WEST DRAYTON GOLF CLUB.

Within the past five or six years the formation of new Golf clubs in the neighbourhood of the metropolis has proceeded at an astounding pace. While fully admitting the testimony thus given to the growing popularity of the Royal and Ancient Game, the criticism has had to be made in the case of several of these new ventures, that undue haste has been shown in the selection, or rather the snapping up of ground which neither nature nor art could render suitable arenas for anything like appropriate play. But to the new Golf course at West Drayton in Middlesex this adverse criticism can in no way apply. For an inland links it is an admirable selection, and the spirited nucleus of the justconstituted club, all fairly experienced golfers, are entitled to the amplest praise for the truly business-like way in which they have accomplished the initiatory work. About ninety acres of pasture land, principally on the De Burgh Estate, have been secured on a fourteen years' lease. Upon this ground an eighteen-hole course has been laid out, which even at the start would seem to fully meet the expectations of the average golfer, while there remains plenty of scope for any variation that experience may suggest. The course abounds in natural hazards, mostly of the ditch or grip kind, some arising from the crossing of hedge or tree-bordered diminutive tributaries of the Colne and Frays rivers (which streams, though bounding and traversing the green to some extent, are not as yet included in the difficulties which the goler has to take directly into account); and one involving the carrying from the tee of the Great Western Staines line. It is contemplated to set up at two or three points, where the natural troubles are not deemed sufficiently great, artificial bunkers, and the sites of these are at present occupied by hurdles. There is much variety in the course, and a number of the holes are of a distinctly sporting character. distances vary from 150 to 400 yards. As a rule, punishment meets slicing or pulling, and careful approach play is generally an essential in order to save the hole, the putting-greens being mostly on the hither side of a ditch or a hedge, or having for one of their not far-away boundaries the running stream.

Notwithstanding its situation near two rivers, the course is a mar-This arises from the circumstance that the supervellously dry one. stratum is but a thin layer of loam, imposed on deep gravel soil. Water therefore does not lie, and even in the most rainy weather the cuttings which abound, and which are of an old date, are expected to operate effectively as drainage arteries. The character of the turf is superior to that which has been found on many of the suburban courses. There exists a decidedly thick root of grass of a fine, delicate type. This natural advantage has enabled the laying out of excellent putting greens without the aid of foreign turf some of the greens, on the occasion of our visit on Saturday last, hardly a month after work was commenced, were all that need be required by the most exacting golfer. Some little time must necessarily elapse before the route through the course is in a satisfactory condition, but the managing committee, who have acted throughout with the assistance only of the club professional, are zealous to a degree, and determined to provide a fair way for the straight player, and, literally speaking, not to let the grass grow in it under their feet.

A very sensible preliminary has been the securing, under a similar lease, of "The Mill House" as a club-house. This is a commodious mansion close to the first tee and the home green, and it has already been fitted up so as to meet every reasonable requirement of golfers. The course, which is to be one for seven days' play, has a charming situation, and possesses the advantage of accessibility, especially from London, being under fourteen miles from Paddington, and three minutes' walk from the local station. It is proposed to limit the membership to

250, and to admit the first 100 without entrance fee, the annual subscription being three guineas. Mr. A. T. Tallent is the secretary pro tem., and to him all communications should be addressed. Thompson, a young North Berwick golfer, is the professional. He has had English experience at Hillingdon, and, besides being a skilful player with a capital style, he has ample knowledge of the requirements of a goodclass course, and can make as well as mend clubs. Altogether, the West Drayton Club makes a promising start, and upon its own merits it deserves a successful career.

KNOCK GOLF CLUB, BELFAST.

OPENING OF THE LINKS.

