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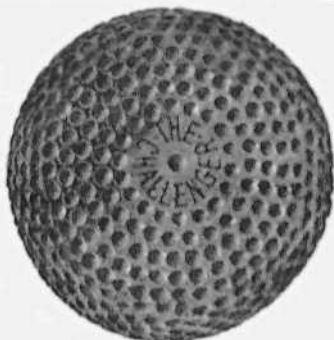
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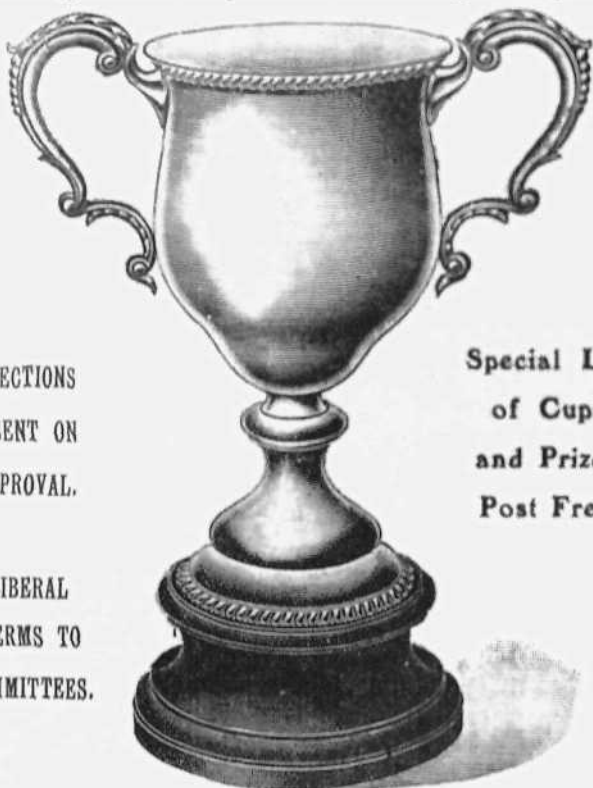
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THE
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RECENT DECISIONS OF THE RULES OF GOLF
COMMITTEE.

THE following are the decisions of the Rules of Golf Committee upon points submitted to them since January, 1908 :—

BUXTON AND HIGH PEAK GOLF CLUB.—A player gives up a hole, and thereafter his opponent's ball cannot be found. Does the player still lose the hole, or is it halved? Reading Rule 30, justice seems to demand that it should be halved.

Answer.—If a player decides to give up a hole, he must abide by his decision.

CITY OF NEWCASTLE GOLF CLUB, LIMITED.—A player had occasion to pick up and drop his ball. He placed his hand on his shoulder next to the neck, and dropped it. Another competitor charged him with breaking Rule 15. Does this rule mean that the player's hand must be on the top of his head, or is the rule kept if the player touches some part of his head with his hand?

Answer.—The rule does not particularise any special part of the head. Provided the rest of the rule was complied with, the action of the player was in order.

CONGLETON GOLF CLUB.—A mixed foursome competition was begun in the Autumn of 1907, and the final round was fixed to be played off by January 10th, 1908. The rules of the Club provide that no member shall be allowed to play in any competition whose subscription is unpaid, and that all

subscriptions shall be due and payable on January 1st. The final was played on January 7th. Should any player be disqualified who had not paid his subscription?

Answer.—By the rules of the Club players are not allowed to compete if their subscriptions are unpaid. The Rules of Golf Committee is of opinion that the players should have had their notice drawn to the fact that their subscriptions were unpaid, and had they not then paid them, they should not have been allowed to compete. As they were allowed to compete, notwithstanding the rule to the contrary, they should not be disqualified.

HYERES GOLF CLUB.—In a Medal competition a competitor played a ball out of bounds from a teeing ground. He returned to the teeing ground, teed a ball, and played a stroke which he counted as his fourth. Is he justified in doing this, or is he disqualified? The local rule for "out of bounds" is a copy of the St. Andrews Rule No. 32.

Answer.—The Rules of Golf provide only one method for treating a ball played out of bounds (see Rule 32), with which the competitor did not conform. A special rule, such as Rule 32, overrides a general rule, such as No. 10, for stroke competitions.

GREYSTONES GOLF CLUB.—Is A. disqualified if, after playing with B. in a stroke competition, he hands in a card recording his (A.'s) score, the actual figures of which have been marked by A., and not by B., although A. and B. have compared both cards, and have both signed the card handed in, and are satisfied that the scores returned are correct. The cards issued are double cards. The competitor's score should be kept on the left, and the marker should keep his own score on the right-hand side as a check. It is the custom of some members to hand in one card recording the scores made by both competitors, but which has been marked by one competitor only.

Answer.—Rule 4 (Special Rules for Stroke Competitions) states clearly that the scores shall be kept by a special marker, or by the competitors noting each other's scores. A. is disqualified. The Rules of Golf Committee is of opinion that the double card submitted is probably the cause of the

difficulty. There is no necessity for a double card or for the competitor's signature.

CHICAGO GOLF CLUB.—This Club desires to know how its members should compete in a stroke competition, and asked in 1905 whether under Rule 1 (a) a four-ball match might compete. The answer given was "No." Since then the Rules Committee refused to disqualify three players who went round together. See question No. 201.

Answer.—1. Rule 1 def. (a) makes no mention of four-ball matches, and has no bearing on the question. 2. By the question submitted, the Committee were led to believe that information was desired, and not that any four-ball match had actually competed. 3. By the custom of the game competitors always play in couples in Medal competitions. 4. Four-ball matches would entail a delay which would be unfair to couples playing behind, and nothing is gained. Four players can make two couples of competitors, and no excuse exists for attempting to depart from a recognised custom. 5. In the case of the three-ball match referred to (question No. 201) one player had nobody with whom to compete, and the Club had made no provision for his or similar cases. Therefore there was some excuse for the player. 6. The proper form of play is in couples, and, if there is an odd competitor, the Chicago Golf Club should either find a player of satisfactory standing to play round with him and mark his score, or provide him with a marker and allow him to compete alone.

INSURANCE AND BANKING CLUB.—This Club desires to know the difference between questions 261 and 19, as regards the time at which a hole may be claimed.

Answer.—In the case of question No. 261, Insurance and Banking Golf Club, A.'s ball strikes Z. The fact is known to all four players. Z. asks A., "Do you claim the hole?" and A. replies, "No, I do not claim the hole." By the established custom of the game the matter is at an end. In the case of question No. 19—Scottish Accident Golf Club—the ball slightly nearer to the hole was played first on a putting green. C. and his partner were about to play four more, and had practically lost the hole, when the incident

occurred. All four players were in ignorance of the rule applicable, but C. stated that he knew the rule entailed the loss of the hole, and in this manner took possession of it. The Rules of Golf Committee decided that C. and D. lost the hole. It is a custom of the game that any claim must be made before striking off from the next teeing ground, but this custom presupposes that a side has not been induced to give up its claim through wrong information given by an opponent as to the facts of the case or the rules of the game.

BOURNEMOUTH GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. meet for the first time in the final of a match play tournament. B. is in receipt of five strokes from A. B. proposes to toss for the honour at the first tee, basing his claim on Rule 2: "The option . . . if necessary." A. considers he is entitled to the honour by universal custom, and that the words "if necessary" should be taken to mean "if there are no other recognised means of deciding." B., on the other hand, contends that the words "if necessary" mean "in the absence of agreement between the players." What are the strict legal rights of the case?

Answer.—The words "if necessary" mean "if there are no other recognised means of deciding." It is the custom in match competitions for players to strike off in the order in which their names appear in the draw. The so-called "universal custom" to which A. refers is merely a matter of etiquette which is frequently observed in private matches.

BURNTISLAND GOLF CLUB.—On the day of a stroke competition the ground was covered with snow to a depth of two or three inches. Some of the competitors had scraped away the snow from behind their balls while playing through the green. As there is no rule in connection with the above incident, did the players do right?

Answer.—As the game cannot properly be played under the conditions described, there is no rule on the subject. Special rules should have been made for such a competition.

LITTLEHAMPTON GOLF CLUB.—If a ball lies within the banks of a burn, but not in the water, can it be lifted as if it was in the water?

Answer.—In the absence of a local rule, the ball cannot

be lifted. This burn should be the subject of a local rule. The local rule for the burn at St. Andrews is as follows:—
“If a ball be played into the Swilcan burn, whether in water or not, the player may drop a ball within two club lengths of the hazard, but not nearer the hole on the side of it other than that upon which the hole is placed, under penalty of one stroke.”

CARLOW GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition a quantity of straw had been blown by the wind along a bank on the course. A competitor's ball lay on the straw. Should the ball have been lifted and dropped without penalty, or played as it lay? Does decision No. 61 govern the case?

Answer.—Decision No. 61 does not apply. The ball was lying on a loose impediment, and could not be lifted and dropped (see Rule 9).

WILLIAMWOOD GOLF CLUB.—On August 29th last the Committee intimated that a competition, taking the form of a hole tournament, should be played for prizes offered by the Honorary Vice-President, and competitors were balloted, and the ballot-card exhibited in the Club-house. Dates were fixed for playing the first, second, third, fourth, and fifth rounds, but no date was fixed by the Committee for playing off the sixth and final round. The semi-final was completed by November 30th last, and it was left to the finalists to play off within a month from that date. It came to the knowledge of the Committee that the tie had not been played by January 13th, 1908, and the two finalists were communicated with and asked to play it forthwith. No reply was received to this communication, and the Committee, on February 21st last, again communicated with the finalists requiring them to play the final tie on or before Saturday, February 29th, failing which the competition would be considered null and void. On February 29th the Secretary received a letter from one of the finalists asking that the matter be left in abeyance, as his opponent had been from home for some time. The Committee would like to be advised on the following points, viz.:—(1) On the assumption that one of the finalists was willing all along to play the tie, but was unable to get his opponent to fix a meeting,

should the prize be awarded to him? Or (2) Should the hole tournament be considered null and void by the refusal and delay of the two finalists to play off the tie within a reasonable time, if they were requested to do so by the Committee? Or (3) Should the other two competitors in the semi-final be permitted to play for the prizes? (4) What steps should the Committee take in the circumstances?

Answer.—(1) Yes, and the other finalist receives the second prize. (2), (3), and (4) The two prizes belong to the two finalists, and it only remains for the Committee to decide which of them is to receive the first prize. There is no reason for declaring the competition null and void.

SOUTHPORT AND AINSDALE GOLF CLUB.—On Friday, March 27th, a stroke competition was played for the Ladies' Captain's Prize, open to all lady members. Mrs. A. returned the best net score, but before her card was put in an objection was lodged by two competitors playing immediately behind, on the ground that Mrs. A. and her partner having played into a sand bunker on the thirteenth hole, picked up their balls and threw them towards the green. Mrs. A. and her partner both deny that they were ever in the said bunker, and the objecting ladies are equally positive that what they say is correct. Under these circumstances how is the Ladies' Committee to act? Are they to disqualify Mrs. A., or award her the prize?

Answer.—As there seems to be some doubt as to the facts of the case, the Rules of Golf Committee cannot adjudicate till these are definitely ascertained.

NORTHWOOD GOLF CLUB.—Does Rule 7 or 8 for three-ball matches apply in four-ball matches where the best ball of A. and B. plays the best ball of C. and D?

