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
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GOLFING ANNUAL.

RECENT DECISIONS OF THE RULES OF GOLF COMMITTEE.

SINCE their appointment by the Royal and Ancient Golf Club of St. Andrews, in September, 1897, the Rules of Golf Committee have not been idle, and have decided authoritatively a number of points submitted for their consideration by various Clubs throughout the country. Some of the queries put to them were absurdly trivial. These it would be a waste of valuable space to give in detail, but we append the more important questions and answers.

Q.—A. and B. play a four-some against C. and D. Without anyone detecting the error, they take three-quarters instead of three-eighths of the difference in handicaps as the number of holes at which a stroke is allowed. Playing so, C. and D. win at the four-tenth by six up and four to play, whereas, had they played on the proper basis of three-eighths, they would only have been dormy four. Was the win valid?

A.—In the circumstances stated, the match must stand as it was played.

Q.—Playing a monthly handicap on a nine-hole course, two couples, after playing the first round, entered the Club-house to see if a threatened shower of rain would pass over. While they were there a third couple came up and teed for the second round, and, seeing the two couples in the Club-house, they claimed that they should be disqualified under the rules. The two couples subsequently played, and handed in eards which were objected to.

A.—Assuming that the green was clear at the time the couples in question finished their first round, the Committee are of opinion that

they are disqualified.

Q.—A. and B. are playing a single. In putting at the first hole, A. strikes B.'s ball. Should B. replace his ball at once, or wait until

A. has played again ?

A.—A. should replace his ball at once, or not at all, except when A.'s ball occupies the exact position which was formerly occupied by B.'s ball, in which case B. should play first.

Q.—On coming up to a ball struck from the tee, it is found on a patch of grass within the bunker. Is that a hazard θ

A.—If the grass in the bunker is of a permanent nature it would

not be a hazard.

- Q.—In medal play, a competitor's ball lay in a hole made by the green-keeper with a hole-cutter. There was no intention to fill up the hole, the turf taken from it being used to repair the green elsewhere. The competitor states that it was possible to play the ball. He, however, elected to lift and drop, holding that he was entitled to do so under Rule 17, without penalty. Was he right, or should the ball have been teed under penalty of two strokes?
 - A.—The competitor was entitled to lift without a penalty.
- Q. Playing Wrong Ball. Rule 27 says, that "unless the opponent then play the player's ball." A. maintains that if the mistake be discovered before the opponent plays, the player must bring back his opponent's ball, and replace it and lose a stroke. A's opponent maintains that the words of the rule quoted give him the option, either of playing his opponent's ball (knowing it to be so), or of recalling the ball with possibly one stroke. Which is right?
- A. The custom would be that the opponent whose ball was played by mistake, crops another ball on the spot on which the ball was placed, and the player who made the mistake is penalised one stroke, e.ch player thereafter continuing to play his own ball.
- Q. (a) In a match a player drives out of bounds and drops a ball behind his shoulder. In doing so the ball strikes A.'s shoulder, and B, claims the hole. Is B, right: (b) What is the penalty (if any) in modal play when the ball, in being dropped behind the head, strikes or touches the player: A. (a) No. (b) None.
- Q. (1) In a medal competition an incorrect card is returned. What is the penalty, if any? (2) Does the term "incorrect card" include the following cases: a stroke too many scored; a stroke too few secored; a penalty stroke omitted or scored in excess; a mistake in adding up totals? (3) Is there any case of an incorrect card where the penalty is not inflicted, and, if so, what case or cases, and why the distinction? (4) In adjudicating upon an incorrect card, is a Committee bound by rule, or has it a discretionary power, as, for instance—(a) when the mistake is discovered before the winners are posted; (b) when the instake is discovered after the winners are posted, but while rectification is possible and easy, the facts

undisputed, and the explanation satisfactory; (c) when other competitors do not suffer from such rectification? (5) If a Committee has no such discretionary power, it must be bound by some fixed and arbitrary rule. By which of the rules of the St. Andrews Code is a Committee so bound? (6) Finally, in the absence of a specific rule dealing with any important question, not being a dispute, would a Committee be justified in dealing with a case on its morits without referring to St. Andrews to seek for a precedent?

A.—The Committee are of opinion that the following answers cover the whole points involved in the first five questions:—(1) The Secretary of the Club is responsible for checking the additions of the cards; (2) No correction by way of reduction of the score at any hole can be made after the eard has been formally returned; and (3) If it be found that the eard returned has a score below that actually played, the player shall be disqualified. As to question 6, the Committee are of opinion that the Committee of a Club certainly would, in the circumstances stated, be justified in dealing with a case on its morits without reference to St. Andrews.

Q.—In a foursome, when a player was addressing his ball to play an approach shot, the ball moved, and he played his shot while the ball was moving. The other side claimed the hole, on the ground that this was a foul stroke. Was it so?

A .- No, it was not a foul stroke.

Q.—In a hole tournament, A played his ball into a hedge within the bounds of the course. The ball being unplayable, be and his partner agreed that it should be lifted and dropped, and a stroke counted, and that they should refer to the matter on returning to the Club-house. At the end of two rounds the players were all square, and, without consulting any one about the disputed hole, they agreed to play other nine holes, at the end of which A was three up. By playing nine holes only, they broke a special rule on the notice board, which says that 'ties ending all square must be played over again." The Convener of the Match Committee having heard of the ball being lifted out of the hedge, wrote to A. (without consulting the Committee), informing him that if he had done so, he had broken Rule 29, and therefore the tie must be entered in favour of his opnoment. Was the decision of the Convener right?

A. If there is no local rule permitting the lifting of a ball out of the hedge, A. lost the hole, and the decision of the Convener was

right.

Q. In a competition, A.'s ball was lying about a foot from the hole, and B.'s about 5 yards. B. putted, and some spectators (players in the competition ledged an objection, contending that A.'s ball lying nearer the hole than B.'s gave B. an advantage, inasmuch as B. might have gone in off it, or been stopped by hitting it, or taken a line from it. The Committee upheld the objection, and B. was disqualified. (1) Was the Committee's decision correct? (2) If so,

is it compulsory, under penalty of disqualification, for the player furthest from the hole to insist upon his opponent either holing out

or lifting his ball?

A.—The Committee's decision was wrong, unless they were of opinion that A and B, were conspiring together to play unfairly. A was bound either to lift or play first if either he or B, thought there was the slightest chance of his ball giving any advantage to B.

Q.—The working of Rule 27.—Suppose neither condition fulfilled, what is to be done? A. played B.'s ball. B. asked what he was to do. He would not exchange balls, and he did not give wrong information. Provision is made in the rule for (1) exchange, or (2) wrong information, but not for the above actual case. What would

be the procedure in St. Andrews in such a case?

A.—The custom in such a case is that the opponent whose ball was played by mistake drops another ball at the place from which the ball was played, and the player who made the mistake is penalised one stroke, each player thereafter continuing to play with his own ball. There is no doubt that Rule 27 is not quite clear, and it is now under the consideration of the Committee with a view to amendment.

Q.—A. and B. were playing off a tie in a competition, and A. was dormy one. A. could not find his ball from his next drive, and the couple behind having driven off, he by mistake played one of their balls. It was lying bally, and he played two more. B.'s ball was a "hanging" one, and as he saw that A.'s ball was not on the green from the two more, he played carefully and lay short of the green. The players following then came up, when it was discovered that A. bad played the wrong ball, and his own ball baying been found, he played out with it, and the hole was halved in 5, counting the strokes played by A. with his own ball. A. considers that the hole was halved; B. thinks otherwise. Which is right?

A.—The hole was halved.

Q.—A. and B. are playing together for a medal. A. plays his approach, and lies about six inches from the hole. B. plays his approach (λ 's ball in no way interfering with B's play), and his ball bounding after landing on the green bounds towards Λ 's ball, and knocks it into the hole. Does Λ count a stroke, or does he receive the benefit and count no stroke;

A .- A. must replace his ball.

Q.—In a medal competition A, and B, were the first couple to start. A, had a putt of about a yard long, and as she saw that the tin was projecting about half an inch above the ground on the side next to her ball, she with her wooden putter hit the tin twice (in the line between her ball and the hole), thereby striking the ground as well. B, claims that this was illegal according to Rules 33 and 34. Was it so, and if it was, what is the penalty incurred?

A.—The tin ought to have been level with the ground, and so long as A. did no more than was necessary to put it so, she was not disqualified.

Q.—In a medal competition A., in driving, sliced his ball into long grass. His partner B. assisted him in looking for it for some time, but without success. A. returned to the teeing ground for the purpose of driving another ball, and while he was engaged in teeing and addressing his ball, B., who had continued the search, discovered the lost ball. Not being able to identify it for the moment owing to his being a few yards from it, he was unsuccessful in attracting A.'s attention to the fact of the ball having been found until after A. had struck off the second ball. Immediately on looking up, after striking off, A. observed B.'s signals, and in accordance with the apparent meaning of the rule, he proceeded to play with his original ball, and lifted the second one. A. was found to be the winner; but two other competitors, C. and D., objected because A. played the first ball after having struck off the second. Was A. right?

A.-A.'s ball having been found before he struck off the second

ball, he was bound to play with the original ball.

Q.—(a) At a monthly medal competition played by strokes under handicap, one of the players in driving, sent his ball over a boundary wall. Under the local rule, he is allowed to bring the ball back on to the course, drop it, and lose one stroke. The player found a ball, which he brought back on to the course, and after having played three strokes, including the penalty. the ball landed on the putting green, when it was discovered that the ball he had found was not the ball he had driven from the tee, but a founding. What is the penalty? (b) In the same competition, a player played what he thought was his ball, but it was discovered before another stroke was played that he had played a ball belonging to another competitor in the competition. What is the penalty

A.—(a) There is no penalty. (b). The player must go back and play his own ball, and he incurs no penalty if he finds his own ball.

and plays with it

Q.—A player was addressing his ball on the putting green (with a strong wind blowing), but had not grounded his club, when the ball rolled from its position and rested in another. The marker put down a stroke for the ball moving. The player protested, on the ground that he did not cause the ball to move, but the Club Committee decided that a -troke must be counted. Are they right?


A. As the player did not touch the hall, or by touching cause it to move, it was not a stroke, and the decision of the Committee was

wrong.

THE LATE MR. ANDREW USHER.

Mr. Andrew Usher in his lifetime secured a lasting monument for himself by his princely gift of £100,000 to the City of Edinburgh to erect a public hall, the object of which is to promote and extend the cultivation and taste for music, of which the donor was passionately fond. In our pages it seems befitting to immortalise the name of this generous citizen as a typical golfer of the old school, and as one who made the Royal and Ancient game his favourite recreation while he was busily engaged building up and carrying on the great concern which eventually made him so wealthy. Long before golf had become a popular craze, a genial coterie of Edinburgh merchants and professional men used to have their daily round over Bruntsfield Links, no one daring to dispute the right of the red coat and the gutta to undisturbed possession of the ground; and it is not saving too much to add that to these gentlemen Edinburgh golfers are really indebted for the Braids Course. They were members of the old Bruntsfield Club, which was founded 137 years ago, and by their enthusiasm they kept up the golfers' rights on the links. When the Town Council wished to discontinue the game thereon, it was found that they could only meet the golfers' claim by providing a new and better course. Hence the Braids. Sociality was the great feature of the old Bruntsfield Club, and, though the late Mr. Usher was rather of a shy and retiring disposition, he opened out in that inner circle of good fellows who used to spend the evening after play in the old two-roomed Clubhouse on the links, when joke and song and story abounded. The jokes were often practical and hard hitting, but woe to the member who dared to take offence. only remedy was to give back a Roland for an Oliver, or just to grin and bear and bide the time that was sure to come to pay the offender in kind

Mr. Andrew Usher was noted for his thoughtful consideration, and it may safely be said that he never made an enemy by word or action; and to the select circle of his friends he was true till death. Of these, such as R. Chambers, jun., David Croall, Charles Cowper, Melville Russel, George Ritchie, Daniel Smith, J. Williamson, and others, are now with him in "the silent land;" while such as T. S. Aitchison, J. Cunningham, W. R. Clapperton, William Croall, and William Paxton remain to lament his loss. Two stanzas of the old Club's song may be quoted:

Of all the goodly Clubs that play
The ancient game of Goff,
There are but few that can compare
With the one we're members of—
The good old Bruntsfield Club. my boys!
A genial crew I ween.