Magnificent weather favoured the opening of this links, a nine-hole one, three miles from Belfast. The first ball was struck off by the president of the club, the Hon. Somerset Ward, D.L. Thereafter fifty-eight players, representing the Royal Belfast, Royal Portrush, County Down, and other clubs took part in a competition for several handsome prizes. The first was won by Mr. T. Stevenson at 74 net, his handicap being 21, and the second and third were tied for by the Rev. W. McKean and Mr. J. McIlveen at 76. The former had a handicap of 24, and the latter 18. Considerable interest was taken in the play of Mr. W. Hubert Webb, the Irish Amateur Champion, who made the lowest actual score of the day. His rounds were 43 and 39, total 82. THE AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP.

VICTORY OF MR. LESLIE BALFOUR-MELVILLE.

BY the narrowest possible margin, Scotland has regained the Championship, which was hers in 1893, when Mr. P. C. Anderson and Mr. J. E. Laidlay fought out the question at Prestwick. But this year, as at Hoylake, in 1894, the final struggle was international in character, and, though the Northerners may justly plume themselves on their remarkably well-earned victory, he would be a bold man who would maintain that the result for them implies any very decided superiority. Truth compels the admission that the probabilities were the other way—that is to say, when the final round had to be played; so much the other way, indeed, that the remarkably generous odds of 4 and 5 to 1 were freely given, and as freely taken, and

properly taken, for, as everybody with the slightest knowledge of the respective play of Mr. Balfour-Melville and Mr. Ball must have known, such an unwonted chance was not likely to recur again in a hurry; for the new Champion, on his own green, is not easily to be disposed of by any other amateur, be he who he may. Apart from that, the chances of the game itself are such that, given the remotest approximation to equality, such odds were far better to take than to Mr. Balfour - Melville justified the confidence reposed in him, and his victory was eminently popular. One jarring note, it is true, was struck by the Dundee Advertiser, not, indeed, in its report, but in its comments written in an incredibly ungenerous tone. This might seem a little strange, seeing that Dundee is, as it were, at the very gates of St. Andrews, and it might have been supposed that the commentator would have had a word to say in favour of a compatriot who hadfought consecutively three of the best fights on

record. Not a bit of it; and his sour words ill conceal his chagrin that Mr. Ball did not on this occasion manage to beat his opponent. The reason, however, is not far to seek, and may be best set forth by the commentator himself: — "Yesterday's play (Thursday) in the Amateur Golf Championship saw the blasting of St. Andrews' hopes," meaning that the last representative of the Artisan Club, Mr. L. Auchterlonie, had been beaten by Mr. Balfour-Melville, of the Royal and Ancient. A singularly fatuous attempt is then made to show that that gentleman cannot be claimed for St. Andrews! True, he has played there since he was the height of his putter; has won more medals there than any man breathing; has been a member of the club ever since he was old enough to be eligible; more than twenty years ago; but inasmuch as comparatively recently in the eighties he joined the Honourable Company, that is his home club! It is not, of course, to be expected that one who is capable of writing in this strain should know much about the etiquette governing such cases, but the usual rule is that a player enters from the club of which he has been longest a member; thus Mr. Alex. Stuart enters from the Honourable Company, and Mr. Hutchings from Hoylake. In all fairness it should be said that the execrable taste as exhibited in this instance has been freely animadverted on even by those who are of its own way of thinking. But all such attempts to stir up ill feeling between class and class will assuredly fail, so long as what are called "the masses" are represented by men like W. Greig, David Simpson, and the rest who in this tournament entered from artisan clubs; there is not a golfer in the Royal and Ancient but would be proud to play with them, and beat them if he could; and the task is far from easy, as events have proved. It is disappointing that the Monifieth and Carnoustie Artisan Clubs did not think fit to send more representatives. No player at all entered from the first of these, which is the more surprising, as one can scarcely take up a local paper without seeing some

score recorded nearly touching the record of the green; yet here was the Championship being played under their very noses, and yet by them left severely alone. The one Carnoustie player, Mr. A. Cant, deserved a better fate than severe defeat in the second round; for obviously he is a golfer who may compare with the best; a very long driver, his full cleek shots up to the hole are brilliant in the extreme. It is to be hoped that he may try his luck again on future occasions, for with a little experience of good matches, he has it in him to make a name for himself, which shall be known far beyond his immediate neighbourhood, and very probably the same might be said with regard to many of his fellow-clubmen; and this it is which makes one regret their non-appearance when such a favourable opportunity offered.

