#### LORD WEMVSS ON GOLF.

W. M. R. writes as follows:—"Seldom, if ever, has it been my good fortune to listen to such humorous after-dinner oratory as that at the London Scottish Golf Club dinner at the Criterion the other evening. It may have been the good dinner that Spiers and Pond provided; it may have been the good (and strong) liquors with which we plied ourselves; or it may have been only an expression of the joy in the minds of the speakers that the second oldest established Golf club in England had taken a lease of a new life of prosperity; or a mixture of all three. Anyhow, the result was as I have said—enjoyment equal to any experienced at the 'Odd Volumes' dinners; and praise

can go no higher. "The Earl of Wemyss, who has long had a reputation as a polished Parliamentary speaker, showed by the effort under review that he was also in the first rank of after-dinner orators. He was witty and interesting throughout. Speaking of the Royal and Ancient Game, he said its prosperity was in 'full swing' and that therein was a danger, for one found in these days the most prosperous institutions were attacked and threatened with municipalisation. He essayed to find reasons for the wonderful popularity of the game in England: firstly, he adduced the spread of education in England under the School Board (the parochial school having, for many years, been operative in Scotland); secondly, he put forward the creation of the gutta percha ball as a more adequate explanation, pointing out that in the old days they used to pay 7s. 6d. each for the feather ball, and that a hard hitter was not long in knocking one of these to pieces. The third explanation he did not claim as his own, but quoted from the Spectator, that was the interest taken by the public in the Right Hon. Arthur James Balfour, a devotee of the game. Lord Wemyss thought this was the most probable explanation, and proceeded to give a reason for his belief. He said that they all knew Mr. Balfour had written a book on Metaphysics, which was stated by all the newspapers to be a very clever book, but on which, however, he, personally, could give no opinion for he had never attempted these flights on the mental trapeze. As a fact, however, he knew that a great many ladies in London were now studying, or pretending to study, metaphysics; and he argued that if the magnetic influence of Mr. Balfour could bring this about there was no doubt that to him was due the interest of, at all events, the ladies in the South, in Golf. He had asked many times how long it was since Golf had been played on Wimbledon Common by the London Scottish; but he could get no definite answer. He supposed that it must be coeval with 'Cæsar's Camp'; and that would take them back at least as far as the Blackheath records. He spoke sorrowfully of the amount of iron play that there was nowadays, as compared with earlier days in the history of the game. He denounced in tragic tones, and reflected with scathing contempt, on 'a person' called Horace Hutchinson, who had presumed to write books on Golf, and who in his 'Hints to Beginners' advised them when playing the iron club to take a good bit out of the ground. He attributed to Mr. Hutchinson's advice the terrible state into which many Golf greens had fallen, especially that portion where the approach to the hole had to be made. As an example of Horace Hutchinson and his works he might refer to the state of Wimbledon Common. What in earlier years had been a green on which golfers could play with pleasure and comfort was now reduced to a condition which he could not describe better than by comparing it to a person who had suffered from a violent attack of confluent small pox—(laughter)—so pitted was the green with holes left by the tyros, who, following Mr. Hutchinson's advice, had 'skelped' innumerable bits out of the ground. He allowed his fancy to wander to an imaginary Golf links whereon were dispersed many novices, with the result that he declared the sun was literally obscured by the shower of 'tableclaiths' set a flying by the destructive irons. Twenty or of 'tableclaiths' set a-flying by the destructive irons. thirty years back golfers used to make as good work at approaching with the short or mid-spoons as they did now with the iron or cleek, and he claimed that the wear and tear to the greens in those early days was almost nil. The only thing that he could say in favour of the iron was that the 'new woman' sometimes used it; but then it was usually a 'flat iron'—(laughter) - and he thought a law should be passed in all good Golf clubs that the iron club should only be used when in hazards or when some especial difficulty had to be got over. He had not played at Wimbledon lately, by reason of the law passed by the Conservators which provided that all players must wear a red coat, and told a story of old time Golf, which probably is new to most of your readers. Sir Robert Clerk of Penicuick, and an English nobleman, were its heroes; and it appears that they, in driving out together one day, passed Musselburgh Links. The Southron, observing the, to him, novel antics of the players, asked what place was this, and who were the people. Sir Robert replied that the grounds were those of a lunatic asylum, and the players were its inmates. 'But why do some wear a red coat?' asked the other; and to this Sir Robert rejoined, 'Oh, they they have to wear this because they are very violent cases of mania.' (Laughter).