(Chorus.) For 'tis our delight of a day so bright
To play it o'er the green!

Long live the ancient Bruntsfield Club To wear its laurels fair; To dine and laugh and kindly chaft Our duffing friends so rare! A loyal lot are we, my boys! Now sing, God bless the Queen!

(Chorns.) For 'tis! &c.

Of this famous old Club, which has now, like the Burgess, found a "howff" at Barnton, Mr. Usher was in his day one of the best of the scratch players, and often won the Medal, as he did in the East Lothian Club, of which he was also a member, and of which his son-in-law, Mr. St. Clair Cunningham, is the Secretary. His portrait as a golfer a few years ago figured on the walls of the Royal Academy. It may also be added that his style was "a perfect picture" of what a golfer's style should be, resembling very much that of the famous Allan Robertson.

A GOLF HERETIC.

The first heresy I shall enunciate is that the object of the game of golf is to put the ball into the hole in fewer strokes than the adversary. Possibly to some this may not seem a heresy, and I never regarded it as such myself till a certain conversation I had with the Editor of this "Annual" when we were watching a big professional match. I then learnt that the true object of the game was "to play golf," and, according to his definition, that was to play each stroke as the ordinary book authority might say that it ought to be played. But I cannot say that his arguments seemed very convincing.

It was some years before the genuine pavilion cricketer could be got to admit that a pull from outside the off stump to long-on was to be called cricket, even though the stroke resulted in four or six runs. But I believe the majority of even the most crusted cricketers will now allow that the object of batting is in the main to make runs. But the golfing critic seems hardly yet to have realised the corresponding truth.

The professional match referred to was between Park and Taylor—the first half of a 72 hole match played over Musselburgh and Richmond links. This is not the place to discuss the advantage which Park's knowledge of Musselburgh gave him over his opponent. We have heard enough and to spare of that. Taylor, at any rate, was not afraid of it. But on that occasion Park showed his knowledge of the links by selecting the worst bunkers, the roughest ground, and the rankest grass to put his ball into, while Taylor was hardly ever in a hazard and rarely in a difficulty. And yet Park was four up on the 36 holes at Musselburgh. Of course Taylor ought to have won, for everyone said he played the better golf; but then that was upset by Park holing out in the smaller number of strokes.

To illustrate what happened, let me describe the play of three holes selected from different rounds. At the very start Park topped his drive, and had actually to play the two more before Taylor played his second. But that two more was a beauty, and Park almost won the hole in 4, halving it in 5, though Taylor had carried the "Graves" bunker with his second.

Again, playing the "Sea" hole (fourth), Taylor drove on to the edge of the green. Park put his drive into the awkward bunker just across the racecourse. He had to play out sideways and then play the two more. His third shot hit the pin, and lay a foot from the hole. His opponent failed to lay his long putt dead, and they halved in 4.

The third instance I take is the "Bathing Coach" (sixth). Taylor, as usual, drove a faultless ball. Park pulled his into the very bad ground to the left. Once again he played the two more, a long, straight cleek shot on to the green. For once in a way, Taylor's approach shot was not quite on the line, and just trickled into the little bunker by the side of the hole. He had to be strong in getting it out. His fourth was just not dead, and Park won the hole in 5.

It was at this point that the amiable Editor remarked to me, "Isn't it disgraceful, stuff like that winning a match?" I could only reply that he seemed to be getting the ball into the hole in fewer strokes than Taylor, and I always thought that was the important thing to do in a match of that sort. But he would not see that the power of recovery is the grandest part of golf, and he would only talk of some sort of adjectival luck, But I still believe I was right.

And that leads me on to my second heresy. How far is there luck in golf? I always assert that the only bad luck in golf is the lie. A man drives to what is recognised as the correct spot, and then finds his ball has discovered the only iron scrape or rabbit scrape to be found within a radius of lifty yards. If I am not interested in his defeat, I can fully sympathise with him; but I get fired of expressing my sympathy when he complains of the same thing more than twelve times in the round. At the same time I confess I am annoyed when I find my ball in the deepest hole in a bunker; yet the philosopher will tell you that it is only the natural thing you ought to expect.

But good luck in golf is almost limitless, though I think it is too often confounded with what is called a fluke. On this point, again, my friends and I seem to hold diverse views. Twice in my life I have dropped a goal in a football match when I never intended to do so; those, I admit, were both flukes. And people don't quarrel very much as to what is a fluke at billiards; though I often find my opponents slow to recognise either the morality or the genuineness of having a second string to one's bow. But when I am in a bunker, and carefully study the lie of the land, and take my niblick, and hit my ball with the exact strength, and in the exact direction I intend, and put it into the hole fifty yards away, while other people call it a fluke I am only grateful that my lucky star is for the moment in the ascendant.

It is an old story how A. M. Ross, when playing one day in a Burgess competition, holed Linkfield hole at Musselburgh each round in 3. But the story will bear repetition. I have heard it told by a spectator, and also by himself. "I was walking along the road," said the one. "when I saw a crowd on the links, and went to see what was on. I saw Ross take an iron approach shot to 'Linkfield' from about 120 yards off, and hole it out. An hour later I was walking back again, and I saw the crowd at the same place, so I went to see how he was getting on. He was just taking an iron shot from what seemed to me exactly the same place as before, and it went into the hole again. And those were the only two strokes I saw played that day." Mr. Ross's account was to the following effect: "I believe it was just 125 yards from the hole, a good iron shot distance, when I holed it. At 'Forman's' a man came up to me and said he heard 1 had holed 'Linkfield' in 3, but he didn't believe it. 'All right. then; come with me next round, and see me do it again.' And he came and saw me do it again, and the second time I played the shot it couldn't have been more than a foot away from the first place." Now, I have heard people say, "awful fluke," to that, and when I argue that at any rate the second one could not be called a fluke, for he knew by experience exactly how to play the shot, they say the second was a bigger fluke than the first.

It is at this point in the argument that I generally tell my tall golfing story. Every man has a tale of some famous stroke he has made, and this is mine. It was in a foursome on Musselburgh links, and we were playing the reverse round up the race-course. Our opponents were on the green in two; we were in the ditch by the roadside in the same number. It was impossible to play at the hole, so I said the only way of saving the hole was to cannon off the telegraph post, which was straight in front. (In those days they were round, and along the edge of the ditch.) I played; I hit the post, and the ball lay about 18 inches from the hole, which we halved in 4. I have never yet found anyone who would both believe me, and agree that it was not a fluke.

And now I am going to propound another heresy, which I do with fear and trembling, and with the knowledge that I must not mention the name of any links of which I may happen to be thinking. If I did, and if anyone reads what I write, I should have a wasp's nest about my ears, for not only am I a heretic in this, but worse still, I am out of the fashion.

Of some links we are told, with an air of either proud superiority or reverential awe, that as long as a player keeps on the line, it is impossible to get a bad lie. Now, I maintain that if you wish to test first-class golf, that is not the sort of links to go to. They are very nice for the second class amateur, and they suit the style of the machine-like professional; but for my part, I like to see a first-class player getting out of a difficulty; and I consider the recovery to be as good a test of golf as anything else. But then they have got to get into a difficulty first of all. Hence my theory that for really first-class matches the links should offer many chances even to the really good golfer of getting into hazards, and the lies should not be immaculate. The difference between a good player and an indifferent one is in no point more clearly marked than in getting the ball away from a bad lie.

Of course, all this sounds utterly outrageous. But I appeal to those who saw Mr. F. G. Tait win the Amateur Champion-ship, and ask them if they did not get more pleasure out of his wonderful recoveries than out of the correct, but unsuccessful, play of some of his opponents. He was modest enough to say that he did not deserve to win, because more than one of those he met had played better golf than he did. But none of the others showed the same mastery of the game and the same marvellous power of atoning for a mistake. And in this lies the secret of golf as played over the old-fashioned links; and in this

the Scottish-taught player has so far shown himself the superior. It is easy to reply that this is because the new race of professionals from the South do not make mistakes; and on the whole I think they make fewer than the Northerners do. But my sympathies have never been with those who never commit a sin; while I have a most hearty and sincere admiration for those who can make a real atonement for whatever sins they do commit.

If I have not already enraged my readers too much, I should like, in conclusion, to ask a question. Why is applause at a golf match considered improper? It is the only outdoor game I know of where this is the case. I am told it is because it puts the players off. But I have never heard that a shout of "well fielded" disconcerted the batsman. I am told a Musselburgh crowd has a bad name. Some people say a Surrey crowd is not always complimentary; but no one ever yet said that a crowd at the Oval could not appreciate good cricket, or a crowd on Musselburgh links appreciate good golf. What would an Edinburgh crowd have thought if in an International football match they had not been allowed to shout with delight over one of Maclagan's famous bits of tackling. If it was suggested that it put the player off, the natural reply would have been that Maelagan's tackling would put him off a great deal more. And so at golf. If the crowd applauds when a man holes a long putt, it does not put the opponent off nearly so much as the annovance caused by the other man's success, and the knowledge that he will probably not hole the like. If a golfer is "put off" by applause he had better not try to play public matches, for he is not fit for the business, any more than a bowler is who cannot bowl because the spectators cheer a cut for four.

Whatever may be thought of my other points, this last, at any rate, is not heresy. And if golf is ever to take its place as a first class game, the players must expect to be treated by spectators just as in other first class games. Their merits will be appreciated to the full; and I really believe their mistakes will find more sympathy than those of a cricketer at the Oval, or of a football player at Tynecastle.

THE LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1898.

