RECENT DECISIONS OF THE RULES OF GOLF
COMMITTEE.

THE following are the more important decisions of the Rules of Golf Committee upon points submitted to them since our last issue :—

Q.—A player in a stroke competition, playing to a blind hole, finds he has played his ball out of bounds. Instead of going back to the point from whence he played, he dropped his ball on the course at the point where he discovered it, and counted one stroke. What is the proper penalty, and under what rule does this come ?

A.—A breach of Rule 32 has occurred, the penalty for which is disqualification.

Q.—In a prize competition (Medal Play) a player plays his ball out of bounds. The hole being a blind one, he did not discover this until he had made some search for his ball. On discovering it he dropped it on the course at the point where he found it, counting two strokes. The Secretary refused to accept his card, holding that the player is disqualified by not adhering to the rule and dropping a ball at the place where he played the stroke which sent the ball out of bounds. Is the Secretary's action correct ?

A.—Yes.

Q.—A. and B. are playing a hole match. A. has a caddie, B. has not. B. has a long putt to win the hole. A.'s caddie

voluntarily stands at the hole holding the pin, but the pin remaining in the hole B. putts and is, as A. admits, going down. A.'s caddie suddenly jerks out the pin, striking B.'s ball away with the pin. A. plays and holes. Then B. plays again and holes in the like. Is the hole halved? If not, whose hole is it?

A.—B. won the hole when the ball struck the pin which was in the hand of A.'s caddie.

Q.—A. and B. are playing match play. Both are within three yards of the hole, but A. is nearest the hole and holes out, whereon B. claims the hole, A. maintaining that B. could only recall the stroke. Rule 5 says:—"When the balls are in play the ball further from the hole shall be played first. If a player play when his opponent should have done so, the opponent may at once recall the ball. A ball so recalled shall be dropped." It is obvious by the term "dropped" being used that the rule does not apply to play on the green, but through the green, otherwise the term "placed" would have been added. Undoubtedly a breach of the rule has occurred, and therefore, as Rule 35 distinctly states, "where no penalty for the breach of a rule is stated the penalty shall be the loss of the hole." The opinion of the Committee is craved.

A.—B. can only recall the stroke.

Q.—In a stroke competition starting from 24th to 31st, member takes a card out on 24th, puts same in his pocket, plays round with a member of another Club, but does not return his card, afterwards saying he intends playing round for prize the following Saturday. He has the card in his possession all the week, and plays round with it on following Saturday, and comes in first. Is he disqualified?

A.—The Club should make its own regulations.

Q.—Can a player, playing a stroke competition, also at the same time playing off a hole competition, if laid a stinie, be allowed to remove opponent's ball, play the stroke for the stroke competition, then afterwards replace the ball and play the stroke for the hole competition?

A.—No.

Q.—In June last the Committee disqualified a member of a Club for that month's competition in respect of a breach of Rule 3, he having before starting either played on a putting-green or on to a putting-green, the contention being that as no new holes had been made for such competitions for the past nine or ten years, nor had such a thing been asked for to the Committee's knowledge, the deciding point was the trying of the strength of the greens. Did the Committee act within its powers?

A.—No. As new holes were not made, the competitor was not disqualified.

Q.—A. started playing her monthly competition round with B. as marker. While playing the second hole B. had to give up playing on account of a sore hand, and another player, C., agreed to take A.'s card and keep her score. In this way the round was finished. A.'s card had been signed by B. (as usual) before play commenced, but as some discussion arose as to the validity of the card on account of two persons having scored, C. did not sign the card at the end of the round, although quite willing to do so. A.'s was the winning score, and C., thinking that disqualification was too severe treatment, brought the matter before the Committee, who decided to refer it to the men's Committee. At the meeting the card was signed by C. Is A. disqualified or not?

A.—Yes. The card should have been signed by B. for the strokes marked by her before handing the card to C., who should have signed for the remainder of the round before handing in the card. The signing of a card before play commences is contrary to Rule 4, Medal Play.

Q.—A couple in a Medal competition started in splendid weather, but when approaching the eleventh hole the weather broke down, and a heavy shower of rain and hail came on. The eleventh hole was played out. On the way to the next hole one of the players said that he would not go any further in the rain, and went into shelter. As the opponent was left without a partner he had no alternative but to follow him, and so discontinued the game for a couple of minutes, when the shower cleared off. The game was resumed and completed, and the opponent's

card was handed in with a score that entitled him to be returned the winner of the Medal. A member of the Club, who saw both players in the shelter, lodged a protest against the successful competitor being returned as winner of the Medal. It came before the Committee of the Club, who disqualified him under an old Rule, No. 11, which reads: "Competitors may not discontinue play on account of bad weather." Their reason for disqualifying him was that they had no power under the rule quoted to take any other course. A protest was lodged against the Committee's finding under the new Rule, No. 13. Under the above circumstances is disqualification warranted?

A.—Yes.

Q.—In a mixed foursome, a lady in driving from tee misses the ball altogether; does the gentleman then drive, or does the lady try again?

A.—The gentleman plays.

Q.—At a competition last December a competitor, on concluding the competition round, suggested that before the cards were returned a few more holes should be played in order to take advantage of what light remained. This was done. Does the fact of not returning a card immediately after the conclusion of the competition round disqualify a competitor?

A.—Yes. The card should have been returned as soon as reasonably possible after the completion of the round.

Q.—A player in a Medal competition hit a ball over the boundary wall of the course. It crossed over the road beyond and hit a further wall on the far side of the road on the top, bounced up into the air, crossed back over the road and the boundary wall, and came to rest on the green. Should that stroke be accounted as out of bounds and the ball be replayed from whence it was struck, or should the stroke be counted and the ball played from where it rested finally on the green?

A.—The stroke is not accounted out of bounds, and the ball is played from where it rested finally on the green.

Q.—(1) Are there any restrictions as to removing sheep droppings on the course? Under Rule 9 a player can remove

any loose impediment within a club length of the ball. Then by Rule 13 "a player or caddie shall not press down or remove any irregularities of surface near a ball in play. Dung, worm casts, or mole hills may be removed (but not pressed down) without penalty." Has the dung to be "near a ball in play"?

(2) If the ball is, say, 40 yards from the hole, can a player remove all sheep droppings (including those more than 20 yards from the hole), so that he is able to run the ball up to the hole with a putter? (3) If the ball be in a hazard, is a player allowed to remove sheep droppings on the putting green or through the course without any penalty?

A.—(1) Within a club length through the green. (2) No, only those within a club length of the ball and those within 20 yards of the hole. (3) He may remove droppings on the putting green within 20 yards of the hole, or on the course within a club length of the ball.

Q.—A player on the first tee in a Medal competition drove his first shot from outside the limits of the discs, but attention being called to the same before another stroke was played, he drove again. Was he disqualified under Rule 5, or could it be taken that the first shot was not the commencement of the game? also should such happen off second or other tee, would there be any other ruling?

A.—The player is disqualified from any tee.

Q.—In a stroke competition, on a given date, a member returns a card without dating it, although a space marked "date" is specially provided for the purpose. Is he disqualified?

A.—He is not disqualified.

Q.—A player, in walking backwards on a putting green, unintentionally knocks his ball out of position, and either lifted it or rolled it to its original position with his hand. In such circumstances what is the penalty?

A.—The player lost a stroke by moving his ball when walking backwards, but lost the hole by not playing the ball from the spot to which it had been moved.

Q.—On a fearfully wet day a player, on playing off a competition by match play, employed two caddies. One was clad in waterproof and umbrella, and carried the clubs in a bag with an extra cover to keep out the wet. Another was employed who attended on the golfer, and both helped to smooth away worm casts, leaves, &c., and to make tees. (1) Is this against the ethics of golf? (2) Can only a caddie and a forecaddie be employed? (3) Should the match be either awarded to the opponent or played off again?

A.—(1) Yes. (2) The player can have only one caddie, who is a party to the match, and entitled to assist and advise. (3) Awarded to opponent.

Q.—(1) A player's ball is in a sand bunker. Does the aforesaid player lose the hole, under Rule 12, if any part of his club, either intentionally or accidentally, touch the sand in the aforesaid bunker before he addresses the ball? (2) In an important match competition (like the Amateur Championship) if one of the players violates one of the rules, ought the Umpire (provided there be one) to award the hole to the other player, although he (the offending competitor) does not claim any penalty?

A.—(1) No, providing always that nothing has been done which might be construed into an intention of doing anything to improve the lie of the ball, or assist him in his subsequent play. (2) Yes. Consult Rule 37.

Q.—A ball lies in casual water in a hazard which runs parallel with the course. From the position of the hazard it is not possible to drop behind the hazard, the player keeping the spot from which the ball was lifted in a line between himself and the hole, but it is possible to drop in the hazard. Has the player the option of either dropping in the hazard or of availing himself of the last clause of Rule 15, and dropping at the side, outside the hazard? or must compliance with both the two alternatives in Rule 14 (2) be impossible before the last clause in Rule 15 has any bearing upon the case, and the player, unable to drop behind, but able to drop in the hazard, be compelled to drop in the hazard?

A.—The player has the option of dropping in the hazard, or of availing himself of the last clause of Rule 15.

Q.—Two players were engaged in a hole competition. When playing to the last hole one of them pulled his drive, but it could not be ascertained whether the ball was driven out of bounds or not. Both players left the tee and searched for the ball on the course and out of bounds, but it could not be found. There were places on the course where the ball could easily be lost. The player who lost the ball went back to the tee and dropped another ball, which he maintains was right according to a clause in Rule 32, which reads: "If it be doubted whether a ball is out of bounds or not a ball may be dropped," &c. The other player maintains it was a lost ball pure and simple, and is of opinion that in any case the player ought to have dropped the second ball before leaving the tee. The decision of the Committee is desired.

A.—As the players cannot agree whether the ball was lost on the course or out of bounds, the Rules of Golf Committee cannot decide between them. A player may return to the tee and play a second ball, provided that the first ball is found to be out of bounds. In the case of a ball lost on the course the player loses the hole.

Q.—In a competition where the player who returns the three best cards is to be the winner, which would win on the following cards: A. returns 98, 98, and 101; B. returns 97, 97, and 104.

A.—The Committee are of opinion that the usual interpretation of the "three best cards" is the best aggregate of three scores.

Q.—The Committee decided that the final of a match play tournament should be a 36-hole match. A. and B. agree before starting that whichever of them is down at the eighteenth hole, that man shall scratch—*i.e.* give up the match to the other man. A. was down at the eighteenth hole, and wished to scratch in accordance with the arrangement he had made with B. who was agreeable. (1) Can the Committee prevent A. from scratching at this or any other period of the game? (2) Can the Committee refuse to recognise B. as the winner if A. scratches? *N.B.*—There is no rule governing the competition which forbids any competitor scratching. The point is not as to whether A. and B. played a sportsmanlike match, but as to whether the Committee

are exceeding their powers in saying that A. must not scratch at this or any period of the game, in other words—how can they prevent A. scratching at any point of the game?

A.—(1) No. (2) No.

Q.—The opinion of the Committee is craved upon the construction of the second paragraph of Rule 4 of Special Rules for Stroke Competitions. It reads as follows: "The scores marked out to be called out after each hole, and, on completion of the round, the cards shall be signed by the marker, under penalty of disqualification, and handed in." Now the words "under penalty of disqualification," coming as they do immediately after the words "the cards shall be signed by the marker," and not at the end of the paragraph, would appear to apply to these words only, and not to the words "and handed in." The words "and handed in" must evidently be read with the words "on completion of the round." (1) What, therefore, is the position if a card is handed in some time after the completion of the round? (2) Again, what do the words "on completion of the round" mean? Do they mean immediately on completion? or what other construction is to be placed upon them?

A.—The words mean as soon as reasonably possible after the completion of the round, and if in the opinion of the Committee the player exceeded this limit, he is disqualified.

