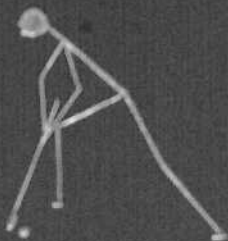

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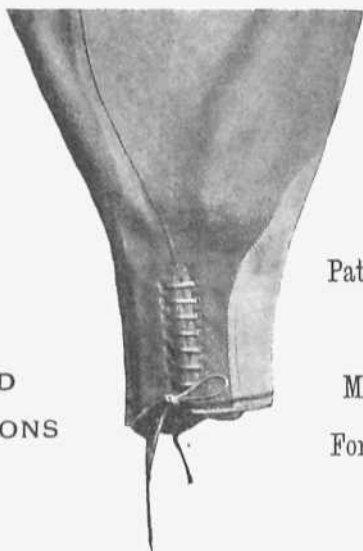
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OUR GOLFING KING.

LONG LIVE KING EDWARD ! Do not let us think of wounding the sensibilities of any of our Theodore Napiers or perfervid Scots by adding "The Seventh" to His Majesty's name. Let us say long live King Edward, the Golfer ! We are all proud of our new King. Golfers are specially so, because the King is a man of like passions with themselves, possessed of the same infirmity, a weakness of the flesh, which makes them crawl to the golf course in search of strength. His Majesty knows what it is to address the ball at the tee, how infinite the gulf is between the intention of the will when in that interesting position and the actual result ; he knows what it is to be bunkered, he has felt that inexpressible sense of the feebleness of humanity which comes over the man who has missed a short putt, and all this has humanised him, has helped to make him a man, for that is what golf does wherever it has its way, and now he is on the throne he is all the dearer to us because his golf has brought him nearer to us. That genial old gentleman, Mr. Punch, suggested to King Edward on his accession that there was no need, or at least no hurry, for any formal coronation, for the King was enthroned in the hearts of the people. Well spoken, old man, your wit is always spiced with wisdom. Might we not say the same about golf ? Is not the game so enthroned in the affections of mankind, is it not so crowned and worshipped in every land that we require no royal recognition of its merits ? Why fuss over Royal favour ?

Kings have, in bygone days, forbidden the people to play golf, at other times they have ordered them to do so, even on Sundays. The people neither abstained from play nor played. They went their way—"gaed their gait," as the Scotch expression has it. Golf has come to its present throne not by Royal favour, but by popular applause, and by that it will occupy its throne while other monarchs come and go. It is all quite true. It is the boast of golf that its intrinsic virtue is the secret of its success, but, on the other hand, one is always on the look out for something which may bind together high and low, rich and poor, peer and peasant, King and cottar, and so one is pleased when, with the accession of King Edward, we know that the love of golf makes King and people kin. By this time every one has been made aware of the devotion of the Stuarts to the ancient game; they all loved golf; even the fair, but ill-fated, Queen Mary used to enjoy the game. Another ill-fated monarch, Charles I., was busy with a match on Leith Links when he received the news of the Irish Rebellion in 1642. With a Canongate cobbler James II., then Duke of York, played and defeated two crack noblemen for a big stake, which he divided with his partner, who was able to build a house therewith, with "I hate no person" (the letters of his name re-arranged), as motto. Blackheath, the oldest Club in the world, claims the parentage of James I. But for a long time the throne had ceased to smile on the old game, not because our rulers wished it "cryit down," as in the old statutes of the fifteenth century, when it was prohibited in favour of archery, then the defence of the country against England, but because the affairs of State were too onerous. King William IV. set a good example by being patron of the Royal and Ancient Club, and gifting a gold medal, which is its chief trophy. The Royal Adelaide Medal, also highly prized, was the gift of Her Majesty the Queen Dowager. Her late Majesty Queen Victoria, of ever blessed memory, showed her interest in her people's highest welfare by encouraging the game in every possible way short of actually playing it, and we are not sure that the putter was not sometimes in her hands at the short courses which were laid out at Balmoral and Osborne. In a letter to the Duke of Buccleuch in June, 1838, it was intimated that Her Majesty was willing to be patron of the Perth Golfing Society, and to confer on it the title Royal, which it has since enjoyed. At the time of her lamented death

more than a score of Clubs in England and Scotland had been permitted to wear this coveted title. In some verses on golf as "Man's Chief End," the writer, referring to the fact that the Duke of Argyll, then Marquis of Lorne, and the late Prince Henry of Battenburg, were often seen out on the green nearest to the palace, says:—

"The Royal game they ca' gowff,  
For Scotland's kings did a' gowff,  
An' noo the Queen,  
On Bemburgh Green,  
Makes a' her callants gowff."

He might have gone further and told how our new King, when, as Prince of Wales he went to study at the High School and University of Edinburgh, no doubt under his mother's instructions, included golf among the subjects to be studied. With Sir James Gardiner Baird, of Edmonstone, who provided the Prince with clubs, Mr. D. B. Wauchope and others, he went down to Musselburgh and got initiated there; and he would have gone oftener and become more of an adept had not the penalty of royalty intervened, for the crowds who wished to see him became so troublesome that he had to give it up. Mr. R. Anderson, Princes Street, has two of the Philp's clubs used by the Prince on that occasion, which he has kindly offered to the Glasgow Exhibition historical collection. Through the courtesy of the *Edinburgh Evening Dispatch* we give a portrait of Tom Brown, who on that occasion acted as caddie to the Prince, and whose genial countenance reminds us of a still more famous old Tom. With the chartered freedom of his clan, the caddie is said to have reproved his employer, who, in trying to hole a putt at the last hole, gave the ball a push instead of a legitimate hit. Sir James Gardiner Baird said to Tom that he must be more guarded in reproving royalty, whereupon Tom, to the Prince's amusement, remarked that "His Royal Highness maun learn, for if he had done that in a match he would have lost the hole." This interesting old man is still to be seen on the Musselburgh Links. He is seventy-three years of age and recently celebrated his golden wedding. One of his sons, Davie Brown, was Open Champion in 1886, a fact of which he is almost as proud as his employment by

royalty forty-two years ago. In June, 1863, His Royal Highness became patron of the Royal and Ancient Club. In the following September he was elected Captain, and thus became the holder for the year of the Silver Club and Royal Adelaide Medal. Other Clubs have rejoiced in his practical support, and if he has not had much time for the game he has trained up his children in the way they ought to go, the Heir-Apparent, the Duke of Cornwall and York, being a fairly good player, while the Duchess of Cornwall and York has been a successful pupil of George Sayers, of North Berwick. Princess Victoria of Wales also excels at golf. The King's brother, the Duke of Connaught, has always taken a lively interest in the game, and became President of the Royal Musselburgh Club in 1876, when stationed at Piershill. The cup presented by him to that Club for annual competition is one of its most cherished possessions. When recovering from his knee accident, some years ago, the Prince resumed golf on the Continent. He played a good deal at Homburg, where one voracious chronicler says: "He is good at putting, and his lack of skill at other parts of the game does not prevent him from being extremely fond of it, and thinking it a very useful addition to the cure," while another declares that "the Prince is throwing himself with greater enthusiasm than ever into the game, and has secured an excellent style." The principal companion of His Royal Highness in the revival of his golf was the Grand Duke Michael of Russia, heir-apparent to the throne of the Czar, who is quite an enthusiast, and who, it will be remembered, was a sympathetic mourner alongside His Majesty at the Queen's funeral. At Cannes, which owes much to the Grand Duke, the Prince also enjoyed golf, and in his company visited various private courses.

At St. Andrews, the headquarters of the game, the proclamation of the new King was fittingly made by the Royal and Ancient being included in the procession of public bodies. The Silver Clubs were draped in crape and carried by the Club Officer, Nicholas Robb; while old Tom Morris, the High Priest of the game, bore the Silver Putter. With the additional cares and responsibilities now devolving on His Majesty, and which, in the spirit of a true golfer, he has taken up with heart and soul, we cannot expect to see our new King much on the course. But his influence as a keen supporter of the game will

undoubtedly still further increase its popularity. He has no more sincere well-wishers than his golfing subjects. May his round as King be successful, happy, and honourable! In "excellent style" he has driven from the tee; may bunkers and bad lies not disturb him more than is required to bring out his prowess, and after the last putt may the green Elysian pastures await him on the other side! Long live our Golfer-King!

## RECENT DECISIONS OF THE RULES OF GOLF COMMITTEE.

THE following are the more important decisions, under the new code, of the Rules of Golf Committee upon points submitted to them since our last issue:—

*Q.*—If a player's ball lie on the sand at the edge of a sand bunker, may he ground his club on the grass behind the ball? According to the spirit of Rule 13, by so doing he does not improve his lie, but according to the wording of the rule he may not ground his club if his ball be in hazard. Does this mean the ground of the hazard?

*A.*—No. It means any ground, whether in the hazard or out of it. The player may not ground his club.

*Q.*—Is it allowable to drop and play a second ball in case the player and his opponent are of opinion that the first ball has been played "out of bounds," and in case it should be found that the first ball had not gone out of bounds, would there be any penalty, and which ball would be considered as "in play?"

*A.*—Yes, quite allowable. If it be found that the first ball had not gone out of bounds it would continue in play, and there would be no penalty.

*Q.*—Is it permissible to place the ball (Rule 15) equal distance away from the hole in front of water instead of behind?

*A.*—No.