From a playing point of view, at all events, the choice of Great Yarmouth as the venue for the Sixth Ladies' Championship was not a happy one. The links lie close to the sea, and in windy weather blown sand throughout the round is the rule. nately, such were the conditions under which the Championship was decided last May, and it was, at times, pathetic to see the attempts made to get away balls lying on these irritating sandy patches. Despite this drawback, several of the fair competitors disclosed form of a high standard, but none more so than the ultimate winner, Miss Lena Thomson, who drove a good ball, and approached and putted in deadly fashion. As a previous finalist, her nerve stood her in good stead when the final tie came to be played. Considerable disappointment was evinced in the non-appearance of Miss E. C. Orr and her sister, to defend the honours they so deservedly won at Gullane in 1897, but we understand their absence was unavoidable. Commencing on Tuesday, May 17, play terminated on the following Friday, and on the last three days a strong and bitterly cold "nor'seaster" was in evidence, to upset even the nicest of calculations. The opening afternoon was devoted to the first round of thirteen ties, the other fifty-one entrants being allotted byes. The feature of the round was a determined tussle between Miss Pearson, the enthusiastic Secretary of the Ladies Union, and Miss Armstrong, a Mitcham player, with an excellent long game at her command. Miss Pearson led by a hole at the turn, but the game was squared at the thirteenth, and the remaining holes being halved, they had to go out a hole, when Miss Pearson proved the winner by a capital bit of holing out. On Wednesday the second and third rounds were down for discussion. In the former several of the ties proved exciting to a degree. Miss C. Morgan, somewhat unexpectedly led Mrs. Richardson for the greater part of the way, but the Hoylake lady wore her down and had only to halve the eighteenth hole to win. She lost it, but

put the issue out of doubt at the first hole out. Immediately behind them. Miss Moeller, the Yorkshire Champion, had an equally hard fight before she beat Miss A. Roberts, of Mid-Surrey and Carnoustie renown. Curiously, their tie ended at the nineteenth hole also. Almost as close was the match between Miss Pearson and Miss B. Thompson, but the latter had to succumb on the home green in virtue of a good putt for a 3 by the Secretary. The surprise of the round was the clever defeat of Miss Bence at the hands of Miss Pratt, a local player In the third round all the cracks, save Miss Lena Thomson, won their heats with ease; but she had to play three extra holes ere she accounted for Mrs. Stubbs, who went out brilliantly in 39. but afterwards found the Champion's steadiness too much for her. A promising Devonshire player in the Hon. Lois Yarde Buller had also her work cut out to defeat Miss Smith, from the neighbouring County of Cornwall, at the twentieth hole. The fourth round on Thursday morning proved intensely interesting. The outstanding tie was that between these old opponents Miss Pascoe and Miss Pearson, and, for the second successive year, victory inclined to the latter at the twentieth hole; but, in justice to Miss Pascoe, it may be said that she had the worst of the Miss Pearson stood three up at the turn, but, winning the next four holes, the ex-Champion secured the lead. Two halves followed, but then Miss Pascoe added another hole to her credit. Nothing daunted, Miss Pearson ran off with the seventeenth and eighteenth holes, and, on going out again, won as above stated. Miss Moeller won comfortably from Mrs. Richardson, after standing three down at one stage; but, to the general amazement, the 1897 Bronze Medallists had to fall out before the Hon. Lois Yarde Buller and Miss Stringer. In the afternoon round Miss Lena Thomson and Miss Barwell had little difficulty in retaining their places, and Miss Dod won more easily than expected from Miss Moeller. Miss Pearson, however, had once more to undergo the ordeal of an exciting match, and this time she proved insuccessful against Miss E. Nevile at the nineteenth hole. The latter must be congratulated on a plucky performance, for she had to secure four successive holes to win. On Friday the penultimate and final ties engaged attention. Miss Thomson qualified for the final somewhat easily at the expense of Miss Barwell, but Miss E. Nevile and Miss Dod proved splendidly

matched. The Worcestershire lady led by a hole at the turn, but it was all to play for with two to go. The seventeenth fell to Miss Nevile, and a half of the home hole was then all she required, and she got it. The final fell far short of expectation, Miss Thomson leading from start to finish and winning by six up and five to play. Needless to say she was heartily congratulated on her success. Although now resident in London the Champion is of Scotch parentage, and learned the game at North Berwick. Since her victory at Yarmouth she has received the heartiest congratulations from the world of golf on her marriage to Mr. E. Towne, himself an ardent golfer. Details:

THE IRISH LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1898.

The links of the Malone Golf Club, at Malone, near Belfast, were last year selected by the Irish Ladies' Golf Union as the venue for the fifth annual Championship. Play was commenced on Tuesday, April 19, by a preliminary stroke competition for handsome prizes presented by the Malone Golf Club. The winners were: First, Miss May Hezlet, 96

(scratch); second, Miss Gregg, 99 (scratch).

The entries for the Championship numbered forty-eight, an increase of thirteen from the previous year. In the first round there were several well fought matches. Miss N. Graham had to play two extra holes with Mrs. T. McMullan before she was declared winner, Miss F. Carr only beat Miss P. Knox at the nineteenth hole, and Miss Walker-Leigh also won at the nineteenth hole, with Miss Pigot. In the third round there was a grand match between Miss N. Graham (the former Champion) and Miss Magill, who was just one up at the lifteenth hole: the next three were halved, which left Miss Magill the winner by a narrow margin. Miss Walker-Leigh played a splendid game against Miss Gregg in the semi-final; but the latter's experience told in the end, and Miss Walker-Leigh was beaten by a hole. It was in the final round that Miss May Hezlet had her first really hard match, all her others being easy wins, and she was only beaten by Miss Magill on the last green, after the closest and most exciting match that has ever been witnessed since the Championship was instituted. The chief characteristic of Miss Hezlet's play was her very accurate putting, and it was in driving that her opponent had the advantage over her. Miss Magill's victory was well deserved, as it was the second time she has been in the final for the Championship. The competition, which concluded on April 22, was attended by very fine weather, and all the

THE GOLF COURSES OF CALCUTTA

CALCUTTA is fortunate in possessing two golf courses, one in the heart of the city and the other at Tollygunge within easy access. It is over these courses that the Amateur Championship of India and the East is held annually, consequently it may prove interesting to append a description of them which appeared recently in "The Pioneer."

Tollygunge is a sort of Hurlingham or Ranelagh, about four miles from the centre of Calcutta. It has a very fine Clubhouse, a race course, archery ground, pigeon shooting. &c., besides a most excellent golf course of nine holes. You drive out there in a ghari through a series of evil-smelling bustis, and suddenly, as by the stroke of a magician's wand, the bustis cease, you turn in at a gate, and find yourself in a most beautiful park-like enclosure of great extent, and covered with turf and fringed with fine trees. Once inside the gate you see no more of the squalid surroundings, and might, for purity of air and beauty of land-scape, be a hundred miles from Calcutta.

The first tee is close to the Clubbouse, and a sand bunker with a high bank on the far side has to be negotiated. Out of consideration for stiff joints and shaky nerves (at the first shot of a big event) the tee for the Championship is the forward one (there are forward and back tees at each hole, and for the Championship all the latter are used except at the first hole). The bunker being carried, no further dangers present themselves, a cleek shot takes one up to the hole, and a 4 should be secured with ordinary back.

At the second hole the tee shot must be long and straight, otherwise it will be found that a big tree bars the course to the right and a great tank confronts one to the left—but if the tee shot be a good one and the lie fair (the lies at Tollygunge are almost all good, and that is one of its chief attractions) the second shot is not very difficult. Then follows an approach on to a fine green, and if a a results one is well pleased. In short,

the second hole is as good and sporting a hole as one would wish to see anywhere.

The tee for the third hole is on the edge of a vast tank, which does not face one squarely but obliquely, and what with this fact and the formidable character of the tank itself (though the carry is really nothing for a well hit ball), nerves are apt to come into play at this tee, and many a ball finds its way to the bottom (it is reported that a harvest of 150 balls resulted lately when the tank was drained). Failure to carry the tank means teeing a second ball with loss of stroke and distance, but if the tank be carried with a good shot, a very long second will get home, and a 4 may result, but a 5 is good enough.

The fourth is the long hole—over 500 yards in length—with a small tank in front of the tee, a large bunker guarding the hole, and various other troubles to right and left. This hole is rather a slogging one, and none but long drivers can hope to get home in three, and Bogey may be put down at 6.

Going to No. 5, a tank will catch a ball drawn off the tee, and a bunker further on will trap anything else but a good shot. The second shot has to carry another bunker and tank, and a drawn one will finish up in a belt of trees—but two good straight ones will land one on the green and a + may be hoped for.

From the next tee a bunker catches a topped ball, and nothing but a long straight tee shot will here serve, otherwise the second shot will not carry a large tank that bars the way; but two fine shots will take one to the neighbourhood of the green. This is a very sporting hole.

The tee shot at the next (seventh) also requires to be a very good one. On the left are bushes, on the right an enclosure carrying a penalty of stroke and distance—too severe a penalty), and in the centre a steeplechase jump. Again a long shot may reach a road. This is a blot on the hole, as only a really good shot can reach it—for this reason the forward tee seems the better at this hole—but if one escapes all these dangers and lies near the road, then follows a most sporting full shot home, over a tank at the end, and landing on an ideal green of beautiful turf and surrounded on all sides with more or less of difficulties. The hole altogether (barring the road) is a beauty.

From the next tee one must keep very straight, for there is

trouble to right and left. Also one must not drive too long a shot, for a matter of 200 yards off there is a deep nullah. This nullah forms a splendid natural hazard to be negotiated by the second shot, and a fine approach over it lands one on the green; but a topped one is done for, and so is a booked one. This is an ideal short hole.

The tee shot to the ninth or last hole must not be topped or foozled, for very bad country faces one, and the race course, with two rows of railings beyond, and bad trouble to the right or left, but a perfect shot will land one on the green, and a 3 may be counted on.

So finishes one of the most sporting inland courses that one could see anywhere, and which it is the greatest treat to play over. There is not a bad hole in the round, the lies through the green are excellent, and the putting greens nearly as good as one could wish—a little hairy in places, but no doubt improving daily. Altogether a more enjoyable day's golfing than at Tollygunge could not be wished for, at least in India, and the Calcutta golfers are to be congratulated on having such a course. The part of the round is 40, and the record 39, by Mr. J. S. Smith during the Championship.

The Calcutta course has often been described, so a brief notice of it will suffice. There are two rounds—an old and a new—each of nine holes, on the Maidan. The hazards are tanks and trees—the latter too numerous and objectionable in every way. The course is otherwise rather tame, and the lies bad—hoof marks of eattle baked in sun but the putting greens are excellent. Another drawback is the presence of herds of cattle, but only in the forenoon, and also crowds of natives crossing the course at all points; but on the whole the course is not bad, considering it is in the centre of Calcutta. Anything under 90 for the eighteen holes is satisfactory. Visitors, alike at Calcutta and Tollygunge, are assured of a hearty welcome.

THE OLD LUFFNESS CLUB.

It is quite a rare event, when one hears of new courses being opened on every hand, to hear of an old course being abandoned -so rare that it may be chronicled as something quite notable. Many must think with regret that the old Luffness Club has bid farewell to its old course and Clubhouse, and found fresh fields and a new Clubhouse at Craigielaw, on the estate of the Earl of Wemyss. The course was laid out by old Tom Morris in 1867, and it was a great favourite with many players, who found it a good test of the game, and a capital place for enjoying a good match in peace and quietness. Differences between the neighbouring proprietors led to the Club's receiving notice to ouit, and, while the loss is irreparable, it may be slight consolation to know that many of the old holes will be used up in the new relief course at Gullane, and in the course of the New Luffness Club. We give a view of the interesting old Clubhouse now vacated, with some Bass Rock players in front, from a photograph by Hutchison, North Berwick, competition of East Lothian, that for the County Cup, was annually held over the old course, and for many years the trophy was monopolised by the Bass Rock Team. Last year it was captured by the New Luffness representatives, Messrs, A. M. Ross, T. T. Grav, F. G. Tait, and W. T. Armour. Lord Wemyss formally opened the Craigielaw course on November 28th.

THE AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1898.