Q.—In a Medal competition, a player sends in his card duly signed, but without his name or any heading whatever being entered. Is the player disqualified?

A.—No.

Q.—Is a competitor in a stroke competition permitted, before starting on his round, to drive from any tee in the direction of the hole?

A.—Yes, provided he does not transgress Rule 3 of Special Rules for Stroke Competitions.

Q.—A player in an open stroke competition drives his ball on to a putting green other than the one he is playing for. A local rule says the ball must be taken off the green and may be placed. He does so, but before addressing the ball, finds he has

given himself a hanging lie; he therefore replaces it in a better position. Is this allowable? If not, what is the penalty?

A.—Yes.

Q.—A player in an open stroke competition drives two balls for practice before his opponent comes to the tee for the first hole. Is this allowable? If not, what is the penalty?

A.—It is allowable, provided he does not transgress Rule 3 of Special Rules for Stroke Competitions.

Q.—Rule 14 of the Rules of Golf provides for a ball lying or being lost in water under various circumstances, and prescribes a penalty of one stroke. Rule 10 of the Special Rules for Stroke Competitions provides that a ball may be lifted from any place under penalty of two strokes. Does this Rule override Rule 14 of the Rules of Golf, although no reservation is made, as is done in Special Rule 6?

A.—Rule 10 of Special Rules for Stroke Competitions does not override Rule 14.

Q.—(1) Does Rule 32 apply to a stroke played through the green as well as off the tee? (2) Does it apply to stroke play?

A.—(1) Yes. (2) Yes.

Q.—In a Medal competition, at the seventh hole a player drove into the wood, dropped a ball in the usual way on the course, played 3, and holed out in 6. Just as he was going to the eighth hole his opponent and marker remembered that the rule is now that you must drop a ball on the tee, and lose "stroke and distance." He went back to the tee, dropped, played 2, and holed out in 5. Two questions therefore arise. Having played a ball inadvertently from a wrong position, and holed out, is he entitled to replay the ball and take advantage of an improved result? or does the fact of his playing at all from a wrong position in itself disqualify him for the whole round? Further than this, does not the fact of his having played twice at one hole disqualify him under the rule that on a Medal day a player is not allowed to approach on to, or putt on, any green prior to the competition?

A.—The player was disqualified for not dropping his ball on the teeing-ground.

Q.—In match play, the ball of one player is found to be lying on the top of a heap of cut grass. To remove the grass under Rule 9 would be impossible without incurring the penalty there provided for the ball moving. It is admitted that the grass should not be there, having merely been piled up preparatory to its removal. (a) Does Rule 10 apply, either in the sense that the grass is a similar obstruction to a vessel, wheel-barrow, &c., or in the sense that it is ground "covered up" for the upkeep of the links? (b) Must the ball be played from where it lies?

A.—Rule 10 applies. The ball may be lifted and dropped without penalty.

Q.—Before a stroke competition a player drives a ball from a tee at the hole and slices out of bounds. The hole is within reach of a drive. (1) Is he disqualified? (2) Does Rule 3 for Stroke Competitions only apply to approach shots proper and not to drives or brassie shots?

A.—(1) Yes. (2) Rule 3 applies to all shots.

Q.—Playing for a Monthly Medal a competitor on coming to the sixteenth green found the hole—which is in a depression on the green—covered over with water to the depth of about 6 inches round the hole, caused by a heavy fall of rain. He tried to putt the ball into the hole, but could not do so, and picked up his ball, claiming the right to finish the round some other time. Can he do so, or is he disqualified? About a quarter of an hour after the above-mentioned competitor, another competitor came in. By this time the water had partly sunk into the ground, leaving about 3 inches of water. He was on the green in two strokes, and within 3 feet of the hole in his third stroke. He says he pitched his fifth shot into the hole, but his marker says it did not go to the bottom of the hole owing to the water, in which it floated. However, he put down five for the hole, and finished the round. Is he disqualified?

A.—It is the duty of the Committee to decide whether the links were in such a condition that the game of golf was playable. From the evidence submitted it appears that the competition should have been declared null and void.

Q.—A player in a stroke competition picks up his ball (either to ascertain whether it is his own ball, or inadvertently when on the lip of the hole), and then replaces it on the same spot and holes out. Does the player, under Rule 26, Match Play, read in conjunction with Rule 16, Stroke Competitions, lose a stroke as having moved "his ball" when not intending to make a stroke? or under Rule 8, Match Play, read in conjunction with Rule 16, Stroke Competitions, does he lose a stroke as having "moved" or "touched" his ball without his "opponent's consent," or does he lose two strokes under Rule 10, Stroke Competitions, as having "lifted his ball from any place," or is he disqualified as having taken his ball out of play? If the latter, under which rule?

A.—He loses two strokes under Rule 10 for Stroke Competitions.

Q.—A. and B. were playing C. and D. C. and D.'s ball was not on the putting green and more than 20 yards from the hole. Their caddie, however, removed some particles of dung from the putting green before C. and D. played the stroke. Was he justified in doing so under Rule 12, clause 4? or was he infringing Rule 18, which says that "when the ball is on the putting green the player or his caddie may remove dung, &c."? If it was an infringement, what penalty was incurred?

A.—The caddie was justified in removing the obstruction from the putting green within 20 yards of the hole.

Q.—In a match, A. holed out, then B. played, and his ball lay on the lip of the hole. A., who had holed out, after waiting a few seconds, knocked away B.'s ball, considering he had a right to do so under latter clause of Rule 21. This seems to be the common-sense reading of the rule, but it is not absolutely clear, and there is a difference of opinion. The opinion of the Rules of Golf Committee is craved.

A.—If there is no doubt that B.'s ball has come to rest, A. may knock it away, allowing B. to count as having holed out with his next stroke, but in any case A. must allow a reasonable time to elapse in case B.'s ball should drop into the hole.

Q.—What is exactly the decision with reference to play on the greens on the day of a stroke competition where the holes have

not been specially changed for the competition? If new holes were cut, say, at twelve o'clock on the day of the competition, would play be permissible up to, say, 11.45 that morning?

A.—Yes, at the old holes.

Q.—The competitor who returned the best score in a Medal round adopted an unusual method of putting. The competitor knelt down and used the handle end of the club shaft to strike the ball in the same manner that a billiard ball is struck with a cue. Is this legal?

A.—This method of putting is absolutely illegal.

Q.—Is it in accordance with the etiquette of golf merely to call "Fore" if a two-ball match intends to pass a four-ball match? If not, what form should be observed?

A.—It is usual for a two-ball match to give verbal intimation of their intention to pass, either at the tee, or by sending forward a caddie.

A HISTORIC LINKS.

WHEN you could have counted all the golf greens in the world on your fingers, Montrose was one of them. So that from early ages the inhabitants of the Burgh have been favoured above the many. For the benefit of those who are ignorant of the geography of their own country, Montrose forms a link in the chain of famous golf courses that runs along the East Coast of Scotland. On one or other of these sea-turf stretches golf first laid its firm hand on Scotland; and for five centuries, at any rate, it has gone on increasing its hold, till, having pretty well captured the whole of the available sea coast, it has of late seized upon most of our inland plains, as well as the bare slopes and unsuspecting hillsides from the Grampians to the Cheviots.

In the history of the game, therefore, Montrose figures from time immemorial; and to its archives and citizens we are indebted for interesting historic hints on early sport, even though in those days Club Secretaries were unknown, and there were no laborious minute-books in which to record either fact or fiction.

Montrose has given to the country one or two of the imperishable heroes of thought or action; and, in the historical tribute attaching to their names, we find early glimpses of the game there and elsewhere. The great Marquis, for example, a native of the place, and in youth educated at St. Andrews, could not possibly have escaped being bitten. He played golf, and we may take it as certain that he did not often suffer on the links the sort of treatment he experienced at the hands of David Leslie, in a graver issue, on the field of Philiphaugh. One of the items of early golf intelligence that has been preserved to us through his diary is that the price of balls in his time was prohibitive, except to well-lined purses, for there is an entry to the effect that his outlay amounted to three pounds for "ane dozen goiff balls." Another notable son of the Ross

was Andrew Melville, who followed in Montrose's steps to the University; and of him it was said that he was "the best poet, philosopher, and Grecian of any young master in the land." His autobiography lifts the veil of his fancy and reveals his partiality also for the links, at the same time as it shows the charm of a father's indulgence in ministering to the student's love of sport. He says: "I had my necessaire honestlie enouch of my father, but nocht else; for archerie and goff, I had bow, arrose, glub and balls, but nocht a purse for catchpull and tavern; sic was his fatherlie wisdom for my weill." Melville's less distinguished brother, James, also has his word on the subject, and thereby lets us into the secret of the manner of scholastic training of the time, not without its significance in modern pedagogies; for he tells us that his master taught both Latin and athletics, supervising both work and play, and teaching the young idea how to shoot, fence, and golf—making school-days, so full of painful memories to some—to him and to those similarly favoured, "a happie and golden time." How different this from the gloomy confession of a right reverend moderator, a profound theologian and accomplished linguist, whose boyhood was unbrightened by golf, who confided to us that the only appropriate hymn sung in his early school life was: "Here we suffer grief and pain!"

The "Royal Albert's" record must reach back for well nigh a century, for that Club was instituted as the Montrose Golf Club, in 1813, and for long it held full sway on the links, but latterly was appropriately joined by the "Victoria," then by the "Mercantile," and some other minor bodies, showing, that here, as elsewhere, the increase of the game was as rapid and inconvenient as a schoolboy outgrowing his clothes. The green has consequently of late required some tailoring, and has undergone considerable alteration. For one thing, it has been pushed further north, where there is an abundance of virgin ground, leaving space at the near end for non-players and frequenters of the sands to move about, secure from the flight of balls. When the new holes among the bent and hummocks have been licked into shape, there will be no occasion to regret the change.

The advent of the iron horse, in its turn, created something like a panic among the players, for the new line cut through part of their treasured ground; and at the present time, skirts one or two of the holes on the inward journey.

The Montrose golfer would fain have put back the hands of the clock of modern enterprise, or, at least, have gladly denied himself the facilities of transit for the sake of the green, but happily wiser councils prevailed, and some of the aggrieved players were compelled to find solace in recourse to poesy. These are the sentiments of one who anticipated the worst, but whose lamentations, happily, were themselves founded on a delusion—

Sweet were the breezes from the sea,
The showers that on me fell,
When sporting o'er the verdant lea
I've loved so long and well.
I've loved so long through Summer pride,
Or Autumn's darkening day,
The links, the stream, the sounding tide,
Gray bent and glittering bay.

The dream of all my early days
Is fled,— a rainbow gleam !
The balmy links, the flowery braes
Are now an empty dream.
A lingering vision, ne'er forgot,
Through all my cares and woes ;
The memory still will haunt the spot,
The lost links of Montrose.

But the railway does more than provide convenience for travellers—it forms an excellent hazard. In fact, there is nothing else in golf quite like lying hard up on the near or far side of a rail ; and many a match has changed colour, and many a good bit of hickory been splintered at the “ Corner o' the Dyke,” on the Old Links. Even the Stationmaster's Garden, the natural complement of the railway, is known the world over as a malign or beneficent factor, as the case may have been, in many a keenly-contested match.

The magistracy of Montrose have shown themselves alive to the possibilities of the game, and have suffered a stretch of valuable arable land to be added to the links. Cropping and golfing are never found compatible at one and the same place ; and even the proximity of potato patches has sometimes wrought disaster both upon play and temper. It is to Montrose, golfers are indebted for the tale of the blasphemous farmer, who, possessed an unenviable reputation for strong epithets, and who,

one day, attacked a player, engaged in the hopeless attempt of saving a half, for destroying his shaws; but the player, suffering from the loss both of hole and self-control, eagerly met him on his own ground with his own peculiar weapons, and it is on record, that the farmer, horrified at this maddened glimpse of himself as he appeared to others, retired, shamed and cowed, and for ever after suffered golfers to work their own sweet will.