Looking at the play as a whole, it cannot be said that any one competitor played a game from start to finish distinctly superior to all the rest—such a game as was

shown by Mr. John Ball, jun., round after round at Prestwick in 1888, or again at Sandwich by Mr. Hilton in 1892, although, indeed, he was beaten in the final. There were indeed occasional spurts of brilliancy; 38's and 39's for the half-round out; while Messrs. Tait and Auchterlonie, in the earlier stages would have run very close to 80 had their respective rounds been finished; the latter indeed did actually hole out once at 82, a performance even better than the actual figures imply, for the tees were all placed extraordinarily far back, so much so, as to alter in great measure the characteristics of the round, which was put down as four or five strokes more difficult than on medal days. Whether this was wise is perhaps open to question; but the idea was to give the long drivers all the advantage that was their due; but perhaps it was a little overdone, for even Mr. Tait, with a favourable wind, could not reach the fourth hole with two of his best shots, though once he was near enough to use his putting cleek for the third stroke. One singular circumstance, which may or may not have affected the ultimate result, was this, that while on the Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thurs-

day the wind remained steadily in the east, on Friday it changed to the west, thus altering all the distances to which Mr. Ball by this time had become fully accustomed. To Mr. Balfour-Melville of course it made no difference, or rather, as against his opponent, theoretically it was in his favour. It may he argued that the pitch into the Burn which cost the Englishman the match, would have been on the green with an east wind, but, per contra, in that case, he would have been over in 2, and would not have had the same shot to play; theorising is pleasant, but of not much practical value. The main characteristic of the ex-Champion's game throughout the tournament was his steadiness, his straightness, and the deadliness of his putting. He seemed to play himself into form as day succeeded day; but whether others are able to drive farther now than Mr. Ball at his best, or whether he himself has lost somewhat in distance, it was obvious that there were occasions when he was at a considerable disadvantage from the tee, as compared with, say, Captain Livingston, who battled right well, or Mr. Tait. The latter disappointed expectation; and was nearly a stroke a hole worse than in his morning round with Mr. A. Stuart. Another who signally failed to do himself justice was Mr. Laidlay, who oddly enough was never once in his game after his medal round of 78.

The representatives of the St. Andrew's Club acquitted themselves extremely well, for out of seven entries no fewer than tour reached the fifth round. The brunt of the battle was sustained principally by Mr. W. Greig, all of whose foemen were worthy of his steel; he lost three of the first five holes to Mr. Hutchings, but gradually wore him down until the match was square and 3 to play; when the latter, whose luck was none of the best at this critical juncture, was disposed of at the seventeenth hole. The fortune of the ballot was unkind to Hovlake also, for Messrs. Hilton and Dick were pitted against each other, and though the ex-Champion defeated his antagonist, it was but to share the fate of Mr. Hutchings. Mr. Greig's putting against the Liverpool man was extraordinarily good, and undoubtedly secured his entry into the fourth round. In that round, although Mr. Boothby was out in the fine score of 40, he was one down, and he too succumbed at the seventeenth hole. Although, after a stubborn fight, the ultimate winner disposed of Mr. Greig, after a halved match, it is open to question whether the latter played with judgment at the nineteenth hole. Mr. Balfour-Melville had played the odds into the Burn ; the other certainly could have cleared that hazard had he hit the ball exactly as it should have been hit; but the lie was by no means a good one, there was loose, treacherous sand to interfere with the stroke, as indeed it did, and as a consequence thereof, he joined his companion in the Swilcan. The latter made the better recovery, but if the St. Andrew's man had played short, he would have had, after all, a fair chance of a 4, and a certain—a morally certain 5. Lawrence Auchterlonie was now the sole survivor of the St. Andrews Club, and his match with Mr. Balfour-Melville produced another sensational ending. Three up at the turn, the Champion saw his lead gradually reduced, until the match was square, and 3 to play. Both men now felt the strain of the situation, and at the Dyke the unexpected happened; Mr. Auchterlogie had two magnificent drives, and the hole was quite at his mercy, for his antagonist was more or less in difficulties all through; even a very long putt at the end seemed to promise but the remotest possibility of a half: nevertheless, Mr. Auchterlonie failed at a very short one, an example followed by Mr. Balfour-Melville at the next hole, who was thus I down. However, at the home hole a grand shot, a full drive against the wind, ran up to within a foot of the hole, and as even Auchterlonie could not expect to hole in 3, the match was halved; and thereafter the Burn, ever friendly to the winner throughout the competition, once more made its influence felt.