When Mr. F. G. Tait won his first Championship at Sandwich in 1896, his performance was justly regarded as coming as near "perfection's sacred heights" as was possible. Such high terms of praise, however, cannot be accorded to his play at Hoylake last May. It was, in the fifth and sixth rounds at all events, far below his average, but, when all seemed against him, he electrified the spectators by his wonderful recoveries, and pulled the issues literally out of the fire. On the other hand, his defeat of Mr. H. H. Hilton in the third round, and his victory over Mr. Mure Fergusson in the final, showed him at his best, and he must be heartily congratulated on regaining the laurels that he lost at Muirfield in 1897. Commencing on Tuesday, May 24th, the competition terminated on the following Friday, and if at times the weather was rather too hot to be pleasant, the conditions on the whole were excellent. An entry list of seventyseven had been secured, but on the eye of the competition Mr. Franklin Ross, of the London Civil Service and Watsonian Clubs, died suddenly, and, of course, his brother, Mr. G. A. Ross, withdrew his name. The veteran Mr. A. M. Ross, who had caught a chill on the Saturday, also scratched, as did Dr-L. R. Gray, of Musselburgh, so that the field was reduced to seventy-three. No big surprises were sprung in the first round, which consisted of twelve ties; but the defeat of Mr. J. B. Pease, the Alumouth crack, at the hands of Mr. R. H. Dun. was searcely anticipated. The latter's short game, however, proved too deadly. In the second round he again distinguished himself against such a formidable opponent as Mr. H. H. Hilton, being only one down at the turn. Thereafter Mr. Hilton disclosed exceptional form, coming home in 34, and winning three holes from home. In this round Mr. W. B. Taylor, the Irish Champion, was severely drubbed by Mr. L. Auchterlonie. but the other cracks proved successful, albeit Mr. G. Hillyards

of Lawn Tennis fame, and Mr. J. Paterson, the Scotch crosscountry Champion, gave Messrs. Hutchinson and Ball more trouble than expected. On Wednesday morning Messrs, L. Auchterlonie and N. Macbeth, the vouthful St. Annes' crack. who led off the third round, had a tremendous tussle, which had to be prolonged to the twentieth hole ere the St. Andrews man pulled through after an uphill game, he having been three down at the turn. In other three ties extra holes had also to be played. Against Mr. Hutchings, Mr. Tait was one up at the turn, and this was also the position six holes later. A very long putt gave Mr. Hutchings the sixteenth, and two halves ended the round all square. One "extra" was sufficient, Mr. Tait laying his second on the green and holing out nicely in 4. Mr. Ball had to go a hole further before he shook off Mr. W. E. Fairlie. Driving to the seventeenth, the latter was two up, and ought to have won on that green, but a putt of less than a yard proved too much for him. With all depending on the second shot to the home hole, Mr. Ball risked the carry successfully, and halved the match. The first hole out looked like settling matters in Mr. Ball's favour, when Mr. Fairlie got a long putt down for the half; but he played the next badly, and Mr. Ball won. Still more prolonged was the encounter between Mr. Farrar and Mr. Darwin, the former winning at the twenty-fourth hole. Mr. Hilton recorded a splendid round of 74 against Mr. C. F. Whigham, and, aided by a couple of stimies, Mr. Fergusson beat Mr. T. T. Gray by two holes, the latter's driving being much admired. The event of the second afternoon was the meeting of Messrs, Tait and Hilton in the fourth round. A great game was looked for, but Mr. Hilton proved completely off colour, and suffered a heavy defeat, never, in fact, winning a hole a unique experience for him. At the "Briars" Mr. Tait ran down a putt of about 40 yards. He turned in 10, and got the next four holes in an average of 1's good, steady golf. Meanwhile Mr. Graham had given Mr. Auchterlonie an easy beating, but Mr. Hutchinson and Mr. Robb were battling hard in the rear. They were all square at the fifteenth, where the ex-Champion knocked in his opponent's ball, and the position was not altered a hole later, Mr. Robb securing a half in virtue of a fine recovery from the bunker. On the seventeenth green he ran down a four yards putt for the hole, and, winning

the home hole also, qualified for the fifth round. The other ties call for no comment. The winners were Messrs, W. K. Whigham, J. L. Low, S. H. Fry, Fergusson, and Ball. The most attractive matches on Thursday forenoon were those between Mr. Tait and Mr. Graham and Mr. Ball and Mr. Robb. In the first mentioned, both played slackly on the greens, but more particularly Mr. Graham. With eight to go he led by a hole, but, missing putts of less than a yard at the three succeeding holes, he allowed his rival to lead by A long putt gave Mr. Tait the fourteenth hole also, but securing the fifteenth and seventeenth holes, and halving the sixteenth, Mr. Graham carried the game to the home hole. Here he had a very short putt for the hole, but missed it. and Mr. Tait was hailed victor by a hole. On the other hand, Mr. Robb and Mr. Ball played grand golf. Reaching the turn in 38, the former had the useful lead of two, and he eventually won by two up and one to play. Mr. Fergusson led nearly all the way against Mr. Fry, and won comfortably: but Mr. Low had a tough nut to crack in Mr. Whigham, He was two down at the turn, but turned the tables by pocketing the next four, an advantage he retained. The "semi-finals" proved intensely exciting, albeit the golf displayed by Mr. Tait and Mr. Low was extremely erratic. The former actually required 48 to reach the turn, and yet was only one down. Coming home the play was little better At the fifteenth Mr. Low was still leading, and the aspect was gloomy for Mr. Tait when his drive to the sixteenth was trapped. He got out of the hazard with difficulty, and then, risking everything, carried the turf dykes at the corner of the field, and the bunkers right on to the green, a feat which deservedly secured him a half. He squared the match on the next green, and halved the home hole in 5, Mr. Low's putt for the hole having lipped it. Out again they had to go, a half in 5 starting the "extras." Mr. Tait overshot the second green with his approach, but snatched a hard half with a five yards putt. To the third hole he drove out of bounds, but playing the odds to Mr. Low, who was on the green in 3, he swiped within holing distance, and, getting down his putt, snapped another half. On the fourth green he holed a two yards' putt for a 4, and with it secured his cutree into the final. Between

the other couple play was not nearly so exciting, yet it was always interesting. Mr. Robb was one up with two to go, but both holes fell to Mr. Fergusson, who actually led for the first. but at the most opportune time. On Friday the play in the final was excellent. To the turn in the first round Mr. Fergusson contested every inch of ground, and was then only one down; but coming home he dropped other two holes, and so entered on the afternoon round three down. For eight holes he made a gallant effort to retrieve his position, but in face of Mr. Tait's fine play the task proved beyond him. Then Mr. Tait went right away, and won his second Championship by seven up and five to play. His victory was extremely popular, but on going up to receive the Cup from Mr. Dun, Captain of the "Royal Liverpool," he, with characteristic modesty, assured the spectators that he had not deserved his success. The arrangements for the competition were quite up to Hoylake standard, and reflected great credit on the Secretary, Mr. W. Ryder Richardson. Subjoined are details:

The conditions which regulate the entrance of players in the Amateur Championship are as follows:

(a) The competition shall be open to all amateur golfers, members

of any Golf Club.

(b) An amateur golfer shall be a golfer who has never made for sale, golf clubs, balls, or any other article connected with the game, who has never carried clubs for hire after attaining the age of fifteen years, and who has not carried clubs for hire at any time within six years of the date on which the competition begins in each year; who has never received any consideration for playing in a match, or for giving less ons in the game, and who for a period of five years prior to the 1st September, 1886, has never received a money prize in any open competition.

(c) Competitors shall enter for the competition through the Secretaries of their respective Clubs, who in sending in the names shall be held to certify that the players are bond fide amateur golfers in

terms of the foregoing definitions.

Notwithstanding the provision in Clause c, all entries shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of the Club on whose

green the competition is held.

This year's Championship falls to be held at Prestwick on May 23rd and the three succeeding days; and for the next four years the venue will be: 1900, Sandwich; 1901, St. Andrews; 1902, Hoylake; 1903, Muirfield.

MR. F. G. TAIT, CHAMPION AMATEUR GOLFER, 1898.

AFTER the lapse of only a year, Mr. Tait's portrait re-appears in THE ANNUAL as that of the leading amateur player of the day. How he regained his laurels is told in the immediately preceding pages; but between his 1897 victory and the present time he has added several minor roses to his golfing chaplet. These include the Silver Cross, Club Gold and George Glennie Medals of the "Royal and Ancient" for 1897; the Club Gold Medal of the same Club for 1898; the Leconfield Medal for 1897 and the Hope Medal for 1898, at New Luffness; and the St. George's Grand Challenge Cup (open), at Sandwich, in 1898. In addition, he finished third in the Open Championship at Hoylake in 1897, and fifth last year at Prestwick. Quite recently, too, he, in a private match over Muirfield, got round in 73, or only a stroke in excess of Herd's marvellous record in the 1896 Championship. Let these deeds speak for themselves. 


TAIN,-THE HOME HOLE FROM THE TER.

TAIN GOLF LINKS.

SITUATED on the southern shore of the Dornoch Firth, almost due south of Dornoch, the Burgh of Tain has direct railway communication with both north and south, the station being an important one on the Highland Railway. It is only forty-four miles north of Inverness, and is one of the driest and healthiest holiday resorts in the Highlands. In and around Tain are several objects of interest. Near the links stands the chapel of St. Duthus, a picturesque ruin, which has withstood the storms of nearly nine centuries; and in the town itself can be seen the walls of another chapel, said to be of Culdee origin, on the site of which was later founded the Collegiate Church of Tain, restored of recent years, and now known as the Memorial Chapel of St. Duthus. The ruins of Fearn Abbey, five miles distant, are also worth a visit.

The links, which lie about three-quarters of a mile east of the town, and extend to over three and a quarter miles, were described at considerable length in the article "Tain and its Golf Course," which appeared in Vol. IX. of The Annual. The round consists of eighteen holes, and simply bristles with hazards in the shape of the river of Tain, whins, broom, rushes, bents, ditches, and bunkers. The holes vary in length from about 140 to 530 yards, and, although the strict par of the round is 75, 83 or thereabouts represents first class play. For variety of play we know of no better course, and as the putting greens are for the most part of excellent quality, visitors to Tain will be loth to leave.

There is ample hotel and other accommodation, and the members of the St. Duthus Golf Club are ever ready to extend a right hearty welcome to all golfers. Our illustrations show fairly well the characteristics of the course. St. Duthus members are proud of their "Home" hole. Thrice does the sinuous stream come into calculations, and there is no dodging it. The hole is indeed a beau ideal one, a terror to the "topper" and "slicer."

THE GOLFING CHAMPIONSHIP, 1898.

If the samples of weather served out north of the Tweed in the fore part of June had been of the most varied and generally disagreeable character, the Clerk of the Weather, as if to atone, turned on a lovely day on Wednesday, June 8th, when the first two rounds in the great golfing event of the year were decided at Prestwick. The prospect from the Prestwick links has often been talked of, but, with the sun shining from a cloudless sky and glinting on the blue and peaceful waters of the Firth of Clyde, even the most rabid golfer had to spare a glance now and again seaward. A peculiar interest was lent to the play, as, under the new conditions, anyone twenty strokes behind the leader at the close of the day had compulsorily to retire, with an exception in favour of professionals to the number of thirty-two. Thus everyone was placed on his mettle from the start. Mr. H. H. Hilton, as in duty bound, was there to defend the title he had so gallantly won at Hoylake the previous summer, but from the seventy-five by whom he was opposed were awanting such fine players as David Brown, T. Vardon, and A. Toogood among the professionals, and Messrs, J. Ball, J. E. Laidlay, and J. Robb. In some overnight betting Park, Vardon, Herd, Braid, Kirkealdy, and Messrs. Hilton and Tait were backed against the field, and the backer assuredly had the best of the deal. A start was made at ten o'clock, but with such a large field the last comple did not hole out until eight o'clock in the evening. Still, nobody grumbled, for with conditions practically perfect, the standard of play was marvellously good. Curiously enough, Messrs. Tait and Hilton followed one another, and of the fancied men it fell to them to set the task for the others. To the turn both played finely, Mr. Tait reaching it in 36, against his rival's 37. Coming home, however, the Amateur Champion played slackly, strokes here and there being dropped on the greens, while he was bunkered with his second

to the seventeenth. He took two strokes to get out, and required three more to hole; consequently, a 7 disfigured his card, and his round was 81. Mr. Hilton, on the other hand, played his characteristic steady game, and, without the slightest luck, registered a brilliant 76; in fact, at least three putts rung the tin, but refused to go down. The next good score handed in was a 78, by J. H. Taylor-37 out and 41 in. As usual, his iron play was perfect, and in the other departments few mistakes were made. Auchterlonie, who won the Championship when Prestwick was last visited, failed to do himself justice with 85, but another ex-Champion in Fernie kept himself in the running with 79, as also did D. Herd. Meantime. Park had been playing in irreproachable fashion before the lion's share of the spectators. Not the semblance of a mistake did he make till the fourteenth hole. Here he had a heavy lie off a hooked drive, and lost a stroke in consequence. Again, going to the seventeenth, he spared his second with his cleek, was bunkered badly, and only got clear with the loss of two strokes. Still, he tied for leading place at 76 with Mr. Hilton. A few couples behind him the youthful Silloth professional, Renouf, played splendidly. Out in 38, he came home in 39, and tied with J. Kinnell for third place thus far at 77. Vardon, who started last of all, scarcely attracted so much attention as he ought. He began badly with a 6, his cleek drive from the tee going out of bounds; but thereafter he played quite up to his reputation, his eard being a 79-38 out and 41 in, 80's and 81's were plentiful as blackberries, among the former, being Douglas McEwan, R. Simpson, Braid, D. Kinnell, and A. Herd, who finished badly after a brilliant half round in 36, and among the latter Neaves, Mr. Tait, Butel, A. Kirkealdy, Paxton, and Kay.