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#### COUNTY GOLF.

THE discussion about County Golf seems to have reached the stage of showing that there is a general desire for matches between counties, but that there is no very clear consensus as to what County Golf is to mean. Mr. Everard, with a caution worthy of the country of his adoption, has declined to be "drawn" on the subject; yet it seems to me that the time has come, at which some suggested scheme, sketched without much detail, might possibly form a helpful basis of further discussion.

So far I have only seen two suggested schemes-one which proposed that the amateur champions of each county should fight out an internecine mutual contest, until but one survived to claim for the county he represented the title of champion. Another, which I saw advocated in your columns, proposed that the representatives should consist of one amateur and one professional for each county. Now, with all respect I should like to predict, that whatever the ultimate arrangements for the County Championship, it will come to be an affair of teams, and not of individuals. There is a peculiar pleasure in team matches (we must look at this question from the point of view of the players, as well as from other points of view). Half a dozen players, who know each other, would have a very pleasant time, travelling together round the country. It would be distinctly good fun playing in a team of amateurs, under these circumstances, for your county. And I would propose, at first, at least, that the representation should be confined to amateurs. Golf cannot be a "gate-money" game—like cricket—and a good thing too. If you have professionals you will have to pay their travelling expenses, their hotel bills, and a sum to cover their loss of time in the shop or on the green at home. To amateurs you would pay less. I do not think it would be advisable not to help them towards their travelling expenses, for in that case a poor man might be unwilling even unable—to represent his county, on account of the expense; and that would be very regrettable. But if the association of each county were to pay the travelling expenses—third-class—of each member of a team of half-adozen representatives, it would be a light expense to the county, and yet a sufficient help to the least opulent representative, for probably it would very seldom happen that the visiting team would not be "put up" by the hospitality of residents. It appears to me that such a plan would put the County Association to little expense, if each club belonging to the association subscribed in proportion to its membership. The selection of the team would be, I presume, in the hands, either of delegates from each of the subscribing clubs or of a committee appointed by such

I have suggested six as a fairly representative number, as forming a pleasant travelling party, and as a number whose railway fares would come to no very large aggregate. I am very sure, with the writer in your columns, that no form of competition other than match play can be seriously entertained for a moment. Golfers, and English golfers more especially, are beginning to realise the pleasure of team matches, and perhaps we may oppose this sentiment to the views of the writer in this month's Blackwood (who is thought to shelter a fairly well-known name under his anonymity), that Golf is a game but poorly suited to the education of boys, as fostering a spirit of egotism and self-sufficiency. In these team matches we introduce the element of esprit de corps that is so valuable in cricket, and if we choose (as why

should we not?) to play some of the matches by foursomes, we then bring in that further and yet more valuable element of mutual dependence and help.

But before we establish, if ever we do, our County Championship competition on the principle of matches between teams, it is surely very necessary that the conditions of team play, as they stand, be very carefully revised. These matches are now generally determined by the balance of holes. Sometimes the result is most unfair. A team of six may win five of its matches by a hole apiece, and yet be defeated by the other team because the best man of the former side lost his match by 6 holes. This cannot be right. We should give higher marks for the winning of the match than for each hole by which it is won. Why should the match not count 6, and each hole of vantage count 1? Thus, if A beat B by by 3 holes, on the round, A's score will be 6 for the match, plus 3 for the vantage holes, equal 9. It appears to me that an arrangement of this kind would determine the result of team matches much more equitably than the present plan.

The question of qualification is one of detail. How would it be that a man should have the option of declaring to play, either for the county of his birth, or a county in which he has for two years belonged to one of the clubs which has joined the County Association?

