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

### THE LATE MR. C. STUART GRACE,

By the Rev. Joun Kunn, M.A., Dirleton.

SAINT ANDREWS, the classic city of the Royal and Ancient Game, has to thank the faithful devotion of many worthy citizens for upholding her fame and her name, and keeping her, notwithstanding the wonderful development of golf both at home and abroad, still facile princeps among the cities or centres to which golfers are wont to resort. No one ever more faithfully and devotedly served the old grey city than Mr. Stuart Grace, who died at his residence in St. Mary's Place there on January 2nd last in his eightieth year. In the world of golf, as in other worlds, there are records and records. But the record of the Grace family is unique; four generations of the family having in succession held the secretarial office in the Royal and Ancient Club over the space of 120 years, and having for the same long period fulfilled the responsible office of City Clerk and Commissary Clerk of the County of Fife. Apart from the connection of the family with golf at Saint Andrews, the name seemrs in the Crail records, Mr. Stuart Grace, grandfather of the subject of this notice, having been Secretary to the Crail Golfing Society in 1786, a proof surely, if such were needed, of the devotion of the family to the game. It was in 1781 when this Society, which had been founded by some members of the Honourable Company in 1754, was in its twenty-seventh year that Mr. Grace was appointed Secretary, and with the exception of a short interval-1838 to 1842-when his grandson was studying at the University, the office has been in the family ever since, or at least, till the present Mr. C. S. Grace resigned

in favour of a paid Secretary a few years ago, he continuing. however, to act as Treasurer. His son Charles was admitted a member of the Club in 1811; in 1812 he was appointed Joint Secretary along with his father, and the "new regulations for the game of golf" adopted by the Society in that year, based on those framed by the Honourable Company at Leith in 1809, were signed by him as Secretary. His father died in 1818, and Charles -the first of that name -continued to act as Secretary until his death, which occurred in 1837. On May 4th, 1836, there is a "minute" of the Royal and Ancient Club resolving that "considering the very kind and handsome manner in which Mr. Charles Grace had gratuitously devoted his time and attention to the interests of the Club for twenty-four years, and at the same time bearing in mind that his late respected father had seted similarly for thirty years, the members as a mark of their heartfelt gratitude, resolve that plate amounting in value to a sum not less than one hundred guineas he presented to him." Subscriptions were limited to £1. A sum of over £140 was raised, and applied in the purchase of an elegant and richly embossed plateau and a hot water kettle and stand, on which a suitable and very grateful inscription was engraved. These presentations, it is needless to say, are cherished as precious heirlooms by the family. In 1837, soon after receiving this bandsome presentation, Mr. Grace died, and his son-the second Charles-being then only a lad of fifteen, Mr. Berwick, who had charge of his father's business, acted as interim Secretary till June 15th, 1842, when the subject of this notice was appointed. He was the oldest survivor of those who were members of the Union Parlour and the Royal and Ancient Clubs. which were merged together in 1854. It is almost impossible for any one fully to realize how much Mr. Grace had to do with building up the Royal and Ancient Club, and fostering its prosperity. He devoted a good deal of his time-much more than any one could have suspected-to it, and year after year he was pleased to see it increase, not only in numbers, but in reputation, till it became the undoubted head and centre of golf. There are plenty to grumble to-day, but they never think of the self-sacrificing labour that was bestowed so ungradgingly on the work of the Club by those who have gone. As a young man he played a good deal; the morning round before breakfast being an

excellent preparation for the day's work. He was the very soul of hospitality, and at his house might be met every day some distinguished citizen or stranger-for all were made welcome, and to all he was most agreeable and kind. His recollections of old-time players, such as Old Sutherland, Campbell (Schiehallion), Whyte-Melville, Blackwood, and many others, were delightful; and he loved to talk of the good old times, even when his official connection with the Club ceased. This was in 1885, when he had held office for the long period of forty-three years, and on his retiral, the Club, at its general meeting in September of that year, requested the late Principal Tulloch and Major Bethune, of Blebo, to prepare a minute expressive of their appreciation of Mr. Grace's services, and the esteem in which he was held by the members. He had—so ran the minute—"spared no pains to advance the interests of this Club, and to conduct its business, frequently involving large expenditure of time and trouble, with courtesy and kindness to all." Shortly after, the Club presented him with a magnificent service of plate, inscribed with a glowing tribute of gratitude. The parish minister, the Rev. Mr. Playfair, in preaching in St. Mary's after his death, said he never asked his help without meeting with the greatest kindness and the most prompt response, and an invitation to ask him at any time for help for the poor of the parish. Diligence, faithfulness, and integrity in the discharge of his duties were amongst the qualities he possessed. Like Sir Hugh Playfair, with whom he was connected by marriage, he was a great benefactor of the city, and the large concourse of mourners at his funeral testified to the esteem in which he was regarded by the community. Old Tom Morris, by special desire, acted as one of the pall bearers on the mournful occasion when his remains were committed to their last resting place in the old Cathedral churchyard.

On his retirement, his son, the third Charles, took the Secretary's duties and discharged them with much acceptance, till their onerous nature required the election of a paid Secretary. Even since then his counsel has often been called in on trying occasions such as Championship gatherings, and he still continues to act as Treasurer to the Club.

### RECENT DECISIONS OF THE RULES OF GOLF COMMITTEE.

THE following are the more important decisions of the Rules of Golf Committee upon points submitted to them since our last issue .—

Q.—In a tournament a competitor drove off from the wrong teeing ground at the commencement of his second round. Attention having been called to this he went to the correct teeing ground, teed another ball and made a fresh drive. Was he disqualified or not, under Rule 5 of the Special Rules?

A.—He was not disqualified.

Q.—A. has played from tee, he then goes up to his ball, and after having addressed it in the usual way, starts his upward awing, and, while swinging, his ball moves, and then stops in a different position. A. continues his swing (not ever having stopped it) and hits the ball. How many strokes has A. played (altogether), two or three?

A.—Three strokes altogether.

Q.—A player on getting to the first green found that his putter had not been put into his bag. He used his opponent's putter for this hole, and thereafter, along with his caddic, returned to the professional's hut, which is situated on the course ten yards from the first teeing ground to find his own putter—he being away for about eight minutes. Was he disqualified from the Stroke Competition in which he was engaged?

A .- Yes.

Q.—In a Medal Round the competitors keep each others scores, and, on the face of the same card, where space is provided for the purpose, they also keep their own scores, thus on the face of each card the full scores of the couple are shown. Is Rule 4 of "Special Rules for Stroke Competitions" complied with, if the two players sign a card each and return both? The card is thus duplicated, but with separate signatures.

A .- No.

Q.—On an eighteen hole course the ninth green is adjacent to the Club-house. In a Medal Round of eighteen holes, may a competitor, on completion of nine holes, enter the Club-house (a) to change his clothes, (b) to obtain refreshment, or (c) for any purpose. If not, what is the penalty P

A.—He may do so provided he keeps his place on the green.

If he allows the next couple to pass him, the penalty is

disqualification.

Q.—May a competitor drive off for the next hole before holing out the one he is playing for, either in Medal or Match Play, and if not, is he disqualified?

A.—He is disqualified in Medal Play. In Match Play it

could not be done without the consent of his opponent.

Q.—A. plays a match against the best ball of B. and C. C. is struck by B,'s ball in playing through the green. Does A. win the hole?

A .- A. wins the hole from B., but goes on playing against C.

Q.—In playing a match against the best of two balls—say A. against B. and C.—is B. responsible and equally liable for C.'s breaches of rules?

A .- No.

Q.—When a ball is driven out of bounds from a tee (in Match Play) and (a) lost, is it a lost hole? (b) If found, does the player re-tee or drop on the tee, playing two, and simply losing the distance?

A.—(a) No. (b) Whether found or not, the player drops on the tee, losing the distance. Q.—A player from the tee put his ball into rusky ground, where it was unplayable. To tee the ball behind the place where it lay, under penalty of two strokes (Rule 10, Special Rules for Medal Competitions), compelled the player to go further back than the tee from which he had played it. Might the ball have been teed on the course to the side of the difficulty, but not nearer the hole?

A .- No.

Q.—Rule 4 of Special Rules—A and B played together and scored for each other. On their eards being examined it was found that A.'s score was entered on a eard marked with B.'s name. It was signed by both players. Can the eard be accepted as returned by A., having regard to the fact that although it is signed by A., it also purports on the face of it to be B.'s eard?

A.—Yes.

Q.—A. drove out of bounds, but played his second from the spot where his ball lay, not observing that it was out of bounds. The hole was halved in 4. After driving off to the next tee, B. remarked that A. must have been very lucky after his tee shot at the previous hole to find his ball on the course. On A 's attention being drawn to the position of his ball by this remark, he remembered that he must have been out of bounds. The boundary at this point is "the cultivated land"; there is no fence bounding the cultivated land. Was B entitled to claim this hole? A. objects, stating that if B. had claimed in time A. would have been entitled to go back to the tee and play the hole over again under the usual penalty for driving out of bounds, and that on the analogy of the second paragraph of Rule 28, B,'s objection cannot be entertained after the parties have driven off to the next hole.