After luncheon Mr. Tait set a capital round of 77 for the field, 38 out and 39 in; but Mr. Hilton dropped five strokes from his morning round, solely owing to one bad hole, the "Himalayas Out," where he hooked his drive into the sand and bents, and was punished so badly that he took five shots to get clear. Nothing disconcerted, he reached the turn in 41 after all, and coming home in 40 with five 4's to wind up with, headed Mr. Tait on the first moiety by a stroke. Taylor practically repeated his morning round. Out in 36, he came back in 42,

and so settled himself in premier position a stroke in front of Mr. Hilton. Park again played brilliantly. With a half-got cleek shot to the eighth he with difficulty cleared the bunker guarding the green, but although he dropped a shot thereby, his outward half was 35. At the fourteenth, too, he was a turn short with his crucial putt, and a 5 was registered against him in place of a 4. These were his only slips, and his round of 75 lifted him easily into Taylor's place as leader. Renouf again played finely, and drew level with Taylor, and an excellent 77 by D. Kinnell considerably bettered his prospects. his inward half in 37 being quite a feat. His brother had a capital chance of emulating him, but he dropped five strokes on the last three holes, his round being 81. A 79 by A. Herd (37 out and 42 in) kept him well in front, but it was left to Vardon to make the most vigorous challenge on Park's position. He began none too well, missing a shortish putt on the first green, and slicing his iron pitch to the second hole into the burn, with consequent loss of a stroke. His cleek shot to the "Railway" was likewise topped, but from this point to the close, his play was Like the younger Kinnell he did the second and longer half in 37, and finished like Park in 75

The weather on Thursday was again of the most delightful description, if, perhaps, a trifle hot; but a refreshing breeze blew from off the sea. Those left in the running from the previous day were Park, 151; Vardon, 154; J. H. Taylor and Renouf, 156; Mr. Hilton and D. Kinnell, 157; Mr. Tait and J. Kinnell, 158; and A. Herd, 159. The only prospect for such good players as Braid, A. Kirkealdy, A. Simpson, Fernie, and Sayers was that they might, by improved play, win one of the minor prizes, while Auchterlonie, who had won when the Championship was last played at Prestwick, had fallen out altogether by compulsion. Unfortunately, Douglas McEwan, who had secured a place in the final stage, was too indisposed to play, and R. Simpson partnered Vardon in his stead, this being the order of despatch:

Vardon of the cracks set the pace in fine style. After taking the two opening holes in par scores, he got a ten yards putt down for a 4 at the "Cardinal," although his ball was lying awkwardly close to the dyke, and a steady 4 followed. Then to the "Himalayas" he topped his cleek shot, and took two to extricate himself; but by holing a longish putt he got a 5. With faultless play thereafter he reached the turn in 36. Two long swipes enabled him to carry hole high at the tenth, and another ten yard putt was sent nicely down for a 3. This was, indeed, great work; but, as if to show that even a top sawyer can make bad mistakes, he topped his drive to the "Himalayas In." He lay awkwardly in sand, but got out to the grass short of the burn, from whence a great brassy shot carried him to the edge of the green, and he holed in 5 after all. Steadily he proceeded thereafter until the fifteenth. Here he took his cleek for safety, but, with a heavy lie, his second was bunkered, and short with his approach afterwards, the hole-a 4 according to parcost him 7. Again at the last but one his ball halted on the lip of the hole for a 4, but with a brilliant 3 he finished the round in 77. Immediately behind him came Park, whose opening was far from auspicious, his approach to the first green being badly bunkered, and down a 6 had perforce to go. At the "Cardinal" also he was weak with his pitch, and dropped another stroke in consequence. Thus it was that Vardon had wiped out his deficit at the turn. To the tenth Park required 6, and he missed a very short putt at the "Alps." However, he had no very bad hole, like Vardon, coming in, and his round of 78 still left him two strokes in front. Of the other likely men Mr. Hilton and Taylor had somewhat similar cards. Off the tee and through the green their play left nothing to be desired, but several easy putts were missed. In fact, the latter failed at the tenth, and again at the fifteenth, to hole putts of little more than a foot. Yet they finished in 77. Mr. Tait played a brilliant round of 75, reaching the turn in 36, and coming home in 39. Had he

not got a bad lie to the ninth he would have been a stroke less. With scores of 77 and 78 David and James Kinnell kept themselves to the fore, but Renouf fell off slightly, and Herd failed utterly to do himself justice. Kay, Fernie, and White all improved their positions in virtue of excellent 77's, as did Sayers, whose round was 79. On the other hand, Braid and A. Kirkcaldy were distinctly disappointing, with returns of 84 and 86 respectively. With a round to go, the positions were: Park, 229; Vardon, 231; Mr. Tait and Taylor, 233; Mr. Hilton, 234; the brothers Kinnell, 236; and Renouf, 237; and to these players the attention of the spectators was now confined.

Vardon again started brilliantly, his only mistake to the turn being his running of his approach putt out of holing at the eighth. He had a very fine 3 to the fourteenth, at which point he and Park were level on scores, as indeed they had been at the seventh. In fact, it was the close tussle between the pair that lent the necessary spice of excitement to the final round. To the "Alps" Vardon was left with an awkward approach, but he played it faultlessly, and carried the formidable bluff and bunker beyond, and with an eight feet putt for a 3 on the home green, he registered a 76, making his aggregate the very fine one of 307. To the first hole Park repeated his mistake of the morning. Indeed, curiously enough his first six holes were practically identical with his earlier ones. At the turn he led Vardon by one, but, trapped from the tee to the tenth, he dropped a stroke behind. A grand pitch to the "Dyke" and an excellent putt saw him draw level, and he led by a stroke at the succeeding hole, which he had finely in 4. At the fourteenth, however, honours were once more easy, and this still remained the position when Park drove his last tee shot. He reached the green, and when he laid his long putt within four feet of the hole a tie seemed inevitable. But for once in a way Park missed the easy putt, and Vardon was directly congratulated on winning his second Championship, for news had come in from the rear that his position was impregnable unless something bordering on the miraculous were accomplished by Mr. Hilton, who by magnificent play had reached the turn in 35. The ex-Champion lost a shot at the sixteenth, but after being in the rough beyond the seventeenth green, he yet holed

in 4. He was left with a 2 to tie with Vardon at this juncture, but, requiring a 4, he was relegated to third place, a stroke behind Park. On the other hand, Mr. Tait deteriorated considerably, an 8 to the "Cardinal" handicapping him at the very outset, and his round of 82 swelled his aggregate to 315. Taylor played a steady round of 79, and his aggregate of 312 won him third prize. Braid at last gave a taste of his true quality with a brilliant 75, as did A. Kirkcaldy with 77; but the efforts came too late. D. Kinnell registered an 80, and with 316 won fourth prize by two strokes over Fernie, who led J. Hunter, the local professional, by one, both having finished well with a 77. J. Kinnell's place in the prize list seemed assured until he fell foul of the "Cardinal" approaching the sixteenth hole, and, with heavy punishment meted out in the shape of a 9, his chance was extinguished.

In closing, it may be said that Vardon's second win was immensely popular, his unassuming demeanour and his imperturbability when in difficulties having won him the sympathies of the onlookers. We cannot call to mind a Championship in which the play reached such a high standard of excellence, and we have only to point out, to clinch the statement, that Auchterlonie's winning aggregate over the same course in 1893 was 322 as against Vardon's 307.

With the presentation of the prizes in the Clubhouse a very successful meeting terminated, and in this connection Mr. Harry Hart, Hon. Secretary of the Prestwick G.C., and his Committee have to be congratulated on the excellence of their management.

HARRY VARDON.

CHAMPION GOLFER, 1898.

So fully did we sketch Vardon's career in The Annual for 1896-7 that it would be wearisome to repeat it. Let us therefore lead up shortly from that time to his phenomenal campaign of 1898.

Owing almost entirely to a bad first round, Vardon, at Hoylake, in 1897, lost the laurels he had so pluckily gained at Muirfield the previous year. His rounds were 84, 80, 80, and 76, and he finished sixth only six strokes behind Mr. H. H. Hilton. Later in the year he met J. Braid four times in exhibition matches, losing at Halifax, halving at Dudley winning at Epsom, and losing at Romford. His brilliant string of successes last year must be fresh in the memories of all. Prior to his Championship victory at Prestwick, he finished third to A. Herd and J. H. Taylor in a tournament at Hastings, and won a similar event at Musse burgh with the very fine return of 152 for 36 holes, one of his rounds being taken in 34, including a lift from the road, thus all but equalling the record for the green. The very day after the Championship he finished first in the Prestwick St. Nicholas tournament, and at Windermere in the following week he occupied a similar position. In the following month (July) he finished second to Braid at West Drayton, second to Taylor at Sheringham, and first at Norbury. In August he beat high-class fields at Carnoustie and Elie, his aggregate of 158 for 36 holes on such a punishing green as the former being quite a feat. In September he had his colours lowered by Herd in exhibition matches at Portrush and Carnalea; but later in the month he electrified the onlookers by his marvellous play in the final of the tournament at Newcastle, Co. Down, when he beat J. H. Taylor, who was playing at the top of his game, by twelve up and eleven to play. His approxi-

In October he won an invitation 18-holes tournament at Barton-on-Sea, and followed with wins at St. Annes and Old Trafford, Manchester. In the preliminary stroke competition at St. Annes he negotiated the 36 holes in 148 strokes, eleven ahead of Herd and Taylor, his first round being a record one of 71, or four strokes below par.

At West Bromwich, in November, Taylor, who had worsted him in an exhibition match at Church Stretton earlier in the year, beat him again in a similar engagement; but he retired for the winter with a win over his brother Tom at Ilkley, when he established another record.

In the early part of the present year Vardon was laid aside for a month with inflammation; but he quickly shook off the effects, and his victory over Herd in an exhibition match at Leicester in April proved that he had lost nothing in ability. Since then he has added other wins to his credit. At Cruden Bay he headed the field in the preliminary stroke competition, and then won the final by holes without much difficulty. And in the Mid-Surrey tournament at Richmond even greater success met his efforts, for in the qualifying competition he finished eleven strokes ahead of his nearest rival in a very high class field, his first round being a record one of 70, and his second 74. He then won the final by holes, defeating in succession Braid, Herd, and Rowe.