Answer.—Rule 8 applies to four-ball matches, and other "best ball" rules apply to four-ball matches.

BURSLEM GOLF CLUB.—When a rule is made that mixed foursomes shall be played, could this be construed to mean three gentlemen and one lady, or three ladies and one gentleman? Can two players pass a foursome when the foursome is only playing two balls?

Answer.—The accepted interpretation of a mixed foursome is that each side consists of a lady and gentleman. A single cannot pass a foursome. There are only two balls in play in a foursome.

FULNECK GOLF CLUB.—A ball was lying on a path which is regarded as a bunker. The club was not grounded, but in the upward swing the top of a cinder on the path about two feet from the ball was touched. Does the penalty in Rule 12 apply?

Answer.—Yes.

MIDDLETON GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. played together in very heavy rain during a stroke competition. On the completion of the round A. said that B.'s card was so wet as to be illegible, but B., who had an umbrella, had kept A.'s card dry, and noted his own score on A.'s card, which A. copied on a new card and certified it as correct. Is B. disqualified?

Answer.—Yes. A player's score which has been marked by himself cannot be accepted.

BELLSHILL GOLF CLUB.—The cards used are double cards, a competitor marking his own score in the first column, and that of the competitor with whom he plays in the second column. Copies of these cards are submitted. Referring to Rule 4 for Stroke Competitions, if competitors hand in cards whose totals agree, but several of the scores for the holes differ, must both players be disqualified?

Answer.—The Rules of Golf Committee cannot on the evidence submitted decide whether either or both cards are incorrectly marked. The practice of using double cards leads to confusion, and should be discouraged.

VALE OF LEVEN GOLF CLUB.—The Monthly Medal has been competed for throughout the year on Wednesdays and Saturdays. For the final ties the holes were altered and played over by the Saturday men. The holes were again shifted previous to the Wednesday men playing, but the first couple of these objected to the position of the hole on second green. They protested and refused to go further. (1) Supposing the holes were more difficult on Wednesday than Saturday, is this sufficient ground for protest? (2) The

protesters not having finished the tie, is their protest in order? (3) Should the protest be lodged by each player individually, or by the Referee? (4) If a Referee fails to appear for the final of a stroke competition, should the match be postponed, or should players play on and keep each other's score?

Answer.—(1) The point at issue is the custom of the Club. If the custom is that each stage of the competition has been played over the same course, the Wednesday men have a good reason for protesting. (2) Yes. (3) The player or players should lodge the protest with the Committee in charge of the competition, or their deputy. (4) The players would certainly be justified in playing on, if both agreed to do so, and there is no clause to the contrary in the conditions of the competition.

Huddersfield Golf Club.—A. and B. were playing off a tie in a stroke competition. At the last hole A. took the honour when it should have been B.'s. B. recalled the stroke, which was a good one. A. did not make a good stroke at the next venture from the tee. The match was halved. The players decided to replay, but in view of criticism in the press B. scratched, and allowed A. to hold the medal. Does Rule 2 (para. 4) apply to stroke as well as match play? If so, is recalling the ball optional or obligatory? If obligatory, what penalty is incurred, and by whom?

Answer.—Rule 2 (para. 4) does not refer to stroke competitions. In a stroke competition there is no hole played for, and therefore there is no honour. B. had no right to recall the stroke. The order of starting from the tee may be a matter of arrangement, but the general custom is for the player who has holed out in the fewer strokes to strike first. The case is not technically covered by a rule, but the above is the universal custom.

Royal St. George's Golf Club.—A competitor handed in a card with the score for the eighteenth hole omitted altogether, but the total for the nine holes is correctly stated at 41. The score for the eight holes is 37, and a certificate from the marker is appended stating

that the blank hole was holed in four strokes, and that he would have amended the clerical error had the Committee afforded him the opportunity. The following questions are submitted:—(1) Were the Committee of the above Club, having satisfied themselves beyond all doubt that the eighteenth hole had been holed in four strokes, and that the omission was an obvious clerical error, *bound* to disqualify the card under Rule 4? Or (2) Were they entitled, if they so elected, to complete the card, or allow it to be completed, after calling on the marker for evidence of the facts, the totals of both outgoing and incoming halves having been already filled in and the card duly signed by the marker? (3) If (1) be answered in the affirmative, would disqualification ensue in respect of the card (similarly incomplete) returned by the marker of the competitor who actually holed the four rounds of the Open Championship in the fewest strokes? (4) If not, why not?

Answer.—(1) Yes. The Committee of the Royal St. George's Golf Club acted in accordance with Rule 4 (Special Rules for Stroke Competitions). (2) No. The rule provides that "Competitors must satisfy themselves before the cards are handed in that their scores for each hole are correctly marked, as no alteration can be made on any card after it has been returned." (3) and (4) The answer to (3) and (4) is covered by the answers to (1) and (2).

ABERFELDY GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. meet to play off a tie, and A. insists on being accompanied by his dog. B. refuses to play, as A.'s dog had on a former occasion interrupted the play. A. claims the match because B. refuses to play. There is no local bye-law prohibiting dogs on the course. A ruling with regard to the rights of both parties is requested.

Answer.—The Rules of Golf Committee is of opinion that B. was right in refusing to play with A. under the circumstances.

ROYAL MELBOURNE GOLF CLUB.—A.—X. was playing in a stroke competition. On this course it has been the custom for several years to have the tee box (about 3ft. high and painted white) on the left, and a peg on the right, to indicate the teeing ground. On the first day of meeting

(just held), and three days before the competition in question, two small discs (painted black) were used to mark the teeing ground; one of them *a* was placed close to the tee box, and the other *b* at the usual distance, or where the peg was formerly placed, but no notice was posted as to the change in custom of marking the tee. On Thursday the tee was marked in this position. On Friday, the second day of the same competition, new tees were set out, but at the twelfth hole this was done by moving disc *a* to *c*, leaving disc *b* in its old position, and now meant as the inner disc. The tee box, in accordance with instructions, should have been moved up close to *b*. This, however, the greenkeeper omitted to do, and the space between *b* and the tee box looked just like the proper teeing ground. Disc *c* was placed on a slight slope at edge of bank, and was not readily observable. X. stated in his evidence that, thinking the space between *b* and the tee box was still the teeing ground in the third round, he drove off from the position indicated. The report soon got around the course that X. had driven from a wrong position at the twelfth tee, thereby warning succeeding players. The Committee took a great quantity of evidence both from amateurs and professionals, and the Committee were satisfied that others had driven off between the same marks as X. The Committee, after taking evidence, found the following facts:—(1) That the tee box at the twelfth tee had been moved up to its proper position close to *b* during the third round of the competition by some unknown and unauthorised person, and so prevented others from making the mistake, thus all players were not under the same conditions. (2) That the tee box throughout the competition was placed close up to the disc at all tees, except those at the fourth hole in the first round, and the twelfth hole for part of the third round in the competition. (3) That many players, none of whom were reported, drove off between the tee box and the near disc at the fourth tee in the first round of the competition. (4) That three players were reported for having driven off between the tee box and the near disc at the twelfth hole in the third round of the competition, and several others not reported also drove from the same place. (5) That the constant position of a large, white, conspicuous

tee box close to the disc was familiar marking of one end of the teeing ground. (6) That the ground between the tee box and disc *b* looked like a fully "indicated" tee. (7) That all players were not under the same conditions. The Committee therefore came to the conclusion: That a teeing ground at the twelfth hole in part of the third round of the competition appeared to be indicated within the meaning of the definition of a teeing ground, between the tee box and disc *b*. That the greenkeeper had, by failing to move the tee box close up to the disc *b*, misled players, including X., and induced them to believe that a tee was indicated between the tee box and disc *b*, and that they had reasonable grounds for such belief. That under the circumstances players driving off between the tee box and disc *b* at the twelfth hole had been misled, and could not therefore be disqualified. *B.—A.* and *B.* are playing in a stroke competition. *A.* is going to play an approach shot. He takes a practice swing close to his ball, less than a club length from it, probably six inches from it. In doing so he chips out a bit of turf with grass growing on it. In doing so is he not committing a breach of Rule 11, Rules of Golf, by moving something growing near the ball? If he has broken that rule, is not the penalty for such breach loss of the hole in match play, two strokes in stroke play, and disqualification in stroke play for not adding said two strokes to his card, so returning a card showing a score below that actually played?

Answer.—A. The Rules of Golf Committee regret that they cannot come to the same conclusion as the Committee of the Royal Melbourne Golf Club. They can see no reason why X. should not be disqualified for playing his tee shot from outside the limits of the teeing ground. There seems no reason to suppose that X. was ignorant of the fact that the teeing grounds were marked by discs, as he had played up to the twelfth hole on the second day of the competition and found the teeing grounds indicated by these marks. Where discs are used, a teeing box, which is at all times removable (see Rule 10) cannot be considered in any way to indicate the exact position of a teeing ground. *B.* On the assumption that *A.* has not removed an irregularity of surface (Rule 13), and so gained an advantage, no penalty has been incurred.

AUSTRALIAN GOLF CLUB.—X. was playing in an Open Championship Stroke Competition on a course where it had been the custom for several years to have the tee box (above 3ft. high and painted white) on the left and a peg on the right to indicate the teeing ground. On the first day of the meeting, which extended over a week, and three days before the commencement of the competition in question, two small discs (painted black) were used to mark the teeing grounds. One of them (*a*) was placed close to the teeing box, and the other (*b*) at the usual distance, or where the peg was formerly placed, but no notice was posted as to the change in custom of marking the tee. On Thursday, the fourth day of the meeting, and the first day of the competition in question, the tee was marked in this position at the twelfth hole. On Friday, the second day of this competition, new tees were set out, but at the twelfth this was done by removing disc *a* to *c*, leaving *b* in its old position, and now meant as the inner disc. The tee box, however, was not moved up close to *b*, but was left where it was on the preceding day. Disc *c* was placed at the edge of the tee, and, as some say, on a slight slope, but it was plainly visible to any player who took the trouble to look for same. On Friday morning X., at the twelfth tee, drove off from the position marked. His partner immediately drew his attention to the fact that he had driven off from outside the discs. X. thereupon teed another ball between the discs, and drove same, but subsequently picked up the second ball and continued his round with the first ball. The Committee, becoming aware of the fact at the end of the third round, allowed X. to continue his fourth round, and at the close of the competition they took certain evidence from various players (including X., who admitted that the discs were properly placed on the twelfth tee, and that he drove from outside the limits thereof, but he stated that he did so thinking that the space between *b* and the tee box was the teeing ground). The Committee eventually decided that X. could not be disqualified, as they were of opinion that the greenkeeper had, by failing to move the tee box close up to disc *b*, misled players, including X., and induced them to believe that a tee was indicated between the tee box and

disc *b*. R., another competitor, not being satisfied with the decision of the Committee, lodged a protest in writing with the Secretary at the Club-house before 7 p.m. on the day on which the disputed matter arose. The Committee, however, took no further notice of the protest, but awarded the Championship to X. They, however—*i.e.*, the Green and Match Committee of the Royal Melbourne Golf Club, Melbourne, Victoria—recently submitted a case for your opinion. A copy of this case has been received by R., and, as he is not satisfied with the way the case has been stated, I have been directed to lay this case before you, and at the same time to point out the case already submitted to you does not disclose the whole facts, and might therefore on that account be most misleading. For instance, the case should have stated that X. was well aware of the change in custom of marking the teeing grounds, as he presented the discs to the Club, and it was at his instigation, so I understand, that they were painted black. It also should have been pointed out to you that X. played on the course in competition on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, and that on each of these days the tees were marked by the before-mentioned black discs. And it further should have been mentioned that this was an open competition, and that the great majority of the competitors were strangers to the links, and were consequently unaware of any custom of marking out the tees, as they all knew that each and every tee was marked by the discs. Again, from the case submitted to you it might be inferred that the tee box was in every instance placed on the left, close to disc *a*, but this was not so (at the ninth, eleventh, fifteenth, and sixteenth tees the tee box was placed on the right). Of course, R.'s contention was, and is, that the tee box, no matter where it was placed, had nothing whatever to do with the marking of the teeing ground, and that X., having played from outside the limits of the teeing ground—that is, outside the discs—should, under Rule 5 of *Special Rules for Stroke Competitions*, have been disqualified. He also contends that the fact that other players may have similarly offended at different tees should not have weighed with the Committee in any way whatever.