A.—B. cannot claim the hole after the parties have driven off from the next teeing ground.

Q.—A.'s ball is in a bunker, and in his backward swing, i.e., when striking at the ball, not whilst addressing it, he slightly touches the sand in the bunker. Is there a penalty, and if so what?

A .- A. loses the hole.

Q.—Can a player in a Hole Match at same time return score for a Stroke Competition, stimies having been played and the ball on all occasions been holed?

A.—Yes, provided he committed no breach of the Special Rules for Stroke Competitions.

Q.—A. and B. are playing in a Stroke Competition. A. is the player. B.'s ball lies on the other side of the bole. A. plays, his ball runs round the hole and strikes B.'s. B.'s being on the slope, A.'s ball after contact runs back down the slope into the hole. Previous to that stroke neither A. nor B. thought B.'s ball likely to interfere with or assist A.'s ball in any way as per Rule 11 Stroke Competitions. What is to be done in such a case? Is A's ball supposed to be holed in said stroke?

A .- A.'s ball is supposed to be holed in said stroke.

Q.—A competitor's partner adds up score, signs card, and puts same in locked box provided for the purpose. On the competitor asking for card to sign, is the Secretary justified in giving it back for signature, or must the player be disqualified?

A .- The Secretary was not justified in giving back the card.

and the player was disqualified.

Q.—Is it allowable to stand out of bounds in order to play a ball lying just within bounds?

A .- Yes.

Q.—Should a ball lying on a purting green, other than that to which the player is going, be placed or dropped when lifted?

A.—That depends on a local rule. If there is no local rule, the ball must be played from where it lies.

Q.—Playing in a Stroke Competition, a player driving off a tee at the edge of a large gravel pit (nearly square in shape) to a hole on the far side of the gravel pit (the whole gravel pit forming a bunker), the player's ball was sliced and dropped in the far right-hand corner of the gravel pit. The player decided to avail himself of his right (under Rule 10, Stroke Competitions) to lift his ball and go back and tee his ball behind the difficulty under a penalty or two strokes. Is he entitled to go back and

and that the match was tied again. What was the result of the match?

A .- A. won; he incurred no penalty.

Q.—In a Stroke Competition one of the competitors stopped during his round to have tea in the Club-house. He afterwards continued his round. He did not lose his place on the green. Was he thereby disqualified?

A.—As he did not lose his place on the green he was not disqualified.

Q.—In playing a match A.'s ball lies under a wire boundary fence. Both players agree that slightly the larger half of the ball is within bounds. Should A. be required to play this ball where it lies, or should he lift and drop at the place from which the ball was struck in accordance with Rule 31?

A .- A. ought to have played the ball.

Q.—In a match between C. and D., C.'s ball is found sticking on a spike on the inner side of a barbed wire boundary fence. What is C. to do?

A.—Assuming the "inner" to mean the course side, C. must play the ball.

### THE AMATEUR STATUS.

MR. HENRY GEORGE, discussing social problems, paints a lurid picture of the troubles which attend civilization and progress. As society develops, he tells us, the increasing complexity of social organisation brings liability to new dangers. Had be been so minded, he might have driven the nail bome by citing golf as one of the terrible examples. Twenty or thirty years ago golf disported in her primitive nakedness; unfortunately (or to be more truthful, fortunately) civilization overtook her, and the goddess perforce became attired in garments, to which have from time to time been added innumerable frills, rendering the outlines of her graceful figure less and less discernible. The Sassenach is, of course, blamed for a good deal of this, no doubt rightly, for long after he was wearing breeches the Scotchman was going about with bare legs.

The amateur status question has come to be one of said innumerable frills. It is difficult, if not impossible, to discover when exactly the division between amateurs and professionals came to be made. Certain it is that players like Allan Robertson and "the Dunnies" were regarded in the same light as professionals are now-a-days, but there was little or no occasion for any hard-and-fast distinction, and even after the institution of the Open Championship, which for the first time provided a field in which both classes could intermingle, matters did not greatly advance. Comparatively recently artisans played for the Championship presumably as amateurs, for there was nothing to distinguish the capacity in which they entered, and only when one attained a high place and received prize-money did he become a professional. Indeed, I have been informed that in these days it was not unusual, speaking generally, for amateurs to receive money prizes. It is practically certain that the institution of the Amateur Championship first brought the matter into prominence.

Originally, such distinction as existed was of a social nature more than anything else, and each Club voiced its opinion for itself alone, as individual names were submitted to the ordeal of ballot, and, while the majority of Clubs admitted to membership only gentlemen who played for amusement, there were also, as far back as forty years ago, Clubs which numbered in their ranks several golfers who were undoubtedly professionals in every sense of the word. Such golfers were at the same time both amateurs and professionals; in their own Clubs they were amateurs competing with amateurs, in open field, competing against members of other Clubs, they were professionals; and so long as there was little chance of colliding interests, nobody bothered about this unsatisfactory condition of things. But whenever the meeting of the two elements in common field became probable, some distinct line of demarcation became a necessity, and accordingly this line was drawn by the Committee in charge of the Amateur Championship Cup. By their definition.

An amateur golfer shall be a golfer who has never made for sale any golf clubs, balls, or any other articles connected with the game, who has never carried clubs for hire after attaining the age of fifteen years, and who has not carried clubs for hire at any time within six years of the date on which the competition begins in each year; who has never received any consideration for playing in a match, or for giving lessons in the game, and who for a period of five years prior to the 1st September, 1886, has never received a money prize in any open competition.

This definition can hardly have been intended to be declaratory of an existing distinction, and seems rather a fair attempt to meet an existing difficulty.

It may be remarked, in passing, that there is no good ground for the belief held by a few that to play for a shilling or half a crown makes both parties professionals, a result they evade by settling their liabilities in bad gutta-percha, instead of good coin of the realm.

The definition before quoted has, be it noted, no actual effect beyond controlling entrants for the Amateur Golf Championship, but, as a matter of fact, in all open amateur competitions it is usually and rightly adopted. Otherwise Clubs are now, as hereto-

fore, quite at liberty to elect to their membership and admit to such competitions as they may organise whom they please. Such a state of matters must continue to exist until some representative Golfing Association is formed, which will be able to bring under its sway practically all Golf Clubs, for whom it will legislate on this and the like subjects.

The United States Golf Association have a definition of their own making. At first they were content to accept the regulations which prevail in this country. Then they adopted, in 1896, some very drastic rules, which according to opinions expressed by capable judges had the effect of making professionals of even those who received remuneration for writing about the game. These were watered down in the following year, and last year the following were adopted:

No person shall be considered an amateur golfer, or shall beeligible to compete in the Amateur Championship of the Association :

1. Who receives a money consideration, either directly or indirectly, by reason of his connection with, or skill displayed in playing, the game of golf.

2. Who plays for a money prize in a match or open

competition.

3. Who receives money for giving lessons or exhibitions of skill in playing the game of golf.

4. Who lays out or takes charge of a golf course for hire.

5. Who carries clubs for hire after attaining the age of fifteen years. 6. Who personally makes for sale balls or other articles

connected with the game of golf.

7. Who is classified as a professional in any athletic sport. 8. Who receives compensation for services performed in any

athletic organization.

9. Who plays the game or frequents golf courses for thepurpose of exploiting business.

10. Who enters a golf competition under an assumed name. 11. Who sells or pledges any prize or token obtained through

connection with the game of golf.

12. Who, with the intention of promoting any business, receives transportation or board or any reduction or equivalent thereof as a consideration of his playing golf or exhibiting his skill as a player.

13. Who has Club dues or charges paid by another person as

an inducement to become a member of a Club.

In the issue of February, 1896, Golf quoted an article on the subject of the amateur status chiefly with regard to professionals. in other classes of sports being allowed to compete as amateurs in golf. The Editor then gave a history of the definition of "amateur," which briefly was to the following effect: The "Gentleman Amateur," as defined in 1865, by the English Amateur Athletic Club, was—

Any gentleman who has never competed in an open competition nor for public payment nor admission money, nor with a professional for a prize, public money, or admission money; who has never at any period of his life taught, pursued, or assisted in the pursuit of athletic exercises as a means of livelihood, and is not a tradesman, mechanic, artisan, or labourer.

This definition, it was explained, contains the fundamental principles which have guided all athletic bodies in distinguishing between professionals and amateurs. The class distinction which appears in the above definition was removed, it is understood, about thirty years ago, and in its place came an exclusion of all "who taught, pursued, or assisted in the pursuit of athletic exercises of any kind as a means of livelihood." All branches of sport and all countries appear to have adopted rules founded upon these principles.

The Editor of the Annual has kindly furnished me with the definition of amateur in present day sports other than golf. I will quote only that adopted in 1896 by the Amateur Athletic

Associations of the three kingdoms:-

An amateur is one who has never competed for a money prize, or monetary consideration, or for any declared wager or staked bet; who has never engaged in, assisted in, or taught any athletic exercise as a means of pecuniary gain; and who has never taken part in any competition with anyone who is not an amateur.

The Rugby Football Unions have no definition, and while not admitting of paid players, admit to their Unions professionals in other sports. The Rowing Association adhere to the old "gentleman amateur" standard.

