after their own fashion. But last winter the course suddenly made for itself a great name. It lies along the river side, abutting on Kew Gardens and opposite Syon House, the Duke of Northumberland's place. Naturally, one would expect it to be a damp, swampy marsh, which in very wet weather would be unplayable. It is nothing like that. The park is a huge bed of sand, ten feet in depth, so porous that you may play over it without discomfort immediately after the heaviest rain in the wettest season. For a big winter meeting of golfers no better place in the country could be found. The course, besides, is quite worthy of the best golfing talent. It is flat, that is an objection not to be gainsaid; the hazards are put down in a way that might have been improved upon; and it is perhaps

lacking in difficult iron play, but with two of the holes 600 yards in length and one or two tricky short holes, where an easy enough 3 may become a 5 or 6, there is abundance of interest in the course. One word as to the financial arrangements of the club, to show how much a matter of course free expenditure has become with London golfers. The rent paid to the Crown is more than £1,000, but the club recoups itself to the extent of nearly one-half by the letting of grazing and cricket pitches and other rights. An entrance fee of £10 tos. and a subscription of £5 5s. should, therefore, leave the treasurer well in hand at the end of the year.

Playing in a three-ball match with Messrs. James A. Godsall and E. Jenner Davies, on June 5th, the Rev. E. H. Hawkins (captain of the club) tied the amateur record of the Minchinhampton Links, and lowered the open record of the homeward half to 36. Appended is the score:—Out, 6 5 5 7 4 4 5 4 3 = 43; home, 3 5 4 5 2 3 5 5 4 = 36; total, 79.

Mr. Horace G. Hutchinson was last week elected captain of Prince's Golf Club, Mitcham, in succession to Mr. J. B. Lubbock, whose year of office has expired.

The English Illustrated Magazine for June contains fourteen short articles, with accompanying and independent illustrations, furnishing reading for as many intervals of leisure. The stories generally end in a concealed surprise. In one it is the identity of a lady authoress at a hotel, drawn into a conversation about herself. In another it is the loss of an illusion nursed by a lady for twelve years. A minister of France loses and recovers an important document in circumstances of romantic mystery. Concealed mechanism in a chess-table, and a time-piece constitutes a madman's device for producing an explosion of dynamite. A Thanet clergyman is kidnapped and carried off to France with a parishioner's daughter, who is saved from ruin by his presence of mind. What jockeys earn and make in various ways will be a revelation to many. Grant Allen tells us that every sandy heath is a London of lizards. Of local sketches and portraits, everyone will be interested in Lord Rosebery's Dalmeny Home; and all who are going to the next Church Congress at Norwich should read beforehand the story of Mr. J. J. Colman's mustard enterprise. Mr. Andrew Lang's "Study of a Spy" is a chapter of Jacobite history from the materials of the Manuscripts Commission.

Mr. Emsley, while playing, on June 3rd., with Mr. Mac-Carthy, of Ilkley, on the Ganton Links, near Scarborough, killed a crow in making a brassey shot. Three crows were sitting together. Mr. Emsley drove his ball about 140 yards from them and saw the ball hit one. On walking up he found that the ball had knocked the bird's eyes out and otherwise injured its head.

J. H. Taylor, the Open Champion, paid a visit to St. Andrews on Monday of last week. He played a round in the forenoon with David Herd. Taylor had the best of it the first half of the round, and turned two holes up. On the homeward journey Herd retrieved himself, and at the third hole from home stood 1 hole up. He lost the next, however, and the Burn was halved, making the match all square and one to play. Taylor holed a good putt at the last hole, and won the round by a hole. In the afternoon Taylor played the best ball of Mr. Everard, Mr. C. P. Findlay, and old Tom. The only one of the three that Taylor had any trouble with was old Tom. He played a capital game, and had some very good holes. Taylor, however, won the round by 3 and 2 to play.

Playing over the King's Norton Links, on June 3rd, with Mr. H. F. Keep, George Cawsey, the club professional, broke the record of the links, going round the nine holes in 34, made up as follows:—4 4 3 3 4 4 5 3 4. The previous record was 36, made by T. Vardon, H. Kirkaldy, and J. Burns.