No account of this historic links would be complete without a reference to Bob Dow, formerly greenkeeper, and who, for something like half a century, upheld the honour of Montrose, and withstood for long, at any rate, the efforts of outsiders to snatch the laurels of his own green from his brow. In his time, playing many matches, he contented himself with a local fame, trying issues occasionally with his northern neighbours, travelling now and again to Perth, Musselburgh, and St. Andrews, where he found foemen worthy of his steel in the Rook, Willie Park, sen., and Old Tom. In ordinary circumstances, Dow was a steady and reliable, rather than brilliant player, but, playing little from home, in a big match he had the fatal failing of losing nerve when that was most required. Now that a Championship of the green has been initiated, in the shape of the annual contest for the Boothby-Campbell Shield, we will expect some of the winners and runners-up to carry their colours further afield, and make Montrose, as it deserves to be, known, both for links and players, throughout the golfing world.

The inhabitants are not all golfers—but the best of them are. In spite of their opportunities, some are even still ignorant of the terminology of the game; for, when a player there excused his defeat, and, “laying the flattering unction to his soul,” went the length of asserting that he was convinced his opponent had broken his record, the only response he got was from an intelligent-looking old lady, who remarked, sympathetically with the opponent, “Eh! that was a poetic!”

We can wish for no better field for play than Montrose offers to-day. We will not venture to determine the comparative merits of our Scotch golf-courses. We hold that the provision of a tolerable green, a tolerable day, and a tolerable opponent, ought to be sufficient to satisfy the ordinary golfing instinct. To local men, and those who know it best, Montrose,

without doubt, is best. We can sympathise with the outburst of poetic fervour—

Oh! the links of Montrose are bonnie and sweet!
And dear are the waters that roll at their feet!
Oh! these green spreading links they ne'er shall depart,
They're the star of my fancy, the home of my heart!

Many lands may be fairer, though none has been seen,
As the shore where my first love and boyhood has been;
Ah! give me the links, and the wild, stormy sea!
Every one for his fancy, but Montrose links for me!

But such sentiments do not solve the problem whether these fair, and, to some, faultless links, hold the palm above all others. It must suffice to say that Montrose offers first-rate sport. It has its stretches of fine sward as well as its rough places, its well-kept greens, its Gully, Howe and Coffin, no less! an obliging starter, and plenty of Club comforts; and, with the sunshine bathing the turf, the larks carolling overhead, and the boom of the tireless sea sounding on the ear, if the player cannot drink his fill of enjoyment at Montrose, it is not because of the links. He must either be off his game or a discontented churl at the best; for Old Tom's verdict, passed upon a neighbouring green, is equally applicable here: "There canna be better found for gowf."

THE LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1904.

AFTER an interval of seven years the Ladies' Golf Union decided to hold their annual Championship in Scotland. The use of the famous Troon links was kindly granted by the Committee of the Troon Golf Club, and at this favourite Ayrshire resort a busy week began on Monday, May 9th, with the usual stroke competition open to all Championship entrants. The Duchess of Portland gave the first prize, and two others were provided by the Ladies' Union. The weather, if dull, was not unfavourable to low scoring, but nobody was prepared for such a grand display as that given by Miss Glover, the Scotch Champion. Beginning well with a 4 and a 5, she came to sad grief at the third hole. Her second shot was trapped in the burn, and, seemingly disconcerted, she required seven strokes to a 5 hole. She at once settled down, however, to her best game, and, aided by a brilliant 3 to the fifth hole, she turned, after all, in 41. Coming home she drove out of bounds going to the long hole (the fourteenth), but this was about her only mistake, and when she handed in a card of 81 it was thought needless to look elsewhere for the winner of the Duchess of Portland's prize. Such proved the case, and she was congratulated at all hands on an exceptionally fine performance. Her details were as follows: Out, 4 5 7 5 3 5 4 4 4=41; in, 5 4 4 4 6 4 5 4 4=40. The other prize winners were Miss Dorothy Campbell, 86 (43 out and in), and Miss May Hezlet, 87 (43 out and 44 in). The latter seemed to find considerable difficulty in gauging the strength of the putting greens. The Champion (Miss Adair) also found the putting difficult, and could do no better than 88 (43 out and 45 in). She tied for fourth place with Miss E. Steel. The next best scores were: Miss A. Buckley, 89; Miss L. Dod, 90; Misses Harvey, V. Hezlet, E. C. Nevile, M. A. Graham, and Mrs. Swanston, 91; Mrs. Jillard, Mrs. Bourn, and Misses M. E.

Phillips and Bishop, 92; Misses B. Thompson, J. Rusack, and K. G. Moeller, 93; Misses F. Hezlet, M. Maitland, and Longmuir, 94; Miss G. Robertson, 95; Misses F. Walker-Leigh, F. Macbeth, M. E. Stuart, and N. Rolland, 96; Mrs. Willock, Mrs. Jackson, and Misses D. Robertson, M. F. Verrall, and J. G. Broun, 97; Misses Issette Pearson and E. Robertson, 98; Mrs. Blakesley, Mrs. Ames, and Misses V. Henry-Anderson, N. Graham, Hamilton-Campbell, and C. Thomson, 99.

The serious business of the Championship began on Tuesday afternoon, when those sixty-two ladies whom the fortune of the ballot had decreed should play from the outset met in the first round, what time the remaining thirty-three entrants looked on at their less fortunate opponents. Of the total entry of ninety-five, more than one-third were Scotch, so that the Ladies' Union could congratulate themselves on selecting Scotland for a second time as their vantage ground. The weather, if a trifle chill for the "merry month," was not unfavourable, and fully 1000 spectators were on the links when the first ball was struck off by Miss M. B. Higgins, America's plucky representative, who, curiously enough, was drawn against the 1903 Champion, Miss Rhona Adair. Both got away fine balls, and the first hole was halved in 5. Miss Adair, however, in virtue of her better short game, took the lead at the second hole, and never afterwards lost it. Both cleared the burn *en route* to the third hole with their seconds, but Miss Adair again putted better, and became two up. The two succeeding holes were halved, but Miss Higgins improved her position at the sixth hole, which she had in 5 by faultless play. Miss Higgins did not put enough into her iron shot to the short seventh hole, and her ball failed to carry the last of the rough ground. Miss Adair won the hole, and eventually turned two up. She increased her advantage at the tenth hole, but threw away the eleventh by indifferent putting. She also missed a shortish putt at the twelfth, and so Miss Higgins stood only one down with six to go. The latter lost the next hole by approaching too strongly, and the end came at the sixteenth hole, where Miss Adair laid her a stimie. As is generally the case in the first round, nearly all the other ties resulted "according to Cocker." In her encounter with Mrs. Jillard, Miss May Hezlet showed up splendidly. Out in 40, she won on the twelfth green. Miss J. G. Broun, one of Edinburgh's

representatives, effected a mild surprise at the expense of Miss M. E. Phillips, the Ladies' County Association Secretary. They turned all square, but Miss Broun had the issue safe at the seventeenth hole. Almost as stiff a match was that between Miss L. Dod and Miss Moeller. The former turned one up, and, forging ahead thereafter, won by three and one. Miss B. Thompson had her work cut out to beat a local lady in Miss D. Jenkins, who comes of a famous golfing family. Indeed, it was only after three extra holes had been played that the latter had to admit defeat in her first Championship essay. Miss Issette Pearson, the enthusiastic Secretary of the Union, was in her best form against Miss W. Robertson (Troon), and her win was probably the most popular of the day.

Wednesday saw a welcome change in the temperature, a start being made with the second round in brilliant sunshine. The first match to attract attention was that between Miss Glover and Miss Maitland, who also hails from Elie. Both began well, the first hole being halved in 4, but Miss Glover, by wonderfully fine play, pocketed the four succeeding holes. The sixth hole was halved in 6, Miss Maitland's long putt lipping the hole. Miss Glover was not seen to advantage at the short hole, which her opponent won in 4. Miss Glover, however, again asserted herself at the ninth hole, and turned four up. Miss Maitland won the tenth hole, and, after a half at the eleventh, she further improved her prospects at the twelfth, where Miss Glover missed a short putt. A deft little pitch also won Miss Maitland the thirteenth in 3, and she squared accounts with another 3 two holes later. Miss Glover again went ahead, but another rare pitch saw Miss Maitland get down in 3 at the seventeenth. On the home green Miss Maitland had a 3 yards putt to win the match, but it was an inch short, and an extra hole had to be played. A very large crowd followed what proved to be an intensely exciting hole. Miss Glover seemed to have the issue safe when Miss Maitland's second was bunkered, but the latter recovered well, and, running down a long steal for a 4, won her way most unexpectedly into the third round after a splendid exhibition of pluck. The match between Miss Adair and Miss Rusack saw the former at her best. Out in 40, she turned four up, and won on the fourteenth green. Miss E. C. Nevile, Miss M. Hezlet, and Miss S. Whigham also won their matches without much difficulty, but Miss M. E.

Stewart took Miss F. Hezlet to the second last hole; and it was not until a similar stage that Miss Issette Pearson accounted for Miss Harvey, of Prestwick. Miss E. McCankie, of Musselburgh, did uncommonly well against such a reliable player as Miss Bertha Thompson, a keenly contested round ending in a tie. Miss McCankie had a good chance of winning at the nineteenth hole, but she missed a 4ft. putt, and Miss Thompson, profiting by Miss McCankie having sent her drive only a few yards, won at the succeeding hole. Miss G. Robertson, one of the best of the Troon players, turned four up against Miss Dod, but, after a half at the tenth, the whilom Lawn Tennis Champion ran away with six successive holes, and won on the home green. Miss Tyrrell and Mrs. Perkin prolonged their tussle for twenty holes, when the former proved victorious. Mrs. Swanston had little mercy on Miss Sant, and her sister (Miss Dorothy Campbell) accomplished one of the best performances of the round in beating Miss Walker-Leigh, last year's runner-up. Out in 40, she stood four up, and, thanks to a lovely 2, won her match on the fifteenth green. The other matches call for no comment.

The weather continued in its kindest mood all day, and the third round was contested in almost ideal conditions. Miss M. A. Graham had more difficulty in beating Mrs. Jackson than anticipated, for their game lasted to the home hole, and it was by a similarly small margin that Miss Steel beat Miss Hamilton-Campbell, of Prestwick. Miss Adair and Miss E. C. Nevile, not unnaturally, attracted the lion's share of attention. The former began in great style by winning the first two holes, and had increased her lead to four at the sixth hole. Miss Nevile then had an innings, and, winning the seventh and nine holes, reduced her deficit to two. The tenth was halved, Miss Adair won the eleventh, Miss Nevile the twelfth, and Miss Adair the thirteenth. Two halves narrowed the issue, and, although Miss Adair gave up the sixteenth hole after having her second bunkered, she won a hole later. Miss F. Hezlet did uncommonly well against her sister, the ex-Champion. Indeed, it was only on the home-coming that the latter secured the lead, and won by a hole. Miss Whigham scarcely did herself justice against Miss Rolland, and an extra hole had to be played before she won. Miss Dod, Mrs. Swanston, and Miss Dorothy Campbell won their matches

with ease, but Miss B. Thompson did not get the better of Miss Pearson until the seventeenth hole. The round concluded with the unexpectedly easy win of Miss Buckley over Miss N. Graham, the Irish ex-Champion.