Answer.—X. should have been disqualified.

BULWELL FOREST GOLF CLUB.—Special Rules for Stroke Competitions.—Rule 4. "On completion of the round the cards shall be signed by the marker under penalty of disqualification," etc. Does this rule mean (a) a marker must *not sign* a card till the strokes he is answerable for have actually been made, or (b) merely that the proper signature is the essential?

Answer.—The card must not be signed by the marker until the round has been completed.

May the local Committee make a rule prohibiting a marker from signing till the strokes have actually been played, without contravening the ethics, etc., of golf?

Answer.—Rule 4 makes such a local bye-law unnecessary.

Rule 3. "No competitor shall play on any of the holes," etc. Many players are in the habit of playing "mashie shots" over the eighteenth green while waiting their turn at the first teeing ground. (a) Is this against the spirit or letter of the rule, or against the ethics of golf? (b) If the ball, badly played, ran on the green, would the player be disqualified under Rule 3?

Answer.—This practice should be put a stop to by the Green Committee. If the ball has been unintentionally played on to the putting green the player cannot be disqualified.

Rule 9. "A competitor shall hole out with his own ball," etc. A. drives from ninth tee ground, plays four more strokes, and holes out, then finds that the ball belongs to B., who played from tenth tee ground. What is A.'s correct procedure, and does he incur a penalty?

Answer.—In match play the penalty is the loss of the hole, and in stroke competitions the player should return to the spot where the mistake originally occurred and hole out with his own ball without penalty.

In a stroke competition is any player engaged in the competition justified in seeing that a breach of rule (or ethics) is notified to the Committee managing the competition, although the breach is not committed by the player accompanying him?

Answer.—Certainly.

HALE GOLF CLUB.—In the final of a Summer competition dense fog rendered it quite dark after the middle of the afternoon. Two players protested against being compelled to compete under these conditions, but their protest was disallowed by the Committee. Several members played before the fog came on, and one of these returned the best score. Should the result of the competition stand as played, or should the Committee now declare the competition null and void?

Answer.—The competition for the day in question should have been declared null and void, and, if possible, it should now be replayed.

PUTTENHAM GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. are playing a match in a Club competition. A. is dormy one, and, winning the eighteenth hole, wins the match, the result of which is written up on board in Club-house. In the act of leaving, B.'s caddie informs him that A. grounded his club in a bunker near the eighteenth green. A. acknowledges that he remembers doing so, without intention of gaining any advantage—in fact, the ball was lying clear—but after discussion they decide not to play on, but to leave it to the Committee. What is to be done? Should they replay the match, or is it A.'s from lapse of time?

Answer.—A. infringed Rule 12, and therefore lost the eighteenth hole. The match was consequently halved. As the Committee of the Puttenham Golf Club is no doubt satisfied that A. claimed the eighteenth hole through ignorance of one of the first principles of the game, they should allow the match to be replayed.

EXMOUTH GOLF CLUB.—In a hole competition two players drove off from the fifth tee and then sheltered. Did they incur a penalty, and, if so, under which rule? Does the fact of their losing their position or having begun a fresh hole make any difference?

Answer.—There are no special rules for hole competitions. The players should not be disqualified unless by sheltering and losing their position they disorganised the tournament.

BURNHAM AND BERROW GOLF CLUB.—How is a ball lying in

casual water on permanent grass in a hazard to be treated? Does Rule 14 (a) or 14 (b) govern the case?

Answer.—Rule 1, definition (c), stated that "Permanent grass within a hazard is not part of the hazard." The ball must therefore be dropped under Rule 14 (b).

SHANKLIN AND SANDOWN GOLF CLUB.—(1) A., a member of the Club, wishing to compete in the Monthly Medal competition, not being able to get a partner, took out the assistant professional, who played with him and marked his card. A. returned the winning card. Is A. disqualified, although he had asked two of the Committee (not sitting officially) before starting whether he could do so, they replying they had no personal objection. (2) Can the Secretary of the Club, alone, in the absence of the Committee, grant permission for a special marker? If so, is the special marker allowed to play with the competitor? Would the Secretary be allowed to appoint the professional as special marker, and, if so, would the professional be allowed to play with the competitor?

Answer.—(1) The Committee should make arrangements for such cases. A. appears to have taken reasonable steps to obtain a marker, and should not be disqualified. (2) If the Secretary is authorised by the Committee to represent them, he can grant permission for a special marker, including a professional, if he thinks fit. The special marker may play with the competitor. It is unusual to appoint a professional when a member is available.

PORTSTEWART GOLF CLUB.—The notice of a ladies' stroke competition stated that competitors should select their fellow-competitors. There were nine entries. The ninth competitor sent to the Hon. Secretary at his house requesting his presence, but he was unable to attend, and suggested that the lady should wait till the rest of the competitors had returned. A prominent gentleman member, however, offered to mark her score, and she therefore played, and returned the best score. The Committee are satisfied that had they been present they would have approved the appointment of the gentleman as a special marker, and are of opinion that the lady fulfilled her part in sending to the

Secretary. Is this decision correct, and should the prize be awarded to the lady?

Answer.—The decision of the Committee was correct, and the prize should be awarded to the lady.

KNOCK GOLF CLUB. A. and B. were playing in a match competition. At the tenth hole A.'s ball lay in the bunker guarding the green. About three feet from his ball lay the direction post, which should have been on the bank some three yards from A.'s ball. A. removed the post. B. claimed the hole from A. for doing so. Had A. the right to remove the post?

Answer.—Yes, A. had the right to remove the post. Guide-posts and flags may always be removed irrespective of the position of the player's ball.

WORCESTERSHIRE UNION OF GOLF CLUBS.—A challenge cup was competed for by Clubs in the Union, under stroke play, each team consisting of four players, whose aggregate scores counted. The cup was won by a team from the Worcestershire Golf Club. Some days afterwards, on looking at the cards, the Secretary discovered that his deputy had accepted a card handed to him by a member of the winning team which was not signed. Had the deputy observed the omission he would have had it rectified. (1) Does the acceptance of the card by the deputy, without question, override the penalty set forth in Special Rules No. 4, and does the result hold good in spite of this belated discovery? (2) Or should the whole team be disqualified by the negligence of one of its members and the failure of the deputy to discover this negligence?

Answer.—The Rules for Stroke Competitions do not presuppose a contest of the kind described. The Rules of Golf Committee considers that there should be no difficulty in accepting the card in such a match.

BULWELL FOREST ARTISANS' GOLF CLUB.—At the Annual Spring Meeting, which was held on Easter Monday, April 20th, when prizes were offered for best scratch scores, and also best scores under handicap in the first and second divisions, the Committee postponed the competition (when in progress), as they considered the weather was unfavourable

for such an important event. The facts are as follows : Draws for partners took place at 8.45 and 9.30 a.m. In the first draw four cards only were returned when a violent snowstorm commenced. The snow fell so rapidly that all the players who followed them lost their balls, and were unable to find them until the snow had cleared, which was about forty-five minutes' duration. The first set of players who entered the 9.30 draw were approaching the eleventh hole, and they, too, met the blinding snowstorm, and in consequence lost their balls, and had to wait some considerable time before they could be found, with the result they ceased to continue the game and returned to the pavilion. No cards were returned from the second division players, and four only from the first division, who managed to finish the game just before the storm commenced. As this has caused some dissatisfaction amongst the players who had returned their cards in regard to the action taken by the Committee in adjourning the competition, they beg to solicit your views whether they were justified in doing so or not.

Answer.—The Committee were not only justified, but acted rightly in adjourning the competition.

BALTIC GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. were playing in a stroke competition on the course of the Bramshot Golf Club, the Baltic Golf Club having no course of its own. At the second hole B. met with an accident, and retired. The Secretary of the Bramshot Golf Club, who happened to be present, marked the third hole for A. This hole is close to the Club-house. From this point the professional was sent out, probably by the Secretary of the Bramshot Golf Club, but not by an official of the Baltic Club, and played with and marked for A., who returned the lowest net score. (1) Is A. disqualified for having played with and had his card marked by a professional? (2) Can a member who is disqualified in a stroke competition for returning an unsigned card, or for playing with and having his card marked by a professional, win the sweepstake?

Answer.—(1) A player is not necessarily disqualified for playing with a professional. A professional may become a

special marker if authorised by the Committee in charge of the competition. In the exceptional circumstances described, which prevented A. from consulting the Committee, and assuming that the professional was sent out by the Secretary of the Bramshot Golf Club, the Rules of Golf Committee considers that A. should not be disqualified. (2) If the sweepstake is under the management of the Club, a player who is disqualified from any cause whatsoever cannot win it.

BURSLEM GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition A., driving from the fourth tee and badly slicing his drive, accidentally hit another player, B., standing on the fifth tee, which is to the right of the fourth. After running over to make enquiries as to the nature of the injury, A. was unable to find his ball to continue the game, and, either in ignorance of Rule 6 governing stroke competitions or in the excitement resulting from the accident, instead of returning to the place from which the ball was originally driven, he dropped a ball some little distance behind the place where he thought the ball was lost, and continued playing. A. ultimately came in the winner of the competition, and the matter was reported to the Committee, who disqualified A. for breach of the rule. The Committee's decision has been questioned, as it was suggested that allowance should be made for the special circumstances. The ruling of the Rules of Golf Committee is requested.

Answer.—The Committee was right in disqualifying A.

GANTON GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition a competitor returned a card properly signed and marked, but he put his handicap at 3, whereas it ought to be 4. Is he disqualified?

Answer.—No. It is the duty of the Secretary to see that the proper handicap is deducted.

BRAMSHOT GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition A. hit a ball apparently out of bounds. He played another ball, losing stroke and distance, and holed out in 8. Meanwhile the caddie found the first ball lying within bounds, and brought it to A., who then returned, dropped the first ball behind the place indicated by the caddie, and holed out

in eight strokes, without reckoning any penalty for the caddie lifting the ball. What is the penalty?