*Q.*—Rule 35 (Rules of Golf); Rule 15 (Special Rules for Stroke Competitions)—(1) As no reference under the above Rules is made to a Local Committee, would it be competent for a Golf Club to interpret them thus?—"Any dispute regarding the play between parties engaged in a match or stroke competition

under the auspices of their Club, must be referred to the Local Committee, who may refer the dispute to the 'Rules of Golf Committee,' whose decision shall be final." *Note.*—Rule 35 seems applicable to private matches only. (2) If the answer to the above be in the negative, how do the "Rules of Golf Committee" propose they should be interpreted?

*A.*—The above interpretation is correct.

*Q.*—What is the meaning of the last paragraph in Rule 11 of the New Rules? Presumably a "Golf hole" means a hole on a green to which the competitors are not playing, and from the wording it would seem that a ball lying in it must be dropped on the green and played from there. This surely cannot be what is meant? Has the Rule any reference to a ball on a wrong green, and if not, what has then to be done? If it has, surely "nearly as possible" is intended to mean "off the green," though it does not say so.

*A.*—The Rule means exactly what its wording implies. The query is apparently founded on a misunderstanding, namely, that it is a Rule of Golf that a ball shall not be played off a green other than that to which the player is playing. In cases where such a rule is desirable, there should be a Local Rule to that effect.

*Q.*—Rule No. 4 Special Rules for Stroke Competitions orders that a competitor must countersign his score before handing it in. What is the penalty if the competitor omits to countersign?

*A.*—Disqualification, unless omission notified before close of the competition.

*Q.*—Playing a match, A. and B.'s balls lie on the green. They are all even. A. holes out. In picking out the ball she dropped it against and moved B.'s ball. B. replaced the ball, and holing out, halved. Was the hole halved, or does A. lose it in consequence of her ball having displaced her adversary's?

*A.*—The hole was halved.

*Q.*—A player returned a card (Bogey competition) as five down. It should have been six. Was he disqualified?

*A.*—The Rules of Golf make no provision for such competitions.

*Q.*—Rule 31.—There are two tees on the Churston course from which a ball is frequently driven out of bounds. If this happens, should the player be allowed to lose the distance, as in other cases, and drop a ball on the tee, thereby incurring the penalty of losing distance, plus the disadvantage he originally had of teeing-up, or should he be allowed to start again (losing distance, of course) with the original advantage of re-teeing his ball?

*A.*—The player must drop the ball on the teeing-ground.

*Q.*—In playing for a Medal at St. Andrews a player gets into the Swilcan Burn. On recovering his ball (instead of facing the hole, and standing upright and dropping it over his head, as Rule 19 directs) he turns his back on the hole, drops the ball in front of him, and then proceeds to play. What is the penalty?

*A.*—Disqualification.

*Q.*—In a Monthly Medal Competition, A. took 99 strokes for the round, and told B., who marked his card, his handicap was 18. B., however, to verify the handicap, looked at the list hanging in the Clubhouse, and, in error, put 12 only in the card, and further deducted them wrongly—thus 99, less 12—77—placing the card in a box reserved for the purpose; immediately thereafter he discovered he had marked the wrong handicap, viz., the Match instead of Medal. He asked the Secretary's permission to open the box and correct the error before the cards were taken by the Secretary to ascertain the winner. The Secretary declined to allow the scorer to alter the return, and, owing to Match handicap having been deducted, the player was disqualified, otherwise A. would have been an easy winner. Rule 4 for Medal Play says the score (viz., the number of strokes) shall be countersigned at the completion of the round, which was done, but it makes no mention of handicap. Was the player disqualified?

*A.*—The player was not disqualified. The deduction of the handicap is a matter for the Club Officials.

Q.—Rule No. 6 (Special Rules for Stroke Competitions). If a player loses his ball in playing his first stroke from the tee, is his next stroke from the tee to be counted as his second or third?

A.—Third.

Q.—Casual water on putting-green. (1) Is placing the ball at the side in place of behind water allowed? (2) If it is not allowed, would it be advisable to adopt a rule which, in some cases, obliges a player to loft on a putting-green over several inches of water that may remain there for days?

A.—No. A Club may make any Local Rule they please.

Q.—To certain of the Rules of Golf a penalty is named. For instance, Rule 15 says . . . in water, the player may drop a ball under penalty of one stroke. Suppose a player to replace his ball (*being ignorant of the Rule*), his opponent not noticing it; then to hole out, and mention the fact to his opponent after holing out. What is the penalty (1) in Match Play, and (2) in Stroke Competitions?

A.—(1) Loss of hole. (2) Loss of two strokes.

Q.—(1) In playing an extra hole to decide a tie in a competition, a player accidentally played a ball which did not belong to the match. This was discovered on the putting-green before holing out. Under protest the player was allowed to return and play his own ball, which he did—winning the hole. The Council of the Club decided that he had not won the hole. The player held that this decision was contrary to the Rules of Golf. The Council thereafter decided that these Rules did not cover the question, and settled it by equity. Did the player win the hole?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Rule 1, Definition (e)—Permanent grass in hazard. When a ball is lying as above, is it permissible to remove any piece of paper, or broken twig, or any other loose impediment lying near it on the same patch of grass in the hazard?

A.—Yes.

Q.—Definition of terms “Professional Golfer” and “Caddie.”

—(1) Is a player who has carried clubs for hire as a boy—say up to the age of fourteen or sixteen—but has since abandoned the calling, to be regarded as a Professional, or is he, in all strictness, an Amateur? (2) Is a person who is not a club-maker, but who sells clubs and repairs clubs for hire, to be regarded as a Professional or as an Amateur? (3) Is every person who carries clubs, for hire or otherwise, to be regarded as a Caddie?

A.—This question should be referred to the Amateur Championship Committee.

Q.—A. and B., on completion of a Stroke Competition, were adding up their scores. A. handed B.'s card to the Secretary and requested him to help in the addition, which he did, making the score 104 strokes. B., however, who had also kept her own score, contended that she had done the round in 101, and pointed out that on three separate occasions A. had marked 6 on the card when she, B., had holed out in 5. A. admitted the errors, and stated that through inadvertence she had marked her own strokes on the card instead of B.'s on those occasions. The scores at the holes in question were also confirmed by the caddies. The cards were checked in the usual manner at the conclusion of each hole by the competitors calling out each other's score. The card was accordingly rectified by A., duly signed by A., and countersigned by B., and then formally handed to the Secretary. Was there anything in these incidents to invalidate the score?

A.—No.

Q.—A. playing the odd from the edge of the green holes his putt. B. in playing like strikes A.'s caddie, who is standing at the hole. Does A. lose the hole? If not, what Rule of Golf qualifies Rule 24?

A.—No; A. does not lose the hole. By holing his putt in the odd, he secured the half, at least, and nothing that B. does could deprive him of that.

Q.—Rule 16—What is the penalty if, in Medal Play, the caddie of a player drops the ball instead of the player himself?

A.—Disqualification.

Q.—Rules 3 and 10 (Medal Play).—(1) Rule 3—"No competitor before starting shall play any stroke on a putting-green." Does this mean literally "on," or is "on" intended to mean "on or on to," *i.e.*, may a competitor stand at any distance over 20 yards from the hole and play on to the putting-green? (2) Rule 10—"A ball may be lifted out of a difficulty of any description." Does this include hazards, or does it only refer to difficulties through the green, *i.e.*, may you lift out of a bunker and tee up under the penalty of two strokes? (3) Suppose a new hole should be cut or a teeing-ground moved (back or forward or otherwise) after some competitors have played that particular hole, how would it affect the competition?

A.—(1) This literally means "on." A competitor may stand at any distance over 20 yards from the hole and play on to the putting-green. (2) This includes hazards. (3) No new hole should be cut after any competitor has holed out, and no teeing-ground should be moved after any competitor has struck from it. In the event of either of these things being done the competition would be null and void.

Q.—In one of the rounds of a Club Competition was it allowable for a member (who had been a competitor in a previous round) to act as caddie for another member and give him advice?

A.—Yes.

Q.—A player (in a Medal Round) drove from the tee, and on going to where the ball was expected to be, saw one, which he played; but, on getting on to the green, and while in the act of putting, he became aware that the ball was not his. When this discovery was made his caddie produced a ball from his pocket which he said he (the caddie) had picked up close to where the other ball had been played from, and which ball turned out to be the one driven from the tee. The player then took the recovered ball to where it was picked up by his caddie, dropped it, and played the hole. What was the penalty, the ball having been picked up by the player's caddie?

A.—The penalty is the loss of two strokes.

Q.—(1) May a player lift his ball out of running water in a Hole Competition for the penalty of a stroke? (2) May a



player lift his ball from any water (not casual water) for a stroke?

A.—(1) Yes. (2) Yes.

Q.—A player had to hole a ball lying two inches from the hole, but instead of doing so he picked it up. Before he had lifted it six inches from the ground his partner checked him, and the ball was replaced and holed out. What is the penalty?

A.—Assuming this to be Medal Play the penalty is two strokes.

Q.—A player had addressed his ball, and while on the upward or downward swing the ball began to move, and he hit it while on the move. Does he lose a stroke?

A.—He loses a stroke.

Q.—Is a sheep track held to be a hazard?

A.—No.

Q.—(1) A. and B. are lying like in 4. A. plays a hard following shot on B. B. cups the hole and runs three feet past the hole. A. goes down. B. replaces his ball, and is down in 5. Is A. also down in 5, and is the hole halved, or is it won by B.?  
(2) Can a ball, in any case, be played on an opponent's ball with intended force to displace said opponent's ball?