Thursday found the weather back to its old tricks, a drizzling rain falling, and there was a perceptible diminution in the number of spectators. "But the play's the the thing." Miss Maitland, who had created such a sensation on the previous day, began well against Miss Smith by winning the first hole in 4, but she straightway lost her advantage. She won the third hole, but, topping her drive to the fourth, never came within sight of a half. Give-and-take was thereafter the order, Miss Maitland turning one up. She increased her lead to two at the eleventh, but by superior putting Miss Smith drew level at the thirteenth. Now came the tug; and, after some in-and-out play, the round was halved. Going to the nineteenth hole Miss Maitland sliced her second into the rough, and Miss Smith, taking her chance, won her way into the fifth round. Every whit as close was the struggle going on behind them between Miss M. A. Graham and Miss Steel. The former had to play an uphill game nearly all the way, and was actually three down at the fifteenth hole. She, however, rose splendidly to the occasion, and squared the match. The nineteenth hole settled matters in her favour, Miss Steel getting badly bunkered. It was unfortunate, from an Irish point of view, that Miss Adair and Miss M. Hezlet had thus early to measure strengths. Miss Hezlet won the first hole, but lost the second through getting trapped. Miss Adair, however, played the next three holes badly, and lost them all. She failed to carry the burn midway to the third hole, missed her pitch to the fourth, and failed at a short putt, which would have given her a half of the fifth. It was now Miss Hezlet's turn to get into difficulties, and at the seventh Miss Adair was only one down. This was still the position of affairs five holes later, but then came one of those curious turns which give the game its charm. Miss Adair had a short putt to win the thirteenth hole and square the match, but, missing it, she laid herself a stimie, and actually lost the hole. Her drive to the next hole went out of bounds, and Miss Hezlet won two holes later. Miss Whigham, Miss Macbeth, Mrs. Swanston, and Miss Dorothy Campbell all won their matches with great ease, but

that steady player Miss B. Thompson took Miss Dod to the seventeenth hole.

The first two matches in the fifth round resulted pretty much as expected. Miss Graham turned three up against Miss Smith, and won without playing the last three holes. Miss Hezlet also stood in the comfortable position of three up at the ninth, and beat Miss Macbeth by 6 and 5. Miss Dod and Miss Whigham, on the other hand, proved well matched. Miss Whigham led at the outset, winning the first two holes, but her opponent had the game square at the fifth, where Miss Whigham was trapped with a very long second. Miss Dod took the lead at the seventh, which she had in 3. Some interesting play followed, of which Miss Dod had slightly the best, and she won at the seventeenth hole. Miss Campbell played splendidly against her sister, Mrs. Swanston. Holing her pitch to the first hole, she had increased her lead to three at the turn, and won in good style by six and four. As a result of the day's play two Scotch ladies, one English, and one Irish were left to "divide the spoil" in the shape of the Gold, Silver, and Bronze Medals.

The weather on Friday was to the north side of friendly, a strong wind driving in from the Atlantic, while it rained towards the close of the forenoon rounds. It fell to the two ex-Champions, Miss Hezlet and Miss Graham, to lead off. It was a hard beat up for them all the way out, but Miss Hezlet was seen to rare advantage. After a half in 6, her strong driving off the tee and through the green won her the second and third holes in 5. She might also have won the fourth, but failed at a short putt. Miss Graham looked like dropping yet further behind at the fifth, but she laid her approach close to the hole, and snatched a half in 5. Miss Hezlet, however, won the long hole in 6, Miss Graham's drive having been bunkered. The seventh was halved in 4, but another bunkered drive cost Miss Graham the eighth. So far she had not won a hole, but Miss Hezlet stunted herself badly at the ninth hole, and Miss Graham gained her initial success. Miss Hezlet all but reached the tenth green with two long shots, and a superb little running pitch and a useful putt won her the hole in 4. The eleventh was halved in 5, both running nicely up from the edge of the green; but Miss Graham won the next hole in 5 in virtue of a 6 yards putt. Miss Hezlet was bunkered to the right of the

thirteenth hole, but she lay well, and the hole was halved in 4. Miss Graham seemed about to lose the fourteenth hole when she ran down a 5 yards putt, and she wrested an even better half of the fifteenth hole, past which Miss Hezlet had driven from the tee. Still, these recoveries were bound to tell upon her powers in the long run, and the end came when Miss Hezlet pitched splendidly to within 3 yards of the sixteenth, whereupon Miss Graham put her approach into the bunker. She got well out, but Miss Hezlet won the hole, and therewith the match, by four and two. Miss Dod and Miss Campbell also began their round with a half in 6, but Miss Dod's better short game enabled her to win the two succeeding holes. The fourth hole was halved in 6, but Miss Dod lost the fifth hole by missing a shortish putt. Another half in 6 led up to the short seventh hole, which Miss Dod won by holing a run up of over 20 yards. Both were bunkered going to the eighth, but Miss Dod made the better recovery, and now stood three up. The ninth hole was halved in 5, Miss Campbell getting down a long putt. She played the tenth hole very well indeed, and deservedly won it. She seemed to have the worst of the eleventh, but won it by a good run up, as a reply to which Miss Dod missed a putt. Of the three next holes Miss Dod won two. She drove on to the thirteenth green, while Miss Campbell was over it, and won it in 2; and the fourteenth was also hers in 6, Miss Campbell having sliced into the bents. A half in 4 made Miss Dod dormy, and she won her way into her first final at the sixteenth hole. A numerous company witnessed the final, and so unruly did they become that threats were made that play would have to be stopped. Afterwards a little better order was kept. The first hole was halved in 5, but Miss Hezlet missed a 4ft. putt at the second, and Miss Dod went ahead. The third was halved, but Miss Hezlet drew level at the fourth, Miss Dodd having lost valuable distance through not keeping the line from the tee. The fifth and sixth were halved in 5 and 6 respectively, but Miss Hezlet was so badly bunkered at the seventh that she took four to reach the green, and Miss Dod won the hole in 4. Miss Dod played the eighth badly, and Miss Hezlet again drew level. She looked like leading for the first time at the ninth, as Miss Dod's second was trapped, but she missed her approach, and Miss Dod, recovering splendidly, won the hole. The latter

went further ahead at the tenth, Miss Hezlet's approach over-running the green. Miss Hezlet had an opportunity given her at the eleventh, but, taking three on the green, allowed Miss Dod to snap a half. Miss Hezlet, however, won the succeeding hole well in 4, and, after a lovely half in 3, wiped out her deficit at the long hole, which she had in 4, her approach being a picture. Then came another half, but Miss Hezlet, with a real good 4 to the sixteenth, led for the first time. She lost her advantage at the last but one, where she once more failed at a short putt. Both got away grand drives to the home hole, but a magnificent approach by Miss Dod was not well replied to by Miss Hezlet, and the former won by a putt after a splendid exhibition on the part of both. Miss Dod had to thank her fine putting for her success, which she had long striven for and richly deserved. Details :—

THE SCOTCH LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1904.

THE second Ladies' Championship of Scotland, which began on Tuesday, May 17th, over the St. Nicholas links, Prestwick, suffered probably from coming so soon after the Ladies' Championship decided at Troon in the previous week, for it certainly did not excite as much interest as expected. An entry list of thirty-five was also disappointing, and of these four failed to answer to their names. The first round, consisting as it did of only three matches, attracted little attention, but there was a fair gathering of spectators in the afternoon. Unfortunately a high wind prevailed, with occasional showers of rain, and little good play was shown. Miss Dorothy Campbell, after a lot of in and out golf, turned two up against Miss D. Jenkins (Troon). The latter tried hard to make up her leeway coming home, but had to admit defeat on the seventeenth green. She, however, ought to be heard of in future Championships. The game between the holder (Miss Glover) and Miss N. Rolland was even more interesting. Miss Glover was one up at the turn, and by this narrowest of margins she ultimately won. Miss Rusack (Cupar) inflicted an unexpectedly severe defeat on Miss Maitland, the conqueror of Miss Glover in the Ladies' Championship, and Mrs. Mundell (Dornoch) had an even more pronounced win over Miss M. Neilson (Prestwick). The other matches, however, ended as was generally expected, Miss M. A. Graham, as at Troon, putting very well indeed.

Wednesday was stormy, and altogether unfitted for ladies playing accurate golf. The wind blew almost a gale from the west, and the competitors had more bunker practice than they cared for. The only match in the third round calling for comment was that between Miss Glover and Miss D. Campbell. It was expected to be close, but Miss Glover won easily. Both were bunkered going to the first hole, but Miss

Glover got well out, and won the hole. She went further ahead at the second, which she had in 3, and also won the two succeeding holes, her opponent putting her second on to the shore in the one case and playing slackly in the other. Miss Campbell showed something like her true form at the fifth, which she won in 5, but both at the sixth and seventh holes she was trapped in the quarry, and Miss Glover became five up. Miss Glover's stronger play through the green gave her the ninth, and she won the tenth by laying her opponent a stimie. A win for Miss Campbell at the short eleventh hole merely prolonged the game, which ended in Miss Glover's favour a hole later.

In the afternoon round Miss Bishop and Miss Henry-Anderson played a close game. Until the seventeenth hole was reached they they were never separated by more than a hole. It, however, fell to the former, and she won by two and one. Mrs. Mundell and Miss Graham won their ties with something in hand, but Miss Glover was unexpectedly thrown out by Miss Harvey, one of the best of the local players. Of the first five holes, Miss Glover won the second in 4 and the fourth in 5, while the others were halved. Miss Harvey then had an innings, and they turned all square. Trapped badly at the tenth hole, Miss Glover had perforce to give it up. Then she missed her iron shot to the eleventh, and lost it also. The twelfth was won splendidly in 3 by Miss Harvey, and, holding tenaciously to her lead, she was hailed the winner at the sixteenth hole.

The weather changed for the better on Thursday, the sun making a welcome appearance, while the wind had greatly moderated. In the first semi-final Miss Bishop, aided by some luck, as she holed a short approach to the fourth hole, and long steals to the sixth and ninth, won very easily; indeed, Miss Harvey never got a single hole. The match between Mrs. Mundell and Miss Graham was for a long time in doubt. Neither settled down until some six holes had been played, at which point Mrs. Mundell was one up. A long putt, however, enabled Miss Graham to draw level at the seventh, and a good recovery from the bunker at the ninth saw her win that hole also, and turn with a hole in hand. Three steady halves followed, but Mrs. Mundell lost the next three holes, failing to carry the wall *en route* to the thirteenth with her third,

pulling her second to the fourteenth, and getting badly bunkered off the fifteenth tee, and therewith the match.

Some 800 spectators witnessed the final in the afternoon. Characteristically good putting deservedly won Miss Graham the first two holes, and, after halves at the third and fourth, Miss Bishop gave her a present of the fifth by missing four shots in succession. With another fine putt Miss Graham went further ahead at the sixth. She also won the seventh with a useful putt, and turned five up. Miss Bishop gained her first success at the tenth hole, Miss Graham having an unplayable ball below the fence; but matters returned to their erstwhile position straightaway. Miss Bishop missed her tee shot to the twelfth. She lost the hole in consequence, and a half at the thirteenth terminated a one-sided game in Miss Graham's favour. Runner-up last year to Miss Glover, her victory was quite in the order of things, and extremely popular. This is her second Championship, she having won the Ladies' Open Championship in 1901, and more honours are probably in store for her, as she plays well at every point, but particularly on the greens. THE IRISH LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1904.

THE Irish ladies held their eleventh Championship on the fine links at Lahinch, Co. Clare, which had been generously placed at their disposal. The course is a most sporting one, abounding in hazards, and affording a thoroughly good test of golf. Magnificent weather favoured the meeting, the great heat of the sun being tempered by a refreshing breeze.

As this was the first Ladies' Championship to take place in the South of Ireland, it created much interest, and it was a great pity that so many of the intending competitors found it necessary to scratch at the last moment. The absence of Miss Rhona Adair, who had held the Irish Cup for four consecutive years, was particularly regretted, and the meeting was thereby robbed of half its attraction.

The proceedings began on Monday, June 6th, with the usual preliminary stroke competition, for prizes given by the Lahinch Club. Miss May Hezlet, Miss F. Hezlet, and Miss F. Walker-Leigh returned scores of 88, Miss Jennings coming next with 89, and on playing off the tie, Miss May Hezlet proved the winner with 86.