Answer.—The player holed out in seven strokes with the provisional ball. The penalty for a ball played out of bounds is loss of distance only. A. should have endeavoured personally to ascertain whether his first ball was out of bounds or not as soon as he reached the spot where it was likely to be. If A. took this precaution, he is allowed to continue his play with his original ball, subject to the penalty of two strokes which he has incurred through his caddie lifting his ball. Otherwise he is disqualified.

FULNECK GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. were playing off the final (thirty-six holes) of a challenge cup competed for by match play. Under the conditions of the cup, it has been left to the players concerned, in the event of a halved match, to decide whether they should play another round, or one hole. In the final A. and B. were all square and one to play at the thirty-fifth hole. They agreed to halve the last hole, and play another match of thirty-six holes on a subsequent day. The last hole was halved by A. putting up and down the green till B. was near enough the hole to make a certain half. The Committee consider their action to be unsportsmanlike, and not golf, and that by agreeing to play a seventy-two hole match they infringed the condition that the final should be thirty-six holes. The players contend that it would be unfair to allow the winning of the cup to depend on the last hole, (1) Would the Committee be within their rights in scratching A. and B.? (2) Otherwise what course would the Rules of Golf Committee recommend?

Answer.—(1) The Rules of Golf Committee considers that the Committee has not the power to disqualify A. and B., since they have already without question defeated the rest of the field. (2) A. and B. have not conformed to the conditions, as they have practically only played thirty-five holes, and the Committee would be justified in withholding the prize for the year. The course taken by A. and B. was probably suggested to them by the conditions of the tournament, under which they were left with an option in the case of a halved match of playing one hole or of replaying the



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match. Under the circumstances the Rules of Golf Committee is of opinion that A. and B. should now be made to complete their match by playing the thirty-sixth hole properly.

ROYAL JERSEY GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition a player drove a ball from the tee which he thought might be out of bounds, and dropped and played another ball. He found that the first ball was not out of bounds, and played out the hole with it. His fellow-competitor objected, and said the second ball should have been played, because the incident had occurred in a stroke competition, and not in match play.

Answer.—Rule 32 applies to a ball out of bounds in match and stroke play. The second paragraph provides for the case submitted, in which the player conformed to the rule by playing out the hole with his first ball.

KILLINEY GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. are drawn together in a stroke competition. At the third hole both drive into long grass. B. finds a ball which he thinks is his, and plays it on to the green. A. searches for his ball for about five minutes, returns to the tee, drops another ball, and after several strokes reaches the green. B. then discovers that he has played with A.'s ball (which is plainly marked), lifts it, and drops it as nearly as they can judge at the spot from which B. played it. A. picks up his second ball, and holes out with his original ball in four strokes, and returns the best card in the competition by one stroke. Is A. disqualified, or does he suffer any penalty? If so, why? Is the case covered by Rule 6 or Rule 9 of Special Rules?

Answer.—A. is not disqualified, and does not suffer any penalty. The ball cannot be considered a lost ball under Stroke Rule 6, as the ball was not lost, but removed from its position by A.'s fellow-competitor; Stroke Rule 9 would only apply to B.'s play. There is no rule which exactly meets this case, but, applying the principle that a ball at rest has been displaced by an agency outside the match, etc. (see Rule 22), it was permissible for A. to act as he did.

ASHTON-ON-MERSEY GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition a competitor, having driven out of bounds from the tee,

inadvertently teed a ball instead of dropping it. What is the penalty?

Answer.—The player is disqualified. The Rules of Golf provide only one method for treating a ball played out of bounds (see Rule 32), with which the competitor did not conform. A special rule, such as Rule 32, overrides a general rule, such as No. 10, for stroke competitions.

GANTON GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition a competitor inadvertently put his card into his pocket on the completion of the round, where it remained for an hour during luncheon before he handed it in. Is he disqualified?

Answer.—The player is disqualified under Rule 4 (Special Rules for Stroke Competitions).

WEST MIDDLESEX GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition A.'s ball lay within twenty yards of the hole. His caddie held the flagstick, A. putted, and, the caddie failing to remove the flagstick, the ball struck it. Is A. penalised two strokes under Rule 21, or one stroke under Rule 11?

Answer.—By sending the caddie to the hole to hold the flagstick A. has complied with Stroke Rule 11. A. has incurred a penalty of the loss of the hole under Rule 25, which becomes two strokes in a stroke competition (see Stroke Rule 14).

BROUGH GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition, open to members and their guests, A. played with another member who was not a competitor, and had not been appointed a special marker. A. was disqualified on the grounds that his partner was not a qualified scorer. Several officials of the Club were either about the Club-house or on the links during the whole of the day, but no application for a marker was made to any of them, or to the Club professional, who would have had no difficulty in finding an official. The member in question was under the impression that any member of the Club could mark, whether competing or not. There is no question of the *bona fides* of the member or his marker, but the latter was a novice at the game, his handicap being twenty-four and the limit for competitors eighteen.

Answer.—It appears that there can have been no written order of starting, or the Committee in charge would have

observed that A. proposed to play with a fellow-member of the Club who was not a competitor, and have provided him with a player or a marker, or both. Under these circumstances A. should not be disqualified, as it has always been the custom to allow a member of the Club to play with and mark for a competitor.

BUSH HILL PARK GOLF CLUB.—A foursome knockout tournament under handicap is held during the month of September. Entries close on the 1st, the draw is posted on the 2nd, and, although allowable, no tie is actually played before the 3rd inst. On September 2nd, Medal Day, A. returns a low score, and his handicap is reduced by the Committee. (1) Does A. play through the foursomes on his original or reduced handicap? (2) Does a competition commence (a) from the date the entries close, (b) from the time the draw is posted, (c) or when the first ball is driven from the tee? (3) Is the Committee justified in altering a player's handicap between the rounds of a running competition (the alteration taking effect immediately)?

Answer.—In the tournament referred to the player is clearly entitled to start with the handicap allowed him on the draw sheet. The question of the time at which a player's handicap may be altered is a matter which should be determined by the rules of the Club in accordance with the wishes of its members. The Rules of Golf Committee sees no reason why, in a tournament lasting only a month, any alteration of the handicap should be made. A competition begins when the first stroke is made.

MADRAS GYMKHANA GOLF CLUB.—(1) On the course it is customary to employ a caddie and forecaddie. In a stroke competition a player drove over a hedge, where he could not see his ball or the forecaddie. The player sent forward his caddie to see how it was lying. When the player got up to his ball he found it just outside a ditch, and on questioning the caddie was told that the forecaddie had lifted it out. Thinking this action had disqualified him, the player played the ball where it lay. The Club Committee decided that the player was not disqualified, and penalised him one stroke under Rule 26, placing the forecaddie, who according to

Rule 22 is not an agency outside the match, in an equal position with the caddie. Was the Committee's decision correct? (2) The first tee is within a railed enclosure. A. drove off, and his ball struck the rail, and, rebounding, hit B. before he could get out of the way. A. claimed the hole. B. objected on the ground that he had not commenced the game and was not in the match, relying on Rule 2: "A match begins by each side playing a ball from the first teeing ground." Which contention is correct?

Answer.—(1) The decision of the Committee was incorrect. Rule 26 refers to moving a ball, and not to lifting it. Assuming that the ball was placed in a position which conformed to Stroke Rule 10, it was immaterial whether the ball was lifted from the ditch by the player or his forecaddie, and the penalty was two strokes. It has been ruled that teeing a ball includes dropping or placing it. (2) The first paragraph of Rule 2 is merely a general description of how the game begins, as evidenced by the fact that there is no penalty clause. A.'s ball was in play, and struck B., who was his opponent. B. therefore lost the hole under Rule 23, owing to the unfortunate accident described.

BACHE GOLF CLUB.—This Club has an annual competition by match play. Each heat consists of thirty-six holes. In previous years a condition stipulated that heats resulting in a tie should be replayed (the thirty-six holes). This year this condition was not made, the Committee thinking that no couple could fail to mutually agree as to the number of holes to constitute the replay. Two players, however, could not arrange, and one scratched. The opinion of the Rules of Golf Committee would be esteemed.

Answer.—The players should have referred the matter to the Committee in charge of the competition. The Committee should then have decided the number of holes to be played.

GLASGOW POSTAL CLUB.—This Club held the Autumn handicap meeting on their own course upon September 2nd. The round consists of nine holes. Owing to the heavy rain the previous Sunday and Monday, the putting-greens did not appear to have been swept or in any way cleaned since the previous Saturday, and were in a fearful state with worm-

casts, leaves, twigs, etc. After eight or ten couples had nearly all finished their round, the greenkeeper started to sweep and clean all the greens, and at one o'clock he was rolling them. Competitors started every hour up till 5 p.m. Some sixteen players who started early have protested against the day's play holding good. The decision of the Rules of Golf Committee is requested.

Answer.—The putting-greens should not have been swept or rolled during a stroke competition. The day's play should be considered null and void.

LESMARHAGOW LADIES' GOLF CLUB.—Postcards were sent to all the members of the Club giving notice that a stroke competition would be held on a certain day and at a stated hour. Five competitors appeared at the appointed time, drew for partners, received cards, and started. An hour later two ladies started to compete without consulting the Secretary or Committee, and having as caddie one of the best players in the gentlemen's Club. (1) Was the Committee justified in disqualifying those two ladies under Stroke Rule 13? (2) Is it allowable for a golfer to act as caddie and give advice about play during a competition? (3) In a stroke competition where there are two prizes (first and second) what is the smallest number of competitors required to make a competition possible?

Answer.—(1) Certainly. (2) Yes. (3) Unless otherwise stated in the conditions of the competition, one competitor would take the first prize; two competitors would play for the first and second prizes.

BORROWOOD LADIES' GOLF CLUB.—Six ladies qualified in the monthly putting and approaching competitions to play in a final competition at 2.30 p.m., September 30th. One competitor could not reach the links until 4 p.m., by which time the other competitors had finished. As the Secretary could not stay on the links after 3.45 p.m., she deputed one lady to take the score of the competitor who came late—this she did, and signed the card. Two of the other competitors, seeing her do this, remembered that they had omitted to put their signatures on the cards they had acted as scorers for. They at once went down to the Secretary's house, she having

taken the cards with her. The Secretary allowed them to sign the cards, but explained that the competitor who had played late had just been to give in her card, and had lodged a complaint that the other cards were unsigned. The two unsigned cards are the winning cards, and the competitor who lodged the complaint is third. Must the winning card be disqualified?

Answer.—The competitor who started at 4 p.m. appears to have received the sanction of the Committee in charge of the competition to play at a time other than that advertised, and therefore her card is in order. The two unsigned cards cannot be accepted.

PERTH ARTISAN GOLF CLUB.—In a stroke competition A. played his second shot on to the putting-green, when a shower came on. A. took shelter under a tree about eight yards from the putting-green, and allowed B., his fellow-competitor, to play his third, and then hole out. A. then started for the green, but the couple following had by this time played on to the green. A. waited and allowed them to hole out before he holed out. A. and B., however, then kept their place on the green. The shower only lasted three or four minutes. Is A. disqualified for sheltering?

Answer.—A. is disqualified, having delayed to play by allowing another couple to pass him on the putting-green. The fact that A. went under a tree would not disqualify him provided he was ready to play his ball when his turn came.