Comparing the golf definition with those of other sporting bodies, several peculiarities are at once evident.

 It alone makes professionals of those who manufacture the implements of sport.

It alone permits a professional to become an amateur.
 It alone, among all bodies who have such a definition,
 legislates for itself alone without paying any regard to kindred

sports.

4. It alone permits amateurs to compete with each other for money. And

5. It permits amateurs to compete against professionals.

For all these, a reason more or less satisfactory as regards the past can be alleged. Thus the inclusion of club and ball makers as professionals dates back to the time of the famous players, when all club and ball makers were de facto) professionals, and, similarly, a reason perfectly valid at the time of framing these rules can be given for allowing boys who had carried clubs to purge themselves of professionalism and become amateurs. As regards amateurs competing against professionals—mark the converse does not apply—this is not singular to golf, but is permitted as regards cricket and Association football.

While, however, the reasons for the peculiarities above noticed might be excellent at the time the rules were formulated, it is very doubtful if they still hold good. The retaining of the clause constituting club and ball makers professionals at the present day gives rise to very many anomalies, and who can presume to draw the dividing line separating all grades which might fall within the strict application of the law from the humble working club maker on the one hand to the magnate manufacturer of sporting requisites on the other. I apprehend that properly speaking all are in the same category, just as a peer who sits in the House of Lords is no less a brewer than the man who presides over the mash tun. Yet as a matter of fact the two extremes are differently treated. Exactly the same argument can be applied to the other illustration. Formerly, when caddies were few, practically no boys but chiefly wellknown men, it was nothing very derogatory for any decent lad to carry clubs for a friend, sometimes for a stranger, and probably earn a shilling or two thereby. Now, however, such a thing is unknown, and carrying clubs has come to be more than before-a recognised employment. Of course, it will be necessary in future to continue this same clause so as not to disqualify any who may be benefitted by the existing law.

It has been suggested that the "clean slate" would be the best solution of the difficulty, that is, abolish all distinction. But would that be satisfactory. I think not. The result would probably be to drive gentlemen amateurs out of all public fields, and I feel sure that it would be with regret that those interested

in the game would see some of the finest talent in golfing circles. confined to Club competitions. It was to give them a meeting place that the Amateur Championship was instituted, and toadopt the "clean slate" would practically mean its abolition, and thus be a retrograde movement.

Notwithstanding all the grumbling there is, it is useless to deny that the present British definition has worked out fairly well. One can only express his own opinion, and that is mine. But when an alteration comes to be made, I think that some modifications such as are above hinted at might be made.

For any person to frame a fresh definition is somewhat presumptuous, but it is only by the expression of individual views that a general opinion can be obtained, and without in any way presuming to imagine that it is immaculate, I venture to suggest the following as an improvement upon the present rule, viz:

An amateur golfer shall be a golfer-

(1) Who has never carried clubs for hire after attaining theage of fifteen years;

(2) Who has never engaged in playing or taught the game asa means of pecuniary gain :

(3) Who has never received a money prize :

(4) Who has never since the date hereof entered a golf com-

petition under an assumed name :

(5) Who is not classified as a professional in any athletic sport. Provided always, that nothing herein contained shall disqualify from competing as such any amateur golfer entitled atthe date hereof to rank as such under the previously existing rule.

### THE LATE MR. JOHN CONGALTON.

ONE might, without either being accused of old age or pessimism, maintain that the former days were better than these when memory recalls the days of old Luffness and its worthy. genial Secretary, John Congalton, whose portrait is here given, and whom, alas! we must now see no more either at Luffness or Kilspindie, for John died at Aberlady on February 1st at the advanced age of eighty-two, and by his death there was severed one of the most interesting links connecting present and past golf in this famous golfing district. John's forbears belonged to the parish of Dirleton, in which there is an estate with the family name, which is common in the district; but he had no educational start of any consequence in life, which explains the curious hieroglyphic in which he wrote, and the amusement he used to give by his characteristic natural wit, and his original manner of pronouncing "lang nebbit" words, e.g., "stamynie" for "stamina," "illegible" for "eligible," and so on. started life as a shoemaker, and was so careful that he soon made a comfortable competency and purchased property of his own in Aberlady, became Inspector of Poor, etc., and died comparatively wealthy, leaving, among other legacies, a fund of £300, the interest of which is to be annually given in coals to the poor at Christmastide. The deceased gentleman had a good memory and antiquarian tastes, and it was always interesting to hear him dilate on old times and old characters. He did not quite remember the days when the 5th Earl of Wemyss (1723-1808) (who built Gosford that he might come from Amisfield and golf there, but was afraid to inhabit it) used to come down and play with the parish minister of Aberlady, Dr. Neil Roy (1730-1811), but he had heard others tell of their doings, and how the doctor if he wished to enjoy his dinner, was careful not to

win his match. The Aberlady boys used also to make free at times with the clubs and balls of the earl and the minister, and thus cultivate their taste for the game. In later days, the boys used to lie by the roadside to wait the return of the members of the old North Berwick Club, who used to drive from Edinburgh and return after their medal play in the evening, and at the old cry of "Poor oot," the boys got the used balls for nothing from the gentlemen, or, perhaps, for very little from their caddies.

"A shillin," John once told us was the usual price demanded by the Musselburgh man for the second-hand article, "but if they werena owre muckle disjeskit they wad be aichteenpence a piece." History repeats itself. Before the present Kilspindie took the place of old Luffness there was an old Kilspindie Club which had high festival on Handsel Monday, then a general holiday in the district, and of this John was one of the chief members. When the Volunteer movement drove them off their course at Greencraig most of them combined to form the old Luffness Club in 1867, and of this Club John was Secretary for many years, and golfers who remember the olden days know how much his genial welcome, his kindly consideration, and his never failing fund of anecdote, contributed to the enjoyment of the game on this grand old ground, with its quaint Club-house, the scene of many a happy half hour with the Secretary after the play was over. For many years "honest John" discharged the Secretarial duties free, but as the work became more onerous he was awarded a small salary. No better business man existed than he, his work for the Golf Club and the Parish Council was most methodical, and his heart was always thrown into whatever he did. When the Club removed to Craigielaw he resigned, after a tenure of office stretching over more than twenty years, and Mr. Crombie was appointed his The portrait here given is that which adorns the successor. walls of the Club alongside of past Captains and other officebearers, and we are indebted to the Committee for permission to reproduce it. Now that he is gone it is impossible to give to the numerous stories of the old worthy the charm of his manner. The following is one of many specimens:-"When I was up at Ulverston for my holidays along wi' my sister, ye ken, an impittent Cockney buddy thocht he could tak' the len' o' me, so he comes up to me, and says, 'I am sure, Mr. Congalton, that you have written a book.' 'No,' says I, 'I've written no book.' 'Weel,' says he, 'I have been taking particular notice of you, and I am confident, at any rate, that you have the ability to write one.' 'Oh,' says I, 'it's verra singular that you've been taking particular notice o' me, for I've been doing the same wi' you; you're the likest I ever saw to Maister Airthur Balfoor, but meenus (minus) the brains, ye ken.' An', dod, I declare when I saw the buddy next mornin' he wadna look at me." The sister referred to was the loving companion of John's life, for he was never married. She died the day after her brother's funeral, having, like him, been spared beyond the span of fourscore, and was buried beside him in the quiet churchyard of his village. Devoted in life they were not divided in death.

### THE IRISH LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1901.

THE Irish Ladies' Golf Union chose entirely new ground for the meeting of 1901, and an exceptionally fort unatechoice it was, for Portmarnock is an ideal course for a ladies' Championship. Owing to the generosity of the Club, and the assistance given by the Captain and some of the members, the meeting was voted quite the most successful yet held. The weather, too, was perfect -no rain, but a gentle easterly air tempered the hot sun every day for the lucky competitors. Indeed, nothing was left to be desired—every wish of a golfer's heart was gratified. Play commenced on Monday, April 29th, with a preliminary stroke competition, which was won by Miss F. Walker-Leigh with a very fine score of 85. The first round of the Championship was decided on Tuesday morning, April 30th, when only one really close match was played, that being between Mrs. Hezlet and Miss H. Jennings, when the former won after a good fight. The third round found all the first-class players still in, The match between Miss May Hezlet, the Ex-Champion, and Miss Magill, also Ex-Champion, was the match of the day. Miss Hezlet kept Miss Magill playing an uphill game most of the way, and at the fourteenth hole was three up. Then the latter came away with a very plucky game, and, winning the next three holes, was all even, and with a sensational putt on the eighteenth green won the hole and the match. In the fourth round, the closest finish, and the match which attracted most attention, was that between the holder, Miss Rhona Adair, and Miss Magill. They were all even at the turn, and still all even at the thirteenth, but Miss Adair securing the lead at the next hole and increasing it at the fifteenth, stood two up. Miss Magill, getting into the bunker at the sixteenth from the tee, gave Miss Adair the hole and