I presume that the matches, as in county cricket matches, would be "home and home," so as to give local knowledge no undue favour. In the case of counties playing out to a tie, they might fight it out on a neutral green.

I hope I may not be thought presumptuous in offering these suggestions, which I throw out in a spirit far removed from such confidence as to suppose that they will be generally accepted or, perhaps, feasible. I throw them out merely, as I have said, as a basis for discussion—as a bone for every dog to come and worry, if so be he can find thereon some solid thing to bite that may make his wisdom-teeth shoot, and so cleave home to the core of this question.

BLACKPOOL GOLF CLUB,-On Saturday the six winners of the preliminary competition for the cup presented by the captain, Mr. W. H. Hampson, to the club was played off on the links at South Shore. The winners were Messrs. G. W. Parks, South Shore, with a net score of 91; A. A. Hinde, South Shore, 89; F. E. Rothwell, South Shore, 90; C. C. Grundy, South Shore, 83; G. B. Smith, St. Anne's, 83; J. E. Gorst, South Shore, 83. They played off under special handicap, and the winner was Mr. Rothwell, with 109, less 8=101.



We understand that, at a special general meeting of the Ladies' Golf Union, to be held to-day (Friday), it is proposed to pass a rule providing that the general meeting of the Union shall be held in the week and at the place where the Ladies' Championship is to be decided. In our judgment, this is not only a serious step to take, but a highly undesirable one. In the first place, the headquarters of the Union are in London, and it is in and near the metropolitan area that the bulk of its members reside. By removing the general meeting to Portrush, for example, only a small and insignificant body of opinion can be represented in the event of a proposal being brought forward, which, if carried without adequate consideration and debate, may have a radically prejudicial effect on the whole scope and government of the Union. The proposal, in fact, is one in the interest of the crocheteers, and will lead, in all probability, to any small, persistent body of members making an attempt to gerrymander" the whole organisation in favour of any pet scheme or theory, though opposed by a large resident propor-tion of the members at home. A good, wholesome debate in a full meeting at home is bound to be more satisfactory in clearing the air of doubt and suspicion than if the ladies meet at some remote green, with a fractional representation of their membership, and pass some legislation which eventually leads to friction and recrimination. We shall await the arguments for the change with interest.

During the recent severe frost the water-pipes in many houses were frozen, and when fresh weather came many scenes of flooding took place. In a handsome villa, not a hundred miles from classic Bruntsfield, occupied by a keen golfer, the floods came down during the night, and the members of the household were driven from room to room for dry quarters. The genial landlord had been twice driven from his bedroom, when in the small hours of the morning he was told that the water was getting into his study. Getting up for the third time, he made his way to his favourite room. Despising all else, he gathered his loved Golf clubs together, and rushed out with them in a bundle, put them carefully in a corner of his bedroom, and laid himself down to sleep—the sleep of the honest golfer!

The links of the Ealing Golf Club at Twyford Abbey were opened for play on Saturday. Walker, of St. Andrews, the professional, has succeeded in getting the greens into remarkably good order considering the short period that has elapsed since the frost broke. The committee invite visitors to play over the course any day (Sundays excepted) up to April 16th without green fee.

The St. George's Challenge Cup, open to all amateurs, is to be played for this year at Sandwich, on Whit Tuesday, June 4th.

We have recently received news from the Tacoma Golf Club, in Washington State, America. Our correspondent says:—
"Golf was introduced here about nine months ago, and is steadily growing in popularity, both with ladies and gentlemen.

We have had exceedingly fine weather since the game was inaugurated, and there have been very few unfavourable days for the playing of the game. We have an excellent eighteen-hole course, covering an area of about three miles. It is prairie land, and suits admirably for the playing of the game on."

\* \* \*

Arrangements for the Ladies' Championship at Portrush are now in an advanced stage, and any competitors wishing to have rooms in the hotel should communicate with the Hon. Secretary of the Ladies' Golf Union, Miss Issette Pearson, 10, Northumberland Avenue, Putney, S. W., at once, so that some idea can be formed of the number of rooms required. This would not commit any competitor to any liability, and would, on the other hand, prevent their being "crowded out."