EDINBURGH MEAT TRADE GOLF CLUB.—Early last season members were informed that there would be four home competitions, the dates of which were given, and one holiday competition on a date to be fixed upon later; and that a prize would be given for the best aggregate score in the five competitions. The home competitions were eighteen holes each. The holiday competition was thirty-six holes, two rounds of eighteen holes each, and the prizes were awarded on the result of thirty-six holes. For the purpose of arriving at the best aggregate score, the Committee added half the scores of competitors in the holiday competition to the four scores in the home competition. This has been objected to, on the ground that the result of the whole thirty-six holes

should have been added. The opinion of the Rules of Golf Committee is requested.

Answer.—As members were informed that the prize would be awarded to the competitor who had the best aggregate score in the five competitions, and the holiday competition was one of thirty-six holes, the Rules of Golf Committee is of opinion that the scores for the thirty-six holes should have been added.

ALWOODLEY GOLF CLUB.—A handicap stroke competition for a cup was held under the following conditions. Two rounds of eighteen holes to be played for the cup. Optional sweepstakes for both morning and afternoon rounds of eighteen holes. The competitor who made the best score for thirty-six holes did not hand in his card for the first round until the completion of the second round. Was he disqualified for the cup, for the morning sweepstake, or both?

Answer.—Assuming that there is no clause in the conditions of the competition stipulating that scores shall be handed in on the completion of the first round, the question must be settled as regards the thirty-six hole competition by the custom of the Club. If it is the custom to hand in cards on the completion of the first round, the competitor is disqualified for the cup. In any case he is disqualified for the optional sweepstakes in the first round. It is customary in thirty-six hole competitions to hand in cards on the completion of eighteen holes.

ARTISAN GOLF CLUB, PERTH.—A stroke competition was held on October 10th. On October 13th the Committee settled the prize-winners, and disqualified the competitor who had returned the best score. Two other competitors tied with the next best score. After the disqualification of the competitor referred to, a member made verbal protest that one of the competitors who tied had infringed the rules. The rule of the Club on the subject is:—"All protests on points of play, or otherwise, must be lodged at the completion of the round." The protesting member had no intention of protesting until the tie was played off, but, on becoming aware of the rule of the Club, he made a formal protest, in writing, on October 20th. (1) Can a protest for

an infringement of rule be lodged against a player after the round has been completed, or must it be lodged at the time the infringement takes place? (2) Can a member wait till a tie is played off, or about to be played off, before protesting, or must he protest at the time when the infringement of rule took place?

Answer.—The rule of the Club referred to does not state that protests must be made in writing, and does not provide for the new situation created by the disqualification on October 13th of the competitor who had apparently won. The verbal protest was therefore in order, and should have been investigated by the Committee. (1) A protest can be lodged after the completion of a round. (2) A member should lodge his protest as soon as possible after becoming aware of the incident which is to be the subject of his protest, whether he acquires this knowledge on the day of the competition or subsequently. It is then the duty of the Committee to investigate the matter, and decide whether action should be taken.

WHITLEY GOLF CLUB.—A. and B. were playing in the final of a match play competition. On the seventh green B. lay two yards from the hole in three strokes. A. was six or seven yards from the hole in two strokes. A. played his third stroke, lipped the hole, and lay half an inch from it. He then knocked his ball into the hole. B. reminded him that he had played out of turn, and recalled the stroke. A. refused to have his stroke recalled, and B. therefore claimed the hole, and putted under protest, holing his ball. A. claimed that the hole was halved, as both were down in four strokes, and also that he was not obliged to leave his ball as a guide to B. As A. had the honour at the seventh tee, he struck off first to the eighth hole, B. stating that he played the rest of the match under protest. B. did not recall A.'s stroke, but played after him. At the fifteenth hole A. was four up and three to play, and B. remarked, "That is the match." A. said, "No; we will play another hole because of the hole in dispute." That hole was halved. On the following day B. protested against the cup being awarded to A., and claims that he should have the cup, as A. should be

disqualified for not playing according to the Rules of Golf. B. states that the friction on the seventh green caused him to play badly, and lose the following holes. (1) Can a competitor be disqualified in match play? (2) Is not the greatest penalty in match play the loss of the hole? (3) Can a competitor play part of a match under protest? (4) Can the fact that B. claimed the seventh hole (rightly), and said he played the rest of the match under protest, be taken into account as regards the subsequent holes? (5) Can the protest on the seventh green be considered as including the recalling of A.'s tee shot on the eighth tee when actually the shot was not recalled?

Answer.—The only valid claim that B. has is to the seventh hole, which he won, owing to A.'s breach of Rule 5. (1) Yes, for dishonesty. (2) No. See answer to (1). (3) Certainly, a player can, after claiming the disqualification of his opponent, play the remainder of the match under protest. (4) B.'s claim was a definite one, limited to the seventh hole. The result of that hole, and that hole only, had therefore to be determined after the match was over. (5) The seventh hole being in dispute, the honour remained as it was.

TRAFFORD GOLF CLUB.—The second round in a tournament was completed on November 23rd. The third round should have been completed on or before December 7th. A. and B. did not play their third round by December 7th, and C., who meets one of them in the fourth round, claims a walk-over on the ground that A. and B. are disqualified. On the afternoon of December 5th an inter-Club match was held, A. and B. playing in the team. A notice was posted in the Club-house requesting members not to play tournament matches, if avoidable, on that day. This may be held to have curtailed the opportunities of A. and B. to play their match, but they made no representation on the point to the Committee. All the other competitors played their third round, and were able to comply with the notice posted regarding December 5th. Ought C.'s claim to be upheld?

Answer.—C.'s claim should be upheld. If the Club match arranged for December 5th interfered with the playing of

their match, A. and B. should have represented the matter to the Committee at the time.

LEVEN MONDAY CLUB.—In a stroke competition, when both balls were on one of the large putting greens, A., putting from a distance of thirty-six yards, struck B.'s ball, which lay close to the hole. B. penalised him a stroke. A. contends that, since he was more than twenty yards from the hole, he was not technically on the green at all, and that the rule therefore does not apply. Is his contention justified?

Answer.—Yes; see Stroke Rule 11, par. 3, where both balls have to be on the putting green before a penalty can be incurred for striking the opponent's ball.

OSBORNE GOLF CLUB.—New Rules, Rule 32 (3). If the opponent's ball lie on the lip of the hole, may the player, after holing out, knock it away with hand or foot, or must it be done with a club?

Answer.—It is immaterial how he knocks it away.

ROTHESAY GOLF CLUB.—(1) In a foursome (stroke) competition A. and B. were balloted to play against C. and D. Play was to begin at any time between 10.30 a.m. and 1.30 p.m. At 10.30 a.m. A. and B. were on the ground ready to start, but C. was unable to play, and D., who was present, decided to wait till the afternoon for another partner. A. and B., without waiting to see whether another competitor would arrive, started off at 10.40 a.m., taking with them as a marker another member of the Club, but not a competitor or special marker appointed by the Committee. Was it allowable for A. and B. in a *foursome* competition to play against a *single* player who, though a member of the Club, was not a competitor or special marker appointed by the Committee? Should they not have waited until two other opponents or competitors had arrived, or until the Committee had appointed two players to go round with them? Under the circumstances are A. and B. disqualified? (2) In a stroke competition the hole on No. 4 putting green was covered with water to the depth of one or two inches, and surrounded with a radius of eighteen inches of water.

On reaching this green a competitor before putting out took a ball out of his pocket and tried it with his hand through the water (not on line of putt) to ascertain whether it was possible for the ball to go into the hole. He afterwards putted out with the original ball and continued the round, but lodged no protest as to the condition of No. 4 green at the close of the game. Was the player entitled to do as he did with the ball out of his pocket, and, if not, is he disqualified? The competition was afterwards declared null and void because of the condition of No. 4 green. If the act of the player disqualified him, is he disqualified also from competing in the replay? (3) Is it allowable for a Committee to declare a stroke competition null and void on any day other than the day of competition or at any time other than between the hour of starting and finish of competition?

Answer.—(1) No objection could be taken to the marker, as he was a member of the Club, but the competitors should have consulted the Committee as to whom they were to play with when they found that C. and D. were unable to play as arranged. Assuming that the Committee, or a representative appointed by the Committee, was present, A. and B. are disqualified. (2) Had the day's play not been declared null and void the competitor would have been disqualified. As it is the player is entitled to compete in the replay. (3) Certainly.

WEEDING OUT UNLIKELY CHAMPIONS.

By Dr. J. G. McPHERSON.

I WAS the first to suggest the "choice score" as a capital means of weeding out non-likely champions in tournament competitions. It has been adopted in several quarters—in Cornwall, Buenos Ayres, Florida, etc.; but it has been coldly received by the British Clubs. The Press has been very fair to me, and I have still hopes, by pegging away, to convince influential golfers,

One thing is plain, that some plan must ere long be adopted to weed out unlikely champions. Instead of about a score of Golf Clubs in the 'fifties, we have now 3,600 Clubs. In consequence, vast numbers now enter the lists both for the Open and Amateur Championships.

To bring out the Champion in "real golf" the final competitions must be by holes, not strokes: and my system makes the match competition always prominent. According to the present system, the really best golfer in the Open Championship, as a match player, may not succeed in carrying off the much-coveted prize. Competition by strokes alone does not always bring out the best player, and play by holes alone, as in the Amateur Championship, is too wearisome when so many secondary players are competing. To weed out men who for the time being at the particular competition have not proved themselves capable—unless by a grand fluke—of holding a first place, scoring of a kind must be employed. Scoring, however, as such, is not golf; hole play is the real golf. To reduce the number who are to play by match play, two rounds by plain scoring may happen to throw out very good men. Their play may have been first class, unless for two or three accidental bunkerings of a bad nature. And everyone should know that a man may have been playing a better game on the whole in a round

where his total score does not please him. He feels that he was playing more brilliantly, yet the damning score disappoints him. That is one of the curses of habitual scoring.

Accordingly, in ordinary tournaments, and even in Championships, the eight at the top of the poll in scoring two rounds may not be the best golfers; in fact, in some prominent cases they plainly are not. My plan will to a great extent remedy this defect in the present system. And it is this, that at the end of the two rounds each competitor chooses the best of the scores for each hole out of the eighteen, selecting these out of the two recorded rounds. If a man takes 4 to the first hole in the first round and 3 to that hole in the second round, his "choice score" for that hole is 3, and so on. The total of these "choice scores" for the successive holes in the two rounds played is the "choice score" for the eighteen holes. The eight best "choice" scorers are the eight final champions who have to finish the competition.

The player knows beforehand that he has a choice at the end of each hole in the second round. Now, real golf brings out brilliancy as well as caution. Golf by the strokes of a round is not real golf, though it is so far a necessary evil. In the good old times scoring was very little attended to. The real match was hole by hole. It is awful to think that the caddies, too, have degenerated by the practice of their masters, when one was heard to say, after finishing a round: "Ye" (that is, your master) "beat's, but it was *only* match play!"

The two elements of golf which, combined in proper proportion, bring out the real golfer, are brilliancy and caution. Now, when out of a hundred competitors for a high prize, or for the Championship, so many totally unlikely champions have to be weeded out to save time for the real contest by holes, this method of the "choice score" seems to be the best yet considered for bringing out the two main elements of the game. For by my plan a man plays his first round with caution. He plays as if for a medal. He will not risk much, and he cannot bring in "dash" at any time, for it will not pay.