Surely no golfer has ever exhibited his supremacy over his fellows in so marked a fashion? Wherein lies his superiority? We should say in his long shots through the green, the facility with which he lays his approach putts dead or in the hole, and his imperturbability of temper. In addition, he drives perhaps a longer ball from the tee than any other professional save Braid or Simpson, and is unquestionably the longest driver we have with iron clubs. With his driving mashic he gets as far as the ordinary man can drive with a wooden club, and can get further with a light iron than most professionals can with a cleek. At Prestwick, against the wind, a cleek shot followed by one with his light iron took him past the first hole, whereat Andrew

Kirkcaldy characteristically remarked: "Good God; he's hame wi' his licht iron." Of his powers through the green let us give samples. The tenth hole at Prestwick is somewhere over 400 yards as played in the Championship, yet in each of the four rounds Vardon was on the green with his second, his average for the hole being 4—a 3, two 4's, and a 5. Again at Carnoustie the ninth hole is over 600 yards, yet Vardon reached the green with two full shots and a "half iron." At holes such as these he is facile princeps; the hole whereat he seems weakest is one of the length of the short holes at Prestwick and Elie, simply an iron pitch.

But perhaps the best testimony to his abilities are the remarks given vent to from time to time by his unfortunate opponents. At Elie, in August, when he holed a little pitch from the rough beyond the first hole, Andrew Kirkealdy ejaculated, "You're an awfu' man. Vardon"; and later on in the same round when he deftly extricated himself from a bunker at the thirteenth, pitched up, and holed his putt, the St. Andrews man, to the amusement of the spectators, said, "Man, ye'd brek the hert o' an iron horse." Poor Taylor, too, at Newcastle, Co. Down, last autumn, when he finished the first round of the final tie 11 down, said very truly, "I'm not ashamed of it; I've played my game, but who could stand against that? He's not a man at all, he's a blooming steam engine." However Vardon may fare in the near future, this we make hold to say, that of all the Golfing Champions there has never been one to match him.

THE IRISH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1898.

AT Dollymount, last May, the entry list for the Irish "Native" Championship showed a distinct advance on that of the previous year, twenty-five players, including two ex-Champions in Messrs. W. H. Webb and J. Stewart-Moore, challenging the holder, Mr. H. E. Reade. Play commenced on Wednesday, May 18th, and concluded on the following Friday with the usual 36 holes' final. In the first round previous "runners up," in Messrs. J. Stevenson and G. Combe were unexpectedly ousted by Messrs. A. H. Boyd and "J. Jones," but only after extra holes had been played. The other cracks, however, remained in the place of hope at the close of the first two rounds. The feature of the second round was the brilliant display of Mr. B. O'Brien, who completed the eighteen holes in 80. On the following morning, however, the 1896 Champion, Mr. Stewart-Moore, cleverly disposed of him, and as Messrs, W. H. Webb and H. E. Reade also won their ties, there was augury of exciting work in the afternoon. So it proved, for, although Mr. Stewart-Moore led all the way against Mr. Boyd, the other couple had an intensely exciting struggle. Playing slackly on the outgoing, Mr. Webb was five down with ten to go; but Mr. Reade now commenced to miss his putts, and Mr. Webb, running off with seven holes in succession, qualified for the final by two holes. Verily, "a match is never lost till it is won." In the final tie, on Friday, Mr. Webb soon put the issue out of doubt, and had won his second championship eight holes from home. Details:

It is only three years since Mr. Webb's portrait adorned our pages, so it would be superfluous to re-sketch his career. Let us, therefore, catch up the clue where we left off, namely, with his easy victory in the 1895 Championship. In the following year he was beaten by one hole in the second round of the Championship by the ultimate winner, Mr. J. Stewart-Moore; and in the 1897 event he fell in the final before Mr. H. E. Reade. How he turned the tables last year on his erstwhile conquerors has already been noted. During these years he also made his presence felt at Portrush and other golfing centres in the north of Ireland, his most notable success being for the Adair Shield, at Portrush, in 1896, with the excellent score of 172 for thirty-six holes.

PORTMARNOCK GOLF CLUB.

By Mr. W. C. PICKEMAN, Hon. Sec.

This Club was started in 1894, and the care and attention bestowed on the links since then by the Committee have now reaped the reward in the green being added by the Golfing Union of Ireland to the Iris Championship courses as the fourth links. These Championships will now be played at Portrush and Newcastle in the north, and Dollymount (Dublin) and Portmarnock in the south. The Open Championship will be played at Portmarnock in September next.

The links are easy of access from Dublin, being but seven miles by rail, and the Clubhouse is then about a mile distant from the railway station, where cars await all trains.

The links are surrounded on three sides by the sea, and are well diversified by hills, ditches, bunkers, bent and such like hazards. The grass throughout is of the true golfing variety with a good deal of moss, but the latter, though giving for the most part good lies, is gradually being worked into hard ground. The links are the fair average of length of three and a third miles, but can be extended at many of the holes by merely taking back the tees as far as may be judicious without spoiling the holes. The following is a description of the individual holes:

- 1. The first is a plain hole some 380 yards in length; a slice may land in the sea, but two straight shots take one on to a nice green, and the hole may be done in 4.
- 2. A pull or a slice is heavily punished—a sliced ball goes into the sea or runs on to the beach, and a pulled one into an old field full of bad lies. The hole is short, and a drive of 180 yards and a wrist approach land one on the green for a 4.
- 3. A foozled drive leaves the ball in a rabbit warren, a short one in a natural sand banker—a good 4. Hole about 380 yards,
 - 4. A good drive, a brassy, and iron shot reach the green, and

allowing the usual two putts, the player is rewarded with a par 5. The hole is 440 yards in length, and runs down a valley with hills on one side, and bent and the sea on the other, so that straight play is most necessary. A bunker has to be carried by

the drive, and two bunkers guard the green.

5. The fifth hole is one of the most attractive in the course, which here bends back to the south-west. A drive of 170 to 190 yards, which is required to carry two formidable bunkers, lands the ball in a large hollow, which extends to the green, but to reach which then requires a full drive of nearly 200 yards. The green is a very pretty one, guarded by two bunkers. The length of the hole varies according to placing of the tee, but is usually about 400 yards: A 5 is generally equired.

6. A pulled drive finds its billet in a potato field, and a slice or top pays the penalty by being in a bunker. Two full drives generally find the green, but they, like those to the last hole, must be long and straight. The result generally means a 5.

Length 400 yards.

7. The tee is on the top of a hill giving magnificent views of the surrounding country on the one side and Dublin Bay on the other. A full drive and pitch over a bunker land the ball on the green. Hole about 280 yards.

8. A good drive over a long and large bunker should reach

the green—a 3 hole. Distance about 200 yards.

9. The green is situated near the Clubhouse, and though a plain hole, the green being guarded by two bunkers and an old ruin behind, a 5 is usual. Length about 350 yards.

10. A full drive and pitch over a "dry water channel" reach

the green, with the result a 4.

11. This hole is aptly named the "Wilderness." The visitor, after carrying a large bunker with his drive, is surprised, on surmounting the first hill, to find an immense stretch of flat country before him—half a mile at least. Wild rose bushes and bent are on each side, but the course is wide enough to avoid these, and two drives and a full iron reach the green, which is well guarded by bunkers. A good 5. Hole, 430 yards.

12. A straight cleek or iron shot over bunkers carries the

green. A 3 hole, about 140 yards in length.

13. Another fine view of Dublin is had from the tee here, which stands high. The hole is a good one, requiring a good

drive over bunkers, ditch, and trees, and an iron shot over another bunker to reach the green. Four should be the result. Length about 280 yards.

14. This hole is about 400 yards in length, and, beyond requiring straight play, does not call for description. The green

is guarded by two bunkers.

15 and 16. Both these holes are long, the former about 450 and the latter 500 yards in length. The greens are good and guarded by bunkers.

17. A short hole, but surrounded by bunkers of every description. A full drive of 170 yards reaches a very pretty green.

18. This hole requires two full drives and a pitch to reach the green. A roadway—mostly sand—bothers one on the left, whilst bent and bracken make one beware of the right; but with good play a 5 is the result. Length about 400 yards.

IRISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1898.

No doubt the votaries of the Royal and Ancient Game who gathered at Portrush last autumn to see the play in the seventh Open Championship of Ireland were disappointed at the absence of Mr. H. H. Hilton, the holder of the Championship; but his election not to defend his title added considerably to the interest from a competitive point of view. A dual ex-Champion in Mr. W. B. Taylor, of the Carlton G.C., Edinburgh, was, however, there to do battle against a field of forty-six, drawn from Ireland, England, Scotland, Wales, and even Belgium. Among these Messrs, S. H. Fry, J. M. Duncan, A. Macdonald, H. E. Reade, and W. H. Webb all had their supporters, but Mr. Taylor started favourite. Play commenced on Tuesday, August 30th, and concluded the following Friday. first day the players had to contend against wind and rain, but on the second the conditions were slightly improved, and on the two closing days the weather was delightful. The luck of the ballot set Mr. Taylor a hard task, but, although now and again his game was scarcely up to his usual standard, he proved equal to every call upon him, and in the end scored his third victory in the competition. In the penultimate round he had an exciting tussle with Mr. J. M. Duncan, the Aberdeen crack. Turning four up, he looked an easy winner, but on the home coming Mr. Duncan showed greatly improved form, and, profiting by Mr. Taylor's being frequently in difficulties, actually led at the fifteenth hole. At the sixteenth Mr. Taylor squared accounts, and two halves closed the round. One extra hole settled the tie in Mr. Taylor's fayour, Mr. Duncan failing at a five feet putt-Again, in the final, Mr. Dallmeyer, whose play all through had been quite a revelation, proved an uncommonly hard nut to erack, so deadly was his putting. When fifteen holes of the first moiety had been discussed, Mr. Dallmeyer had a lead of four

holes, but, pocketing the last three in "two under fours," Mr. Taylor put a much more favourable complexion on affairs. In the afternoon Mr. Dallmeyer stuck manfully to his advantage for eleven holes, when Mr. Taylor drew level. Thereafter it was "pull devil, pull baker," and honours were easy on the statutory thirty-six holes. Out again they had perforce to go, but, missing his second shot, Mr. Dallmever got into such hopeless difficulties that he gave up the hole, and Mr. Taylor was able to breathe freely. With the presentation of the Championship Trophy and medals by Col. Pottinger, a successful function terminated. Details

A WORD FOR MONIFIETH.

The Golf Course of Monifieth is one of the oldest and most popular in the country. The privilege of playing the Royal and Ancient Game on it was generously granted by William Maule, Lord Panmure, over seventy years ago, to a Club which was named, in his honour, the Panmure Golf Club, the members of which were for the most part the merchants, business and professional gentlemen of Dundee and district. At first the course consisted of nine holes, but for many years back, through the generosity of successive Earls of Dalhousie, the enterprise of the Panmure Golf Club, who have up till now acted as custodiers of the green, and the assistance of Monifieth Golf Club, the course has been a full one of eighteen holes.

The popularity of Monifieth course is due to its charming situation by the estuary of the Tay, the wonderful variety of "country" it contains, and the specially suitable character of the soil for golfing purposes. It embraces natural hazards which test the skill of the best players, and the names bestowed by players on some of the holes indicate the various phases of "country" met with.

In recent years the green has been fully occupied by the six Clubs which have been by courtesy accorded playing rights, but the Panmure Club have lately acquired from Lord Dalhousie, to the eastward of the old green, a new course, which is to be maintained as a private green. To the great grief of the golfing community, the speculative builder lately made his fatal appearance on a part of the green. The portion already feued does not much havu the course, but as it would have been seriously and permanently injured if more of it had been taken up for building purposes, the inhabitants of Monifieth, and the Club men from Dundee, Broughty Ferry, and the neighbourhood, resolved to make a supreme effort to acquire the course, and to secure for all time coming that it should be devoted to the purpose for which nature has so admirably adapted it.