A.—(1) The hole is halved. (2) A player may play with any force he likes on an opponent's ball, as it can always be replaced.

Q.—A., in a Stroke Competition, drove a ball from the tee and the ball could not be found. On consultation with his partner, and in ignorance of a rule to the contrary, A. dropped a ball where the lost ball was supposed to be under the penalty of one stroke, and played on. The ball was lost on the course. Reference is made to Rule 29 and the latter part of Rule 35 of the Rules of Golf, and Rules 4, 6, and 14 of the Special Rules for Stroke Competitions. It will be observed:—  
(1) That there is no penalty attached to said Rule 6. (2) That there is no rule specifying a penalty for the breach of a rule to which no penalty is attached. (3) That there is no authority in the rules disqualifying A. (4) That in each case where

disqualification is the penalty it is clearly stated in the rule. (5) That he does not exactly come under said Rule 14 through said Rule 29.

(1) Would the breaking of Rule 6 disqualify A.? (2) Would he be disqualified under Rule 4? (3) If the mistake were discovered before the card was returned and handed in, under the objection, would A. be exempted from Rule 4? (4) Could A. be penalised under Rule 14? (5) Had A. gone back and teed another ball would he be playing his second or third stroke?

A.—A. was disqualified. He ought to have returned to the tee.

Q.—(1) Is a Secretary entitled to accept cards not countersigned? (2) If no cards are countersigned is the competition void?

A.—(1) No. (2) Yes.

While giving the above decision the Rules of Golf Committee are unanimously of opinion that it is apparent that neither the Secretary nor any of the competitors were aware of the provisions of Rule 4 of Medal Play, and that, as there is no suggestion of any inaccuracy in the scores returned, the Committee should on this occasion recommend the Club to ignore the decision and award the Medal to the lowest score returned.

Q.—The ladies' course at Eastbourne is a nine hole one, and in competitions the players, who are numerous, play the eighteen holes right off, but have to be sandwiched in, and have to wait nearly an hour between the rounds. In playing a competition the Committee of the Club ruled that any member who left the course between the two rounds would be disqualified. The result would be that competitors would have to sit at the first tee in the broiling sun or drenching rain in order to qualify. They cannot go on, but continue their round as soon as possible. Was this ruling correct, seeing that by Rule 13 (Special Rules for Stroke Competitions) they are only disqualified if they discontinue play on account of bad weather?

A.—The ruling was incorrect.

## THE LATE WILLIE CAMPBELL.

MEN who have existed during a stage of transition—between the death of the old and the birth of the new—are more apt to fall into oblivion than those who are identified with either the earlier or the later period. The lapse of years casts over the one a glamour oftentimes adding to their achievements, while the performances of the latter remain fresh in the memory as acts of the founders of a new era. Among the former may be classed Alan Robertson, the “Dunnies,” old Willie Park, and young Tommy; and among the latter J. H. Taylor, Harry Vardon, Mr. John Ball, and Mr. Hilton. Willie Campbell lived in the transition period, and although it is not more than a dozen years since he was the principal figure of his day as a golfer, there are many to whom he is no more than a name, and many more who have never heard of even his most notable performances, notwithstanding the astonishment they excited at the time. Mr. William Doleman—whose views upon any subject connected with the game must command attention—informed the writer that he considered Willie Campbell to have been the finest match player of recent years. It was undoubtedly in this department of the game that Campbell's genius manifested itself. For about five years, from 1885 to 1890, Willie never shirked an encounter anywhere or with anybody, and only on rare occasions was it that he did not emerge victorious from the contest. Given a hard match and a large gallery, and Campbell was in his glory; they seemed to act like a tonic, and however loose a game he might be playing previously, there was no sign of weakness when the day of the match came. It was in 1884, when about twenty-two years of age, that Campbell first gave evidence of his capabilities by vanquishing J. O. F. Morris by seven holes in an 18-hole match

over St. Andrews, the latter's green. Between that year and 1885 these two had a round half-dozen of encounters, from which the Musselburgh man emerged victorious in all save one, and this one he is believed to have lost by playing a too cautious game, being at one time four up and five to play. How unlike Campbell, his dashing game suggested anything but caution, and if, indeed, caution brought about disaster on this occasion, he must for the future have taken the lesson strongly to heart. Notwithstanding the result of these matches, other opponents were not slow to come forward. There were no open tournaments in those days. The Open Championship was practically the only common arena, and golfers who desired to distinguish themselves had to do so in single-handed encounters. Ben Sayers, Willie Dunn, Davie Brown (fresh from his honours as Champion), and young Willie Park frequently either challenged Campbell or picked up the glove he threw down. The results varied occasionally, but the balance ever lay largely in favour of Campbell. It may be noticed that at least one match arose out of a careful retrospect of the play on a previous occasion. "Campbell no doubt won," said this professional, referring to a past victory, "but his score was no better than I am doing every day in practice," and so the match was arranged. When the day came, however, that professional found to his cost that Campbell had always something in hand, and when required could go one better than his antagonist. When his opponent laid a long approach within ten feet of the hole, Campbell would lash up his ball still nearer, and probably run down the putt. A brilliant stroke from an opponent invariably called forth a better from Campbell; instead of discouraging it stimulated, and hence the spectators at a match where Campbell was a performer could generally rely upon being treated to some sensational bit of play. On the occasion of his match with Willie Park, Campbell eclipsed all previous performances over Musselburgh by holing the four rounds, or thirty-six holes, in 152, a record which stood till 1892. During these five years Mr. J. E. Laidlay and Willie Campbell were much associated. The professional used to carry for the amateur in all his competitions, and frequently they conjoined forces. The best amateur and the best professional, it was a powerful combination, and as partners they were no less successful than each was individually. Such couples as Tom

and Willie Dunn, Sayers and Willie Dunn, Mr. John Ball and J. O. F. Morris, and Mr. Macfie and Davie Ayton, successively fell before them under overwhelming defeats. In 1887 Campbell was at Prestwick as professional to that Club. His scores over that links during his residence there were truly marvellous, culminating with a duly authenticated 71. That year gave a well-defined example of the ill-luck which dogged Campbell in Championship and stroke competitions. Up to the third hole from home he was leading the field easily and appeared certain to win. A slightly heeled tee shot landed his ball in a bunker, converting what should have been a 4 into an 8, and Campbell lost the prize thus practically within his grasp, his fellow townsman, Willie Park, carrying off the coveted honour. In his own graphic way Campbell afterwards described the occasion, saying "Every stroke I played in that bunker cost me a pound note." It was in 1889, however, that Campbell reached the zenith of his career. At this time he had difficulty in finding opponents; to use his own phrase he was "willing to play anything creeping," but no one seemed desirous of taking up his standing challenge to play a match for £100 a side. Archie Simpson was justly considered the rising hope of the "Kingdom of Fife," and very fitly—having in mind the old rivalry between St. Andrews and Musselburgh—he was put forward to pick up the gauntlet thrown down by Campbell. If any match caused excitement that match did—probably more in proportion than any other—for in those days few played golf, and all who did were golfers from top to toe, and not merely in name; men did not golf then merely because it was the fashionable game. Carnoustie, St. Andrews, Musselburgh, and Prestwick were the selected greens, and over each the challenger proved his superiority. In the long game Campbell was Simpson's equal, and in the short game much his superior. Now and again the Musselburgh man holed putts beyond all ordinary expectations. The late Mr. Peter McEwan, speaking of the opening part of the match at Carnoustie, remarked he never saw golf like it. Shortly after that great event Campbell began to suffer in health, and although his play in matches remained good, it was clearly not up to the old standard. After leaving Prestwick Campbell went to Bridge of Weir, and although he played down to 1891, his performances ceased to be noteworthy. Some years ago he migrated to

America, and was one of the first Scotch professionals to go to the United States, where his death took place in the end of last year. It was hoped that abroad there would be a revival of his old form; this unfortunately was not the case, for while he acquitted himself creditably on several occasions, there are no indications of his having nearly approached the game he had at his command before he left his native country. So has passed from us, at the early age of thirty-eight, one of the finest golfers Scotland has produced, and one worthy to be ranked among the historic giants of the game.

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## BESIDE THE BRAIDS.

SOME golfers may have heard of the Highland keeper who was so careful to avoid wounding the feelings of a sportsman whom he knew to be a generous donor though but an indifferent shot. When he was appealed to to explain the reason of the escape of the birds, he answered in the half apologetic way so encouraging to the unsuccessful, "Alloo for the wun', sir, alloo for the wun', an' ye'll be a' richt. I see where ye gang wrang. Alloo for the wun'! A wee thing mair or a wee thing less, but just alloo for the wun'!" It was a sound bit of advice, quite worth the handsome tip that the pawky keeper had in his mind's eye; and not a bit less valuable on the links than over the moor. Times without number have the best of golfers lamented not having acted up to it. The tendency is to allow too little, to cut it too fine, and then there follows the consequent penalty. If the links happen to be bordered with furze, as they should be, a cross wind forms a very dangerous element, and unless sufficient allowance is made for the lateral pressure on the ball, the player cannot hope to keep down his score.