But in the second round he brings in a sort of match play; the second element of brilliancy can here and there come in for deadly effect, when successful. He competes hole after hole against his first round score. If in the first round, by cautious play, he has secured the "par" score of 4 for the first hole, he can put all he can into it by dash to endeavour to secure a 3 for it in the second round. It does not matter if, by rash play, he takes 6, for he has in the first round already secured a "safe" figure. But occasionally the dash shot will succeed, and cut off a stroke from "par." So on with the successive holes.

If a competitor has scored well for a particular hole in the first round, he can take it easy in the second round. If he has fozzled a hole in the first round, he must play with caution at that hole in the second round, for anyone who fozzles the same hole in both rounds is hardly fit to be classed as a champion, or even included among the winning eight. If "par" is secured for a hole in the first round, a great effort may succeed by a carry over a bunker, or a risky loft in an approach, or a bolt of a long putt in reducing the "par" score by a stroke.

Something of the same point comes in when the choice of two balls is given against a third. If one is safe, the second risks more, and sometimes succeeds. If one is dead, safe to halve with the common opponent, the other can run a long bolt; and he sometimes succeeds in securing the hole. In fact, to win against two players who have the choice of their balls, a man must be able to give each of them about a third. So the advantage the two players have in this case against the third comes out equally strong in the advantage of the second round scoring in particular holes over the first round.

It has been said that by this system players would not greatly exert themselves in the afternoon at the holes at which they had accomplished practically unbeatable scores in the morning. Well, the men would be quite right. They are not playing to the gallery. Real brilliancy cannot be made a matter of common occurrence. The energy of a great dash effort must be stored. Diluted anxiety—watered

down nerve-force—is not in the real style of golf; it comes only into the ordinary style of scoring. In such a case as an unbeatable score for a hole made in the first round the player will wisely play easily at that in the second round, and store up his energy for what he would exercise by dash at a crisis point in a match. For real brilliancy there must be a certain amount of storage of energy or nerve-force. Spreading nerve-force over two rounds is simply sucking away real dash when it is needed.

The principle of the "choice score" is to have caution in the several holes of the first round, and exercise brilliancy when at crucial points in the reducing of the scores of certain holes in the second round. Thus caution and brilliancy are combined in the highest attainable degree by the necessary evil of weeding out inferior players before the final tussle by holes which is to secure the immortal laurel for victory in the best of all games.

THE LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1908.

THE Sixteenth Annual Championship, which was held at St. Andrews on Tuesday, May 19th, and the three following days, attracted a record entry of 148, included among whom were four exponents from the United States of America, South Africa, and New Zealand, an eloquent tribute to the popularity and far-reaching influence of the Ladies' Golf Union. Unfortunately, however, the then Scotch Lady Champion, Miss F. S. Teacher, had been too late in entering, a *contretemps* which robbed the play of no little interest. On the opening day the various ties resulted pretty much as anticipated, but the leading players began to get together in the third round on Wednesday forenoon. Miss C. Leitch, a youthful Sillioth player with a splendid style, who is sure to take high honours in the near future, had her work cut out to beat Miss R. Grant-Suttie, a member of a well-known East Lothian family, and yet more exciting was the tussle between Miss A. Glover, a Scotch ex-Champion, and Miss A. Ormsby (Co. Sligo), the former only winning on the home green. Miss Bertha Thompson, the 1905 Champion, had, however, the whip hand of Mrs. Cuthell (Miss Rhona K. Adair), and won without playing the last three holes, while Miss May Hezlet once more cleverly asserted her superiority over her sister, an unkindly fate having brought them thus early into opposition. In the afternoon Miss Sharp (Murrayfield), by holing a long steal on the home green, sprung a surprise at the expense of Miss Glover, and Miss Tynte dealt similarly, but in a more pronounced fashion, with Miss May Hezlet, who was frequently bunkered, and never found her form. The other cracks, however, kept themselves in the place of hope, albeit, Miss Bertha Thompson had to play two extra holes before disposing of Miss Hilda Evans (Weston-super-Mare).

The outstanding tie in the fifth round on Thursday fore-

noon was that between Miss Bertha Thompson and Miss E. M. Titterton, an 1897 Bronze Medallist, who had had no luck so far in Championship contests. The former, after having been three up at the fourth hole, turned one up. At the fifth hole, however, a curious thing happened. Miss Titterton, who had been badly bunkered, had actually played four more, when, to general amazement, her opponent, instead of pitching on to the green, played her putter, with the result that her ball fell into a deep bunker, where, as the saying goes, it still remains. The outcome of an exciting match was a win for Miss Titterton by the narrowest of margins. Another interesting tie was the last in the round, when Miss E. C. Nevile, runner-up in 1898 and 1902, leat an exceptionally strong player in Miss E. Grant-Suttie, winner of the Stroke Competition, which had preceded the Championship, at the nineteenth hole. In the sixth round Miss Nevile fell very easily before Miss Mather, a Scotch player, now resident in the Newcastle district; but the three remaining ties were fought out with exceptional keenness. Indeed, Miss Titterton did not get the better of Miss E. Kyle, the youthful hope of St. Andrews, until six extra holes had been played, the pair having never been separated by more than a single hole.

In the first of the "semi-finals," on Friday forenoon, Miss Leitch looked like drawing away from Miss Titterton, inasmuch as she was four up at the seventh hole; but the latter then had a telling innings with five successive wins. Miss Leitch squared the match at the fourteenth, but Miss Titterton won the next two holes, and was eventually hailed the victress by one. Miss D. I. Campbell, the Scotch Champion, in the other tie turned four up against Miss Mather; but the latter played with rare pluck, and, after wiping out her deficit, would not admit defeat until the twenty-second hole. In the final tie, a portion of which was played in drenching rain, Miss Titterton, generally speaking, held the advantage—indeed, she at one time led by three holes—but Miss Campbell hung on determinedly, and all was to play for at the seventeenth hole. The round was halved, but Miss

Titterton gained an extremely popular victory at the first hole out, thanks to a magnificent second with her brassy. To Miss Campbell is also due hearty congratulations on her uphill fight, and the match formed a fitting finish to a meeting which must have opened the eyes of conservative St. Andrews to the merits of ladies' golf. THE IRISH LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1908.

THE Irish Ladies' Championship was played over the Portrush links by kind invitation of the Royal Portrush Club, beginning on Tuesday, April 7th. Fifty-three players competed, the most notable being Mrs. Cuthell and Miss M. E. Stuart, now resident in England, the Misses Hezlet, Miss Tynte, Miss Walker-Leigh, and Miss Graham. The absence of Miss Magill and Miss Mary Dickson was regretted, as their presence would have meant the Irish cracks being all to the fore. Several players put in appearance for the first time, and their play attracted much favourable comment, Miss Shaw (Lahinch) and Miss Ormsby (Sligo) standing out prominently. Miss Mabel Harrison, a young Dublin player, who is becoming well known, defeated Miss Walker-Leigh, the 1907 Champion, somewhat easily in the third round, providing practically the only big surprise of the week.

On Monday, 6th, the two scratch prizes, kindly given by the Royal Portrush Club, were competed for in delightful weather, Miss May and Miss Florence Hezlet again asserting their superiority in score play as well as match play, and taking first and second place with scores of 86 and 87 respectively. THE SCOTCH LADIES' CHAMPIONSHIP, 1908.

THE Sixth Annual Championship was decided over the old course at Gullane on Tuesday, June 2nd, and the two succeeding days. Contrary to expectation, there were only forty-three entries, but these included the holder (Miss F. S. Teacher), ex-Champions in Misses A. Glover and D. I. Campbell, and Miss E. M. Titterton, the winner of the Ladies' Championship about a fortnight before. On the opening day the weather was hazy, and several heavy showers of rain fell in the afternoon, but the conditions were not unfavourable from a playing point of view. In the first round, which comprised only ten matches, inasmuch as one lady did not answer to her name, Miss G. Savory created a mild surprise by beating Miss M. N. Fraser, and Miss L. Lugton, after standing four up at the thirteenth hole, had to play two extra holes before she accounted for Mrs. Jackson. In the second round Miss Hamilton-Campbell, the then Hon. Secretary of the Scottish Ladies' G.A., had great difficulty in shaking off Miss Hemingway, a daughter of the well-known Notts player, and Mrs. Shand gave Miss Glover a capital game. They were all square at the thirteenth, but a fine pitch gained Miss Glover the next hole, and she eventually won by two holes. Miss C. Stevenson, the Scotch Hockey International, stuck pluckily to Miss D. I. Campbell for twelve holes, but the latter then pocketed four holes in succession, and won easily. The round closed with a fine display on the part of Miss Titterton. Against such a capable exponent of the game as Miss J. Park, she turned five up, and victory was hers on the thirteenth green.

Wednesday broke into a lovely day, and, if, perhaps, a trifle too hot for the players, furnished the spectators with a pleasurable outing. The majority of the ties in the third round were keenly contested, the exceptions being those in which Miss M. Cairns, who has a splendid long game at her command, beat Miss J. Rusack with

unexpected ease on the fourteenth green and Miss Titterton similarly worsted Miss Forbes. Miss Allaway only got the better of Miss E. Anderson after playing an extra hole, Miss O. Wood beat her Club-fellow, Miss D. Cotton, on the home green, and the four remaining ties were not decided until the sporting seventeenth hole, where cards and hopes are so frequently wrecked. Miss Glover and Miss Lugton led alternately going out, the balance being in favour of the latter at the turn. Miss Glover, by deadly putting, then put a different aspect on the game by winning three holes in succession, and, try as her opponent liked, she could not wipe out her deficit, the end coming at "Saltcoats," where Miss Lugton, in trying to hole the odds, knocked Miss Glover's ball in. Miss E. B. Black also gave Miss F. S. Teacher a good game, but the most interesting contest was that between Miss D. I. Campbell and Miss K. Stuart. Although the St. Andrews Silver Medallist was out in 39, she found herself two holes down, Miss Stuart having only made one mistake so far—a topped second to the sixth hole, which she lost in consequence. She had the seventh and eighth holes brilliantly in 3 and 4, her brassy shot to the latter being a picture. She went further ahead at the eleventh, where she got her third 3, but lost the twelfth through missing a short putt. Miss Campbell thereupon took heart of grace, and her splendid driving deservedly won her two succeeding holes. The fifteenth was halved, and Miss Campbell took the lead for the first time at the sixteenth, where Miss Stuart was bunkered. Miss Campbell's second to "Saltcoats" jumped the bunker, and, profiting thereby, she won an uphill game by 2 and 1. In the afternoon Miss Allaway beat Miss Bell with something in hand, and Miss Cairns had no difficulty in disposing of Miss Wood. The other ties, however, were followed with the keenest interest and appreciation. Miss Teacher had a little the best of the play against Miss Glover for seven holes, but the Elie player drew level at the turn. They were still all square at the sixteenth, but Miss Glover's victory seemed assured when she won the seventeenth. She, however, lost her advantage by missing a two-yards putt on

the home green, and extra holes had perforce to be played. The end came at the twentieth, where Miss Teacher had to resign the honour she had won at Troon. Miss Titterton and Miss Campbell fought their St. Andrews battle over again. The latter made a splendid start by winning three out of the first five holes, but Miss Titterton, by steady play and good putting, was able to square accounts at the turn. Three well-played halves followed, but Miss Campbell won the thirteenth and fourteenth through her superior approaching. Playing the odds on the fifteenth green, Miss Titterton holed a long putt, and Miss Campbell, failing with the like from little over a yard, had her lead reduced to one. The Champion got a hard half of the sixteenth, to which her opponent had a long drive; but, as the seventeenth and eighteenth holes were also halved, she had to admit defeat by one hole.