We have received from the United States the first copy of a monthly journal entitled "Golfing," which, like our own little journal, is to be devoted exclusively to the interests of the Royal and Ancient game in the United States. The first number is exceedingly well got up, and contains a great variety of interesting material with reference to the growth and progress of Golf in America, which in process of time will be found to be of much historical value. The frontispiece is in colour red and pale green-showing the figure of a lady golfer, drawn after the manner of Aubrey Beardsley, in the act of striking a red teed ball. Among the articles which have been contributed to this first number is one by Mr. H. O. Tallmadge, of the United States Golf Association, giving an account of the St. Andrews (Yonkers) Golf Club, which is the pioneer club of the United States. The article is illustrated by finely executed photographs, showing some of the leading members of the club in the course of play, and the frontispiece is a large representation of the St. Andrews Club-house. The other articles treat of Golf in Canada, and in some other portions of the States, while Willie Park, figures prominently among the illustrations, showing the stance and grip with which certain difficult strokes ought to be played. We wish a hearty bon voyage to our new contemporary.

Cricketers seem to have a higher appreciation of their heroes than golfers. They were determined to have W. G. Grace knighted, and their agitation has drawn a letter from the Prince of Wales, congratulating "W. G." on his wonderful performances—which may be taken as a shadow of the coming event. Now they propose a portrait of the Cricket King, to be painted by one of the best artists of the day, and placed in the National Gallery. Now, against this, take the case of the Nestor of Golf, Old Tom Morris. Surely he is worthy of all the honour that golfers in Scotland and elsewhere can bestow upon him, and accordingly we suggested, some time ago, that Sir George Reid, P.R.S.A., or some eminent artist, should be commissioned to paint the hero of a hundred fights, in order that in the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, or elsewhere, future generations might look upon the kindly countenance of the most interesting figure in the century's Golf. Yet no response has as yet been made to our appeal. It will be a great pity if even yet the suggestion is not adopted. It is not too late. Will any golfer send a shilling to open the subscription? Or, preferably, will the Royal and Ancient tee off?

An interesting example of the development of club-making by machinery is to be found at Spinks' Works, 124, Duke Street, Leith, already well known to manufacturers for the supply of shafts. Drivers and Brassies resembling in style the famous Anderson's patent, with the variations that instead of the whipping a brass rivet binds together head and shaft, while the latter does not go right through the sole, but stops a little short, are being turned out by the dozen to any pattern, the head being made to any pattern as desired. Ere long we expect to hear that the machine-made clubs are in general use among ordinary golfers, who are not frightened by the sound of the adjective, and like to save a shilling a head on their clubs.

Among the advantages which professionals now enjoy, and for which they are, no doubt, grateful, may be reckoned the payment of their entry-money and travelling expenses in connection with the competition for the Championship, by the clubs under which they serve, a custom, which, we believe, is now pretty general over the country. This is a capital way of encouraging the game and giving inducement to professionals to improve their form, for the sense of having the honour of their employers to maintain, as well as their own good name, must nerve them to do their very best.

Mr. Andrew Lang, in *Harper's Monthly*, has an article on "Golf, Old and New," in which the chief changes noted are "improvement in the links, additional vigour in the driving, variety in the iron clubs, and the scientific use of the same for approaching." Following Lord Wemyss he has a rub at Mr.

Hutchinson and his "turf" theory. Why does he not advocate the restoration of the "baffy," by the abolition of which the greens have suffered more than many of them can endure?

The old statute of Charles II., for the "better observance of the Lord's Day," is invoked now and again, to the wonderment of enlightened men. Sunday golfers in America have been marched off the green to the parish lock-up under its provisions, or at least under legislation founded on the same model; but surely no incident could parallel the following for humourous absurdity. That old statute was invoked at South Molton the other day. A man employed by a local clergyman was summoned for ploughing the parson's land on the Sabbath. The defendant pleaded that he had been distracted by neuralgia for several days, and that when he went to work early on the Sunday morning he thought it was Saturday! At breakfasttime the man's wife set his defective chronology right, and the man innocently told the village constable what he had done in the belief that this frank confession would protect him. The magistrates, however, took a different view, and imposed on the poor ploughman a fine and costs amounting to eighteen shillings !