The semi-final gave the spectators the best match of the Championship, between Miss R. Adair and Miss M. E. Stuart. The issue was in doubt right up to the last hole, and were it not that there Miss Stuart elected to play with a brassy out of a difficult lie for her second shot the result might have been different. As it was, she got into a cart track, and, taking two to get out, next found the bunker and gave up. The final between Miss R. Adair and Miss F. Walker-Leigh was not quite so close, but if the latter had not been so anxious she would have made a better match, as there is no doubt that she is now well in the front rank of Irish lady golfers. Of Miss R. Adair's play there is nothing new left to be said. She has proved herself once more to be the most brilliant and finished of our players, and heartily deserved all the congratulations showered upon her. A most enjoyable meeting was brought to a close by Mrs. John Jamieson presenting the prizes to the successful competitors. Details :-

### THE LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1901.

THE new departure of the Ladies' Golf Union in selecting Aberdovey, Wales, as the venue for last year's Championship was attended with such a measure of success that the Principality is assured of another visit on no distant date. Adair was, of course, there to defend the title she had so deservedly won at Westward Ho, and she was challenged by a representative field of seventy-one. Ireland sent a goodly contingent in addition to the holder, and prominent among a too small representation from Scotland were Miss Sibyl Whigham and Miss E. M. Titterton. It is no disparagement to the merits of the many other fine players that the holder and Miss Whigham started strong favourites, but the unexpected happened, and the winner turned up in Miss M. A. Graham, a sister of the famous Hoylake player, who made her début in a Championship. began on Tuesday, May 13th, and extended over the three succeeding days. The opening day was devoted to the first round, which consisted of eight ties, the first of which alone excited any interest. In it Miss B. Thompson, of Beverley, and Miss F. Walker-Leigh, a promising Irish player, had a very tough tussle. The latter led by a hole at the turn, but Miss Thompson, after being two up at the sixteenth hole, won by a On the following day Miss Thompson accounted for another of the best players from across the Channel in Miss Magill, and later asserted her superiority over Miss Titterton by two holes, after leading from start to finish. The other ties in those three rounds, however, resulted according to anticipation with one notable exception. This was when in the third round Miss E. Cobbold, Great Yarmouth, beat an Ex-Champion in Miss Pascoe by the narrowest of margins. On Thursday forenoon the fourth round provided three games of much interest. In the first of these Miss Cobbold failed to sustain her form

of the previous day, and Miss M. A. Graham, who so far had attracted little attention, beat her with great case. Miss Issette Pearson and Miss B. Thompson had an exciting match. At the turn the former looked like being beaten, as she was then two down, but she drew level at the fifteenth, and won in virtue of a useful putt on the home green. the other tie Miss Whigham's fine long game gave her a considerable advantage over Miss M. Hezlet, the 1900 Champion, whose steady putting, however, kept the game going to the seventeenth hole. In the fifth round the only runaway win was that of Miss E. C. Nevile over Mrs. Wilson Hoare; but, although the latter was beaten by nine up and eight to play, she had no cause to be ashamed, as her opponent went out in 41-a magnificent performance. Miss M. A. Graham beat another steady player in Miss M. E. Phillips by two holes, and Miss Pearson took Mrs. Stubbs to the nineteenth hole ere she succumbed. But the feature of the day was the prolonged struggle between Miss Adair and Miss Whigham. After standing one down at the eighth, the latter led two holes later. She had frequent opportunities of winning thereafter, but weak putting on her part, and steady holing out by Miss Adair, enabled the latter to square the match at the seventeenth. The eighteenth was beautifully halved in 4, the first two "extras" ended similarly, but a useful run up with her wooden putter gave Miss Adair the twenty-first hole, and her entrée into the "semi-finals." In the first "semi-final" on Friday, Mrs. Stubbs had a somewhat unfortunate experience against Miss Graham. She thought that she had only the last hole to halve to win the match, and so played safely; but on a protest Miss Graham was adjudged by the Championship Committee to have won the eighth hole, which the Referee had declared halved, and out they had to go again. Only one hole was necessary, and as it fell to Miss Graham, she was left to contest the final with Miss Adair, who had cleverly beaten Miss E. C. Nevile, after being two down and five to play. In the final Miss Adair failed to do herself justice against the steadiest of opponents. Indeed, so poor a start did she make, that she lost four out of the first five holes. she was unable to wipe out, and, throwing nothing away, Miss Graham was hailed winner by three up and two to play. With the presentation by Major Green, Captain of the Aberdovey

Club, of the Challenge Cup and Gold Medal to Miss Graham, the Silver Medal to the runner-up, and Bronze Medals to Mrs. Stubbs and Miss E. C. Nevile, an enjoyable meeting terminated. Details:—

## THE AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1901.

THE Amateur Championship, which was decided at St. Andrews on May 7th and the three succeeding days, attracted a record entry list of 116. Included in this huge array were the holder, Mr. H. H. Hilton, and Ex-Champions in Messrs. H. G. Hutchinson. J. E. Laidlay, and L. M. Balfour-Melville. Mr. John Ball, jun., was the only notable absentee, but a sad family bereavement necessitated the withdrawal of Mr. R. Maxwell and his brother on the eve of the competition. It goes without saving that Mr. Hilton started a hot favourite, and, to cut a long story short, he justified the confidence of his supporters. His way was pretty clear until he met his old opponent, Mr. Laidlay, in the third round, but what was expected to be a tight match turned out the reverse. Mr. Laidlay could do nothing right in the outward half, and Mr. Hilton turned five up. Coming home, however, Mr. Laidlay showed his true form, but the effort came too late, and he had to admit defeat on the sixteenth green. The feature of this round was the phenomenal form displayed by Mr. A. R. Aitken, the rising young Prestwick player, who ousted Mr. J. Robb, runner up in 1897, and again in 1900, by one hole. Starting at the sixth hole, Mr. Aitken took seven successive holes in 24. With five to go Mr. Robb stood three down, but so well did he play that he brought the match to the last hole. In the fifth round Mr. Hilton easily accounted for Mr. H. S. Colt, but Mr. Hutchinson and Mr. J. L. Low had their work cut out to dispose of Messrs. C. Hutchings and C. E. Dick. Perhaps most interest, however, was taken in the match between Mr. J. Graham and Mr. Aitken. The latter again played fine golf and turned one up, but the Hoylake representative wore him down coming home, and won by two holes. In the "semi-finals" Mr. Hutchinson made a bad start against Mr. Hilton, inasmuch as he lost the first three holes, but, sticking to his work with characteristic pluck, he drew level at the eleventh hole and actually led at the twelfth. Mr. Hilton, however, again asserted himself, and victory became his when he laid a fine third with the spoon at the side of the seventeenth hole. It was generally thought that Mr. Graham would contest the final with his club-fellow, but those who had this arrangement cut and dry had reckoned without Mr. Low. So steadily did the latter play that he turned three up, but Mr. Graham made such a magnificent effort after the turn that it was all to play for when the tee shots were driven to the home hole. With the better second, Mr. Low reached the green, and holing out in 4 to Mr. Graham's 5, won his way deservedly into the final for the first time. The final tie was contested in the best of weather before a very large crowd, among whom some rabid partisans behaved towards the stranger in a way unbecoming of votaries of the Royal and Ancient game, and this in spite of the words of counsel, uttered by the venerable Mr. R. Cathcart, an Ex-Captain of the promoting Club, asking the spectators to give a fair field and no favour and to refrain from cheering either player. The golf shown by both men was of a high order. Mr. Hilton had the pull off the tee, but the pawky Scot threw nothing away, and was always within hailing distance when the hole side was reached. They were all square at the thirteenth hole in the first round, but Mr. Hilton, pocketing the next three, carried an advantage of three holes over to the afternoon. At the turn in the second round Mr. Low had reduced his leeway by a hole, and excitement rose apace when he ran down a long steal for the hole at the thirteenth. The putting of both had, so far, left little to be desired, but Mr. Hilton missed a two yards' putt at the sixteenth, and Mr. Low drew level. It was felt that the tricky seventeenth hole would settle the match, and so it proved. Against a head wind Mr. Low was unable to get home in three, but with the like-a magnificent raking shot—the holder carried hole high, and won the hole deservedly in virtue thereof. An equally good second took him on to the home green, and had it been necessary he might probably have won his second Amateur Championship by two holes, as it was he was content to win by one. That the best man won there can be no question, and in so doing he played quite up to his high reputation; but Mr. Low excelled

all his previous efforts and disclosed a game which few thought was in him. Details :-

The conditions which regulate the entrance of players in the Amateur Championship are as follows:

(a) The competition shall be open to all amateur golfers, members of any Golf Club.

(b) An amateur golfer shall be a golfer who has never made for sale, golf clubs, balls, or any other article connected with the game; who has never carried clubs for hire after attaining the age of fifteen years, and who has not carried clubs for hire at any time within six years of the date on which the competition begins in each year; who has never received any consideration for playing in a match, or for giving lessons in the game; and who for a period of five years prior to the 1st September, 1886, has never received a money prize in any open competition.

(c) Competitors shall enter for the competition through the Secretaries of their respective Clubs, who in sending in the names shall be held to certify that the players are bond fide amateur golfers in

terms of the foregoing definitions.

Notwithstanding the provision in Clause c, all entries shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of the Club on whose green the competition is held.

This year's Championship falls to be held at Hoylake on April 29th and the three succeeding days.