Lovely weather favoured the players in the penultimate and final rounds on Thursday, a fresh breeze from the West tempering the heat, but adding a few strokes to the difficulties of the outward half. The Gullane representatives, who led off, were on equal terms at the turn, as also at the fourteenth hole, but Miss Cairns then went right away, and won without playing the last hole. The other semi-finalists took practically all the spectators with them. Neither began well, Miss Campbell hooking her drive, while Miss Glover topped her second. The latter, however, had the best of the play afterwards, and so gained the first success. Miss Campbell lost no time in squaring accounts with a good putt, and took the lead with a 2 at the third, where her tee shot lay within easy holing distance. Miss Glover wiped out her deficit with a fine putt for a 5 at the fifth, but the sixth went to her opponent. Miss Glover pluckily responded by winning the seventh in 4, but Miss Campbell pocketed the two remaining outward holes in a like figure, and so turned two up. Two steady halves followed, but Miss Glover further prejudiced her prospects by playing the twelfth hole badly. A half at the thirteenth narrowed the issue, but, after both had been trapped with their seconds to the fourteenth, Miss Glover got best out, and won in 5 to 7. The fifteenth and sixteenth

holes were halved in 5 and 4 respectively, as also the seventeenth after both had been in difficulties, and Miss Campbell won her way into the final by 2 and 1.

In the final, the result was never in doubt. Miss Cairns lost the first two holes, won the third, but lost the fourth and fifth, being at this early stage three down. Going to the sixth, she had further bad luck, inasmuch as her caddie accidentally kicked her ball, and so lost her the hole. The seventh hole also went to Miss Campbell, who turned five up, and she made her third victory in the Championship practically assured by securing the tenth and eleventh holes, being hailed an easy winner a hole later. FAR NORTH.

"COME in here, Dugald," said a shock-headed student to his brother, who was waiting at the door of the Principal's room, "come in here, and see a gentleman who does not know where Rogart is!" But Rogart is more widely known than it was fifty years ago, for just beyond it lies the Queen of Northern watering-places and the home of the Royal Dornoch Golf Club. It is necessary to explain that the title of this article is a relative term. Under certain aspects such a title would be a misnomer. My friend, who was crossing the Dornoch Firth, inquired of the boatman whether he belonged to the locality. "No," was the reply, not without the suggestion of resentment, "I pelong to the Nuth of Scotland." But we are writing of Dornoch in its relation to the great heart and centre of Scottish golf, the kingdom of Fife, and from there Dornoch lies at the distance of a day's journey, and one has to make a very early start, and exhibit something of what Napoleon called "two-o'clock-in-the-morning courage," in order to reach the Royal Burgh in time to admit of an evening round. Of course, as golf is played nowadays over the whole habitable globe, Dornoch cannot be considered out of the way. When we consider that we have been brought within two days' reach of the Alps, on the slopes and in the valleys of which golf is becoming more and more an everyday spectacle, even South-country players must regard Dornoch as lying at their very door. It puts a different complexion on the subject altogether, when we remember that golf is now played under the shadow of the Great Pyramid; and that, indeed, wherever the Britisher has taken root, from Bengal to Donegal, there likewise the game has sprung up and flourished amazingly. We remember having heard that some of the *savants* of the British

Association, a few years ago, introduced golf to the natives in the neighbourhood of the Victoria Falls, if they did not actually convert that majestic cascade into one of the hazards of the green; and, besides, we have been credibly informed that that intrepid explorer, Captain Scott, Scot like, carried his clubs with him in the South Polar Expedition, and indulged his weakness on the fields of eternal snow and ice. But, when all is said and done, Dornoch is outside the programme of a week-ender's holiday from such a centre as Fife or the Lothians.

And yet, though far North, Dornoch is not by any means a new discovery. It takes its place among the handful of Scottish greens that have a history. Although the Golf Club has only been in existence for a little over thirty years, the traditions of the green extend away back into the misty past, and the archives of Dunrobin and the Burg's records lead us to understand that play has been going on there for at least three hundred years.

Sir Robert Gordon, tutor to the Earl of Sutherland, not only figures in history as the restorer of the ancient Cathedral of Dornoch, but he seems to have been the first to draw public attention to the valuable asset Dornoch possessed in the extensive links which lay around the city. He seems, with a prophetic insight, to have forecasted the possibilities of Dornoch golf, and, although he could not have anticipated the full extent of the annual harvest now reaped from the links, yet he was bold enough to declare—we must always allow a certain licence for local enthusiasm—that, in its links, Dornoch could rival either St. Andrews or Montrose. The public opinion, at least, of Dornoch, will, there is no doubt, support this early flattering estimate.

In the far North one finds, especially among the elderly ghillies and caddies, a theological bent of mind, and a sort of homespun, rule-of-thumb method of dealing with problems that even expert theologians have never solved in such a way as to be beyond objection. It was in the North that we learned that "at the Creation some things were made and some were left unmade, or not finished altogether like those that were made," and from this, to us, novel theory, or, rather, statement of fact, it was easy to account for

the difference in the value of land in the Northern Counties, compared with that of the more finished and fertile South, and to see the force and justice of the claim for a state subsidy for the Highlands. We are led to recall this single-eyed syllogism from the reflection that some fifty or more years ago, according to the Burgh records, the total revenue of the links, direct and indirect, was £2 2s. Without question, a great deal has been recently done at Dornoch to make up for this deficiency. In a quarter of a century how has the value of the links been multiplied! We do not know what value the Assessor puts upon such waste places as Dornoch Links, but it may well be high, for it has proved a veritable field of gold, causing almost as great a rush to the town as was witnessed some years ago to the auriferous rock beds on the Yukon River.

Let not the jaded city devotee imagine that in the far North he is to find, during the Summer months, more elbow room than falls to his share in Southern places; for there the queue of balls, or, to be more exact, the tin tube, is in constant service; and he must be quite as alive, to secure a satisfactory place on the roster as at St. Andrews or North Berwick.

Since the advent of the rubber-core, a considerable addition was made to the links in the direction of Embo, and there are now, in the round, a couple of holes of over 500 yards, and two or three others only a hundred less. It is remarkable how many of the holes on the outward journey are to be found upon ramparted greens, "not high-raised battlement or laboured mound," but looking exactly like miniature forts or camps, with the *vallum fossaque* formation so agreeable to the mind of the ancient Roman general, somewhat similar in appearance to the "Corner o' the Dyke" at St. Andrews. One of these holes, "Earl's Cross," takes its name from the pillar that commemorates a feat of valour by the Earl of Sutherland, who decided the issue of an old-time battle by slaying the Danish general, using as his weapon of destruction the leg of a horse which came conveniently to hand; but whether the "Witch" hole is a memorial of the last case of witch-burning in the North, which took place in the vicinity of the links, common report

deponeth not. A very sporting hole is the sixth, or hole across, entitled the "Whinny Brae," on a plateau which is carefully guarded against anything but a long, straight mashie shot.

Referring to the scenery that can be viewed from the links, the local guide-book thus enlarges: "The spectator admiring Nature can contemplate the loveliness of an extensive marine and champaign landscape, then pass his gaze on to the deep solitude of ancient forests, or dark, craggy fastnesses of Alpine ravines, etc, etc."

We question if such an inviting vista ever attracted the presence of a golfer. It is not a "champaign landscape" that he goes in quest of. But the Secretary of the Club comes more to the point when he writes: "The nature of the turf has frequently been described as 'velvety'; but, strictly speaking, this is not so, although, under certain conditions, and at certain times, it is considerably more 'velvety' than at others." One cannot help admiring the judicious terms in which the assiduous Secretary has taken care to recommend the green.

Let us be thankful the green is not "velvety." We have heard it described as "weedy," but that was after a lost match. But much has been done of late years to remove any natural roughness upon it, large spaces through the greens have recently been returfed, and all has tended to ensure that a straight-hit ball will be well treated, and secure a clean lie. It is said that there are no "Alps" or "Himalayas" on Dornoch, but there well might be, and, by playing over the rough slopes at the Embo end, the green could be so advantageously lengthened in that direction as to provide an eighteen-hole course to the North of the Club-house, and so save backing down to the low-lying ground, where, without question, the burn has been turned to such good account as a hazard. But, even at the sacrifice of the burn, the project is worth consideration. The proprietor of Skibo, already a generous friend of the Club, as his "Shield" bears witness, knows a thing or two about "removing mountains" and the best means of accomplishing this end. With a little of his help, every obstruction and difficulty in the way of such extension could be brushed aside and overcome.

As with every other reputable green, Dornoch has had some notable men, whose names are for ever associated with it. It is unquestionably a sign of a high golfing reputation to be taken notice of at St. Andrews, and in what is undoubtedly the most spirited of all the old golfing pictures, "The End of a Big Match," one of the former Dornoch lairds, Mr. George Dempster, of Skibo, occupies a front position, and we may take it for granted that, unless he had been a front-rank player, his likeness would not have appeared there. But, passing from the beginning of the nineteenth century to the present time, Dornoch has annexed a young player who has already done great things, and who has the promise of a great future before him. Mr. Gordon Simpson did splendid work for his *alma mater*, and almost carried the old Red Cross to the premier position in the Amateur Championship three years ago, and, out of a record field, he only fell in the sixth round, by the barest possible margin, before Mr. C. C. Lingen, the runner-up in the contest. On the home links Mr. Simpson has carried all before him, and he must be heavily plussed to give other players, some of them strong representatives in the Northern Counties Cup match, a chance of success. His record of the green, 72, is only two strokes over Taylor's professional record of 1906. J. H. Taylor is a frequent visitor there. No one would think of recommending a rural postman to spend his holiday taking long walks in the country, but it is asserted that Taylor spends his annual holiday on Dornoch Links. That he should go so far North in pursuit of the game is evidence enough of the excellence of the *menu*. It is a fine, firm, breezy links, and every year, by careful tending, is being put into better order. Three hundred years ago Charles I. conferred upon the town the title of a "Royal" Burgh, and now King Edward has granted to the Golf Club the use of the same high-sounding title. The Club basks in the Royal favour, and so great has been the measure of recent prosperity that it has now erected a Club-house that is more in keeping with its prestige and the requirements of the times. Hitherto, their energies and revenue have been expended on the green, and that is the proper sequence. A roomy,

airy Club-room and comfortable lounge are both good and desirable; but the green is the main thing, and the care of that is a constant claim and drain upon Club finance, and a duty not only incumbent upon the Green Committee, but upon every player who is endowed with a reasonable mind.

Among the Club furnishings there is displayed a golfing rhyme setting forth a maxim that cannot be too deeply impressed upon every player of whatever age, sex, or clime; for, after recounting certain liberties, and even a certain licence, in which each may indulge his own taste or habit, it concludes with an appeal which might fitly find its sanction or enforcement in a graduated penal code reaching unto coercion:

“Remember the maxim for all you are worth,
If you scloff with your iron, you put back the turf.”