A professional match was played at Lakewood, N. J., on Tuesday, January 1st, between Samuel Tucker, the professional of the St. Andrew's Golf Club, of Yonkers, N. Y., and William Norton, of the Lakewood Golf Club. The prize was 100 dols., and some interesting play was the result of the contest. Norton succeeded in defeating Tucker.

The Right Hon. A. J. Balfour, on his return to the House of Commons from his recent illness, was sympathetically cheered by both sides of the House—a compliment which says much for the right honourable gentleman's popularity as a statesman. While at Brighton recruiting himself Mr. Balfour did not forget

his favourite game.

Colonel Maxwell, at a gathering of the curlers of Dumfriesshire, in which they formed themselves into an association to become a Province under the Royal Club, said that "Sports played a very important part in our national life, and, as the years rolled on, they did not seem to play any less important part. He thought he would be a rash man who would say that next century they would not see a demand from the national Exchequer in aid of some of our national sports. (Laughter.) And if that were the case they would no doubt see a Minister of National Sports." The idea of sports as a State Department is not a bad one, and who knows but in that direction may be found the future solution of the difficulty. The State does more foolish things than this, in catering for the welfare of the citizens.

Lord Leconfield, the first captain of the new Luffness Club, has presented a gold medal for annual competition (scratch), and Messrs. Armour and Reid have given a silver quaich for handicap play. The first meeting to contest for these trophies is on April 23rd. In the evening of the same day a club dinner is to come off in the Central Hotel, Edinburgh, tickets 25s. each. The new club continues to prosper beyond the expectation of its promoters, and no fewer than thirty-eight names were admitted, after ballot, on the 20th inst, among others being such well-known players as Major D. A. Kinloch, Messrs. B. Innes Ker, R Fitzroy Bell, and R. Addison Smith.

The Album, an excellent addition to our illustrated periodicals, has, in No. 5, a good reproduction of the William St. Clair of Roslin portrait, which is now in the Grafton Galleries, to which recent reference was made in our columns. In the same number we have an interesting account of Golf at Cannes, by Miss Savile-Clarke, and two illustrations of aristocratic couples, who are now residing there and enjoying Golf, the one of the Grand Duke and Duchess Michael of Russia, the other of Prince Ourounoff and the Countess of Torby.

The Tournament for the *Dispatch* Braids Trophy, which never fails to draw out the best players of the Edinburgh and Leith Clubs, begins on Saturday, April 6th, and goes on for the two succeeding Saturdays. Entries close on March 29th, and may be sent to Mr. Geoghegan, hon. secretary, *Evening Dispatch* Office.

Mr. Robert Millar, schoolmaster, West Linton, has received a unique testimonial from his former pupils, in the form of a gold medal of golfing design. The medal on one side shows the St Andrews University arms, and the other has a represention of a golfer in the act of driving. The presentation is as appropriate as it is unique, for Mr. Millar, since learning his Golfat St. Andrews, has taught his pupils to enjoy the game. He is secretary to the West Linton Club, of which he was the founder, and though not now a scratch scorer no one is keener over the game.

Mr. Horace Hutchinson in his article on "Golf as an Old Man's Game," in the Windsor Magazine, says, "Golf differs in one respect from every other game, except, perhaps, polo and hockey; its cognates, that for the drive you have to keep your eye fast on the ball when you hit it." Mr. Hilton comes down on some of the illustrations to the article, and says they are incorrect. Mr. Hutchinson, in future articles, will have to borrow the golden rule of Golf, and keep his eye on the photographer, or rather the reproducer of the photographs. Such designs of golfers consort ill with such a good article.

Dr. W. F. Collier, who is well-known as a writer on Golf subjects, has in the press "Marjorie Duddingstone, a tale of old St. Andrews." Messrs. Oliphant, Anderson and Ferrier, are to publish the story.