The first and second rounds of the Championship (June 7th) were somewhat devoid of interest, as, in consequence of the numerous scratchings, all the good players had easy victories. The same may be said of the third round, but the fourth produced some good matches. Miss F. Walker-Leigh had a great struggle with Miss M. Dickson, which only ended on the last green. Miss Dickson is a young player from the North-West Club, who drives a very long ball, and only requires a little more steadiness in her short game to take a very high rank among lady players. Miss Jennings and Miss F. Hezlet also had a hard-fought match. The "semi-finals" produced the most exciting match of the meeting—that between Miss

F. Walker-Leigh and Miss F. Hezlet. The former made the better start, but Miss Hezlet squared the match at the seventh, and, after halving the eighth and ninth, she won the next three holes. She lost a stroke at the thirteenth, and also at the fourteenth, through playing out of bounds, but owing to her opponent's weakness on those greens she managed to halve both holes. From this point fortune turned in Miss Walker-Leigh's favour, as at the fifteenth Miss Hezlet was bunkered from the tee, and picked up. Her lead was reduced to one at the sixteenth, Miss Walker-Leigh holing a long putt, and as Miss Hezlet drove into the bunker at the seventeenth and made a bad recovery, the match was squared. The eighteenth was halved, and Miss Walker-Leigh won the nineteenth very easily.

Miss May Hezlet played very well in all her matches, but by the luck of the draw she had a very easy time till she reached the final, which was keenly contested and watched with much interest. Miss Hezlet took the lead at the third hole, and at the turn she stood four up. She got bunkered at the short tenth hole, and Miss Walker-Leigh also won the eleventh, leaving herself only two down. Miss Hezlet won the next, and lost the thirteenth. Each then won a hole, and as Miss Hezlet secured the fourteenth and halved the next, she became dormy three and won on the sixteenth green, thus gaining for the second time the Irish Championship.

The presentation of the Cup and Medals by Mrs. J. B. Barrington brought a most enjoyable meeting to a close. The enjoyment was largely due to the kindness of the members of the Lahinch Club, both gentlemen and ladies, who spared no efforts to make the meeting a success, prominent among them being Mr. J. B. ENGLAND v. SCOTLAND.

SCOTLAND won the Third International Match, which was played at Sandwich, on Saturday, May 28th, by six matches to three. The event of the day was the match between Mr. John Ball and Mr. R. Maxwell. It was a great tussle all the way, but luck was on Mr. Maxwell's side, and he won after the game had been prolonged to the thirty-ninth hole. He reached the turn in the morning round in 33 aided by a 2 at the eighth, where his approach cannoned in off Mr. Ball's ball. At this point he held a useful lead of three holes, but Mr. Ball got one back coming home. In the afternoon Mr. Maxwell drew first blood at the second hole, but for the next twelve holes Mr. Ball played such fine golf that he squared accounts at the eighth hole, went in front at the ninth, and led by three at the fourteenth. All now seemed over, but Mr. Maxwell rose to the occasion and managed to equalise matters at the home hole. At the first extra hole Mr. Maxwell laid his opponent a dead stinnie, which the latter all but negotiated. A half resulted, and so also at the second hole. At the third hole Mr. Maxwell hit the tin with a long run up, and Mr. Ball laying himself a stinnie, lost the hole and the match, which with equal luck he would have won. But therein lies golf's chiefest charm. That "hero of a hundred fights," Mr. Mure Fergusson, held the whip hand over Mr. Hilton nearly all the way. Two up in the morning, he ran off with the first three holes in the afternoon. Mr. Hilton made a plucky fight from this point, but his effort came too late, and the match finished at the sixteenth hole. Mr. De Zoete, who did so well against Mr. Graham at Muirfield in 1903, failed to hold him now. He putted slackly, and, steady in every department, Mr. Graham won by four up and three to play. This was also the measure of Mr. Hutchinson's success—his first in an International—over Mr. Laidlay: but dogged as ever, Mr. Fry kept Mr. Blackwell going for thirty-seven holes before admitting defeat. Lieut. C. K. Hutcheson

one of Scotland's two new "caps," justified his selection by cleverly beating Mr. Pease, but the other newcomer Mr. A. D. Blyth, from whom much was expected on his own favourite course, quite failed to do himself justice against Mr. Fowler. Mr. Castle, who had done so well against Mr. Robb at Muirfield, was now badly beaten by Mr. Dick; but Mr. Darwin reduced England's leeway to three points at the expense of Mr. Low, whose play through the green left something to be desired. THE AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1904.

THE Nineteenth Annual Amateur Championship will long be recalled as the one in which the famous American, Mr. W. J. Travis, like Cæsar, "came, saw, and conquered" by the steadiest and best of golf, which must have made his erstwhile detractors feel very small indeed, as did those who pooh-poohed the chances of the late Dr. Allan at Muirfield in 1897. The fact of the matter is that it has become the fashion to regard the Championship as impossible of being won save by a very limited coterie. Hence it is well that the sapient critics should, as in 1893, 1897, 1902, and last year, have it borne in on them at stated intervals that the number of players up to Championship standard is not to be counted on the fingers of one hand. There are many spread up and down the Kingdom who only await the opportunity, denied to them now by the all too early date fixed for the competition, of showing their worth as exponents of the Royal and Ancient game.

Sandwich was seen at its worst on Tuesday, May 31st, when play began. Rain fell heavily from early morning until four o'clock, by which time the majority of the golfers had returned. Those who know Sandwich can easily appreciate the condition of things with a pitiless rainstorm sweeping for hours over the links from the south-west; and there were plenty of extenuating circumstances for the competitors who failed to do themselves justice in the first two rounds. It was a heavy day's programme, there being thirty-five matches and twenty-nine byes in the first round. Indeed only five of the 104 entrants failed to start competitions. The presence of the American contingent gave an additional interest to the meeting, and the rain did not prevent Mr. Travis from having a strong following. His straight play through the green and his unerring putting brought him through the first two rounds, even though in the second he had to meet such a sterling player as Mr. James Robb. In the morning Mr. Holden gave Mr. Travis a good

match for about half-way ; but his game with Mr. Robb was the one to see. He went out in 36, his only bad hole being the seventh, which he lost. Turning for home two up he was lucky in winning the tenth. Mr. Robb threw away a good chance of reducing the lead at the thirteenth, but his putting won him the fourteenth. At the fifteenth both lay equidistant about 12 yards from the hole ; but Mr. Travis got his putt down, and again led by two. He got a half of the seventeenth by lying Mr. Robb a stimie, but he lost the seventeenth through a poor second shot. The home hole was halved and the match went to Mr. Travis. Perhaps the most brilliant golf of the day was played by Mr. John Graham. As he went out in 32 in the morning, it was not surprising to find him beating Mr. Balfour-Melville by seven up and six to play, and he won his second tie against Mr. R. W. Orr by three up and two to play. Mr. Maxwell was given a tremendously hard match by Mr. Matthews, a Royal St. George's player, and was not successful until the twentieth hole. He several times held the lead, but Mr. Matthews hung on steadily, and finally stood two up at the sixteenth. Mr. Maxwell won the next two holes, getting down an 8 yards putt at the eighteenth, and the nineteenth was halved. To the twentieth Mr. Maxwell drove a long ball. Mr. Matthews was in the rough and made a poor recovery, and lost the hole and the match. After being two down at the eighth, Mr. Byers beat Mr. C. E. Dick, and subsequently easily won his second match with Mr. Peto. His short game was very good. Four of the Americans survived the first two rounds, for, in addition to Mr. Travis and Mr. Byers, Mr. Emmett beat Mr. Elliot by a 4 yards putt on the last green ; while, after an easy win in the first round, Mr. Burton won a hard match against Mr. Cant. Mr. John Ball, after a walk over, easily won his match in the second round, while Mr. Hilton and Mr. Fowler also passed without any trouble into the last thirty-two. Mr. Horace Hutchinson showed excellent form by beating Mr. Mure Fergusson at the thirteenth hole in the second round. Previous runners up, in Mr. J. L. Low and Mr. S. H. Fry, failed to get through the day, as also did the brothers Hunter.

There was a complete change for the better in the weather on Wednesday morning. The sun shone brilliantly, but its rays were tempered by a breeze from the South. It was generally

agreed that the match of the third round would be that between Mr. Maxwell and Mr. Graham. Mr. Maxwell took the lead at the second hole, and, playing very strongly, was four up at the turn, which he reached in 34. Up to this point Mr. Graham failed to do himself justice, but he won the tenth through his opponent finding the rough. After a half at the eleventh, Mr. Maxwell's putting won for him the twelfth in 3. Mr. Graham took the thirteenth, but he was bunkered in front of the fourteenth green, and this made Mr. Maxwell four up again, the end coming a hole later. Mr. Emmett was the first of the American players out in the morning, but he was no match for that strong Irish golfer, Mr. Cairnes, of Portmarnock. The match between Mr. Darwin and Mr. Boyd furnished another victory for the Irish contingent, for Mr. Darwin, while good through the green, was off his putting. Mr. Laidlay played a strong game. Going out in 36, he was six up against Mr. Crawford Hutchison at the turn, and won at the fourteenth hole. Mr. John Ball was also at the top of his game, and easily won his match with Mr. Brickhill; while Mr. Hutchinson had an almost equally easy victory over Mr. Paton. Mr. H. E. Reade, the Irish ex-Champion, had the distinction of beating Mr. Burton, another of the Americans, by no less than nine up and eight to play. Mr. Travis began badly against Mr. Murray, of Purley Downs; but, after being two down, he turned one up, and ultimately won on the seventeenth green. Mr. Hilton and Mr. Fowler played a hard match to the seventeenth green where Mr. Hilton won by two. The last couple were Mr. Byers and Mr. Williamson, and they took nearly three hours to play their match. It was the hardest game of the round, the match being taken to the nineteenth hole, where Mr. Williamson made a fine second shot, which settled matters in his favour. This left Mr. Travis the sole survivor of the American golfers in the fourth round, in which were six players each from England and Scotland, and three from Ireland.

In the fourth round, Mr. Blackwell and Mr. Boyd had a capital game, the former's long driving being neutralised by Mr. Boyd's uniform steadiness, and the issue was not settled in Mr. Blackwell's favour till the home hole. Mr. Graham-Murray fairly excelled himself against Mr. Laidlay, who only

won by playing two extra holes; and the tie between Mr. Hilton and Mr. Williamson was all but as protracted. Mr. Hilton won at the nineteenth hole, thanks to a picture of a second. Mr. W. E. Fairlie, Mr. Bevan, and Mr. Maxwell all won with something in hand; but Mr. Hutchinson and Mr. Travis had their work cut out to beat Mr. Ball and Mr. Reade. Mr. Hutchinson led by a hole at the turn, added to his advantage by a brilliant recovery from the bunker guarding the thirteenth hole, and won on the seventeenth green. Mr. Travis and Mr. Reade were all square at the eleventh, but the latter forged ahead then, and stood two up at the fourteenth. Mr. Travis, however, pocketed the remaining holes in great style, his 2 at the sixteenth being quite a feat, and was heartily cheered for pulling the match out of the fire. His score was 76 (38 out and in), as against Mr. Reade's 79. *Four Scotchmen, three Englishmen, and one American* were left to fight it out on the third day.

The conditions on Thursday were unfavourable, the wind blowing from the North-West, and bringing rain in its train. In the fifth round Mr. Blackwell won comfortably over Mr. Fairlie, and Mr. Laidlay quite outplayed Mr. Bevan. Those old opponents, Mr. Hutchinson and Mr. Maxwell, however, supplied plenty of excitement. Mr. Maxwell began in great style, and won three out of the first four holes. The next three were halved, but Mr. Hutchinson then had his innings, and had drawn level at the tenth hole. It was still all to play for at the seventeenth, but Mr. Hutchinson's victory seemed assured when he laid his opponent a stinnie at the home hole. Mr. Maxwell, however, deftly pitched into the hole, and out they had to go again. Mr. Maxwell's second carried over the green, whereas Mr. Hutchinson's was bunkered. The latter made a fine recovery, and, holing a 2 yards putt for a 4, avenged his Muirfield defeat. Mr. Travis gave Mr. Hilton a taste of his steadiness. Winning the first three holes, he turned three up, and, leaving nothing to chance, won five holes later.