Thus entering the final, Mr. Balfour-Melville began in anything but promising fashion: having lost two of the first three holes, thanks to several bad mistakes, he seemed in a fair way to lose yet another at the fourth; but here occurred one of the two crises which probably decided the match. After the two tee shots Mr Ball lay beautifully teed, whereas the other was behind a very steep face; but whereas Mr. Ball sliced his drive, his antagonist got away a magnificent cleek shot. The two were now on an equality, but Mr. Ball, drawing his approach into a bunker, and Mr. Balfour-Melville playing his

with great accuracy, he won the hole, and reduced the lead. The second crisis arose when the match was all square and 6 to play. Mr. Ball had the ill-luck, when lying in a grassy "pot," to strike his ball twice, thus losing the hole. The finish of the match, for Mr. Balfour-Melville, was in every way as exciting as its two predecessors: dormy 2, a 6 and a 5, fair enough play ordinarily, were not good enough as against Mr. Ball, and once more a tie was decided at the nineteenth hole, where Mr. Ball, playing the like, landed with a bad shot in the

Little need be said as to the winner, a sketch of whose career has already been given in this paper; for many years he has been celebrated as a first-rate all-round athlete; and there are few but will rejoice that this crowning success, so pluckily

fought for, so well deserved, has fallen to his share.

The new school and the old may be said to have come into friendly rivalry in this tournament, but while in the natural course of things the former must prevail, and probably at no distant date, the honours of war remain for the present with the latter. Much regret was felt that Mr. P. C. Anderson, who has been seriously ill. was unable to take his part in the fray; all will be glad to learn that he is recovering, though slowly.

EALING GOLF CLUB.

THE Links at Twyford Abbey have resumed their old appearance, and once more the golfer is abroad in the land. The bridges are up across the meandering Brent, and under the able exertions of Walker, of St. Andrews, the club's professional, the greens have been restored to something like their former condition. Review.

PETER STEELE, THE CRICKETER; by HORACE G. HUTCHINSON, Bristol: J. W. Arrowsmith. London: Simpkins, Marshall & Co., Ltd. 1895.

A good cricketing name, though spelt with an additional e; surely also we have heard of "Peter" (A.H.) Studd, so the combination is a happy one. The hero is a sturdy, healthy, talented—so far as cricket goes—young Englishman of the good sort, grown among the village greens and pleasant woods of the Sporting Counties; a man who hits straight from the shoulder, and never tells a lie, who can catch a ball skim-ming a few inches from the ground, but who cannot grasp what the meaning of an overdrawn account is. He sends the politely "dunning" bankers a cheque on their own bank for the overdrawn amount, believing in all good faith that it will meet the requirements of the case. The story is an old one, it is true, but it comes in very appropriately, and will pass muster well enough. To seriously review a book so lightly and pleasantly written would be beside the mark; the story is full of life, and the scenes are good to read, being familiar to us all. The 'Varsity match; the games on the village green; the hard-hitting, lost catches, and the thousand and one thrilling incidents dear to the lover of our great English game will go far to establish the popularity of "Peter Steele, the Cricketer."