There are greens, however, where the danger attending the wind-swept ball does not arise from that dear old enemy the whin, but from precipitous slopes, along the summit of which the course has been laid. There is a hog-backed ridge of this sort towards the close of the round at Mortonhall, that aristocratic dip of the Braid Hills that provides such excellent sport for a section of the Edinburgh players. It *can* blow on the Braids and their abutments, and it takes considerable judgment, as well as execution on the exposed terraces, to avoid disaster. Yet what a boon are these same heights and summer gales to the youth of Edinburgh! There are more Clubs connected with the old Scottish Capital than with any other city in the world.

Every other institution seems to form a Club, and though these may occasionally shift their arena to seaside links, most of them go forth for practice and contests to the Braids.

The youth of Edinburgh have seized their grand opportunities. It is little exaggeration to say that every available foot of likely turf in the environs of the old town has been put under tribute to the game. Hundreds of city youths, who are engaged throughout the day in sedentary employment, stretch their limbs, open their shoulders, and invigorate and strengthen their frames in the breezes that sweep what were formerly little more than waste places. And not youth only, but age is now found resorting to the same happy golfing ground. The veteran heroes of Modern Athens, preachers, pedagogues, practitioners, are frequently to be seen flogging away, not always, it is true, with the easy grace that characterises their professional labours, but they still seem to get quite as much enjoyment as the more juvenile players, if it cost double the amount of toil.

Good fortune took us forth to Mortonhall on a glorious summer morning, in company with a Scot of Scots, a player of an enquiring and observant mind, with a turn for poetry as well as romance, and who knows the value of the wise man's maxim in its applicability to our national pastime, that "there is a time to keep silence and a time to speak." He is compelled by the inexorable claims of duty to reside "furth of Scotland," but once each year he returns to refresh his spirit among his native hills. But when he "went south" he carried his golfing ardour with him, and, like many another forlorn exile, so skilfully pleaded his cause that a perfect mania for the game seized the minds of his fellow citizens, and they not only laid out a full length course, but lately called upon Mr. A. J. Balfour to open what is described as the second finest Clubhouse in the kingdom. The Leader of the House on the occasion showed himself to be a true idealist, ever hankering after the unattainable, for he declared it to be a much more enviable thing to be a scratch player than to be a member of the British House of Commons, and he may be regarded as illustrating the truth, that the attainment of one's ambition never affords the gratification that one anticipates from it. But though our compatriot and companion for the day at Mortonhall was quite willing to accept the dictum of his honoured guest as to the pre-eminence of golf over politics,

he was still of opinion that he had taken part in a far more stirring and animating function than even the opening of a golf Clubhouse with the glamour of Mr. Balfour's presence and oratory to give it *éclat*.

He had had something to do inaugurating a St. Andrew's dinner, and the memory of that gathering would never fade from his mind. At the critical moment in the evening's proceedings, and at a signal from the M.C., there entered the hall where the sons of Scotland had arrayed themselves, fifteen waiters bearing fifteen several haggises, and preceded by as many kilted pipers. It was a memorable occasion, not to be compared with a golf dinner, whatever lustre was shed on it, nor to be identified with any of those ordinary National festivals where there is commonly more din than dinner.

It was not to be wondered at, when so passionate a patriot found himself on a height from whence he could survey the "Heart of Midlothian," and all its vivid environment, that poetic and historic reflections should crowd, almost too rapidly, upon his mind. After observing that Edina was "Scotia's darling seat," he proceeded to apostrophize "her palaces and towers," the venerable piles within which her Colleges of Justice and Knowledge discharge their useful offices, and that "rough, rude fortress," the very cause of the city's being, and her tower of defence in the days when international contests were not fought out on the football field. And truly, unless when her streets are swept by the east wind or enveloped in haar, when one swallows too much of the raw material to be thoroughly comfortable, she can compare not unfavourably with most other cities of similar magnitude. Her gardens are fashioned by the true blending of art with nature, and her seven hills are massive and picturesque, altogether unlike the puny moleheaps that were the boast of Imperial Rome.

So fondly did our returned Scot dwell upon the landscape, and expatiate on the charms of the varied scene, during the breathing spaces of the round, that one was reminded of the Western tourist, found by a chance acquaintance glued to the Princes Street pavement, gazing in rapt admiration on the summer blending of greens and greys upon the Castle Rock, and the city's eastern framework of Salisbury's beetling crags, and the giant slopes of Arthur's Seat. "Well," said the citizen, in

conscious pride, "What do you think of that?" "Stranger," replied the nasal-toned, wideawaked sightseer, "I have heard of the splendour of Ancient Babylon, and have read the Seer's vision of the New Jerusalem, but I never conceived of anything so beautiful as this!"

And now, in many of the young eyes, the crowning glory of the hills is the triumph of the national game. Golf sits enthroned upon the Braids, and young and old go trooping out to do her obeisance. In the heights and hollows, the gales and hazards of the hills there is health and recreation without stint; and by perambulating the heath they keep the limbs elastic and the brain clear, and sweep away the cobwebs of care and worry, of business entanglement, and professional jealousy. To play golf on the Braids is discipline alike for the body and spirit, sometimes a very mortification of the latter, for the course presents aspects of the game undreamt of on the level stretch of seaside links, and, as has been said of one of the Border greens, the man who can play golf there can play it anywhere.

On Mortonhall only one or two of the holes are steep and exposed, and the ascent is so graduated that the ground can be covered with the ordinary expenditure of energy. It required an early start to get the full quantum of golf and return to the city in time for the afternoon train, but early starting is a fashion on the Braids, where many players take a summer morning round before breakfast, when the dew is on the green, and the gossamer webs glitter like threaded diamonds—a refreshing but not altogether desirable condition of things. So useful, however, is the habit where greens are apt to be crowded, that some of the Clubs set their competitions agoing at 6 a.m.

It detracts much from the pleasure of the game to play fast golf anywhere, but in hilly country it is anathema. Golf should be taken leisurely, as some wine-bibbers consume very old port, meditatively, lingering occasionally over a troublesome putt, with at least brief intervals of pause to talk the game over.

To rush the game in the consciousness that time is limited, or that we can hardly catch the last train, makes a plague of a pleasure, and it is wisdom either to sacrifice the holes or the homegoing. Indeed, a few extra holes, rapidly executed, which some players affect, are sometimes very dearly bought, as some

of our party learned after an outing, such as we enjoyed on Mortonhall, on a links no great distance removed from that pleasant course. "The few more holes" would possibly settle off a previous score, and it was proved to a demonstration that *a later suburban train than was originally intended would take the players to Portobello just in time to catch their connection home*; but when at length they were set down at that busy sea-side junction, it was found, to the dismay of at least one of the party, whom we shall call, to avoid identification, "The Old Man of the Mountain," that the train had already departed.

All sorts of shifts and devices were suggested, into which, however, the railway authorities did not enter with any sympathetic feeling, and even the telegraph clerk remained obdurate for it was *after hours*, and his instructions did not permit of a "few more holes."

There was no way left of letting those friends at home, for whose peace of mind all golfers are so solicitous, know of the *contretemps* that had befallen the strolling players. No alternative presented itself that gained unanimity of opinion, and the issue of an exhaustive discussion was summed up in the title of the most touching of all English songs. The only rift in the cloud of distress was the discovery that a late train would take them at least one stage of the way to a point at which a couple of steeds could be obtained that would enable them to finish the journey before the small hours. In this way the "Old Man" at least would reach the family ingle, and the others were assured that in the village hostelry there would meet them that "warmest welcome" that the poet tells us we must look for "in an inn."

In such brave hope the journey was accomplished, and the midnight air of the drowsy Peeblesshire village was broken by the rattle of hoofs and wheels, and at length the expectant *voyageurs* alighted before the inn. It is a place where excellent fare and shelter are offered to all and sundry, for a consideration. But, alas, they had reckoned without their host, for the ears of the slumbrous Boniface were sealed against every sound, and peals and appeals were alike unavailing. And now but one resource remained, and, what the consequences would be if the "Old Man's" door remained as sternly closed against them, was a riddle none cared either to solve or propound. But all their anxious fears were dispelled when they found that the best

of all welcomes awaited them in the home of the golfer, where the good lady was keeping sleepless vigil, and where the belated trio at length slept the sleep of the weary, after resolving that for some time to come they would forego the "few more holes," and, as well on the links as off, pay more heed to that word of sage counsel and profoundest philosophy, "aloo for the wun."

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## THE IRISH LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1900.