# THE GOLFING CHAMPIONSHIP, 1901.

AFTER a lapse of five years the Golfing Championship was held last year at Muirfield. It may be remembered that its selection as a Championship course was severely criticised because of its inaccessibility, but no such drawback can now be laid at its door. for the opening of the railway to Gullane has brought the links within easy reach of players and spectators alike. A record entry of 101 bore eloquent testimony to the increased and everincreasing spread of the Royal and Ancient game, but the great majority of these had slender prospects of success. It is excusable for second-class professionals to enter, but it sayours of the ridiculous to find amateur players, to whom the front rank of the professionals could give "half one," and possibly more, cumbering the field. The record entry necessitated a start as early as nine o'clock on the morning of Wednesday, June 5th, and the last couple did not complete their second round until some ten hours later. Harry Vardon and Braid, in view of their recent grand form, started hot favourites; but the holder (J. H. Taylor), A. Herd, A. Kirkealdy, J. White, Mr. H. H. Hilton, and Willie Park all had their supporters, the issue being popularly regarded as confined among these eight top sawyers. The conditions underfoot could not have been improved upon, but a strong westerly breeze had to be reckoned with at nearly every hole, and with a few notable exceptions scores ruled considerably above the average. Of the cracks it fell to Park to set the pace, and right well be did so. A 6 to the third hole, where he was short with his approach, and afterwards weak on the green, was, perhaps, the only blemish in a steady outward half of 41, but on the homeward journey he did not make the semblance of a slip, and many were of the opinion that his total of 78 would not be equalled. The Champion began somewhat inauspiciously by topping his drive, but a good recovery and a fair putt gave him a 4 after all. He was next twice in trouble en route to the second hole, but a deadly piece of holing out gave him a 6. A stroke was dropped at the long hole, where a 5ft. putt was missed, but all went well with him thereafter, and a steady 79 was recorded. Braid began even worse than Taylor by pulling his first drive out of bounds, and his second looked like going the same way when it rebounded from the top of the fence, and he got a rather lucky 5. He was again out of bounds at the eighth, and missed a short putt at the ninth. Thus he turned with the comparatively high score of 43. His play home, however, was brilliant to a degree, and he equalled Taylor's score. Great things were expected from Harry Vardon, and they were fulfilled. He took the first ten holes in 41 by magnificent play; but his approach to the eleventh in the teeth of the wind was skied over the dyke. Undismayed, however, he dropped another ball, and got a 6 by a good putt. He then proceeded on the even tenour of his way until the last hole, where, sparing his second, he was bunkered, and a 6 had perforce to go down on his card, making his round 77. The only other return under 80 was a 79 by J. Kinnell (40 out Jack White's round was 82, a figure equalled by and 39 in. Mr. C. L. Dalziel of the promoting Club, Mr. J. Graham, jun., the Hoylake crack, and A. Kirkcaldy; but A. Herd and Mr. Hilton put themselves thus early out of court with scores of 87 and 89 respectively.

In the afternoon Park, who had putted so well in the morning, could get nothing down, and with an 87 his chances were extinguished. Taylor also deteriorated to the extent of four strokes, but his aggregate of 162 kept him in the running. Braid, as before, did not begin particularly well, but two great swipes to the fifth hole, followed by a fine putt, gave him a 3 here, and he turned in 40. His homeward half was again 36, and his round of 76 the lowest of the day. Harry Vardon, as he frequently does, repeated his morning's figures going out, and came home in 40 after being bunkered approaching the thirteenth. Nobody came near his or Braid's fine aggregates, and as a result of the day's play it was recognised that the Championship had thus early resolved itself into a duel between these two giants.

On the second day the conditions were almost ideal, what wind there was chopping round from West to East, but overnight rain had made the putting greens a little lumpy. Although qualified to take part in the final stage, T. Vardon did not do so,

Of those with the slenderest of chances it fell to Mr. Graham to set the pace. By steady play he finished in 81, as did his partner, Renouf, but this was not nearly good enough to win. Mr. Hilton, however, as if to show that his previous day's returns were unreliable, now returned a 75 without the semblance of a slip. But of the leaders it was left for Braid to start first. His play was practically faultless, and a brilliant round of 74 put him in a seemingly impregnable position. With J. H. Taylor as his partner, H. Vardon straightway showed a tendency to slice his drives, but there was little to cavil at in his play until he fell foul of the rough going to the seventh hole, and so

required 6 to an easy 4 hole. Thereafter he made few mistakes. albeit his usual dash was conspicuous by its absence. His round was 79, so that Braid now led him by five strokes. Taylor, on the other hand, drove a fine length, and as a result thereof, and uniformly good putting, he registered a grand 74. With a round to go the position of affairs was, therefore, Braid, 229 Vardon, 234; and Taylor, 236, the issue being now among the trio. Braid's was a difficult position, and no doubt it reacted upon him. It was current that he was playing for an 80, and this was the figure he returned, a stroke having been dropped here and there on the greens. This set Vardon 74 to win, which was regarded as beyond his powers. He made a gallant effort, but his long putts did everything but go in, and he topped his approaches to the third and sixteenth holes as a result of the high pressure he was going at. With a hole to go, Vardon had 2 to tie; but this, of course, was not practicable, and all he could do was to finish second, three strokes behind Braid and one in front of Taylor, who again did fine work. Mr. Hilton did another good round, but it simply bettered his position, and nothing more. Still it was a wonderful performance to finish fourth after his poor beginning, and he shared with Taylor the credit of returning the lowest aggregate on the second day. Braid's first win in the Championship was popular to a degree, it being the first victory for Scotland since 1893. An exceptionally pleasant function concluded with the presentation of the medals to the successful competitors by Mr. H. Cook, Captain of the Honourable Company, Braid receiving an ovation.



# JAMES BRAID. CHAMPION GOLFER, 1901.

JAMES BRAID is one of a little band of golfers who have, during the last quarter of a century, kept the name of the quaint little Fifeshire village of Earlsferry well to the front in the world of golf. Preceded by such golfing giants as Douglas Rolland and the brothers Simpson, he had a high ideal set before him, and that he has come up to that ideal his victory at Muirfield last June amply proved. Born some thirty-one years ago, Braid. like many other famous players, had made a name for himself. both on his native links of Earlsferry and on the Braids' course, Edinburgh, before he determined to take to golf as his pro-It was in the autumn of 1893 that he left the amateur ranks, and took up his residence in London as a clubmaker at the Army and Navy Stores. He soon forced himself into notice as a player, and in April, 1896, he was appointed professional to the Romford Golf Club, and there he has married and settled down, respected and esteemed by all.

He made his Championship debut at Sandwich in 1894, and finished tenth to his staunch comrade in arms, J. H. Taylor. He did not compete at St. Andrews when Taylor won his second victory, but has done so ever since. Finishing sixth at Muirfield in 1896, he went several places better at Hoylake in 1897, for he there ran up only one stroke behind Mr. H. H. Hilton. At Prestwick in 1898 he fell back to eleventh position; at Sandwich in 1899 he was fifth; at St. Andrews in 1900 he was third; and at Muirfield he succeeded in doing what everybody felt sure he would do sooner or later. During these years he had been fairly successful in open tournaments and exhibition matches, but last year was undoubtedly his annus mirabilis. His Championship victory was, of course, a big feather in his cap, but the week prior to it he had, at Musselburgh, accomplished a performance

which astounded the world of golf. Than the nine holes of Musselburgh there is no better test of golf. Perfect play is represented by 36, and the front rank of professionals are perfectly pleased if they can show an average of 38 per round. Yet in the open tournament there last May the Champion negotiated four rounds of the green in 140, or four strokes below par. Never had such tremendous swiping been seen on the classic old links. The onlookers simply stared aghast when, with clock-like regularity. two rakers took him hole high at the second and third holes. both of which at full stretch are somewhere about a quarter of a mile in length. His rounds were 36, 34, 35, 35. His second round equalled Harry Vardon's competition record for the round : his two rounds in 70 is a best on record ; and his aggregate of 140 for 36 holes lowered the previous record established by Willie Park in 1892 by no fewer than seven strokes. When he set the seal on this great performance by winning the final stage of the tournament by holes, defeating J. H. Taylor and A. Herd in turn, an old golfer said, "There goes the Champion." As a token of their recognition of his phenomenal play he was presented with a timepiece, suitably engraved, by several Musselburgh admirers, and in a letter of thanks he bore testimony to the fact that he has no more cherished possession.

In conclusion, it may be said that Braid is of rather spare build, for, albeit standing 6ft. 2in., he only weighs twelve stone eight pounds. There is, therefore, no lumber to retard the free play of his powerful muscles, and he is able to put his back into his full shots in a fashion that those of stouter habit would scarcely care to try twice. His powerful long game is supported by accurate approaching, and although his putting, like most mortals', is occasionally off, he can do good execution at the hole

side also.

### MECCA IN A MIST.

THE Autumn Medal Day of the "Royal and Ancient" has been, with reason, accounted the classic gathering of Scottish golf. It brings out many of the élite of the north, and not a few who have earned their laurels upon English greens. For a full week prior to the event the City of Ruins and Red Gowns puts on an extra amount of bustle, and the Supernumerary List gets hopelessly enlarged. The new course, still at a discount by reason of the glorious traditions of its perennial neighbour, gets, perforce, a full complement of players, and these have no cause to complain of the sport it affords them.