In the penultimate round Mr. Laidlay proved slightly under form against Mr. Blackwell, who drove as strongly as ever. Mr. Blackwell was three up at the tenth, but Mr. Laidlay had him down to one at the fourteenth. Mr. Blackwell won the fifteenth, however, and, halving the next two, made his way into final for the first time. Meantime, Mr. Travis had been excelling

all his previous performances against Mr. Hutchinson. He won the first hole, and Mr. Hutchinson the second. Mr. Travis won the third hole in 3, and could not again be deprived of his lead, which, by splendid putting, he had increased to three at the turn, his score to this point being 34. Bunkered *en route* to the tenth hole, Mr. Travis lost it, but resumed his old lead of three at the thirteenth which both played badly. A fine recovery from the bunker at the fourteenth gave him a hard half, and he won at the sixteenth hole, beside which he had placed his drive.

The final tie on Friday was favoured with good weather. Both players began indifferently by taking four to reach the first green, but Mr. Travis ran down his putt and won the hole. A long putt gave him the second hole in 3, and the third was halved; but Mr. Travis rammed down long putts at the fourth and fifth, and thus early stood four up, a lead he was holding tenaciously to at the close of the morning round. In the afternoon Mr. Blackwell, after standing six down at the sixth, made the pluckiest of fights to retrieve his position. Not another hole did he let Mr. Travis win, but he could only wrest from him the seventh and ninth, and had to admit defeat on the fifteenth green. Such putting as Mr. Travis' has never been seen in a Championship final, and, albeit beaten, Mr. Blackwell was in no way disgraced. Mr. Travis was presented with the Championship Cup and Medal by Lord Northbourne, President of the Royal St. George's Golf Club, amid loud cheering. The runner-up and semi-finalists also received their medals. Mr. Hutchinson, in responding, saying that they had been "gloriously beaten." Details:—

The conditions which regulate the entrance of players in the Amateur Championship are as follows :

(a) The competition shall be open to all amateur golfers, members of any Golf Club.

(b) An amateur golfer shall be a golfer who has never made for sale golf clubs, balls, or any other article connected with the game ; who has never carried clubs for hire after attaining the age of fifteen years, and who has not carried clubs for hire at any time within six years of the date on which the competition begins in each year ; who has never received any consideration for playing in a match, or for giving lessons in the game ; and who for a period of five years prior to the 1st September, 1886, has never received a money prize in any open competition.

(c) Competitors shall enter for the competition through the Secretaries of their respective Clubs, who in sending in the names shall be held to certify that the players are *bonâ fide* amateur golfers in terms of the foregoing definitions.

Notwithstanding the provision in Clause c, all entries shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of the Club on whose green the competition is held.

This year's Championship falls to be held at Prestwick on May 22nd and the four succeeding days.

MR. WALTER J. TRAVIS,
CHAMPION AMATEUR GOLFER, 1904.

THE remark of the old St. Andrews caddie to the "duffing" professor, "It taks a man wi' a heid to play gowf," was never more fittingly exemplified than in Mr. Travis at Sandwich last Summer. A long driver when he chooses, he never once let himself go from the tee, but played well within himself, trusting to his precise placing and deadly short game to pull him through. This it was, coupled with his high-strung nerve, kept well under control, that carried him through a trying ordeal with flying colours. Nor was his triumph in the nature of a fluke, as some uncharitable Britons would have the golfing world believe, for he had to meet in turn a twice runner-up in Mr. J. Robb, Mr. H. E. Reade, the Irish ex-Champion, past Champions in Mr. H. H. Hilton and Mr. H. G. Hutchinson, and that mighty swiper, Mr. Edward Blackwell. The Americans, who were his fellow-competitors, supported him to a man, and that excellent judge, Mr. T. T. Gray, who had played with him in practice, made no secret of his strong fancy for him to win outright.

Born at Maldon, Victoria, some forty odd years ago, it was not until October, 1896, that he began to play. Yet, less than four years after, he won the American Amateur Championship, which he retained in 1901, and won for a third time in 1903. He has also made his presence felt in competitions in and around New York, and as far south as Florida, in no uncertain fashion; and in 1903 he gave a splendid account of himself in matches against the Oxford and Cambridge Golfing Society, Mr. J. L. Low being his only conqueror. This was at Shinnecock Hills, but Mr. Travis turned the tables in the representative all-America contest twelve days later. We hope to see Mr. Travis upon this side in the near future, as we are confident that, given reasonable luck, he can repeat his last year's triumph.

"All wire and whip-cord" truly describes the man, as, although he stands 5ft. 9in., he weighs only 9st. 12lb.

THE GOLFING CHAMPIONSHIP, 1904.

The strong north-east wind which blew in the morning had increased considerably by mid-day, so that those who went out in the afternoon had the worst of the conditions. Low scoring was, therefore, not expected, but some fine returns were handed in notwithstanding. Those who went out with the Amateur Champion, Mr. W. J. Travis, in expectation of seeing a recurrence of the wonderful golf by which he secured the Amateur Championship over the same course, were disappointed. He played a very fine game from the tee and through the green, but never really found his short game, and his round was 83. Tom Vardon played with great precision from the tee and through the green, but his putting failed him repeatedly. Still, he managed a 77. Save for an 8 at the fifteenth hole, Herd would have had a fair round, and in spite of this he brought in an 84. Andrew Kirkcaldy and Sayers played excellently, their scores being 78 and 80 respectively. Coburn, another of the early players, returned 79, and Mr. John Ball, jun., and Mr. C. E. Hambro had only a couple of bad holes. Braid's long game was a triumph against the wind, perhaps the outstanding feature being his 3 to the fourteenth hole. He drove a tremendous ball, lay 4 yards from the hole after his spoon shot, and then got down the putt amid great applause. His round was 77, which J. H. Taylor equalled by the steadiest of golf. Mr. John Graham made few mistakes. He was strong from the tee, and his approach putts were superb. Thus he finished in 76. R. Thomson played before mid-day, and so had had the best of the weather. He twice jumped a bunker, and these slices of luck enabled him to get round at the very low figure of 75. Harry Vardon commanded the biggest following of the day. He played magnificent golf as a rule, but missed some short putts, including one of 4 feet on the home green to equal Thomson's score. Mr. Maxwell's long raking game promised a good score, but he missed some short putts, and while out in 37, he took 43 for the home coming. The leaders at the close of the first round were: R. Thomson, 75; Mr. J. Graham and H. Vardon, 76; J. Braid, J. H. Taylor, and T. Vardon, 77; A. Kirkcaldy, 78; G. Coburn and P. J. Gaudin, 79; and Mr. R. Maxwell, B. Sayers, J. White, and H. Cawsey, 80.

There was a large company on the links early on Thursday in anticipation of seeing the leader play his second round. The wind again blew strongly from the north-east, but it was not quite so bad as on the first day, and was much less felt on the greens. Thomson was thrice weak in his driving going out, but he compensated for this by very accurate approaching and deadly putting; in fact, his putting was the great strength of his golf, and at the seventeenth he got down from a distance of 12 yards. Driving to the home green he kept beautifully straight, while with his second shot he actually hit the pin, and rested on the edge of the hole. He was down in 3, and this brought his card to 76, having taken only six for the last two holes. His aggregate for the two rounds of 151 set a very high standard for those competitors who had done moderate first rounds, and had to do 170 to prevent exclusion from the final stage. But the round of the morning was that done by Sherlock. He went out just after nine o'clock, when the weather was at its fairest, and brought in a card of 71. He played beautiful golf from the tee, through the green, and to the hole, but the chief contributory genius to his wonderful round was his approaching. Time after time he lay dead from his pitch, and the manner of his golf is graphically told by his figures. His details were:

Even with this record, however, he was still three strokes more on the aggregate than Thomson. Mr. Travis, whose heart did not seem in the game, put himself right out of it with 88, as against 83 for Mr. Fergusson, who now partnered him. The way Tom Vardon began presaged a fine card, for he did the first three holes in 4 3 3. On the fourth green his putting failed, and he pulled his drive to the fifth, but reached the turn, after all, in 36. Coming home, he kept a beautiful line, and his score was 77. Kirkcaldy came in with a 79, as did Fernie. Save for two bad holes—the second, where he over-ran the green, and the seventh, where he drove into the bunker—Herd played excellently, as his 76 showed. A disappointment in the afternoon was Braid. His driving was as good as ever, and so, too, were his second shots, but his putting was indifferent, and this ran his card to 80. Consistency, for the most part, marked the golf of

J. H. Taylor, but he had three bad holes through getting off the line. However, he was home in 78, and retained his position among the favourites. Perhaps the most remarkable golf of the day was Mr. Graham's. Save for one hole, he was perfect; but this one hole, the ninth, was a very bad one. Playing his third, after being bunkered, he reached the edge of the green, and, after his run up to the hole, he took four more putts to get down. But, for all this, he came back with a wonderful card, for, including the 8, he was out in 35, and in in 41. Jack White's card was 75, but there was a long interval between him and the others in whom the public were interested. A big crowd went with Harry Vardon, and they saw him at his best. From the first tee to the last hole his golf was perfect, but he had no luck with his long approach putts, which continually lipped the hole. However, he did 36 out and 37 home, and took the leading place in the aggregates, beating Thomson's score by two strokes. Willie Park, playing a great short game, did a 72; but Mr. Maxwell, who was last in, about half-past six, did another 80. The leaders at the close of the first stage were: H. Vardon, 149; R. Thomson, 151; Mr. J. Graham, 152; J. Sherlock and T. Vardon, 154; J. H. Taylor and J. White, 155; W. Park, 156; J. Braid and A. Kirkcaldy, 157; and Mr. R. Maxwell, B. Sayers, and A. Herd, 160.

Friday, June 10th, was not a good day for spectators, as a drizzling rain came in from the sea, but it was a capital day for low scoring, although no one was prepared for what was actually accomplished. The draw for the day was as follows:

Fernie, Massy, Harris, and Pulford however, elected not to play, and the field was thereby reduced to 49. Of those still in the running it fell to White to set the pace. He played brilliant golf at every point, and compiled a splendid 72 (34 out and 38 in). Three couples behind him came his great rival, Tom Vardon. He scarcely did so well, but very well all the same, with a 75 unaided by luck in any way. Much was of course expected of Harry Vardon, but, palpably disconcerted on the outgoing by the uncalled-for interference of an all too officious official, he quite failed to do himself justice, and took 41 to reach the turn. He did better coming home, but his round was the high one for him of 79. Braid, on the other hand, excelled himself at every point. Out in 31, he came home in 38, and his phenomenal round of 69 elevated him to first place. Taylor, in a virtue of a capital 74, went up a place, but Mr. Graham and Thomson lost valuable ground by handing in scores of 78 and 80. It was felt that Braid, 226; White, 227; H. Vardon, 228; and Taylor and T. Vardon, 229, had now the issue pretty safely among them. White played a wonderful last round of 69. He got down several long putts going out, and turned in 32. Coming home he reached the rough at the sixteenth and eighteenth holes, but recovering well, got a 4 at each. Harry Vardon had now a 74, but this was no good as matters were shaping. Braid, however, made a gallant bid for victory. Out in 34, he quite rightly gave everything a chance thereafter, but had in the end to admit defeat by one stroke. White's victory was now looked upon as assured, but Taylor came within a little of effecting a great surprise. Turning in 32, he had eleven strokes to tie after holing out at the fifteenth; but he required one more, and so tied with Braid for second and third prizes. His round of 68 established a fresh record for the links, and it spoke volumes for his grit and determination, inasmuch as he knew what was required of him, and only failed to accomplish it by a hairsbreadth. And so White won his first Championship with a record aggregate of 296, and his victory was hailed with acclamation. A meeting that will long be remembered, terminated with the presentation of the Championship Medal and prizes by Mr. S. Mure Fergusson.