PORTRUSH was unanimously chosen as the venue of the seventh Irish Ladies' Championship meeting, it being five years since the Championship was held there, and the number of entries (56) showed how glad everyone was to go back again to the delightful long course at Portrush. The luck of the draw brought about some very unequal matches in the first round on May 1st. Only one match resulted in a tie, that between Miss Gregg and Miss Tyrrell, the latter only being beaten at the twentieth hole. Another interesting match was between Miss Walker-Leigh and Miss D. Knox, and after a capital match and excellent play the Foxrock player went down after a plucky struggle. For the second round, on May 2nd, the weather was dull, with a gusty wind; but this proved to be a qualified evil, as it cleared the sky early in the afternoon, and left the remainder of the day bright and sunshiny. There was not a single walk-over during the day, and although most of the matches resulted as everyone expected they would, in some instances close competition was witnessed. Miss Dodd only beat Miss Scovell at the twentieth hole, and Mrs. Hezlet beat Miss G. Brownrigg at the nineteenth hole. Miss Magill, runner-up in the Open Championship last year; Miss R. Adair, runner-up in the Irish Championship last year; and Miss N. Graham, a former Champion, all found success more or less easy to grasp in the third round. The most interesting match in the fourth round was between Miss May Hezlet, the Irish and Open Lady Champion of 1899, and Miss Magill. Miss Magill played a magnificent uphill game, as she never got all even with her opponent until the sixteenth hole, which she got in 2. By a splendid putt Miss Hezlet got the seventeenth hole, and the

last hole being halved, the Champion won a beautifully played match by a hole. In the fifth and semi-final round the match of the whole Championship meeting was witnessed between Miss May Hezlet and Miss Rhona Adair. The breeze of the morning, unfortunately, had developed into a heavy gale, which drove sand blindingly across the links, and was accompanied by torrents of rain. No other sport would have been continued under such conditions, but the plucky competitors stood out stubbornly in what became largely a contest of physical endurance, and a large crowd of spectators followed all the way. Miss Hezlet was two down at the turn, but playing up splendidly, the match was squared at the fifteenth hole, and they were all even again at the seventeenth. Miss Adair won the match by a single putt on the last green, the Champion being defeated after a magnificent fight, under trying circumstances, by one who played with rare skill, judgment, and nerve. The final round of thirty-six holes was played on Friday, Miss Adair scoring rather an easy win over Miss E. Hezlet. Both players felt the strain of the "semi-finals," and the play was hardly up to the brilliant form displayed earlier in the competition. Miss Adair was heartily congratulated on her success, and since winning the double event (for a week later she went over to Westward Ho! where she was again successful) she has received the sincere congratulations of the world of golf. She is a consistently steady player, and a particularly brilliant driver. Mrs. Adair, in the unavoidable absence of the Countess of Annesley, presented the prizes to the successful competitors. Miss Adair, besides winning the Championship Medal, won the preliminary scratch score competition with an 89, Miss May Hezlet being second with 94. This brought to a close one of the most successful meetings yet held. Details :

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## THE LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1900.

" 'Tis a far cry " to Westward Ho, yet no fewer than seventy-eight ladies mustered there last May to do battle against Miss M. Hezlet, who had so gallantly won Ireland her first victory at Newcastle, Co. Down, the previous year. Play began on May 15th, and, as usual, extended over the three succeeding days. The favourites at starting were, undoubtedly, the Misses Whigham, of Prestwick, whose long driving and general good play had come as a revelation to the onlookers at the stroke competition on the previous day; Miss L. Dod (the winner of that competition), Miss Pascoe, and Miss B. Anderson, as representing England; and last, but by no means least, Miss M. Hezlet and Miss Rhona K. Adair, the Irish Lady Champion. Here then, as at Gullane in 1897, were the makings of a splendid International contest. The winner sprang from the above galaxy of talent, and history to a certain extent repeated itself, inasmuch as the Irish Champion followed in the footsteps of Miss M. Hezlet, in adding the Championship to her Irish laurels after a display of pluck and staying power which won admiration on all hands.

The luck of the ballot decreed that the holder should meet Miss Sibyl Whigham at the very outset. Miss Hezlet made an unfortunate start in losing five out of the first seven holes, and, although she settled down to a good game thereafter, Miss Whigham threw nothing away, and won comfortably on the sixteenth green. Miss Dod also fell unexpectedly before Mrs. Hoare in the same round, the latter's deadly short game enabling her to win by a hole. On Wednesday the only surprise in the second round was the defeat of the enthusiastic Hon. Secretary (Miss Issette Pearson) by Mrs. Hollings, after she had stood four up at the fourteenth. In the third round there were none. On Thursday the majority of the ties in the fourth round were keenly contested. Miss Pascoe had only a

hole to spare over Miss Walker-Leigh, and Mrs. Richardson held a similar advantage over Miss Blanche Anderson. But the outstanding tie was that between Miss Adair and Miss Sibyl Whigham. Throughout a splendidly played round they were never separated by more than a hole, and it was all to play for at the fifteenth. A brilliant 2 at the succeeding hole gave Miss Adair the lead, and, halving the last two holes, she made her way into the fifth round. In this round the results were unaccountably one-sided. Miss M. Whigham's win over Miss B. Thompson was anticipated, as also, perhaps, Miss Nevile's over Mrs. Hezlet; but Miss Pascoe and Miss Phillips scarcely did themselves justice against Miss Adair and Mrs. Richardson. Indeed, Miss Pascoe missed a number of very short putts. In the "semi-finals," on Friday, Mrs. Richardson went completely off her game against Miss Nevile, who won without playing the last five holes; but the tussle between Miss Adair and Miss M. Whigham was almost a repetition of that wherein the former had beaten the latter's sister. They turned all square, but Miss Whigham's prospects assumed a rosy aspect when she pocketed the next two holes by superior approaching. After a half in 5, Miss Adair straightaway drew level, and, with two steady halves thereafter, excitement rose apace. To the seventeenth Miss Whigham drove an exceptionally long ball, but failing to follow up her advantage lost the hole. Both came to grief at the last hole, Miss Whigham in the ditch beyond the green with her second, and her opponent in the mud at the edge of the burn with her approach after playing safe. Miss Whigham had a yard putt to square the match, but it beat her, and Miss Adair was hailed the winner. The result of the final tie was never in doubt. Her hard struggle with Miss Whigham had seemingly no ill-effect on the Irish Champion, who led by four holes at the sixth, and never gave Miss Nevile a chance of retrieving her position. With the presentation, by Lord Churston, of the Challenge Cup and Gold Medal to Miss Adair, the Silver Medal to the runner-up, and Bronze Medals to the other semi-finalists, a most successful and enjoyable meeting terminated. ## THE AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1900.

THE Amateur Championship, which was decided at Sandwich on May 15th and the three succeeding days, was robbed of a deal of interest by the lamented death of Mr. F. G. Tait, and the absence, at the front in South Africa, of the holder, Mr. John Ball, jun. Yet with such fine exponents in the field of sixty-eight as Messrs. H. G. Hutchinson, J. E. Laidlay, and L. M. Balfour-Melville (all previous holders), Mr. H. H. Hilton, a dual Open Champion, and such slashing young players as Messrs. J. Robb, R. Maxwell, H. C. Ellis, and J. A. T. Bramston, there were the elements of a grand struggle. The magnificent victory he had achieved in the St. George's Challenge Vase Competition on the eve of the Championship, made Mr. Maxwell a hot favourite, yet there were those who thought that the turn of Mr. Hilton, unlucky to a degree hitherto in the contest, had come at last, while the University contingent made no secret of their confidence in Messrs. Ellis and Bramston. On the opening day (Tuesday) the weather was to the north side of friendly, a stiff nor-easter and heavy rain being the concomitants. As a rule, little interest is taken in the first day's play, it being generally of the nature of a "weeding out" process. Now, however, the ballot had fated that several fine players should meet in the second round. In the very first tie Mr. J. M. Williamson, a Bronze Medallist of 1899, was thrown out of the running somewhat unexpectedly by Mr. V. A. Pollock (Felixstowe), as the other Bronze Medallist, Mr. G. C. Whigham, had been by Mr. E. Scrutton, jun., a youthful player of parts, in the first of the three ties which constituted the first round. And then the spectators were treated to a couple of interesting bouts between Mr. A. D. Blyth, the local crack, and Mr. J. Robb, and those veteran opponents Messrs. Laidlay and Hutchinson. Although Mr. Robb was playing at the top of his game, Mr. Blyth made the

pluckiest of fights. Three down at the turn, he succeeded in squaring the match at the fourteenth hole; but Mr. Robb, coming again, won by two up and one to play. Mr. Hutchinson was one down at the turn against Mr. Laidlay, but coming home luck befriended the latter, and he won comfortably three holes from home. Handicapped by sciatica, Mr. J. R. Gairdner was ousted by Mr. Balfour-Melville after a good struggle in the outward half, and then came a great surprise in the defeat of Mr. H. C. Ellis by Mr. C. F. Whigham by three up and one to play. The other matches worthy of note in the round were a stern struggle between Mr. J. L. Low and Mr. A. Maedonald, of Edinburgh Burgess renown, and one nearly as close between the Earl of Winchelsea and Mr. C. E. Dick. The two first named, who played splendidly, ran neck and neck, and Mr. Low only won by a putt. The match between the other couple finished on the seventeenth green. In the third round, on Wednesday, Mr. C. F. Whigham, continuing his good form, beat Mr. H. S. Colt by a "pocketful" of holes, and even more pronounced was the win of Mr. Bramston over Mr. F. Ballingall. Holding Mr. Booth, of the promoting Club, a little too cheap, Mr. Balfour-Melville was unexpectedly worsted by three and two; but Mr. Low again won on the home green against Mr. N. Macbeth, one of the hopes of Lancashire. Mr. T. T. Gray and Mr. C. Hutchings had an extraordinary game. With the latter six down at the tenth all seemed over, yet by a great effort he squared accounts, and an extra hole had to be played ere Mr. Gray overcame him. But the outstanding game was that between Mr. Hilton and Mr. Maxwell, which many regarded as likely to settle thus early the Championship. Inasmuch as he had been easily beaten by Mr. Maxwell at Muirfield in 1897, Mr. Hilton had an old score to wipe out, and he did it in no uncertain fashion. The loser began brilliantly by securing two out of the first three holes, but taking the remaining outward holes in "two under 4's," Mr. Hilton established the useful lead of three. Thereafter Mr. Hilton threw nothing away, and the game was his at the fifteenth hole. Mr. Hilton, whose outward half was taken in 35, played well at every point, but Mr. Maxwell's short game was not up to his usual standard. Mr. Robb and Mr. Laidlay provided the tit-bit of the fourth round. The pair were never separated by more than a hole, and