The opening Autumn Meeting of the century will be remembered and differentiated by its unusual weather conditions. The prospect looked depressing enough, for at the hour of starting a dense mist veiled the links, and it was consequently impossible to follow the flight of a clean hit ball. Any player new to the course would have been heavily handicapped, for the bunkers and hole-pins, looming through the haar, looked ever so much farther away, and foreknowledge was the only sure guide to the hole. Once an old sportsman went out deer-stalking on the Grampians in just such weather, and after bringing down in his accustomed unerring style a fine fat hind, was both surprised and shocked to discover, on closer inspection, that his quarry was only a black-faced ewe. Appearances are very deceptive in a fog.

Of course, from the sightseer's point of view, most of the interest and charm of the Medal Day was wanting. There was little to tempt the gallery, for the long game was largely guesswork, a great deal being left to the imagination, while the bent and turf were heavily bedewed with moisture—not a day, certainly, for fine feathers to be abroad.

The first company of any great dimensions that left the steps was that which pinned its faith to Mr. R. Maxwell. He is a brawny Scot, already credited with a splendid record, having only such invincibles as Ball and Hilton coming between him and the highest amateur honours. Scotland need have little fear for her prestige in the near future, with Maxwell to uphold her fame. He got quietly but vigorously to work, and if the first few holes betokened no remarkable card, being set down at fives. slightly over par, there came at the Heather hole a useful fillip in the shape of a three, brought about by a long steal on the level sward. From there to the close his game was characterised by unintermitted first-class play, and he handed in what proved to be the winning card of one stroke under the fourscore. Mr. A. G. Tait quite maintained the family reputation on the occasion, and only failed to tie for first honours by lipping the disc on the home green. An unusually large batch of players, young and old, tied for the next places, no less than half-a-dozen names being tabulated at 83-an evidence that the list of really good players is rapidly increasing.

It means superior golf to get round the Old Course in anything under 90. There were names "of credit and renown" to be found among those who had exceeded that respectable figure on Medal Day, but an average of fives has no chance of getting placed nowadays. It has come to this, that the would-be hero must eschew sixes, and it is worthy of remark that Mr. Maxwell's card was the only one out of the hundred and fifty that showed nothing over five; but besides, to reduce the total to the necessary dimension, there must be a few fours and at least a couple of threes. And to achieve this there is even something more required than high-class golf. The player must be favoured with what is known as "the luck of the green," keeping clear of cups, and of traps such as those at the High and Eden holes. and avoiding close relations with the Railway and Road on the homeward journey. He must hole all his putts, the hardest task of all, for even Homer was known to have his moments of forgetfulness, yet it takes but one or two slight defections at the hole-side to irretrievably damage the best of cards.

The risk of accident to the players and onlookers, not inconsiderable on so crowded a links, was much increased by the density of the atmosphere. One was utterly unconscious that

he stood in the line of a player until the ball whistled past his ear, more or less near; and, if all tales are true, there were several hairbreadth escapes. Nothing more serious, however, than a badly-hit dog was reported at the end of the day.

The tail of the play-list, and it included some of the likeliest names of all, was the most favoured, for by four o'clock, an hour before gun-fire, the fog lifted and the sun shone out, making the conditions much happier both for player and onlooker. The advantage, however, did not affect the issue, for Mr. Maxwell's card, compiled in the worst of the weather, held the field.

One of the incidental feats of the meeting is worthy of special remark, because it serves to place the capability of the Leader of the House beyond question or cavil. Playing in a match on the previous afternoon, he gave satisfactory evidence of what can be accomplished by industry and an equable temperament. Mr. Balfour is no stripling. His style is a little suggestive of a perceptible stiffening of the sinews, and the loss of the elasticity and force which are required to reach the long hole in a couple of shots; and yet not many of those more youthful exponents, whose brilliant execution delights the gallery, could have eclipsed the 83 that he then recorded. It is but a new reading of an old fable, proving that the constant and even movement towards the goal can give points to that magnificence of display, which, when accompanied by occasional lapses into carelessness, leaves much to be desired.

And if any further proof be required that the golfer can bear the burden of his years lightly, and, even as an octogenarian, add lustre to his fame, it is only necessary to cite the case of the veteran green-keeper, Old Tom, most genial and gentle-mannered of men, ever at his accustomed post, and rejoicing in the fresh laurels of a recent 86, compiled in spite of a luckless five at the short hole in, to be quickly discounted however, and the good man's eye sparkles when he recalls his own prowess, by a faultless three at the next one. Truly, as Béranger declares, it is the good workman who enjoys the

length of years.

# THE IRISH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1901.

IT was unfortunate that Mr. R. G. N. Henry, who had won the Championship sounexpectedly at Portmarnock in 1900, was unable to defend his title at Newcastle last May, nor were previous winners well represented, Mr. H. E. Reade, a dual Champion in 1897 and again in 1899, being alone included in the entry of thirty-eight. He started a strong favourite, but although he worked his way into the final with Mr. W. H. Boyd, Portmarnock G.C., it was only in the fifth round against Mr. E. K. Figgis that he showed anything like his usual accurate play. It was not matter for wonderment, therefore, to find him fall easily before Mr. Boyd, who finished the first round four up, and won his first Championship by seven up and five to play. The winner played steady golf throughout the Championship which began on May 21st, and his victory was thoroughly deserved. Details:—



# IRISH AMATEUR CHAMPION, 1901.

MR. W. H. BOYD, who so easily won the Irish "Native" Championship last year, is no "single sport sportsman," for, in addition to golf, yachting and lawn tennis claim him as a devotee. A son of Mr. Justice Boyd and a member of the Irish Bar, he comes of an athletic family, Taking to golf some eight years ago, he soon made his presence felt in the prize lists of the Portmarnock Golf Club. In 1897, and again in 1899. he won the Monthly Medal thrice; in 1900, the scratch aggregate prize at the St. Stephen's Day Meeting and the first handicap prize at the Easter Open Meeting, and the scratch aggregate prize at the same meeting last year. Under the auspices of the Royal Dublin Golf Club, his successes have been even more important. In 1900 he won the Monthly Medal final with the excellent score of 81, and last year he carried off the Moncreiff Cup. Scratch Medal, and Coldstream Guards' Cup. last-named trophy his score was 78, which is the Club's Medal record for Dollymount. Singularly, however, although so successful in stroke competitions, he had never done himself justice in hole competitions until last year's Championship, and yet his game is more noteworthy for brilliance than steadiness. Forcing splendidly with the forearm, he drives a very long ball, is particularly good with his iron out of cuppy lies, and has the happy faculty of laying the great majority of his long putts dead. His recovery play is also worthy of mention, and he is probably the most resourceful player in Ireland.

# IRISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1901.

THIS, the leading event of the Irish golfing season, was held at Dollymount on Tuesday, 3rd September, and the three succeeding days. The weather throughout was in its kindliest mood, and the many visitors from England and Scotland had a splendid week's golf. With the redoubtable Mr. H. H. Hilton in the field to defend the title he had won for the second time at Newcastle in 1900, the result, bar accidents, was considered a foregone conclusion. He won his first three ties with ease, and then qualified for the final by disposing of Mr. F. Easterbrook with something in hand; but the London Scot disclosed form he had never done before. Meanwhile, Mr. P. Dowie (Edinburgh Burgess) had also won his way into the final, thanks to a somewhat easy draw. In the first round of the final Mr. Hilton led by two holes at the turn, but so well did Mr. Dowie putt on the homeward journey that he actually led at the thirteenth, and eventually succeeded in halving the round. In the afternoon the Champion straightaway took the lead, and, increasing it as he went, won easily by six up and four to play. Albeit beaten. however, Mr. Dowie enhanced his growing reputation by his cool, steady play. Details :-

# A FANCY INLAND GOLF COURSE.

By Dr. J. G. McPherson.

NOTHING can equal a golf course on the sea coast; but all cannot avail themselves of that boon. However, they make up for it by selecting the most convenient inland for this best of

games.

Blessed are they that can command an inland course like that at Blairgowrie, in Perthshire! The surroundings and associations of the Lansdowne course add to the attractions of the green. For the facsimile of Goldsmith's "Sweet Auburn, loveliest village of the plain," basks softly at the base of the northern slope of Strathmore. Approaching it from the east during a bright sunset, I know no more enchanting scene. The harsh grandeur of the Highlands is here supplanted by a cheerful mildness and a sylvan joy. The giants of Highland story here give place to the elves, who trip about from dewy morn to heaven-flushed eve.

What an enchanting panorama is before one! How beautifully variegated with wood and pasture-land among the highly cultured fields! In front is the Birnam of Macbeth, with its densely wooded surroundings. Beyond, touching the grey horizon, the cloudlike peaks of the mountains that guard the Trossachs and Loch Katrine, made so enchanting by the magic pen of Sir Walter Scott. On the left, the kindly Sidlaw Hills run up to Dunsinane; and on the right stretch out the heaven-kissing Grampians.