JACK WHITE

THE OPEN CHAMPION.

By the REV. J. KERR, M.A., Dirleton.

AWARE, no doubt, of the connection of Jack White with my parish, and of my pride in the success of one in whose career I have taken the greatest interest since his early childhood, my good friend the Editor of *THE GOLFING ANNUAL* asked me to make my customary contribution to that excellent publication something about the Open Champion's career. I wrote Jack to give me some particulars to guide me, and it occurs to me that golfers generally would like to hear Jack's story just as he himself has told it. I therefore present them with it in the original form, and while I say that the writer intended me to revise it and put it into shape, I think the story, as here set down, requires no apology or correction.

I am extremely delighted that Jack, after many promising performances, has at last won the blue ribbon of golf at the early age of 31. I believe and hope it will not be his last victory. It will be remembered that, after his triumph last year, his health gave way and caused some anxiety. It is satisfactory to hear that it is now thoroughly re-established, and that White is "going strong" for this year's competition.

Of a bright and amiable disposition, Jack has always won friends since first I saw him in the Sunday school here, where he was a most intelligent pupil, and his many friends will be only too pleased if he increases his reputation by another victory.

I may add that his excellent helpmeet was for some years a member of my church choir, and on her marriage, December 3, 1897, she received a handsome present from my congregation.

"I was born," says Jack White, "at Pefferside, East Lothian, Aug. 15, 1873. My first attempt at golf was when a boy of ten years of age I went to carry clubs on Saturdays, and the game took my fancy, after seeing such players as W. Campbell,

Sayers, and others play. When I left school I was for a few months in the late Tom Dunn's shop, but when he left North Berwick I acted as caddie to Mr. J. E. Laidlay. During this time I got a good grip of the game, as I carried for Mr. Laidlay when he won his first Championship, and also went to Hoylake and different places with him. By this time I was playing a fairly good game, and Mr. Laidlay would give me a round now and again. When I found I could very nearly hold my own, I thought it was worth my while to stick to golf. But I must confess my parents were quite against my wish, for it was not a very rosy profession at that time. I left North Berwick as a lad of seventeen to take up the position of pro. and green-keeper at York, having just won a tournament at home open to local pro.'s and caddies. I finished an easy first, doing 73 in a gale of wind. My duties at York were to keep a nine-hole course in order with no help; but I managed to satisfy the members, and they were very good to me after serving them for two seasons. My golf was always getting better, and the year Mr. Hilton won at Muirfield I got into the prize list in the Open. The following year I again was in the prize list at Prestwick, tying with Sayers one stroke in front of J. H. Taylor, who started a raging hot favourite, and did 75 in the first round. I then went to the Worlington and Newmarket Club, and played a lot of good matches. I beat the late Hugh Kirkaldy at Chesterford by five and four to play, and lost to D. Rolland. Then my most important match so far came along. W. Park and Hugh Kirkaldy played Rolland and myself for £20, and we had the good fortune to win by seven holes. Rolland at that time was the best golfer I have ever seen play.

"I played Taylor twice, and got beaten both times at the thirty-fifth hole. The same year I lost by one stroke in a competition at Raynes Park—Taylor 77 and 72, self 79, 71, a record, which has never been equalled. I then went to Mitcham for a little over two years, as playing pro. only, and there I improved much, but the work was very hard, playing or teaching all day, so that when I got the offer of Seaford I gladly accepted the place. The first few months I was there I got a lot of splendid practice, and at Dollymount, Dublin, I was left with a 4 to win the Irish Championship, but lost my head and took 6. I had just beaten J. H. Taylor, at Beckenham, previous to

this. Then, in 1899, I got on a little better, in a large field at Richmond. I was second to H. Vardon, but his golf was extraordinary, for he was 11 strokes in front. Then, shortly after, he was in front at Sandwich, in the Championship, when I got second, with a nice 75, in the last round. The following year, after playing very sound golf, I could only get fourth. Taylor, Vardon, and Braid were in front of me the next year at Muirfield. I tied for fifth place, but was driving badly that year. Again, at Hoylake, I was quite off, and felt very disappointed, as I had just been appointed pro. to the Sunningdale Golf Club, but did better at Prestwick, finishing third to the two Vardons. Then came my lucky year. I won't forget 1904 for a long time—everything seemed to come off for me at Sandwich. Amongst the best of my records, I may say that Northwood 70, Byfleet 72, Acton 66, Sunningdale 72, Raynes Park 71, are the best. My 66 at Acton I put down as the very best round I ever played. It was in the qualifying rounds of the *News of the World* Competition, and I had a bad 78 to start, only sixteen places (open), and was away back about thirty-sixth. I was playing with Braid, and had to let fly at everything, and only finished 4 strokes behind the winner. I went home a happy man that night. I may say that I am very happy here at Sunningdale. The Committee gave me a rise in my pay and a cottage free, also a present of £75 for winning the Championship—all in one year. I like the place, and my members treat me as well as I can possibly wish, and we are all looking forward hopefully to St. Andrews in June."

To this may be added that the Champion's height is 5ft. 8in., his weight 11st. 10lb., and that his favourite course is Prestwick, which he calls "the best test of golf" that he knows.

THE PROFESSIONAL INTERNATIONAL MATCH.

ENGLAND v. SCOTLAND.

THE second Professional International Contest, decided at Sandwich on Saturday, June 4th, ended in a tie, Scotland's majority of two points in the singles being balanced by England in the foursomes, wherein, with questionable wisdom, the pairing was not made on orthodox lines, players at the tail-end of the list in the singles being coupled with the cracks. Thus nearly all the interest, unlike at Prestwick in the inaugural contest, centred in the individual tussles. The match between Harry Vardon and Braid furnished a rare treat for the lion's share of the spectators. Both played superbly at every point, Vardon showing no traces of his serious illness. Each made two slips going out, Vardon's costing him the third and fourth holes, and Braid's the seventh and ninth. Out in 35, they turned all square. Vardon then won the tenth hole, only to see Braid draw level at eleventh, and the remaining holes were halved. Each went round in 72, a magnificent performance, inasmuch as a strong north-east wind had to be reckoned with. Taylor seemed to have Herd beaten when he stood "dormy two," but Herd won the last two holes in fine style, and saved the game. Taylor went out in 38, and came home in 41, as against Herd's 39 and 40. Park looked like making short work of Tom Vardon for a time, standing as he did four up at the fifth hole. Vardon, however, was only a hole to the bad at the eleventh; but Park drew away again, and won on the seventeenth green. The other matches resulted pretty much according to anticipation, save that Pulford was not expected to defeat the once-dreaded Archie Simpson so soundly as he did. His victory, however, was well earned at every point. Details:—

THE IRISH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1904.

THE twelfth annual Irish Native Championship was decided at Portmarnock on Wednesday, May 18th, and the three succeeding days. The holder (Mr. H. E. Reade) was challenged by a field of sixty-three, prominent among whom were four ex-Champions in Messrs. W. H. Webb, R. G. N. Henry, W. H. Boyd, and F. B. Newett. Of these, Mr. Henry scratched in the first round, while Mr. Newett fell most unexpectedly before Mr. J. C. Parke, a young Dublin University player. The weather, which had been very stormy on the opening day, left nothing to be desired on Thursday. There were no surprises in the second round, the feature of which was a determined tussle between the Hon. E. Gibson and Mr. H. A. Boyd. The former turned one up, but his opponent drew level at the eleventh hole, and, forging ahead, stood two up at the fifteenth. But Mr. Gibson was not yet done with, and it was all to play for two holes later. Mr. Boyd, however, won the home hole, and therewith the stiffest of matches. In the afternoon the holder and Messrs. W. H. Boyd and W. H. Webb all received their *coucé*, to the general amazement. The weather continued favourable on Friday, and the favourites won in almost every instance. As a result of the day's play, Messrs. H. A. Boyd and J. P. Todd were left to fight out the issue on Saturday, when a few showers fell, but the conditions otherwise were not out of the way. Mr. Todd's opening drive was trapped in a rabbit scrape, and Mr. Boyd straightaway secured the lead, which he held throughout. He finished the first round with two holes in hand, and ultimately won by four up and two to play. He was outdriven off nearly every tee, but his approaching and putting deservedly won him his first Championship. Details:—

The Championship is open to members of all recognised Irish Golf Clubs who shall have been born in Ireland, and are at the time of the competition permanently resident in Ireland; also to members of recognised Irish Golf Clubs, who, although not Irish-born, shall have been resident in Ireland, and a member of such Golf Club for two years immediately preceding the competition; and also to Irish-born golfers who, although non-resident, have been *bona fide* full members of a recognised Irish Golf Club for five consecutive years prior to a Close Championship. "Irish-born" shall mean born of Irish parents.

IRISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1904.

THIS event grows yearly in popularity, and for the thirteenth annual meeting, held at Newcastle, Co. Down, on Tuesday, August 30th, and the four succeeding days, there was an entry of 102, including the holder (Mr. G. Wilkie), the cream of Ireland's golfers, several of the best players in the South of England, and quite a host of young Scotch exponents, one or two of whom are up to International standard. The first round occupied Tuesday afternoon, and saw the defeat of the holder by Mr. E. A. Apthorp, of Bedford, an ex-Captain of Cambridge University. They were all square at the eighth hole, but Mr. Wilkie threw away the ninth and tenth by weak putting. Mr. Apthorp went further ahead at the thirteenth. Mr. Wilkie then had an innings, and drew level at the sixteenth amidst growing excitement. A particularly good tee shot won Mr. Apthorp the seventeenth in 3, and he also secured the home hole which was indifferently played by both. Much was expected from Mr. D. Forster, in view of his fine play in the competitions which, as usual, preceded the big event, but, excelling himself at every point, Mr. G. D. Macniven compelled him to play three extra holes, before he was able to breathe freely. Another Watsonian in Mr. W. G. Ritchie sprung a surprise at the expense of Mr. H. A. Boyd, the Irish Native Champion, whom he beat three holes from home. The only other tie, however, which calls for comment, was that between Mr. Worthington and Mr. Colville, of Machrihanish renown. It was a ding-dong game all the way, and only ended in the Englishman's favour by a hole.

Overnight rain had given place to bright sunshine on Wednesday, and Newcastle was seen at its best. A stiff north-west wind had, however, to be reckoned with, and frequently upset calculations. The two most interesting ties in the second round were those between Mr. J. F. Mitchell, one of Scotland's hopes, and Mr. C. H. Potter, and Mr. E.

A. Lassen, the Yorkshire crack, and Mr. J. L. Lawson, another young Scot of renown. Mr. Potter looked to have Mr. Mitchell beat, but he managed to square the match and win at the twentieth hole. Mr. Lawson, however, after turning two up, began to socket his approaches, and Mr. Lassen, taking full advantage, had him beat at the seventeenth hole. Mr. H. G. Stewart avenged Mr. Lawson's defeat in the third round after a fine match, and in virtue thereof shared favouritism with Mr. Forster, who, for the second time during the week, trounced Mr. Angus Macdonald most unmercifully. Mr. Worthington showed fine form against Mr. D. G. Maekenzie, and Mr. Palmer characteristic grit in winning against Mr. Matheson after being two to the bad at the thirteenth.