honours were easy at the thirteenth. At the fourteenth, however, Mr. Robb, when playing the like over the bunker, holed his pitch, and so led for the first time. He did not afterwards relinquish his advantage, and won his way into the fifth round by holing a yard putt at the home hole. An interesting round concluded with a good tussle between Lord Winchelsea and Mr. Low. The former once more excelled himself, and Mr. Low had to cry enough without playing the last hole. On Thursday the improvement in the weather which had set in on Wednesday forenoon continued. Mr. Hilton and Mr. J. Graham, the Hoylake crack, easily qualified to meet in the "semi-finals," and Mr. Robb had something in hand over Mr. Pease. But Mr. Bramston had his work cut out to beat Mr. C. E. Hambro, who had gone round at the low figure of 74 against Mr. H. Finch Hatton, on Wednesday afternoon. It was all to play for at the turn, but by the time the twelfth hole was reached, Mr. Hambro led by two. This deficit Mr. Bramston promptly proceeded to wipe out, and, playing up grandly, won by three and two. On Thursday afternoon Mr. Robb and Mr. Bramston proved splendidly matched for fourteen holes, but the latter "cracked" when the pinch came, and Mr. Robb won more easily than seemed likely at one time. Against Mr. Graham, Mr. Hilton began sensationally by holing a full brassy shot for a 2, and, never giving his opponent a chance, qualified for the final at the thirteenth hole. His outward half was taken in 35, and his score was "one under 4's" when the game terminated.

The concluding day (Friday) was, as usual, devoted to the final tie of thirty-six holes. In the forenoon, albeit somewhat unlucky with his putts, Mr. Robb made an excellent fight with Mr. Hilton, who again played at the top of his game. The difference between them was that Mr. Hilton's long putts went down, whereas Mr. Robb's, after looking in all the way, would aggravatingly turn off at the very lip of the hole. Round in 79, Mr. Hilton finished the morning round three up. In the afternoon Mr. Robb's driving fell away considerably, and going further ahead, Mr. Hilton won his first Amateur Championship by eight up and seven to play. Needless to say his victory was very popular, and he spoke from the bottom of his heart when, in acknowledging the presentation of the Championship Cup and Gold Medal by Capt. Austin, Captain of the St. George's



Golf Club, he said that he had at last attained the height of his ambition. In every tie he played grand golf, and never was a win better earned. Mr. Robb's Silver Medal was also well deserved, and perhaps his day may yet come, but in the meantime his form is too brilliantly erratic to make for absolute success. For a first appearance Mr. Bramston did uncommonly well, and Mr. Graham, the other Bronze Medallist, again justified his claim to be deemed one of the best players of the day. A word of praise must be accorded the Committee of the St. George's Golf Club for their excellent arrangements, which made things comfortable for players and spectators alike. Subjoined are details :

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The conditions which regulate the entrance of players in the Amateur Championship are as follows:

(a) The competition shall be open to all amateur golfers, members of any Golf Club.

(b) An amateur golfer shall be a golfer who has never made for sale, golf clubs, balls, or any other article connected with the game; who has never carried clubs for hire after attaining the age of fifteen years, and who has not carried clubs for hire at any time within six years of the date on which the competition begins in each year; who has never received any consideration for playing in a match, or for giving lessons in the game; and who for a period of five years prior to the 1st September, 1886, has never received a money prize in any open competition.

(c) Competitors shall enter for the competition through the Secretaries of their respective Clubs, who in sending in the names shall be held to certify that the players are *bonâ fide* amateur golfers in terms of the foregoing definitions.

Notwithstanding the provision in Clause c, all entries shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of the Club on whose green the competition is held.

This year's Championship falls to be held at St. Andrews on May 7th and the three succeeding days.

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## THE GOLFING CHAMPIONSHIP, 1900.

ALTHOUGH the redoubtable Harry Vardon had not long returned from a lengthy tour in the United States, he started a strong favourite for the Championship at St. Andrews on June 6th. Indeed, of the eighty who joined issue with him, J. Braid, J. H. Taylor, J. White, and Mr. H. H. Hilton were alone deemed capable of wresting the title from him. Prior to the start, there was a deal of speculation as to what aggregate would be good enough to carry off the honour, and the general opinion seemed to be that the player who averaged under 80's would prove the Champion. How far astray this calculation was will be seen below. The conditions on the opening day were favourable, the light being subdued, and only a gentle easterly breeze to add a stroke or two to the home-coming. This was the order of despatch:—

Driving a fine straight ball, and playing steadily otherwise, Willie Park set the field an 80 to beat straight away. Several came near it, but it was not until J. H. Taylor handed in a 79, that the ex-Champion was ousted from pride of place. To go out Taylor took 39 to Park's 37, but making scarcely the semblance of a mistake in the second moiety, only required 40 for it against Park's 43. Needless to say, Mr. Hilton and Harry Vardon drew after them the bulk of the spectators, who had a rare treat provided for them to the turn, which the former reached by the grandest of golf in 36, Vardon being at this point three strokes to the bad. These he quickly recovered by pocketing each of the first three inward holes in 3. By this time the crowd had become unmanageable. Disconcerted thereby, Mr. Hilton's hitherto fine game deserted him, and what looked like being a noteworthy round eventually totalled to 83. Vardon also was somewhat handicapped, but not so appreciably as his



partner, and he equalled Taylor's score. So also did his brother Tom, and White kept himself well in the running with an 80. Braid's long game was not excelled by any one, but he repeatedly threw away strokes on the greens, and so registered an 82. At this stage Mr. R. Maxwell headed the amateurs with an 81.

The feature of the afternoon round was the magnificent play of J. H. Taylor. Beginning in great style with a 3, he reached the turn in 36, and throwing nothing away coming home, rivalled A. Herd's Medal record of 77, made in the 1895 Championship, which Taylor won. Of the other two erstwhile leaders Harry Vardon did best. In the outward half he left little to be desired, but strokes were dropped here and there on the journey inward, and his aggregate of 160 was four in excess of Taylor's. Mr. Hilton again failed in the second half, his round being 87, as also was T. Vardon's. An 81 by White raised him into third place, Mr. Maxwell coming fourth with 162, while the leading six were completed at 163 by Park and Braid. Thus early, however, such usually reliable players as W. Fernie, T. Williamson, and the brothers Kinnell were, according to the conditions, compulsorily retired, and the final tussle was generally regarded as lying between Taylor and Harry Vardon.

On the second day a chill Scotch mist made matters unpleasant for spectators, but the conditions from a scoring point of view were ideal. Approaching was made easy, and, if putts were up and on the line, down they went. Although qualified to take part in the final stage, Mr. J. L. Low and A. Marr elected not to do so, and this was the order of despatch:—

In Mr. Laidlay, Taylor had an excellent partner, and, of course, they had a large gallery. At the very outset luck befriended Taylor, his second shot jumping the "Swilean," and so enabling him to start with a par 4. Three finely played holes at a like figure gave him welcome heartening, and after being bunkered *en route* to the sixth hole, a magnificent recovery laid his ball dead, and he got another 4. The turn was reached in 37, and home in 41, his victory was thus early practically assured, for it was then known that his great rival was seven strokes behind him at the turn. Only one stroke did the latter wrest back in the home-coming, so that he had "a stey brae" to climb in the final round. White's round was 82, and as Braid's was two less, the couple now tied for third place, nine strokes behind Taylor and three behind Vardon. The last round requires little description. It saw Taylor excel at every point. Mr. Laidlay is a driver above the average, yet he was frequently outdriven by yards. Indeed, Taylor has never been seen to such advantage off the tee. Through the green he was equally good, and his approaching and putting were phenomenal. Every putt was played with refreshing confidence, and down they had to go, so to speak. At the seventh hole he ran down a five yards' putt, at the tenth and fourteenth eight yards' puts, and at the seventeenth—the *bête noir* of all the competitors—he got a fine 5 with a "six yarder." A perfect 4 completed the grandest round ever played in a Championship. Out in 38, he returned in 37, the lowest figure at which this half was taken on the two days, and still further lowered the Medal record for the links to 75. His winning aggregate of 309 was thirteen strokes below that with which he won at St. Andrews in 1895, and he well deserved the ovation he received when his last putt found the bottom of the hole. Harry Vardon also kept his best effort to the last—a 77—and his aggregate of 317 would have appeared a great performance with Taylor's unparalleled figures out of the way. To the close Braid and White continued their keen struggle for third and fourth prizes, but Braid's 79 gave him the advantage by a stroke. The Gold Medal and prizes were presented by Mr. Cathcart, of Pitcairlic, Convener of St. Andrews' Green Committee, who congratulated the Champion on his brilliant victory, and so the last Championship of the Nineteenth Century ended in a blaze of glory.