Peter's uncle, a veritable fairy godmother in the disguise of an elderly gentleman with a heart of gold and a weakness for brandy and soda, is, perhaps the most natural and pleasing character in the book, not even second to his stalwart cheerful The other characters are a trifle conventional, the Earl and his daughters, the wily widow, and the village cronies being all of an accepted type. They fill their allotted places with credit, however, and even the widow appears in a more favourable light when the climax of the story is reached. The ending is eminently satisfactory and happy, and Peter Steele's life rolls on comfortably, and we part from him, a contented Squireling, blessed with a splendid digestion, and able to hit for four even at an age when he has retired from County Cricket, and confines himself to village matches, and games on the lawn with his son and heir. As we close the book we are sufficiently interested in the hero to wish him a long innings before the inexorable umpire gives him "Out" for good and all. For the smoking-room and the railway-carriage "Peter Steele" will be found exactly the book to suit a reader who requires no up-to-date "smart" conversations, or morbid decadence. It is of the fresh out-door order of book, written for healthy-minded readers.

At the annual meeting of the Championship delegates at St Andrews last week, the subject of the conditions of the Amateur Championship was considered, and it was resolved that in future the match in the final should be one of thirty-six instead of eighteen holes as at present. This is a view we have long advocated, and after last week's final, golfers on both sides of the Tweed will agree that it is the only satisfactory method of deciding such an important match. It was also agreed that the Championship meeting next year should be at Sandwich.

The glorious uncertainty of the game came out as clearly as ever in the Championship. Since he was bowled out last year by a new entrant, Mr. T. T. Gray, Mr. Balfour-Melville had done nothing striking to reinstate him in the minds of golfers as a probable Champion, and few even thought of him as likely to come before Tait, Laidlay, or Auchterlonie -the three favourites at this year's gathering. If a poll had been taken amongst Scottish golfers to declare which of the many entrants they would like to see Champion, we verily believe the highest vote would have gone to Mr. Balfour-Melville, for no one is more popular among those who esteem an all-round sportsman, and no one through so many years has kept up such consistent good form, though he has not had nearly the amount of practice at Golf as many of his compeers, and though he gives a lot of time for cricket-all the while not neglecting business. Scotland may well rejoice that one who bears a name so revered in the annals of Golf has this year saved her honour. She could not desire a worthier Champion. It must gladden the heart of his father, whose "Reminiscences" of the game at St. Andrews are so interesting, to find his son occupy to-day such a distinguished

One of the best features of this year's Championship was the creditable appearance of the representatives of the local clubs, which comprise the artisans and working men who, in leisure hours cultivate the game with all the enthusiasm and success of those who make it their only or chief avocation. No fewer than four of these representatives were in the final eight, viz., Messrs. W. Greig, L. Auchterlonie, J. Rose and D. Simpson. Against the two first named the Champion had the stiffest of fights to get through to his proud position, Mr. Greig having only lost, like some others, by a slip at the Burn. This same player had the honour of defeating the ex-Open Champion, Mr. Hilton, who seemed to have some premonition of doom, when in writing on the prospects of the meeting he said: "Of our local representatives three of them have been rather hardly treated, as Messrs. Dick and Hilton are drawn together, whilst the survivor may have to meet Mr. Charles Hutchings, with the proviso, however, that the latter proves equal to the task of defeating Mr. Wm. Greig, anything but a simple task, particularly as the latter knows every inch of the ground over which the match will be played."

One of the longest "tee shots" on record is reported in Thursday's *Standard*. It gives an account of Wednesday's play in the Amateur Championship, and states that "Mr. Mure Fergusson, playing from the seventeenth hole, landed on the

roof of the Royal Hotel shed." We once saw Mr. Fergusson play over Hell into the Elysian Fields (the allusion is not classical); but, as the distance from the seventeenth hole to the Royal Hotel is about a mile, the stroke which the veracious correspondent of the *Standard* records beats the other performance hollow. This wonderful shot seems to have escaped the notice of the other reporters, of whom there was quite a crowd present.