Thursday was another fine day, and was thoroughly enjoyed alike by players and spectators. The two Scotch representatives, Mr. J. F. Mitchell and Mr. H. G. Stewart, earned golden opinions by their play against such formidable opponents as Mr. Apthorp and Mr. H. M. Cairnes, whom they respectively beat with something in hand. Mr. Forster also kept on his way rejoicing at the expense of Mr. A. Robertson, a player of undoubted parts. Mr. Worthington and Mr. Palmer also qualified for the fifth essay; but Mr. Reade, whom many expected would at length win an "Irish Open," was beaten cleverly by Dr. O'Brien, who was seen at the top of his game. In the afternoon Mr. Mitchell won his match against Mr. R. H. Dun quite comfortably, but Mr. Worthington and Mr. Palmer (the latter, after another uphill fight) had little to spare from Dr. O'Brien and Mr. R. Andrew. Most interest, however, centred in the tie between Mr. Forster and Mr. H. G. Stewart. Both played grand golf to the turn, at which point Mr. Forster led by a hole. Continuing his fine play, he won the tenth in 2, the eleventh in 4, and the thirteenth in 3. This was hot work truly, but Mr. Stewart, nothing daunted, won the fourteenth. He also looked like getting the fifteenth, when Mr. Forster holed a run up of over 30 yards. The next hole was halved, and so Mr. Forster qualified for the "semi-final."

Play on Friday forenoon proceeded in a rain-storm, Mr. Forster and Mr. Mitchell leading off. The former was not unnaturally favourite, but triumphing over the elements by the sweetest of driving. Mr. Mitchell stood "in clover," five up at

the turn. Mr. Forster improved coming home, but Mr. Mitchell was hailed winner with a hole to go. Mr. Worthington turned four up against Mr. Palmer, who seemed to be feeling the effects of his two hard games on the previous day, and the match finished in the former's favour at the fourteenth hole. It was intended to overtake the first moiety of the final 36 holes in the afternoon, but the weather broke down so completely that a cessation was called at the turn, with the Scotchman leading by a hole, leaving the remaining 27 holes to be played on the Saturday.

When play was resumed Mr. Mitchell, pressing his advantage, led by three at the end of the first round. The first hole of the second round was halved, but from this point Mr. Worthington played irresistibly. He had the match square at the fifth hole, turned two up, pocketed the next three holes in great style, and won his first Championship two holes later. His final round has never been excelled over Newcastle links, and his victory was richly deserved. The runner-up was powerless against the Mid-Surrey man's phenomenal display during the closing holes. Details:—

MR. J. S. WORTHINGTON.

IRISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPION, 1904.

PLUCK, perseverance, and pertinacity have been the golfing characteristics of Mr. Worthington. Starting the game about eleven years ago on the Mid-Surrey course at Richmond, he, from a handicap of 27, gradually worked his way up the golfing ladder, and his Club allotment is now plus 4. He has invariably acquitted himself creditably in the Championship events. In the Amateur Championship, at Muirfield in 1903, he fell before Mr. Edward Blackwell in the second round, after an interesting tussle. A year ago, at Sandwich, he was ousted by Mr. Hilton in the first round of the Amateur event, but placed on record a fine performance in the Open Championship. Only in his first round did he fail to get under 80, and his aggregate of 320 landed him in the twenty-second place, Messrs. R. Maxwell and J. Ball alone of the Amateur competitors finishing in front of him. And since then, as set forth in the immediately preceding pages, he has won the Irish Open Amateur Championship.

Standing as he does 6ft., and weighing somewhere about 13st. in golfing costume, it is not matter for wonderment that Mr. Worthington drives a long ball, but he is equally proficient in other departments of the game, and an International cap should be his in the near future. HINTS TO YOUNG GOLFERS.

By DR. J. G. MCPHERSON.

THE boom of golf is on so swimmingly that no town, seaside or inland, can compete with others for Summer visitors without having a golf course to attract them. Then it is the duty of all shopkeepers, hotel keepers, house factors, &c., to push most strenuously to get a small, conveniently reached course laid out as nicely as possible. As time moves on, and prosperity comes to the place, the number of holes can be extended. Meanwhile, aim at a nice, attractive, short course.

Having satisfied themselves that there must be a golf course, the well-balanced enthusiasts should call in the services of an expert near, to settle upon the course. If possible, select ground with undulations; for a flat course becomes monotonous. There is a grand elastic spring in walking up a "brae."

The positions of the putting greens should be next considered; and, for any sake, avoid "blind" holes. There is nothing more irritating to a good golfer than to play a long approach to a hole, when the flag is invisible. Vagueness puzzles him even more than a haphazard player.

I am Captain of a small inland course which was laid out before I saw it; half of the holes are "blind." Every time I go round I feel the irritation of playing my approaches to these holes. Besides inaccuracy in calculation of distance, you are sure to run the risk of losing your ball in the long grass or broom beyond the hole (when you have a following wind).

Avoid "blind" holes, then; make the distances between the holes varied; and, if possible, have one in six short and one in six pretty long. In that way the method of play is charmingly different.

Having fixed these holes, lay out the putting greens—about seventeen yards square. This is done in different ways. At first, you may require to be satisfied with cropping low and mowing and rolling; but, where the turf is spongy, you will

require to put a green at a time in thorough order, either by removing the turf, sprinkling over new earth, sowing out lawn grass, spreading over fine sand, and rolling; or by transplanting firm close turf in squares from some other place. I have seen seaside turf transferred with advantage to an inland course. Of course, until it is quite in order, the green must be enclosed with netting, and no one must be allowed to play his ball when it happens to stray on it.

When this is begun, set about clearing the course. Have a fair width for a windy day—say 100 yards—for there is no greater nuisance than looking for a lost ball after a slice or a draw. Keep the horse mower at work, hole after hole.

Then build teeing grounds—for one can never drive steadily from a soft, fozy tee; and much sand for tees ought to be discouraged. But an expert will tell you more in an hour than would a whole volume on the subject. However, good teeing grounds are made—12ft. by 6ft.—by transplanting firm turf from a beaten foot-road over the moor. After a time, make duplicates to be alternately used. Never mind bunkers for a year or more. There are sufficient difficulties for beginners for a time.

Young golfers, now thoroughly installed with a short, fairly well laid out course, should then pay particular attention to the style of golf that will be most successful. The first thing is not to aim at swiping, but straightness. Of course, all like to see a grand drive; but that is really not the most important part of the game. Caution beats long and erratic driving in the end. Little is really gained by twenty yards on a drive, if some risk (especially during wind) is run: for a good second shot would easily make up for a shorter first: and the *second* shot is the most important shot in the hole.

The next thing to aim at, as a paramount rule, is to make sure of holing in three shots, when within the approach of the cleeck. Cautious driving on the straight, with sound obedience to this, would secure a first-class place for the golfer. This is the ideal; it is very long before it can be attained. Long driving is for the "gallery"; but it won't do on a new course, when unplayable broom is on both sides of the narrow course. If one can study this plan, and play for weeks without losing a ball, he will be on the fair road for success on any classic links.

Ladies are indispensable in a young Club; so much is expected from them in the securing of the necessary element—money.

The ladies improve by leaps and bounds. Then, on the principal meeting-day of the week, afternoon tea should be arranged in the Club-house (however primitive) by the ladies' Committee, to be conducted by the several members of the Committee in turn. A small amount should be charged for tea from the participants, the surplus, after paying the necessary expenses, should be given to cleaning of the Club-house and the general funds of the Club.

Of course, if the first subscription efforts have not been able to secure a humble Club-house, as well as pay for the green-keeper's wages, a bazaar must be got up by the ladies for providing one and bettering the course. There is a good deal of unrecognised expense to begin with, if rent and labour are considered.

If the ladies work well—and won't they?—the more skilled gentlemen golfers should play mixed foursomes with them. You have no idea how much the ladies improve in their game in this way. And they soon enjoy it when they can see the ball rise, after weeks of topping, and can hole out decently on the putting green.

But the ladies should not get disheartened at their own play when they see the Lady Champions at work. I have seen Miss Rhona Adair play. She is *facile princeps* as a lady golfer. When Lady Champion of this country, she went over to America and beat three of the best lady golfers there. I saw her golfing at Muirfield two years ago. Mr. Robert Maxwell and I followed her for several holes. He had just secured the Amateur Championship against the veteran Mr. Horace Hutchinson; yet he was anxious to see her play. Of most pleasant manners and bright complexion, she showed great skill in all parts of the game. Barring the drive, and the forcing of a bad-lying ball, she could bother Mr. Maxwell at any other part of the game. Let the ladies watch good players, and imitate them; but do not let them despair at their own deficiency, for it requires years of close attention to all the details of the game to be proficient. Rome was not built in a day.

And, for any sake, do not use many clubs. It fairly disgusts one to see ladies or gentlemen with a great number of weapons. It is not a bad thing for an expert to study the build of the player of either sex, and write to a club maker for suitable weapons for each. He should fit them with clubs as a tailor makes for each a suit of clothes.

Secure a suitable driver, brassie, cleek, iron, and wooden (or

aluminium) putter, and go to work. It is better to begin with gutta balls; scalping them is not so expensive as rubber-cored balls. In windy weather they are steadier, and you can learn pitching and putting much more easily. If short holes have been made near the Club-house, practise putting there. The expert will show you how to hold the club, and how to swing. But never risk over-balancing yourself by hitting too hard. Pressing is the curse of the young player. It is wonderful how far a ball goes when hit easily and fair.

Remember to keep the irons and balls quite clean; "taste" goes a long way with golfers. If you begin to *like* your clubs, you are on the high road to success as a player. "Ideas is everything," an old caddie once remarked to me. By this he meant that if you fairly take it into your head that you will succeed in pitching well and holing out truly, you will often do it. "Jist putt as if ye cushed (cushioned) for the 'nine' at bagatelle, an' ye'll hole 'er," said that same sage. It is wonderful how such an idea possesses one, especially the beginner. Better that, at any rate, than to be always foreboding a bad stroke. And how a few successful strokes in a round will remain in the memory! Let these always banish the bad ones.

Play for the game *itself*; foursomes, if possible. Avoid counting scores too slavishly. One or two badly played holes vitiate the score. You might have been playing seven holes better than your average, when two very bad ones will make the total worse.

I am reluctant about having Club competitions for some months. Jealousy soon springs up in the breasts of young aspirants; then all is up with harmony in the Club. A "scratch" cup would not excite the same amount of envious passion; but a "handicap" medal competition bristles with trouble. Who is to fix the handicap, and what are the data for the arbiter? Wait for some time, and the play of each can be more fairly judged. It is the glory of golf that most players are optimistic as to their play. Most would be insulted with too high a handicap. Even duffers do not like to be knocked down. One asked his caddie how Colonel B., his coming opponent, played, and if he could allow him odds. "I'm o' opeenion," answered the wily critic, "that he's jist aboot like yersel'; he canna play a d—n."

In terms of the conditions, Major Burn, whose card was better against Bogey than that of G. W. Walker and B. Only members of Clubs belonging to the Association can compete for the Amateur Championship, and competitors must enter for the competition through the Secretaries of their respective Clubs, who, in sending in the names, shall be held to certify that the players are *bonâ fide* amateur golfers in terms of the Association's definition.

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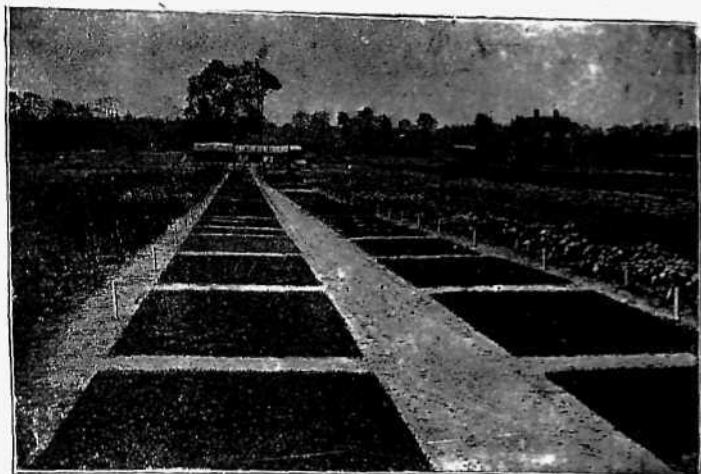
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