In every direction are excellent walks. Near it the Eagle's Crag, a precipitous rock 300 feet in height, stretches 700 feet along the ireful Ericht's bank. Strangely savage does nature appear in its kaleidoscopic variety, and many a weird legend is connected with its surroundings. Occupying a commanding position on the summit of a cliff opposite, stands the prototype

of the Tullyveolan of Waverley. Looking down on the river we have a rare combination of "the gleam, the shadow, and the peace supreme;" and here we have a very attractive inland golf course, of nine holes only, a mile from the town. A nice rustic Clubhouse, with stabling, has been erected for the convenience of players, and, a short distance off is a sweet Clubhouse for the accommodation of lady golfers, who in the summer adorn the course in their dresses of varied colourings. The putting greens have been firmly laid with fine turf from the sea coast; artificial bunkers have been judiciously formed to trap the foozler and unwary; and trees have been left to act as additional hazards.

The course is necessarily zig-zag. The first hole is down a valley between occasional firs; sometimes a hard-hit ball, when caught by the dense branches, will be kept aloft for a time. On the left is the "Smuggler's Bunker"—three-quarters of a century ago, when the Muir was all densely wooded, the "mountain dew" of rare good quality was made in that hollow. Not far from it the emissaries of the law kept watch to get a sniff of the "peat reek," which told them that work was begun in earnest. Their hiding place is now transformed into the "Gauger's Bunker," on the opposite side of the course. What scenes must have been enacted there in the olden time, when people honestly considered that they could make what they chose out of their own barley!

Holing out in the fine natural hollow, we turn north to the second hole, called "Mount Blair." Right beyond the hole, that solitary mountain rears its conical head into the heavens. Many antiquarians are of opinion that this is the "Mons Grampius" of the Roman historian; and some believe that the battle between the Romans under Agricola and the Caledonians under Galgacus was fought near the Blair Muir early in the Christian era. Early in the last century there was dug up out of a moss bog in the neighbourhood the body of a Roman soldier, in full armour, and in an upright position.

The prettiest hole is the next, the "Fairy Dell." The hollow is surrounded by heavy headed Scotch firs; beyond the rich carpet of putting green are spongy grass and heather. Beyond is the Black Loch, and near is dense wood—all giving a fairy-like

charm. The parish minister once described in humorous verse

the erratic movements of the golf balls which were struck off from the Blair teeing grounds. Though it takes two good shots to this "Fairy Dell" hole, the parson's imaginary swipe carried the ball into the Black Loch. The plunge of the ball aroused the attention of a slumbering pike that had taken some apparently incurable disease. Mistaking it for a horse medicine-ball, he swallowed the gutta, which so irritated the animal's stomach that he didn't slumber again for some time, thus effecting a perpetual cure and puffing golf as a medicine.

Curious legends have been handed down of the Brownies that danced about that fairy dell. The last was Redcap, who assisted a tired blacksmith to do his work; but, unfortunately, the smith thanked the Brownie, who disappeared, as was their wont, at the

sound of a human voice.

The most difficult of all the holes is "Druid's Mere." Whether the Druids had a rendezvous here or not is beyond my knowledge, but it might have suited them admirably. A little to the west, at Marlee, a Druid's circle of stones was restored at the request of the Very Rev. Dr Boyd (the A.K.H.B. of Fraser), when residing there.

In front of the tee to the Druid's Mere is an insignificant tree, which, however, catches not a few skimmed balls. To draw your ball is fatal, for you can only with difficulty extricate yourself from the tree roots. Of course, a master hand can do anything at golf, for I saw Braid, the Champion, in a match against Vardon, slice a ball from the tree roots and make it swirk round the trees on to the putting green—a marvellous stroke. On the right of the course is a bunker, and you must play straight. You have a dangerous second if there is a slight breeze. To the right is a threatening barbed fence, to the left are heavy trees, and beyond the hole is the "Trap" bunker. This is always a trying hole on medal days. The other holes of this model inland course are varied in hazard, length, and texture.

Blairgowrie has been noted for its ball sports. Three centuries ago, young men were in the practice of playing shinty on Sunday between sermons, and often did the Rev. John Ross warn the delinquents of their bad conduct, but to no effect. He was an athletic man, a muscular Christian. One Sunday he appeared among the youths, and, taking off his coat and placing it

on his staff, which he had stuck into the ground, he solemnly exclaimed:

"Stand ye there, As Minister o' Blair, While I, John Ross, Get a game at the ba'."

Keenly did he enter into the contest, but, instead of striking the ball, he, under pretence of being extremely blind in his aim, struck the *shins* of the youths, till he sent them all limping home.

# SOME MORAL REFLECTIONS.

I OBSERVED the other day in a letter in the Scotsman, above a name well-known in the world of athletics, a remark to the effect that golf fostered selfishness. The next day there was an indignant repudiation of the suggestion, but the writer did not give his name. "Was Lieut. Tait selfish?" was his triumphant retort; and when he had told us that many golfers had volunteered for the war he considered that he had proved his point. His argument, of course, was ridiculous; though perhaps the original proposition was stated in an unfortunate manner.

Is golf a selfish game? is a question that is worth considering. Personally I regard it as such: and though a game to be selfish must foster selfishness, I think that golf is peculiarly fortunate in apparently having no evil results on the character, away from the links. I am not speaking of the absorbing devotion it winsfrom its disciples, nor of the golf-widows it leaves. These are only proofs of its excellence as a pastime, and of its power to-

upset the balance even of the most sober-minded.

But to use a philosophical term, golf is a self-regarding game. In many cases, as soon as a man gets within range of the links his whole character changes. What are we to think of the unseemly rush for the tee on those greens where places are not booked beforehand? Of the reluctance to allow a faster party topass, no matter how clear the green may be in front? Of the impatience of the man waiting to play his approach, as he watches a deliberate putter hole out? We see little of this in the higher walks of golfing life. Those, whose place is there, only play where a time is booked; they go fast enough (though I have seen a four-ball match sin egregiously) to prevent any but the greyhound players desiring to pass them; and they have

:a heartfelt sympathy for the deliberate putter. But there is a -class of golf where these things are rampant.

I was once playing on a nine-hole course where there was in force that weird rule, that any party with caddies might pass any party without caddies. I had a caddy. My opponents were two, playing one ball, and using one set of clubs, and so naturally carrying for each other. We were in no hurry, and wanted to take things very easily. So, at the beginning of our second round, we waited on the first tee, until a party who had been a hole behind us came up, and I then suggested that they should go in front of us. "Oh! we intended to do so, as you haven't got caddies," was the only reply. And yet I was told by those who knew him that that man was really quite a decent fellow.

It is hard to say much about the difficulty that so many seem to find in counting. I have known men who could never get beyond the fingers of one hand. Nor is it perhaps advisable to discuss the little advantages that are occasionally taken when the opponent is not too near. I spent a very instructive hour one Saturday morning on Mount Pisgah, the highest eminence on Musselburgh links, which commands a good view of Linkfield bunker. The various methods used to get out of that bunker amazed me, and would have filled me with despair for the morality of our island, if I had not realised that it was only golf, and under ordinary circumstances the offenders were very honest creatures. The adversary meanwhile was generally trying to play off the road (it was in the old days, before police regulations), and had I been able to see, I should probably have found that his devices were equally ingenious.

It is scarcely to be expected that a man should feel any deep sympathy for the misfortunes of his adversary, when those misfortunes mean his own success. Still I am glad to think there are many people who would rather lose a close and hard fought match than win an easy one, when the other man broke down. But it would make a cynic smile grimly to hear the two players talking together, each one absorbed in himself, and paying but scant attention to his neighbour; explaining in tedious detail his shocking bad luck, or his wonderful recovery; in fact, so full of his own play, that he has no interest left to give to the other. My own experience has led me to this conclusion,

that there is always room for one of the two to grumble; but it spoils the game if both do it. But discontent has its limits. It should stop short of grotesque exhibitions of temper, or childish sulks, if only because they spoil the pleasure of the partner; and, after all, we are supposed to play golf for pleasure. But a man often fails to appreciate the situation owing to that loss of moral sense which golf so strangely induces.

Perhaps the root of the evil is to be found in the fact that in most cases a man plays golf entirely for himself. Competitions are purely personal and individual; and the kudos, that attaches to the winning of an Open Championship or the most insignificant monthly medal, belongs to an individual only. Herein lies the secret of the interest of foursomes, which the old-fashioned golfer will tell you are better sport any day than singles. There is a partner to play for, and a partner's sympathy to look for, and at the end of the round it is not self that has won.

There is, however, one form of golf that is not selfish—the inter-club match; and that I regard as the finest sport to be got in golf. It is far more exciting and far more nervous than medal play. There is always the fear, "suppose I am hopelessly out of form, and let the side down badly." Then, if things are going ill (the match may be over—five down and four to play), yet still a man has to struggle on, and try not to be six down. I think it would interfere greatly with the excellence of these matches if they were to be decided simply by the number of individual matches won, and it is a grand test of nervous power to play an uphill game, when eight down, and the other man is still going strong. Compared with an inter-club match the sport of all other forms of golf fades into insignificance, and I may confess that during the last six months, I have played in four inter-club matches, and besides them on three other days only.