On the initiative of the Commissioners of the Burgh of Monifieth, a committee, representative of all the interests concerned, have provisionally purchased the ground, comprising 115 acres, from the proprietor, the Earl of Dalhousie, at the price of £4000, and they now appeal with confidence to the public of the district, the patrons of the Royal and Ancient game in all parts of the country, and all who appreciate the public advantage of a pastime which is at once in the highest degree healthful, interesting, and elevating, to accord their kind support to the bazaar which is being organised to raise the money, and which will be held in Dundee in September.

Recognising the fact that a first-class golf course is of the highest value to the district, care is being taken in the deed of conveyance to provide a constitution under which the public will have the fullest facility of enjoying the game on these splendid links, subject to such suitable rules and regulations as will ensure the maintenance of the course in the most perfect condition possible, and its most convenient and advantageous enjoyment.

GOLF AT LAS PALMAS, GRAND CANARY.

By LIEUT.-COL. WALLACE W. CRAGG, Vice-President, Las Palmas G.C.

Wherever English people go they are bound to take with them their love of outdoor sports, and the first thing to be done in any resort, whether for summer or winter residence in any part of the world, is to see that opportunities are provided for playing the national games of Cricket, Lawn Tennis, and Golf. In the perfect climate that is the rule during the winter, and far into the summer at Grand Canary, these games are in full swing, although the absence of turf alters the appearance and circumstances of the game. Cricket is played on a spacious ground, the pitch being green matting pegged down on a hard sandy substratum. Lawn tennis is played on hard gravel, or concrete courts, and Golf "greens" ought rather to be termed "browns," as they are levelled on smooth, gravelly soil, well beaten down. All of these games have their respective Clubs.

The golf links, which are remarkably well laid out, are the property of the Las Palmas Golf Club, and adjoin the grounds of the Santa Catalina Hotel. The links are about two miles round, and there are thirteen holes, some of the upper ones being played twice for the full course of eighteen holes. Bogey score for the eighteen holes is 73. There is a Club-house on the links, which have been favourably reported on by Messrs. H. H. Hilton and J. Ball, Jun., who played over them last year. These gentlemen suggested certain alterations in the course, which have since been carried out. The obstacles are principally natural, consisting of "Barrancos," or dry watercourses, and emphorbia scrub, which to any badly directed ball is very fatal. These natural obstacles have been in places supplemented by dry retaining walls, which require some negotiating. The subscription to the Club is very low, 10s, for a year, or any part of one

No entrance fee. Caddies 50 cents (about fourpence) for eighteen holes, and 30 cents for thirteen holes.

A Medal, given by the late Mr. J. Forman, is competed for monthly, and there are at present two Silver Challenge Cups, one given by Mr. Walter Palmer, and the other by Mr. O. Robinson, the latter played for against Bogey. There is also a Silver Medal for ladies, to be played for monthly, given by Lieut.-Col. Wallace W. Cragg.

The links, being on an elevated plateau, commanding magnificent sea and land views, are always blessed with a fresh and invigorating breeze, and are a favourite walk for the visitors, who enjoy the tea picnics given frequently at the Clubhouse, which is only ten minutes' walk from the hotel. All Golf requisites can be obtained in the island.

THE EDITOR'S FOURSOME.

THE advent of the railway to Gullane, making the connecting link from Longniddry, helped to determine our choice of that sweet little links as our rendezvous for the match. We decided to leave the problem of finding a fourth until we had settled all the preliminaries; and, after a triangular interchange of information regarding professional engagements (without reference to golf), much to the advantage of the postal revenue, we found there was unanimity at last as to date, time, and place of meeting.

I am certain there might be many a melancholy chapter written on "Secretarial Worry," not only on account of the opprobriums these long-suffering officials have to bear with respect to the members' handicaps, but in connection with the selection and formation of Club teams. Happy, indeed, are the Secretaries of Clubs, such as the Royal and Ancient, which have no match-playing history! Even to find the fourth of a foursome is not always such a simple problem as it seems. The theatre of operations was, as I have said, Gullane, and we had counted, with some degree of confidence, on the assistance of a neighbouring historian of the game, who is at home on all the East Lothian greens; but our hopes proved delasive, for we discovered he could not be "at home" on any of them the day we had fixed upon. The proposal to enlist the parish minister of the neighbouring Burgh also proved futile. His services had been requisitioned for that afternoon by the leading Scottish exponent of the game to discharge a very interesting duty, and we could not help wishing that that indomitable player would pay his great English rival the Scotch compliment of "giving him the name." But that good pastor proved his love of golf as well as of his parish assistant, by sending the latter to fill the gap and square the game. It was a little awkward that the young divine's own set was not available for Gullane; but the clubmaker there, he said, would be able to supply the necessary few out of his cast-off box.

The little numerical puzzle having been solved to our entire satisfaction, we found ourselves, by ten o'clock, east-coasting it past Seton Castle, where, we have been told, Queen Mary once played golf when she should have been attending to matters of even greater importance, and, after a rapid run, we reached that great congeries of links, which may well be entitled, "the Playground of the East."

If you put any faith in the encomia lavished on Gullane turf, you may believe that, like the imperturbable milkmaid, its face will prove its fortune, for it is recorded in the chronicles of East Lothian golf that the links there possess a recuperative vitality that no amount of abuse can impair, and the turf is so springy

as to give elasticity to every stiffened sinew.

"The Helper" retired to choose a temporary outfit of clubs. while we did what we could to suit ourselves from the not very promising bunch of caddies who crowded round us. "The Genie of the Lamp "-is not Haddington the Lamp of the Lothians?—lamented their size and boyish proclivities—they were not, when most wanted, and, O tempora! O mores! they leaned upon his most seasoned and cherished shafts. What a comfort is an elderly, experienced, soher caddie! You do not require to drag your club out of the bag or push it in again; you do not even need to hint what you will take. The weapon you want is in his hand, once he has gauged your game, before you get within twenty yards of the ball. He has an encouraging word for the shot, whether it be good or bad, and keeps you in perfect temper with yourself. Once when a player baffed so badly that the ball only rolled a couple of feet, "Fine line, Professor, fine line!" was old Watty's eulogy, and without the slightest trace of irony. Besides, he has plenty to say, if you are in a talkative mood-golfing drolleries and memories, sometimes even theological problems to propound. "Do you think, sir," said one of these Musselburgh worthies, "that Jock and Geordie" (two fellow caddies recently deceased) "will be meeting noo in the next warld?" adding with a sigh of satisfied reflection, "Onyway, they made the verra best o't in this ane."

But at last "The Helper" arrives with his extemporised set, an incongruous looking lot, all on the short side, as he remarks, with a show of regret. The Editor and I accordingly hand him over to partner the Lothian record-player, for has not that old medallist just returned from a week's tour in the greatest of golfing counties, towards which, even then, we were casting longing looks, where he visited, with the Captain of "The Calcutta," four first-class greens in four successive days? That meant sufficient form to risk "The Helper" and his helpless-looking set.

And now we are off, the Editor and I in the best of spirits, for it is always a pleasurable thing to think you have won your match before you begin to play it. What stirring golfing memories of College times were revived that summer day on Gullane Hill! Some notable 'Varsity encounters were recalled, which, to our mind, no doubt, loomed larger, as most things do when viewed through the mist of departed years. But the "Genie" has one grievance to ventilate. When last we had engaged in friendly rivalry, he knew little or nothing of the graver concernments of life. "Books and crooks" were all his little store. But now among his numerous belongings, great and small, he counts a sturdy youth, who is able to hold his own, on any green, against his father.

To teach his laddic gooff His leisure he'd employ, Until at length the old man Got beaten by the boy.

And, for the sake of paternal prestige, he has since declined to engage him in a single.

We will not detain you with any precise account of the play through the green. That concerned only ourselves and our caddies. Let it suffice to say that at the outset "The Helper" was sorely harassed with his job lot. We could see at a glance they were out of proportion for a player almost as long as Tam Kidd, of cleek-playing fame.

The first couple of holes went to the Editor's side, and we

accordingly began, as men of finer feelings will do, to compassionate our opponents. "The Genie" had already begun to press, and we knew by experience what the upshot of that would be. The interest, as well as the harmony of the game, were at stake. Something must be done. In the sacred name of friend-ship we must dissemble.

Now, we have often contended against a rigid cast-iron sternness of principle, for a slightly elastic ethical code, for service in a friendly game, always provided that any aberration would give the advantage to the other side. If a man deliberately plays on a bunker with his partner's goodwill that is his own affair. He loses strokes, but he regards these as a surreptitious allowance to his opponents.

In this way a game can be made more even, without the tender susceptibilities of any player being wounded by the offer of odds. It has, it is true, a cat-and-mouse flavour about it, and it looks a bold game for the cat, and yet she is seldom the sufferer. There are exceptions in this, as in loftier trifling and scheming, but these are rare and inconsiderable.

The convenient bunker puts the game on a more level footing, so we reckoned, and on we went—ding-dong, give and take. Sometimes we talked of the play and sometimes of the landscape. Here on Gullane Hill we stood at an altitude favourable for lofty contemplation. Earth, sky, and sea unfolded themselves in varied loveliness. What softness of toning was there for the eye to linger on! The summer blue overhead, flecked with a few stray warmly-tinged downy clouds; westward, through the haze, Auld Reckie, sitting like the old-world metropolis on her seven hills—the lion of Arthur's Seat at his eternal post of silent ward; eastward, Berwick and its Law by the edge of the ocean's silver floor; and to the north, Fife, dear to all golfers, but doubly dear to those who were able to combine in her, most ancient of Scottish cities, their play with their pupilage!

That summer day we felt the full significance of Browning's exhibitanting words:—


I find earth not gray, but rosy,
Heaven not grim, but fair of hue.
Do I stoop? I pluck a posey;
Do I stand and stare? All's blue.

But to finish off the story of our match. Everything went smoothly, and with two to play, the Editor and I were in the comfortable position of having a hole in our pocket. Helper," towards the latter period of the play, had developed remarkable prowess both in driving and putting, and the game had began to get a good deal more exciting towards the close. Driving from the second last tee, my shot, a perfect beauty of course, got badly treated, and eventually settled in a cart rut on the slope of a knoll, and we were shortly after surprised to find ourselves square, and one to play. In an attempt to carry on to the green with our second at the last hole, we again suffered from an untoward accident of fortune, and found the bottom of a nasty dry ditch, that guards the hole. Still, despite repeated misfortunes, a half was yet in sight, and at last the ball was alongside the hole, and we waited confidently for the like, a good twelve yard putt. It fell to the "Genie" to give it. There was a hard, determined look in his eye. He spent little time gauging the distance or the run, but, brushing away some trifling obstructions, he grasped his putter, and, before we had time to count the consequences, the ball was rattling in the cup of the hole—the match was over, lost and won. Somehow, Browning's line came up like the refrain of some old irritating song, "Do I stand and stare? All's blue." We said little; but, like the erow of the countryman's fable, we thought much, and determined to thrash out the still open question of the ethical merit of playing on a bunker.

"The Helper" left us to deliver up his outré set, but we found on his return he had purchased two of them, the driver and the putter. They suited his style, so he said, when we were handling them, "But are they not undersized?" we asked, not a little bewildered. "No!" said the six-footer in his stocking soles; "I always play short clubs."

Well, there are few consolations so truly restorative to ruffled feelings as creature comforts. And after the Editor and I had decided that it was the highest wisdom to play the game, no matter what the odds might be, and renewed a resolution never to judge a player by his appearance, we recovered our equanimity when "mine host" of the hotel placed his tempting menu before us, and we found that a lordly dish of the lowly and luscions summer fruit would conclude our ample and well-earned repast.