## THE IRISH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1900.

THE ninth annual "Native" Championship, which was decided at Portmarnock, on Wednesday, 30th May, and the two succeeding days, attracted a record entry of forty-one, and was favoured by perfect weather. The holder (Mr. H. E. Reade) started a strong favourite, and won his way into the fourth round, as did his reputed strongest rival, Mr. O. B. Webb. The pair then met, and after a tie Mr. Webb won an exciting match on the nineteenth green, through the holder's weakness in putting. The way now seemed clear for Mr. Webb, but seemingly his struggle with Mr. Reade had taken the steel out of him, for he fell most unexpectedly before Mr. J. McAvoy in the "semi-finals." The other finalist was Mr. R. G. N. Henry, a local player, whose *début* it was in a Championship connection, and Friday was set apart for their thirty-six holes encounter. Mr. Henry, after being two down at the sixth, actually led by one at the turn, but Mr. McAvoy having slightly the best of the inward half, the first round ended all square. In the second round Mr. Henry settled down to a telling game. Out in 41, he led by two, and made his victory all but assured by pocketing the tenth and eleventh holes. Two halves and a win for Mr. McAvoy prolonged the agony, but the end came at the fifteenth hole, where, down in 5, Mr. Henry was hailed Champion. Details:

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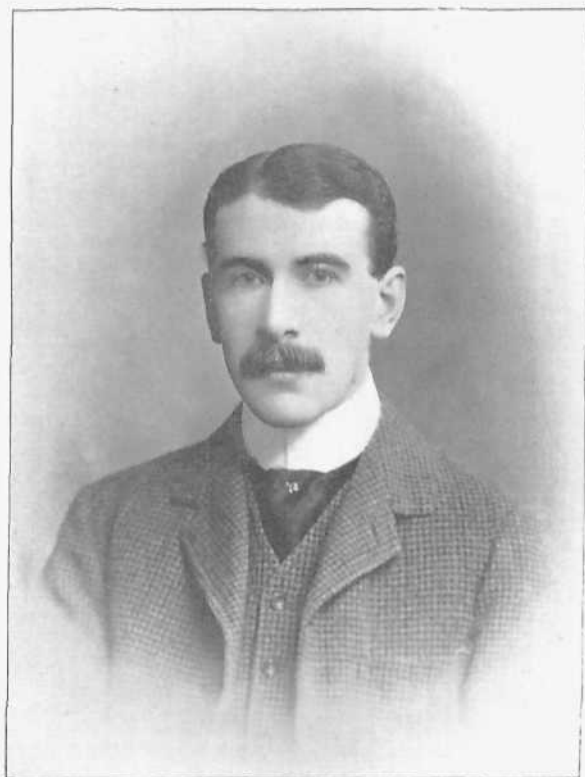

MR. R. G. N. HENRY, who so unexpectedly, yet deservedly, won the Irish "Native" Championship last year, was born at Stewartstown, Co. Tyrone, in 1876, and was educated at Coleraine, among his contemporaries there being a previous Champion in Mr. J. Stewart-Moore, and Mr. R. R. Gilroy, who ousted Mr. John Ball, jun., from the Irish Open Championship at Portrush in 1895. Having secured a position in Guinness's Brewery, Mr. Henry took up his residence in Dublin in 1895, but it was not until two years later that he joined the Portmarnock Golf Club, and became initiated into the mysteries of golf under the able tuition of George Coburn, the Portmarnock professional. By assiduous and careful practice Mr. Henry quickly became proficient, and gradually worked his way from the limit mark of 27 strokes. In May, 1898, he finished first in the Portmarnock Monthly Medal competition, and two months later he carried off the Legal Cup (36 holes) at Portmarnock, and the Captain's Prize at Sutton. In 1899 he excelled himself at Portmarnock by winning the "One Club" competition with a driving iron, his score over the usual Medal course being only 94. And how he won the Championship last year is set forth in the preceding pages. Mr. Henry has a nice easy style of driving, and approaches and putts with accuracy.

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## IRISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1900.

WITH the holder (Mr. John Ball, jun.) fighting for his country in South Africa, the way was cleared for Mr. H. H. Hilton's second success in this important event, at Newcastle, last September. Yet with such fine players in the field of fifty-nine as Messrs. J. M. Williamson, who had beaten him so unexpectedly in the "semi-finals" at Portmarnock the previous year, H. Holden, S. H. Fry, A. Macdonald, Josiah Livingston, H. E. Reade, and the brothers Ballingall, Duncan, and Macfarlane, it was certain that he would require to be at the top of his game to win outright. He was, with the result anticipated. Indeed, the only serious resistance he met with was from the youngest of the brothers Ballingall, who, after losing the first three holes, kept the game going till the seventeenth hole. The scores—75 and 77 respectively—are eloquent testimony to the superb play. Last year's runner up (Mr. Williamson) fell in the third round before that determined player, Mr. H. Holden, who only succumbed to Mr. S. H. Fry in the penultimate round after the most exciting of tussles. In the final Mr. Fry stoutly contested the issue to the turn, but in such deadly fashion did Mr. Hilton play in the home-coming that he won six out of the nine holes. In the afternoon the leader's play was phenomenally good. Only one hole did he allow his opponent to snatch from him, and at the turn, which he reached in 35, the Championship was his by eleven up and nine to play. The arrangements were quite up to the standard of former years, and as the weather had been for the most part good, everybody was sorry to leave hospitable Newcastle. Details :

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## THE LATE MR. W. M. CROAL.

THE celebrated Edmund Burke in one of his famous orations, whilst speaking of the different estates of the realm, which at the time were supposed to be three, pointed to the Reporters' Gallery and said: "Yonder sits the Fourth Estate, more important than them all." Since then the daily press has been referred to as "the Fourth Estate," and there is no doubt as to its being the most important. We need not discuss its power in influencing public opinion, which is its chief feature. Its importance in enabling the public to form its opinion by the accurate transmission of news from all parts of the world is what concerns us here. It is simply marvellous how, on the chart of an ordinary morning or evening paper, the happenings and mishappenings of the world are chronicled. The wonder is not thought of. We put our feet on the fender and comfortably survey all that is going on without thinking of the great labour that is expended in so placing us in touch with the ends of the earth. With many nowadays the first column to be read is the golf column of the daily paper. The majority of mankind have chosen that game as their recreation, and they like to hear about what is being done in the world of golf. Especially when some big match is on do they like to read about it. Great crowds now attend a Championship meeting or a big stake-match. These are but a fraction of the numbers that watch the competition and follow the fortunes of the players. Here comes in the power of the Fourth Estate. They have their emissaries on the field, and these follow the fortunes of war and place before the readers of the press at their fireside the course of the tournament and the issues of the matches. But how different the mode of presenting this picture! In some cases it is high art, the perspective is excellent, the chief points stand out clearly, the



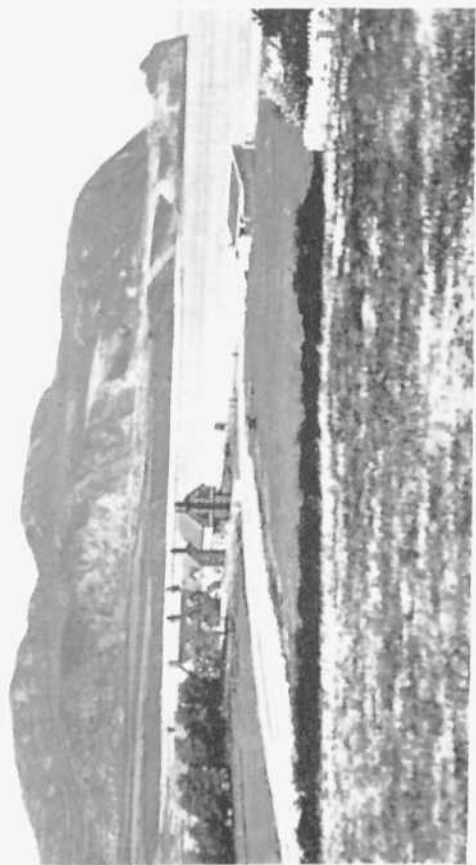
THE LATE MR. W. M. CROAL.

central figure is clear. In others there is no perspective, everything is blurred and confused, and all that can be gathered up is just the ultimate issue. We have no hesitation in saying that the pioneer of this fine art in golf reporting was Mr. J. P. Croal, now the London correspondent of the *Scotsman*. He was, and has continued ever to be, a most intimate friend of Mr. A. M. Ross, one of the finest Scottish amateurs who ever wielded hickory; and when that player was at his best playing some great matches Mr. Croal took up the idea of asking him his own version of the various turns of the match. This with his (Mr. Croal's opinion) was conjoined, and in the *Scotsman* there appeared the extended report, which has continued to be a feature of that paper ever since. Mr. Ross loves to tell how he awoke one morning, and found one of his matches the subject of a column or more, and all the "turns" of the match noted as events of importance. Since then that art has been cultivated with more or less success, but no one has ever equalled Mr. J. P. Croal therein. His *proxime accessit* was Mr. W. M. Croal, the subject of this notice, whose death on January 7th at the early age of thirty-five deprived the Fourth Estate of one of its very best representatives so far as golf is concerned. Mr. Croal belonged to a golfing family. As a native of Haddington, where his father and his uncle, who were both keen golfers, were proprietors of the *Courier*, which had always interesting reports of the game on the East Lothian greens, he grew up in sympathy with golf traditions, and acquired a knowledge of the game which is a *sine quâ non* in successful reporting. When, after a considerable interval, he took his brother's place he tried to act up to his brother's ideal, and he so far succeeded that he came to be recognised as a prince in his profession. Never robust in health, he did not devote much time to the game, or he would have, perhaps, been a successful player. As it was, he contented himself with an occasional round, and gave all his attention to the study of the play of others. This made him quite a connoisseur in the matter of style, &c., at golf. More intimately than any other he knew the strong and the weak points of all the great players; with most of the professionals, from Old Tom to Vardon, he was in intimate fellowship, and at all the tournaments they greeted "Willie Croal" with a hearty shake of the hand as an old and tried friend. So with the chief amateurs. He

had the confidence of them all, and anything he wanted to know they were ever ready to tell him, so that, like his brother, his reports gave their explanation as well as his own. The present Amateur Champion paid this tribute to Mr. Croal's memory in the *Sporting Chronicle*: "Not only was he an excellent judge of the game and its players, but he had also a lucid manner of placing his observations upon paper, which made his work most interesting to read. I have often myself found that it was quite easy to follow the play and main incidents of a match when depicted by the pen of Mr. Croal in the columns of the *Scotsman*. He was at the same time the most interesting of companions, and his cheery countenance will be missed at the big events of the coming season."