The report on Sunday Observance given in to the Free Church of Scotland Assembly, quoted from a sporting paper as an illustration of the "painful and melancholy tendency of our times," is to the effect, that a number of the competitors in the Golf Championship at Sandwich, had practised on the Sunday. Without saying more on this subject than we have already said, we would advise the Scottish Free Kirk divines to look a little nearer home, and (if we are credibly informed) they will find plenty of evidences of the "tendency" which causes their jeremiads, without having to read sporting papers, and deal with matters as far afield as Sandwich. Is it unadvisable to remind clergymen and others who are always prating about the desecration of the Sabbath by golfers, evidently for lack of a more crying evil to remedy, of these very apposite lines:—

A man may cry "Church! Church!" at every word, With no more piety than other people—
A Daw's not reckoned a religious bird
Because it keeps a-cawing from a steeple.

The foursome over five greens (eighteen holes each) in one day, which for many years was an incident in each season's Golf in East Lothian, but did not come off last year, owing to the disablement of one of the players, came off on Friday last with great success, and the usual result—a close finish. The greens played over were North Berwick, Gullane, Luffness, Muirfield, and Archerfield.

Religio Athletae is the title of a book containing two poems by Mr. Arthur Lynch, and a collection of prose chapters of a very gushing description, in which physical strength is glorified in a wild, mystical fashion. The athlete will find amusement in the volume, but little of practical use for physical training.

The famous old Burgess Society seems to prosper hugely at Barnton, seeing it is reported that members are being refused at seven guineas of entry money, and ten guineas freely offered. With this prosperity and the success of the new green, the timidity which led to the proposal to annex the club to a new hotel, seems to be passing away, and the idea of a new and commodious club-house is gaining possession of the minds of the members. The club will do wisely to act unanimously on the matter and proceed to build for themselves, at once, a local habitation worthy of their past and present position.

A club-house is about to be erected by the New Luffness Golf Club. It is to be placed close to the road from Aberlady leading to Gullane and North Berwick, and will be within easy reach of Drem Station by the road vià Mungoswells and Luffness Mill. The building is entered by a door facing northwards, sheltered under a broad verandah. This door leads to a spacious vestibule from which access is obtained to all the

rooms. On the left is the club-room, a spacious apartment with an open timbered roof with arched principals, and decorated with ribs arranged in simple patterns. A handsome fireplace occupies one side, and the overmantel is richly panelled up to the ceiling. Opposite the fireplace is a large semioctagonal bay window, 12 feet wide, and projecting outwards 15 feet. This window is divided from the rest of the room by pilasters and a flat arch, so as to form a sort of smoking recess. An admirable and extensive view of the course is to be had from it. The walls of the club-room are lined with wood in narrow widths, and are divided by moulded bands into dado, wall space, and frieze. A richly moulded wooden cornice runs round the entire room. On the opposite side of the vestibule from the club-room is a spacious box-room fitted up with boxes for clubs, &c. A stove is placed in the centre of this room for warming it and drying clothes. Adjoining the box-room is a handsome lavatory with all the usual accommodation. Opening off the club-room is a kitchen with store-places attached. It is intended at some future time to add a caretaker's house, and provision has been made for this in the plans. The exterior is treated with simplicity, in order to accord with the situation. The roof is covered with tiles, and a deep verandah carried on wooden posts and arches is a pleasant feature. The architects are Messrs. Sydney Mitchell and Wilson, Edinburgh. total cost will be about £750.

Sir Charles Tennant, of The Glen, is to open the new Golf courses at Carnoustie on the 22nd inst.

Golf club-makers do not all make fortunes. One came into the Bankruptcy Court of Glasgow last week, and from his examination he appears to have been a "patent" victim. He was now, he said, earning $\pounds 3$ a week in a situation with a firm of club-makers. Better this than manufacturing on one's own account with risky royalties on patents.