The reporters, by-the-by, are not at all pleased with the arrangements for their accommodation at St. Andrews Links on the occasion of the Amateur Championship. In point of fact, there were no arrangements at all. Four years ago the event had not attained to its present importance, and the Royal and Ancient never anticipated that Press-men were to be on the green from all parts of England and Scotland. Hence, probably, the explanation that the Press arrangements were defective. The reporters have, in consequence, taken to calling St. Andrews names. One relieves his feelings by calling St. Andrews a "paradise of snobbery," and another threatens it with the Institute of Journalists.

Some of the newspapers allege that there was a disgraceful display of partisan feeling when the final was being played out. This is putting the conduct of the crowd in much too unfavourable a light. There was, no doubt, a good deal of undesirable applause, but it was bestowed pretty equally between both players. Than Mr. Ball, there is no greater favourite amongst golfers in St. Andrews, and, if the crowd was a little more demonstrative at Mr. Balfour's successes, it was because it never expected him to stand up against his redoubtable opponent in the way that he did. All the same, applause at a Golf match is very disconcerting to the players. The "gallery" ought to be under the impression that they are celebrating a funeral.

Roberts, Somerville, and Co. will send patterns direct from their Galashiels Mills on application.

The seventh grand Golf tournament (open to amateur golfers, members of Edinburgh and Leith clubs only) will be held on Saturday, June 15th, on the Braids course, Edinburgh. The Kinloch-Anderson medal (scratch) and Councillor Colston's medal (handicap) will be competed for, in addition to other prizes. The competition will consist of one round of eighteen holes, counted by strokes. Maximum handicap, 18 strokes.

Mr. Garden G. Smith, who used to be a well-known scratch player in East Lothian, is exhibiting thirty-eight clever watercolour pictures in St. George's Gallery, Grafton Street. Those who make a visit to the "Fair Children" in the Grafton, should take the extra few steps required, to enjoy Mr. Smith's collection. This painter is to be commended for his correct and keen observation of nature; his shadows, and distributions of light and shade, stamp him as one who works direct from what the eye sees; he has no mannerisms or strained effects. Very pleasant and suggestive is his colouring in "On the Beach, Fuenterrabia," town and rocks forming the background, a curve of blue water to the left, a woman and her two donkeys giving a look of life to the stretch of soft pale sand in front. The grouping of figures is another excellence of Mr. Garden G. Smith's. Notice the white-robed priests and the hooded and kerchiefed woman at the West Doorway, Bayonne Cathedral.

Those acquainted with the burial-places of old Scottish chieftains, will quickly recognise "Castle Urquhart, Loch Ness." Intense blue water, lines of sand dunes and the crumbling towers are vividly depicted. The freshness of the mountain air pervades this picture, a thorough contrast with its rich colour, to "Jaizquibel and Fuenterrabia," a very delicate piece of painting. The most striking and best example of these works is called "A Spanish Haven." Evidently taken from some great height in the foreground, the lines of the houses and the sea are drawn with great skill. The scarlet roofs vie with the deep ultra-marine of the water; boats, specks of white dot the blue. It is a gorgeous scene. The lights are made to emphasise the look of intense heat and sunshine. In some of the smaller landscapes, the trees and distance are somewhat heavy; but on his treatment of market-places, towers, streets, and gateways, his wonderful purple shadows and spots of colour, we heartily congratulate a fellow-golfer, who having attained honours in Golf, is bidding for still higher ones in the realm of Art.

Pearce, Walter Scrimgeour and Edward Swain, with Mr. G. A. Mitchell, hon. secretary, and Mr. T. Fergusson, hon. treasurer. The club are about to erect a handsome pavilion at a cost of about £400, the tenders of Messrs. Boulton and Paul, of Norwich, the well-known club-house builders, having been accepted by the committee. A charming site has been chosen, commanding fine views of the course and of the neighbourhood.

In the current number of *Scribner* is an excellent article on "Golf." But the writer, after giving a short sketch of the Royal and Ancient Game in Scotland, goes on to say:—"With lingering feet it crossed the *Grampian* Hills in the wake of his somewhat sportive Majesty, James VI. of Scotland, and made its home at Blackheath, where it maintained a precarious existence under the care of Scotlish Londoners." Of course he means the Cheviots.