Mr. Hilton here shows insight into the secret of Mr. Croal's power. He had the true reporter's eye, which could glance over the whole field and take in the situation, an accomplishment becoming yearly more difficult as the fields grow larger: he could single out the outstanding features of the tournament, his friendship with the chief players secured him information which others could not receive, and his kindly disposition made him always ready to help his neighbours at the reporters' table. His old and best-tryed friend there was Mr. James Dickson, of the *Glasgow Herald*, who possesses a good many of those same qualities which are necessary for the power of the Fourth Estate. By a large and sorrowing company Mr. Croal's remains were followed to the grave in Haddington Cemetery on Friday, January 11th. "The subdued heartfelt words exchanged between the friends who followed him to his last resting-place formed a touching testimony to the sincere regard in which he was held." So writes the Rev. Mr. Proudfoot, the minister of Haddington, who was one of the number. For his excellence in the work he chose for his life's work, his high ideal of his art, his reverence for all that was best in the traditions of golf, and his happy, genial character, Mr. W. M. Croal is well worthy of remembrance in the *Golfing Annual*.

## THE RHOS-ON-SEA LINKS.

RHOS-ON-SEA has long been famous as one of the finest and most picturesque holiday resorts in North Wales, and it has now added to its other attractions an excellent golf course of eighteen holes. Situated about a mile and a half from Colwyn Bay Station (L. and N.W. Main Line to Holyhead), and within walking distance of Llandudno, Rhos-on-Sea will soon be brought into direct communication with both places by the electric tramway about to be laid out between them. Even as it is, it can be reached in about two hours from Liverpool and Manchester, and about three from Birmingham and district. The air is crisp and bracing, and there is a refreshing breeze during the hottest days of summer. There is excellent accommodation for visitors in the Rhos Abbey Hotel and the Rhos Hydropathic, and golfers may also procure bedrooms in the Clubhouse at a reasonable rate. Golfers tickets at a fare and a quarter are granted by the London and North Western Railway from any station to Colwyn Bay on production of vouchers obtainable from the Hon. Secretary or Secretary of the Club, and during the season a 'bus runs frequently from Colwyn Bay. Visitors may have the use of the links and Clubhouse, on application at the Secretary's office in the Clubhouse, at the rate of 2s. a day, 5s. a week, or 15s. a month; juveniles (under 18) half price. The charges for caddies are moderate to a degree. They must be engaged through the resident professional, who is an excellent coach. The Clubhouse, which contains every convenience both for ladies and gentlemen, faces the sea; and the links, which comprise over 120 acres of capital golfing ground, extend along the marine drive connecting Colwyn Bay with Llandudno. They are held on a long lease, with option to purchase, and command a magnificent view both of the mountain and sea. The hazards, which are all natural, are of a thoroughly sporting character, and there is no crossing

throughout the round, which is almost three miles in circuit. The lengths of the holes are as follows :

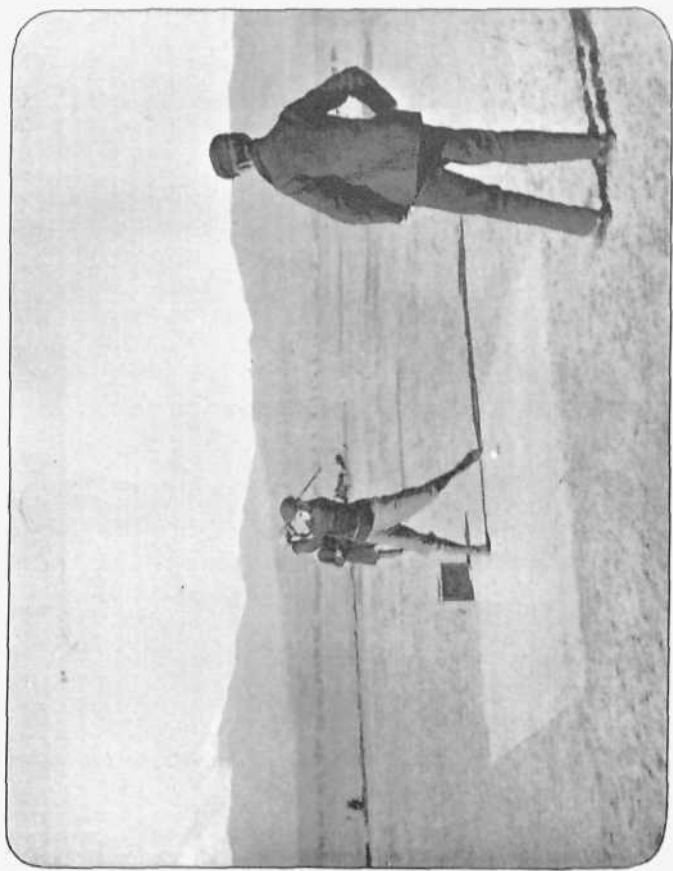

Macbeth, the youthful Lytham crack, who is now resident in Bombay, started a strong favourite, and justified the preference by finishing an easy first in the thirty-six holes qualifying stroke competition, wherein a previous dual Champion, in Mr. R. D. Murray, just failed to secure a place in the last eight to play off by holes. All the other likely men, however, remained in the place of hope, including previous holders in Messrs. F. S. In the first round of the final stage, Mr. Macbeth held the whip hand of Mr. Stewart throughout, and so also did Mr. J. S. Smith over Mr. Pym. After a fine struggle for twenty-seven holes, Mr. Lamb went right away from Mr. Simson in quite his old style; but, handicapped by an injured hand, Mr. Drimmie, last year's runner-up, was unable to do himself justice against Mr. Urie. In the first of the "semi-finals" Mr. Macbeth early took a strong lead, but just as his success seemed likely he went off his putting, and Mr. Smith squared accounts on the first nine holes. In the second he had the best of the luck, inasmuch as his ball jumped a couple of bunkers, and he won an unexpected victory by three up and two to play. It was ding dong, however, between the other two, Mr. Urie winning by a putt after Mr. Lamb had holed the "long odds" from the edge of the green. The final found Mr. Urie pressing and slicing his drives, and Mr. Smith won his second Championship within two years with great ease. In addition to the custody of the Championship Cup, he was awarded a prize valued at 150 rupees, while Mr. Urie took the second prize (value 100 rupees), and Mr. Macbeth the special prize for the best rounds in the qualifying competition, as also that for the visitor returning the lowest score. The Club formerly played on the Aberdeen Links course, but on March 31st, 1888, they opened a private course on the Balgownie Links, situated two miles north of Aberdeen, near the mouth of the Don, conveyance by tramway or cab. The course of eighteen holes is about three and a half miles in length. A commodious Club-house stands on a high hill overlooking the Don, and the view from it embraces the entire coast line from Girdleness to Buchanness.

The Aberdeen Golf Club appear to have come after, and in the place of, a Club called the "Society of Golfers at Aberdeen," instituted May 9th, 1783, a printed copy of whose "Regulations, with a list of the original members and the Laws of Golf," is still extant; but this "Society of Golfers" had become dissolved before the institution of the present Club. A Golf Club must have existed in Aberdeen even before 1783, as the ballot box still in the possession of the Club bears the inscription, "The Aberdeen Golf Club, 1780." The game itself has been played on the Aberdeen Links from time immemorial.

The approximate lengths of the holes in the Medal round are as follows: 1st, 275 yards; 2nd, 227; 3rd, 390; 4th, 300; 5th, 185; 6th, 510; 7th, 480; 8th, 283; 9th, 600; 10th, 280; 11th, 375; 12th, 300; 13th, 330; 14th, 427; 15th, 300; 16th, 350; 17th, 320; 18th, 350.

The record for the extended course is 74, by A. Smith (professional), on September 17th, 1897. The par of the round is 76.

The starting point for the nine-hole course is close to that for the eighteen-hole one, and although it is commonly called the "duffers' " course, that is indeed a misnomer. It is a thorough test of golf, and the only pity is that many *bonâ fide* duffers consider it altogether beneath their dignity to try their tempers on it. The burn, as on the long course, is an inexorable hazard; there is simply no dodging it. Twice has it to be crossed *en route* to the first and third greens, once to the fourth, and the last green of all is in hazardous proximity to it. There are also bunkers and broken ground galore. The par of the round is 34.

The courses are now kept up by the Police Commissioners of Carnoustie, by whom the links have been acquired for the purposes of golf only, and a Committee comprising members of the local Clubs. A small charge for visitors has now been imposed. Carnoustie Station is about five minutes' walk from the links. In the town there are five hotels besides every variety of private lodgings.