With the great lexicographer, we began to feel that "there is nothing which has yet been contrived by man by which so much happiness is produced as by a good tavern or inn;" though we added a provision of our own, not so essential a hundred years ago as it is to-day—that there be always a links as good as Gullane attached to it.

CASTLEBAR GOLF COURSE, EALING.

This course, which was opened in May, 1898, is situated in the parishes of Ealing, Perivale, and Greenford, Middlesex, and is distant about seven miles by road from the Marble Arch and Hyde Park Corner. Ealing is well served, both by the Great Western and District Railways, the main stations being distant a little over a mile from the Club-house, 15, Kent Gardens Ealing. Castle Hill Station (G.W.R.) is rather less than a mile from the Club-house. Cabs can be had at both stations.

The course, which for the most part is on good gravel soil, begins in Woodbury Field, close to the Club-house, the first drive being over a low wall and natural hazards.

The second green is well placed between the River Brent on one side and excavated ground on the other, and is approached over hedge and ditch.

Playing northwards, the drive to the third hole crosses a portion of the burn and other obstacles.

Diverging then westwards in the direction of the main road from Castle Hill to Perivale, a distance of 430 yards, the fourth green is reached.

The play is then over the burn and a fine old pasture field to No. 5.

Here an extension of the course has recently been effected, and a new sixth green laid out, increasing the length of the hole from 250 to 380 yards, and greatly improving it, the green, an undulating one, being on an elevated plateau, with a difficult approach over short turf and a sloping bank.

The drive to the seventh hole is from this plateau, over a narrow tongue of land, which cannot as yet be obtained, the drive being from high to low ground, meeting the course again, giving a drive and brassy or cleek shot to a pretty green near the old bridge there, well guarded, increasing the length from 170 to 320 yards, and thus giving an alternative short or longer course to both greens.

The course to the eighth hole is played over good short turf, with hazards on the right, the green being guarded by a bank and hedge on one side.

No. 9 is taken over part of the same field with a hollow in front, then over the hedge to the green, which is prettily sloped on the far side.

No. 10 is over good turf, and then across the pond, with

No. 10 is over good turn, and then across the pond, with hazards on either side.

The course to No. 11 is over the river.

No. 12 requires a short iron shot over a narrow and shallow part of the burn, and is placed on rising ground, the tee being at a considerable elevation, so as to allow a fair falling shot on the green, with the river and bank interposed. This hole is capable of being considerably lengthened by playing from a tee on the far side of the Harrow Road, with a double hedge.

Then comes a charming green on the high part of a field on

the north side of the river.

From this knoll No. 14 is reached, the river giving a double hazard.

From thence the play is to one of the best greens, No. 15, on elevated ground, over pond and tangle.

The drive to No. 16 is taken over hazardous ground, thicket and hedge, to the corner of a large field adjoining the river.

The course to No. 17—"Babylon," for many weep there—gives a long drive over good ground, with the burn running on its left the whole length, which is crossed with a brassy sh.t from low to high ground, and so to the green, a distance of 370 yards.

Thence to the home green, adjoining the first tee and Clubhouse.

AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP OF INDIA, 1898.

WITH a record entry and a record score to win it, the seventh Amateur Championship of India and the East, held under the auspices of the Calcutta Golf Club, and which concluded on December 26, may fairly be said to have been the most successful yet held. It was unfortunate that Mr. Outhwaite, of the Gordon Highlanders, who was regarded as a likely winner. was unable to come down from Umballa at the last moment, while Messrs, J. G. Tait and A. Clark were kept away by the plague in the Madras Presidency. There were, however, twentyeight entries, including players from Rawal Pindi, Rangoon, and Penang. Play for the Championship consisted of thirty-six holes at Tollygunge, and eighteen at Calcutta, under Medal playrules. and the winner was eventually found in Mr. J. S. Smith, a young player, well-known in Glasgow and its neighbourhood, who had only been in the country about three weeks. His rounds at Tollygunge were a record of very fine play, his score of 81 (39) and 42) for the second eighteen holes beating the previous competition record for the green by four strokes. On the Calcutta Maidan he went to pieces, but as he had only to do 100 to win. he had the Championship at his mercy before he began to play there at all. Second honours went to Mr. F. H. Stewart, the Champion of the previous year, who put in three very careful rounds of 89 each, and who but for want of practice, owing to ill-health, might have done better. It was unfortunate that Messrs, E. M. Shand and A. F. Simson, two of the best players entered, were prevented by business engagements from playing to the end; and also that Mr. R. D. Murray, an ex-Champion, had to leave Calcutta without playing on the Maidan. Mr. C. Morrison, of Madras, another strong player, was also prevented from seeing the competition through by reason of a badly injured hand. The scores were as below, Mr. J. S.

LANARK GOLF COURSE.

The Lanark golf course is situated at White Leas, and is within ten minutes' walk of Lanark railway station. There are two rounds, viz., the old, of fourteen holes, and the new, of eighteen holes, which retains some of the old greens, and extends eastward over the Whinny Knowe. This new round keeps quite clear of the ground occupied by the Militia when in camp on Lanark Moor, and is now regularly played over. It was planned by old Tom Morris, and all are loud in their praises of the excellent way in which he has done his work. The soil is sandy, and dries very quickly after rain, the air is keen and bracing, and the view from the course is remarkably fine. In short, the Lanark green has just claim to rank as one of the best inland greens in the United Kingdom. The putting greens, which are kept short and well rolled, are from 20 to 30 yards square, and there is only one crossing where the first and last drives intersect.

Here is a description of the new round:

1. Two full drives and a pitch over a sand bunker should land the ball on the green, a large one sloping towards the player. Slicing will be punished, as there are two sand bunkers, a road, and a morass to the right.

2. The tee shot must carry some roughish country, and then a brassy should take you on to a putting green almost as level as

a billiard table.

A fairly easy hole, the requisites being a drive and a pitch.
 An easy 4.

4. A good drive will land short of a water ditch, over which

and a road it is necessary to pitch to reach the green.

5. "Fashoda."—The drive must be far and sure to carry bad country and a road, from whence a full iron shot over a wire fence will reach the green.

6. A good honest swipe will carry the green, but it must be

straight as a die, for there are rushes to the right and also beyond the hole.

7. A drive and an approach on to a beautifully undulating green, which quite took old Tom's fancy. A 4 hole.

8. A burn must be carried from the tee, after which an uphill brassy shot, along a track 60 yards wide cut through whins, should be hole high.

9. A drive over a turf dyke and ditch on to a receding green with a plantation on the left and far sides. By faultless play the turn should be reached in 35.

10. Now homeward bound—a good drive and brassy shot through another whin-bordered track should take one on to a billowy green guarded by a sand bunker in front and bents behind.

11. The drive should carry a hollow in which 300 yards of drain tiles have been laid, and land on the top of a knoll from which heather is rapidly disappearing under the influence of lime. Thereafter a short pitch will place you at the hole side.

12. Two long drives and a wrist iron will put the player nicely on the green if he has avoided rushes on the left of the line and sand bunkers on the right.

13. A driving iron shot over a yawning sand and gravel pit which stretches from tee to green, with heather and whins on the far side.

14. The tee shot must carry a road, and be very straight, for there is rough country to the right, and a pulled ball will land in the aforesaid pit, which at this point is well clad with whins. These difficulties successfully negotiated, a pitch remains on to a green laid with a spirit level.

15. A somewhat plain hole, requiring two drives and an iron shot.

16. Three full shots will reach the green, which is guarded in front by the burn, and on the right by the railway, which is out of bounds.

17. The requisites are two full drives and an iron shot over undulating ground and a grassy ditch.

18. A sand bunker has to be carried from the tee driving to the home green, which is as large and level as a bowling green. The approach must then be accurate, for there is a fenced inclosure (out of bounds) to the left and a plantation behind, while on the right two terraces rising to the Clubhouse windows are sometimes troublesome.

The par of the round is as follows:

At time of writing the record stands at 84, a score which will always take a lot of beating, as slips are apt to be punished somewhat severely. A commodious Clubhouse, to which large additions have recently been made (including accommodation for ladies), overlooks the course. Houses are springing up all round, and are invariably well filled with summer visitors, for whom there is plenty of accommodation, and to whom the Golf Club gives special terms for membership, obtainable from the Hon. Secretary.

BARTON-ON-SEA GOLF LINKS.

Golf links have been formed at Barton-on-Sea, near Bourne-They are situated one mile from New Milton Station. on the main line of the London and South-Western Railway. and the round of nine holes is over 3000 yards. The length of the holes are as follows: First, 395 yards; second, 350; third, 386; fourth, 238; fifth, 290; sixth, 322; seventh, 450; eighth, 381: ninth, 279; total, 3101 yards, or 13 miles round. If necessary, by bringing in more adjacent land, a round of eighteen holes can easily be secured. The present course covers about sixty acros of ground, and is full of sport. Good play is sure to be rewarded and bad play punished, as hazards abound, The turf is excellent; the natural hazards consist of cliffs, hedges, ditches, furze, rushes, watercourse, &c., and some of the holes are diversified by sand bunkers of various forms. Nearly all the putting greens have been relaid with fine down turf, and the tees, where necessary, have been made on a large scale, One striking feature is the home putting green, the hazard surrounding it taking the form of a zareba, and looking like a miniature entrenchment. In short, the round supplies a thorough test of golf. The links are charmingly situated. The proprietor of the Barton Court Hotel has added a large wing to the building, including, in addition to public and private rooms, about forty bedrooms. A golf professional has been engaged, and will be in residence on the premises all the year round. Golf pavilions have been erected adjoining the hotel, in which are placed several lockers for the accommodation of ladies' and gentlemen's clubs, the charges for which, and for playing on the ground, are of a moderate figure.

The Club formerly played on the Aberdeen Links course, but on March 31st, 1888, they opened a private course on the Balgownie Links, situated two miles north of Aberdeen, near the mouth of the Don, conveyance by tramway or cab. The course of eighteen holes is about three and a half miles in length. A commodious Clubhouse stands on a high hill overlooking the Don, and the view from it embraces the entire coast line from Girdleness to Buchanness.

The Aberdeen Golf Club appears to have come after, and in the place of, a Club called the "Society of Golfers at Aberdeen," instituted May 9th, 1783, a printed copy of whose "Regulations, with a list of the original members and the Laws of Golf," is still extant; but this "Society of Golfers" had become dissolved before the institution of the present Club. A Golf Club must have existed in Aberdeen even before 1783, as the ballot box still in the possession of the Club bears the inscription, "The Aberdeen Golf Club, 1780." The game itself has been played on the Aberdeen Links from time immemorial.

sufficient.

4. When the ballot is in force a list of the order of starting for each day will be posted at the Starter's box and at the Post Office on the previous evening about 6 o'clock.

5. Any party not ready to start immediately when its number is

called loses its turn, and must wait for the first vacancy.

6. Players coming on the ground without a number shall have their names taken down by the Starter, and vacancies shall be allotted

to them in the order of their arrival at the tee.

- 7. In the event of unpropitious weather, or other accidental circumstances, rendering it impossible to adhere to the time as entered in the list, the Starter is empowered to despatch matches in rotation by their numbers only, and the regulations as to time will be cancelled.
- 8. Any dispute which may arise must be left to the decision of the Starter.
- 9. A player without an opponent, or who is receiving instruction, cannot have a number allotted to him, nor can he be recognised as having any standing on the green.
- A player who has his clubs carried for him, and whose caddie also plays in the game as his opponent, has no standing on the

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
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
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