The first Welsh Championship meeting, under the auspices of the Welsh Golfing Union, will be held at Aberdovey, North Wales, on June 3rd, 4th, and 5th. The club also presents a number of prizes for open competition during Whitsun week.

Playing on the course of the Bowdon Club on the 4th inst., Mr. James Boyd succeeded in taking the eighth hole with his tee shot. The distance is about 120 yards, and the feat has been accomplished twice previously.

The Muswell Hill Golf Course lies between Muswell Hill and Wood Green; the Club-house, close to the first teeing ground, being equi-distant from those two stations. The ground is private, and is on the Alexandra Park Estate. It is held on a seven years' lease (dating from Christmas, 1894), from the London Financial Association. The links extend over eighty acres of ground. There are eighteen holes, nine of which were played on all last season, and the remaining greens will be in good playing condition shortly. The course, which is beautifully situated, presents the usual features of inland Golf links, and, it is believed, will soon become one of the besc in the neighbourhood of London. The hon secretary is Mr. D. A. Watson, Tottenhan Wood House, Wood Green, N.

"A Constant Reader" draws attention to a "nice derangement" of Scottish Golf links in the following paragraph from the *Daily Chronicle* on the morning of the final play for the Championship:—

The eyes of the ever-growing multitude of golfers throughout the United Kingdom will be turned to-day towards the classic links of St. Andrews, where the Amateur Championship will be decided. From all appearances it seems likely that the blue riband of the amateur golfing world will once more come south of the Tweed, and be carried off for the fifth time by that marvellous young player, Mr. John Ball, jun. Mr. Balfour-Melville carries the hopes of Scotland, and after his splendid play yesterday he will at any rate make a good fight to-day. So across the Burn at the "Cardinal" hole, over the "Himalayas," through the "Elysian fields," by the "Dyke," and over the "Alps," these two will be followed by hundreds of people watching eagerly to see whether an awkward "loft," a failure with the cleek, or a short putt will decide this keen international rivalry. When it is remembered that even the Championship is often lost or won by two or three strokes out of a total of 300 strokes for four complete rounds, it will be seen how near perfection any man's play must be to win in to-day's game.

The Banff golfers in connection with the bazaar held to raise funds for their new club-house, issued a neat little volume containing a historical account of the game and the club at Banff, portraits of presidents and secretaries, and some verses on Golf, and other subjects. Mr. Edward Clark gave permission to use several of the capital Doyle drawings in his father's volume, and altogether the volume is one which may well be added to the *Bibliotheca* of the game. Lord Stormonth Darling, whose "Duffers Yet" every golfer knows, contributes to the volume a ballad of the beginner who on Musselburgh "first sought the key for the game that is fit for a king."

The caddie that fell to my lot
Was old, hard of hearing, and wise;

He knew how the young player tries
To remember each tip all at once,
And, forgetting the vital one, sighs,
And despairs of himself as a dunce.

Not to be outdone by a Lord of Session, Mr. Mackintosh, a native, supplies both the words and music of a golfing song, which he "putts" out with a latin quotation. One verse may be given as a sample, our desire being that many may be induced by the bricks we exhibit to try and possess the city:—

The golfer's club removes the blight
Of dismal occupation;
Its sphere is one of air and light,
The sum of recreation;
The mind-springs, too, it deftly oils,
Producing healthy motion,
And for the springs that worry soils,
The golf course is the potion.

Sir Walter Hamilton Dalrymple, the Lord of the Manor at North Berwick, has been making a bold effort to get security of tenure for the town, in all time coming, of the golf links, which now are only leased for a comparatively short period from the proprietors of the estate of Archerfield. Sir Walter has offered to give, free of all charge, certain ground asked by the Archerfield agents on his estate to facilitate the feuing of the Dirleton estate, provided that the Long Links (the new course) and the Ladies Links are let in perpetuity for Golf at rents not exceeding (£350 and £15) those at present paid respectively for the ground. The Archerfield proprietors decline to make the concession, so the matter remains where it was, but great credit is due to Sir Walter for his effort, which shows that he has the good of North Berwick, as well as the interests of both estates, in view. It is a pity that his effort has not been successful.