The death from pneumonia is announced of Mrs. Boyd, wife of the Rev. Dr. Boyd, of St. Andrews, the chaplain of the Royal and Ancient Club, whose late severe illness was referred to in our columns only a week or two ago.

The people of Aberlady have been successful in opposing the outflow of Gullane drainage at Aberlady Bay, and a scheme for draining Gullane directly seaward is now being rapidly pushed forward, so that the outlook for next season is hopeful. Among those who have already taken houses for the holidays at this popular Golf resort is Mr. Laidlaw Purves, who has on several former occasions spent a holiday with his family at Gullane.

Lieutenant-Colonel Carleton, in a brochure entitled "Oh wad some Pow'r," has been rating his brother Scots on their unmannerly habits; but has only managed to make a case of Satan reproving sin. There is a good old saying, "It's an ill bird that fyles its ain nest," which we commend to this military censor of the Scots. It is doubtful whether we may call it satisfactory to find that this cruel carle has nothing but praise to give to the national games—Golf and curling.

Mr. J. C. Bayldon has been elected captain for the ensuing year of the Dulwich and Sydenham Golf Club. Mr. Bayldon is a pretty fair player, knows a good deal about the game, and the management details of a large Golf club; and we are sure that no better or more popular choice could be made in the interests of the club. We understand that the membership of this suburban club is nearly full, so that golfers anxious to join a good club, have no time to lose. As a Captain's prize, Mr. Bayldon has generously offered a cup to be played for at an early date by the members; the cup to become the property of the winner.

Last year some of the members of Lloyds formed themselves into a Golf Club, with the idea of promoting good fellowship among its members, and to associate the game with the community of Lloyds, among which were many players. The first president was Mr. Alfred Borwick, the father of the famous young pianist, and the first captain was Mr. Alec. L. Tweedie. The inaugural dinner of the little club was held at the Hôtel Métropole the other night, the members feeling that nothing gave stimulus to a club so satisfactorily, or enabled men to know one another better than a dinner. Accordingly

a dinner was arranged, over which Mr. Borwick presided, and on his right sat Mr. Alec. Tweedie, Messrs. Norman Foster, E. H. Johnson, T. C. Hedderwick, and various other guests were present. Among the club members were Messrs. David Howden, Vyvian Wintle, Cyril Wintle, S. Bolton, G. S. Tweedie, Franklin Adams, W. H. Leslie, and E. H. Robson. Lloyds Club has no green of its own as yet, so they have been permitted to enjoy the pleasure of playing their tournaments at Wimbledon and Littlestone; thanks for which privilege were tendered by the captain in his speech. #### COUNTY GOLF AND GOLF UNIONS.

#### To the Editor of GOLF.

SIR,—The formation of Unions comprising several counties, such as, for instance, the "so-called" Midland Golf Union, is not in accordance with the idea, pure and simple, of County Golf.

Some months ago I attended a meeting in Birmingham, called by Mr. Conway Morgan, hon secretary, Staffordshire Golf Club, to consider the formation of a Midland Golf Union, on a much more comprehensive scale than that described in your issue of February 22nd, and I believe the principal reason why the project fell through was that the Worcestershire and Warwickshire County Clubs refused to associate themselves with it, although the opinion of the majority of the different clubs was decidedly favourable. Perhaps the action they then took, is now not altogether to be regretted.

As Mr. Everard says, there is no reason why county Golf should not be as popular as county cricket; but I am afraid the amalgamation of counties into Unions will defeat the object which the Hants and Isle of Wight Association have in view,

if it has not already done so.

For my own part, I should be in favour of each county forming an Association of its own (and in most counties there are now sufficient clubs to do so successfully), and as far as Worcestershire is concerned, I have little doubt, if the County Club at Malvern took up the matter, the other clubs in the county would readily join them in the formation of a County Association. If the leading club holds aloof, no county organization would be likely to flourish. I think the object of county Golf should comprise the holding of a championship meeting in each county once a year, and the promotion of inter-county team matches, for amateurs only.

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


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