When playing for a side golf is not selfish; though no doubt personal success or failure makes a great difference to a man's pleasure. But that secret self-satisfaction that a player has, when he feels that by his efforts his side is winning, is not to be condemned. A batsman has it, and some of those half-hours or hours at the wicket are among a man's sweetest memories. A football player has it when his dogged and determined defence has prevented the foe from scoring. And the golfer has it, too. But the real fulness of it he can hardly have, for he rarely knows

what the exact task is that he has to do; and the true inwardness of the feeling depends on the knowledge that he is doing what is wanted to save his side.


Let it not be supposed that I am an enemy of the game. I have played it for more than thirty years. I have played it on Musselburgh, when the whins were more than waist high. I have made a record on Portrush when there were only nine holes. But is it not the case that a man's failings are best understood by his best friend?

# WOOLACOMBE AND ITS GOLF LINKS.

WOOLACOMBE sands have created Woolacombe "town"-if it may vet be considered to have arrived at that dignity. Unquestionably it is on the high road thither, for there is hardly such a grand stretch of sandy foreshore in the kingdom. Right away the sands stretch-along the bottom of Morte Bay, from Morte to Baggy Points, nearer three miles than two-firm. broad, bright, and breezy. They have been called "a beautiful and unrivalled reach," and the praise is not a whit too high. They are, moreover, in marvellous contrast to neighbouring Barracane Bay, whose singular beach is made up almost wholly of broken shells. Let not the visiting conchologist, however, despair. Hunt he carefully, he will find many rare and perfect specimens even at Barracane, and at Woolacombe there are plenty. It is a curious feature again of the beach at Rockham Bay, to the north of Morte Point, that it contains numbers of porphyritic pebbles, some very handsome, and not belonging to any rock known in situ. The sands are a perfect paradise for children and those who resort to the seaside for the benefit of the fresh sea breezes. Nowhere can out-of-door exercise be taken more easily, more pleasantly, or under more invigorating influences, while for the robuster of both sexes there is a magnificent range of cliffs, and a noble back country not readily exhausted even in a prolonged visit.

The climate of Woolacombe is mild, but bracing, and the mean temperature is about equal to that of Ventnor, Torquay, Falmouth, and Guernsey.

The links, which adjoin the grounds of the Woolacombe Bay Hotel, are within three minutes' walk of the centre of Woolacombe. They are picturesquely situated upon a range of burrows stretching along the central part of the Bay. Open towards the west and sheltered by hills on all other sides, they

command views of Morte and Baggy Points, Lundy Island, and a wide range of rugged coast scenery. The hazards are all natural, and comprise formidable sand hills, some 60 feet in height, loose sand bunkers, a road with open ditch, and other obstacles. The greens are well maintained and the lies are good. The following is a short description of the round of nine holes, which extends to nearly two miles:—

No. 1 Hole (353 yards).—View No. 2 shows the position of the teeing ground on the summit of the hill, slightly to rear and left of the pavilion. The hazards are clearly shown, and consist of a deep ditch, a road, and a fence, the latter being some seven feet above the roadway. A good drive must be made here, which will carry the ball to a good lie upon the grass shown in the foreground. Once over the road all is plain sailing up to the green.

No. 2 Hole (309 yards).—This is devoid of any serious difficulty, the only hazard being a stretch of marshy ground lying partly across the course. The putting green is well elevated, and good views are obtained from it.

No. 3 Hole (215 yards).—A successful drive from this tee is necessary to clear the formidable obstacles of a wide ditch, banks, and gate. The green is a very sporting one.

No. 4 Hole (266 yards).—The teeing ground is in a hollow, and faces a very tricky bunker which rises sharply some five-and-twenty yards from the tee. No further difficulty is encountered if a straight line along the telegraph posts is kept, in which case the player is rewarded by finding a very well laid out putting green.

No. 5 Hole.—This is the second longest hole on the links, covering 340 yards. The putting green is situated on a steeply-rising ground, to approach which a well-judged lofting shot is required. It is generally considered that from this position are obtained the best views of Woolacombe, Morte Point, and Lundy Island.

No. 6 Hole.—Here we commence our homeward journey with the longest hole, this being 415 yards. It is quite plain sailing, providing the deep gorse to the left is avoided.

No. 7 Hole (263 yards).—There is a very attractive drive from this tee, which, if straight and with a carry of about 120 yards, clears the only formidable obstacle, a ridge of sand stretching across the course, and secures a good lie for the second shot in

full view of the green.

No. 8 Hole (183 yards).—Distinctly the most sporting hole on the course. From the teeing ground to the summit of "Jacob's Ladder" is a rise of 50 feet in a distance of 70 yards, a very formidable hazard. Even when the ladder is scaled another difficulty lies before us in the form of a deep pit of loose sand, on the further side of which is hidden a very pretty little green situated at the bottom of a small natural bowl.

No. 9 Hole (218 yards).—Two transverse lines of sand hills form difficult hazards to this hole. To clear the second and higher one from the tee requires a carry of quite 150 yards, with, in addition, considerable elevation. The putting green is prettily placed.

The par of the round is 36, and the record is 42 by W. Henry,

professional.

The links belong to the Woolacombe Bay Estate, and are under the full control of Mr. Edward Henshall, of Chichester Estate Offices, Woolacombe, who is the owner's agent. The annual subscription is £1 11s. 6d., but daily, weekly, and monthly tickets are issued to visitors.

Excellent accommodation is to be had in the Woolacombe Bay Hotel, and there are many good lodging and boarding

houses.

The nearest railway station is at Mortehoe (London and South-Western Railway), distant two miles; but carriages meet all trains.

# AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP OF INDIA, 1901.

THE tenth annual Championship of India and the East was decided over the course of the Jollygunge G.C., Calcutta, on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday, 25th, 26th, and 27th December. It attracted a thoroughly representative field, and proved most successful in every way. The holder (Mr. J. S. Smith) was forward to defend his title, but Mr. N. Macbeth. who had in 1900 headed the qualifying stroke competition, and afterwards fallen unexpectedly before Mr. Smith in the second round of the final stage, again started a strong favourite. But history repeated itself, inasmuch as he again took premier place by strokes, but was defeated in the final tie of the second stage by A. F. Simson, a member of the promoting Club, whose victory was naturally very popular. The opening day was occupied with the qualifying competition over four rounds of nine holes. Scoring ruled higher than anticipated, and two Ex-Champions in Messrs, N. M. Mitchell-Innes and F. H. Stewart most unexpectedly failed to get places among the last eight to take part in the final stage by eight holes. Subjoined are the scores :-

Lt.-Col. Broome (Poona), Lieut. W. R. Poynter (Barrakpore), and Messrs. J. Wilson (Rangoon), A. B. Bruce (Lucknow), P. F. Fischer and H. G. W. Meikle (Royal Bombay), E. A. Goward (Barrakpore), N. M. Mitchell-Innes, G. Harvey and N. Macleod (Calcutta), and A. D. Murray (Chittagong) made no return.

The first couple to start in the final stage on Thursday morning were Mr. A. M. Urie, the 1900 runner up, and Mr. H. J. Whigham, the American Amateur Ex-Champion. The latter stood three up with four to go, but Mr. Urie, by a plucky effort, kept the match going to the home green, where he lost by a putt. Mr. Macbeth, as expected, had little difficulty in beating Capt. Lethbridge, but Mr. J. Reid sprung a mild surprise at the expense of Mr. J. P. Henderson. The holder and Mr. A. F. Simson proved splendidly matched. They were all square at the fourteenth, but Mr. Simson drew ahead at the fifteenth, and so secured the match, as the remaining holes were halved. In the "semi-finals" Mr. Macbeth held a slight advantage of Mr. Whigham, and won a moderately played game on the seventeenth green. Mr. Simson, on the other hand, played well, and made short work of Mr. Reid.

On the closing day the final tie over 36 holes was played. Mr. Macbeth started a strong favourite, and the confidence reposed in him looked like being fulfilled when he finished the first eighteen holes three up. After lunch, however, Mr. Simson came away with such a phenomenal game that he had accounts squared at the seventh hole, and led by two at the ninth. In the last round Mr. Macbeth made up his leeway at the fifth, but he missed easy putts at the two succeeding holes, and, profiting thereby, Mr. Simson won his first Championship by two up and one to play. The winner has for years been recognised

as one of the best players in India, so that it cannot be said that he has won out of his turn. Nor can his pluck be called in question, as his third round was taken in 38 (a record) when most required. Details:—

A commodious Clubhouse stands on a high hill overlooking the Don, and the view from it embraces the entire coast line from Girdleness to Buchanness.

The Aberdeen Golf Club appear to have come after, and in the place of, a Club called the "Society of Golfers at Aberdeen," instituted May 9th, 1783, a printed copy of whose "Regulations, with a list of the original members and the Laws of Golf," is still extant; but this "Society of Golfers" had become dissolved before the institution of the present Club. A Golf Club must have existed in Aberdeen even before 1783, as the ballot box still in the possession of the Club bears the inscription, "The Aberdeen Golf Club, 1780." The game itself has been played on the Aberdeen Links from time immemorial.

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
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