* * *

Mr. William Melville, of "Ye Auld Shoppe," has published "The New and Popular Guide to North Berwick," a work which does credit both to author and publisher, and which will be of great benefit to visitors and others. This fashionable resort owes its popularity mainly to Golf, and Mr. Melville has recognised this, and given an excellent chapter on the game there and the extended course. The writer is, however, a little "off the course" when he says, "the changes obviate all crossing with its attendant risks. The direction is to the left both out and in." This was Tom Anderson's idea at the first, but it was not quite carried out, there being good reasons for retaining some of the old features such as the "Redan," where crossing will still occur. More than justice has been done to the lions of the neighbourhood in the little guide-book; e.g., the address of John Keats to Ailsa Craig (p. 46) is quietly appropriated by the Bass Rock, and the gentle bard described as the "poet of the island," addressing it in a frenzy of awe and emotion.

A United Presbyterian minister of Dunfermline, who had denounced in his Synod some neighbours who played penny points at whist, has been caught up neatly. The virtuous soul, it appears, joins the sweepstake in his local Golf club, evidently not objecting to pocket the half-crowns or shillings of his brother-golfers. A new illustration of the glass-house proverb.

Two thousand nine hundred and eighty-four golfers (including 209 ladies) played over the Braids in the week ending May 4th; 882 being out on the Saturday. This is a "record" for the week and the day respectively.

By the death of the Dowager Duchess of Roxburghe the golfers of Dunbar, and its inhabitants generally, have lost a valued friend. The Links adjoin Broxmouth, and the Duchess might often be seen on them, when residing there, watching the play with interest. The family have done all they could to promote the game at this health resort, and only recently a move has been made to acquire further ground in Broxmouth Park, with every expectation that the request would be granted. The Roxburghe scratch medal is one of the most valued trophies in possession of the club.

Sir John Adam Hay, of Smithfield and Haystoun, Bart., a landlord very popular with his tenantry and the townsfolk of Peebles, has died in London at the early age of forty-one. He inherited a partiality to golf from ancestors, several of whom were distinguished players. He was a regular visitor at North Berwick each season, and took part in many capital foursomes, in which the local professionals, Sayers and Grant, were generally engaged.

The ladies attending an ambulance class at Haddington, taught by Dr. Ronaldson, presented their teacher at the close with a set of Golf clubs, being evidently of the opinion that Golf would do as much for the doctor as a knowledge of ambulance work would do for themselves.

The Moray Golf Club, one of the most enterprising in the North of Scotland, have, taking time by the forelock, made arrangements for another open amateur handicap competition on Wednesday and Thursday, August 28th and 29th. From the particulars to be found in our advertising columns it will be seen that the conditions are of a kind calculated to attract a large field, as was the case last year. The links of the club at Stotfield, near Lossiemouth, and five miles from Elgin, the county town, are accessible with the minimum of travelling, and as many Scottish as well as English golfers select some portion of the North and North-East of Scotland for their early autumn touring, they cannot do better than hold themselves free for this important gathering, where they are certain to meet with some of the most prominent players and a pleasant company generally. The links are of a high-class, having been lately much improved, and first-rate accommodation can be had without difficulty, either close at hand, or within very measurable distance.

It may interest the lovers of lawn tennis to learn that the Officers of the German Army and Navy intend holding a Lawn Tennis Tournament in Homburg early in July next. The number of competitors is likely to be very large, as H.M. the Kaiser, has graciously given for the occasion a magnificent prize. The Officers' Tournament is to be followed immediately by a Golf Tournament open to all comers. On August the 20th, will begin the Great International Lawn Tennis Tournament, for which are entering all the famous players of England and the Continent. 