ENGLAND v. SCOTLAND.

THE selection of the English team for this match, which was played at Sandwich on Saturday, May 23rd, furnished not a little food for controversy: but, keeping in view the fact that England had been badly beaten at St. Andrews in the previous year, there was some justification for the remodelling of their side by the Selection Committee. Scotland were again successful, but only by five matches to four, and, curiously enough, the Englishman, whose preferment had probably been most adversely criticised, gained the most pronounced victory of the day. England led by two matches at the close of the forenoon's round, but in the afternoon V. A. Pollock had his advantage of two holes wrested from him by R. Andrew, and H. S. Colt, who had been all square with J. G. Simpson, was cleverly beaten. With one couple to finish, honours were easy, but J. L. C. Jenkins, the Troon crack, whose display in the St. George's Cup Competition had deservedly won him his place, played with the nerve of a veteran against F. H. Mitchell, and Scotland's fifth successive victory was assured two holes from home. J. Ball and J. Graham were in great form for their respective sides, but J. E. Laidlay, after standing seven down against Ball with thirteen to go, kept in the running until the fourteenth hole, and would have made an even better fight of it had he not been laid several stimies, in trying to circumvent one of which he holed his opponent's ball. Details:—

THE AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1908.

As the lottery of the draw had kept most of the leading golfers apart, the first round of the Amateur Championship at Sandwich on Monday, May 25th, promised little of more than passing interest. To reduce the field to sixty-four ties for the second round, fifty-nine players were given byes and 138 were drawn, but as three men scratched, the programme was reduced to sixty-six matches. It was, however, a long day's golf, lasting from nine o'clock until nearly six. There were few surprises, but one of these was the defeat of the veteran, H. G. Hutchinson, by D. S. Froy. For excellence there was nothing to equal the golf of the 1907 Champion, J. Ball. He was playing J. A. Healing, of Richmond, but no ordinary golfer could have lived against him. He was out in 33, and was one under fours up to the thirteenth green, when the match ended. V. A. Pollock also played splendidly against A. G. McNeill, of Prestwick; but the most curious match was that between J. B. Pease and Major Williams. The latter was three up at the fifteenth hole, but Pease squared the game on the home green, then saved the nineteenth by getting down a long putt, and won at the succeeding hole, where Williams was bunkered. A. C. Lincoln, the winner of the St. George's Cup, and H. D. Gillies proved wonderfully well-matched, and the issue was not decided in favour of the former until an extra hole had been played, his opponent being trapped short of the green.

On Tuesday morning there was some disappointment in the way of scratchings. The claims of work prevented H. W. Beveridge from putting in an appearance, and as previous runners-up in S. M. Fergusson and the Hon. O. Scott also withdrew, E. Martin-Smith, G. Hoffman (the old Cambridge Captain), and J. Graham (the Royal Liverpool crack) passed into the third round without having

to drive a ball. The spectators had comparatively little to interest them, but those who went round with J. E. Laidlay and C. Bell saw a close match. They turned for home all square, but Bell forged ahead afterwards, and won by two holes. The tie between Ball and Pollock attracted almost the whole company on the links, but proved a great disappointment. Ball, who was off his putting, had also the worst of the luck, inasmuch as he was stymied at the eighth and ninth holes, and Pollock, who was steadiness itself, won an unexpectedly easy victory on the thirteenth green. G. Campbell and J. G. Simpson were also forced to fall out thus early, thanks to the marvellous putting of C. Medrington and H. L. Gaw, of Engadine fame; and T. M. Hunter was beaten by E. H. W. Scott, after standing three up at the fifteenth. In the third round the tie between Gaw and A. V. Hambro attracted much attention. It was a brilliant and well-contested round, but Gaw failed to reproduce the remarkable putting which had determined the issue against J. G. Simpson, and he was down from almost the start. It was not for want of giving his ball a chance that he did not win, for he made some wonderful approach shots. But Hambro's drives surpassed anything else seen during the day, and his second shots at the long holes were equally brilliant. He was three up at the fifteenth, and victory was his two holes later. Pollock again won, retaining the fine form which he had shown against John Ball; Captain C. K. Hutchison, though occasionally outdriven, came out splendidly in his short game; Graham was at the top of his form; Medrington, who had beaten Campbell, was no match for W. H. Fowler; W. E. Fairlie, who had ousted the veteran C. Hutchings in the second round, won a hard match with J. B. Pease; C. A. Palmer had to play to the twenty-eighth hole before beating L. O. Munn, the young Irish Champion; and Lincoln only won his match with C. Smith on the eighteenth green. The curfew bell of Sandwich Church was ringing eight o'clock as Lincoln's second shot dropped on the edge of the home green so that golfers had had an eleven-hours' day on the links.

Wednesday brought really good weather, the sky being cloudless, while a refreshing breeze blew in from the sea. One of the most interesting of the matches in the fourth round promised to be that between H. S. Colt and the Canadian ex-Champion, G. S. Lyon, who was the last of the Colonial golfers left in. At the start Colt was kind to him, for Lyon, after topping his drive and his brassy shot, got in a finely-hit third, and escaped with a half. Colt, however, soon established an advantage, and, turning three up, won comfortably at the fifteenth. The Lawn Tennis ex-Champion, H. L. Doherty, showed the immense improvement in his game by beating the English International, E. Martin-Smith. Between A. Gallacher and Graham it was anyone's match for twelve holes, but the latter then drew away, and won without playing the home hole. Captain C. K. Hutchison, failing to find the strength of the putting greens, lost to E. A. Lassen, and Pollock followed up his triumphs of Tuesday by beating R. Andrew, the end coming at the seventeenth, where he ran down a long steal for a 3. The defeat of Lincoln was perhaps the most surprising event of the round, though it was recalled that his conqueror, A. W. Murray, had given W. J. Travis a hard round in the 1904 Championship over the same course.

Graham and Doherty were the first to play in the fifth round, and the Liverpool man proved in such fine form that, hard as Doherty tried, he could not wrest back the four holes which he had lost in the outward half. Colt, playing a steady game, beat Aitken, although the latter, after being four down at the tenth, brought the match to the home green. A. V. Hambro, Palmer, Fowler, and Pollock were also among the vanquished, the last-named quite failing to do himself justice against the veteran, C. E. Dick, until nearing the close of the round. Dick was one up at the seventeenth, but to the home hole he pulled his drive into the rushes, and was bunkered with his second. His recovery was good, but Pollock holed a longish putt and squared the match. The nineteenth was halved in 4; but at the twentieth Pollock failed to carry the bunker on the left, and lost.

On Thursday morning Graham had his work cut out to beat Bishop. His long game was good, but his putting was very weak, albeit he holed out well at the home hole. Colt led H. E. Taylor for twelve holes, but the latter then drew level, and eventually won, after playing an extra hole. Lassen got the better of Mellin by his superior play through the green, and Dick, after some fine golf on the part of both, cleverly beat Darwin. In the first of the semi-finals there was a surprise, for Graham, again putting badly, had to own defeat from Taylor on the fifteenth green. Dick and Lassen played beautiful golf going out. Dick took three to reach the first green, but from the second to the seventh the play was faultless. Lassen failing to carry the bunker, lost the eighth hole, but he won the ninth with a good putt. Lassen was one up at the thirteenth, and the fourteenth was halved. The crucial hole was the fifteenth. Dick pushed his tee shot into the bents, but made a good recovery from a bad lie, and, with a beautiful brassy shot, he seemed to have a chance of a half, but the ball caught the top of the face of the bunker, and fell back into it. He twice failed to get out, and then gave up the hole. Lassen, now two up, halved the two succeeding holes, and the match was over, two Englishmen being left to contest the final on the following day.

The weather on Friday was so boisterous that good golf was hardly expected; but few were prepared to see so many mistakes made, more particularly in the homeward half. Lassen turned two up, and led by a like margin at the close of the forenoon round. In the afternoon he straightway increased his advantage, and Taylor, cracking completely up, was beaten with unexpected ease by seven up and six to play. Lassen's play was steady, but Taylor's was really too bad to be true, and the final was generally agreed to have been about the dullest in the history of the Championship. Details:—

The conditions which regulate the entrance of players in the Amateur Championship are as follows :

(a) The competition shall be open to all amateur golfers, members of any Golf Club, playing from scratch.

(b) An amateur golfer shall be a golfer who has never made for sale golf clubs, balls, or any other article connected with the game ; who has never carried clubs for hire after attaining the age of fifteen

years, and who has not carried clubs for hire at any time within six years of the date on which the competition begins in each year; who has never received any consideration for playing in a match, or for giving lessons in the game; and who for a period of five years prior to the 1st September, 1886, has never received a money prize in any open competition.

(c) Competitors shall enter for the competition through the Secretaries of their respective Clubs, who in sending in the names shall be held to certify that the players are *bonâ fide* amateur golfers in terms of the foregoing definitions.

Notwithstanding the provision in Clause c, all entries shall be subject to the approval of the Committee of the Club on whose green the competition is held.

This year's Championship falls to be held at Muirfield during the week beginning May 24th.

MR. E. A. LASSEN was born in Bradford in 1876. In due course he went to Rugby, where he gained his football cap. He was also a cricketer of no mean ability, and would probably have made his mark after leaving school had he been able to devote the requisite time to the game. As an outlet for his superfluous athletic energy, he, therefore, transferred his affections to golf, and, being gifted with a fine physique, he was soon placed upon the scratch mark. His forte at that time was length from the tee and through the green, but of recent years he has become an exceptionally steady and painstaking putter, and reaped a full reward last year. In 1900 he won the Championship of the County of "broad acres" in virtue of holing an approach at the expense of Mr. G. T. Crosland (Huddersfield G.C.), and last year, undoubtedly his *annus mirabilis*, he gained his second County Championship. With a great liking for St. Annes, he has distinguished himself not a little in the competitions of the Royal Lytham and St. Annes G.C., and it was under their banner that he achieved his crowning success at Sandwich.

THE GOLFING CHAMPIONSHIP, 1908.

It scarcely so large as was expected, the entry list of 180 for the leading event of the golfing calendar necessitated two full days' golf at Prestwick on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 16th and 17th, for the qualifying competition instituted in 1907. A slight variation was, however, made in the procedure which obtained at Hoylake, inasmuch as the ninety competitors who played on Tuesday forenoon were not asked to play their second round until Wednesday afternoon, whereas the second section, who played on Tuesday afternoon, were set to complete their probation on the following forenoon. When play started on Tuesday, the course, which probably supplies the finest test of golf in the world, was looking its best; but a stiff Southerly breeze bade fair to add a few strokes to the par value of the inward and longer portion of the round. It would serve no good purpose to enter into lengthened details of the play, for the fact that only thirty players in each section, or those who might tie for the last place, could qualify, forced the leading players to run no unnecessary risks. R. Jones was the first to hand in a card of under 80. Going out in 39, he came home in a like figure. This steady score was equalled by Braid, who took a stroke less to go out, and was excelled by the old Aberdeen player, Donaldson, who went out in 38 and came home in 39. Meantime, Taylor had been progressing in old-time form. By almost faultless play, he reached the end hole in 37, and, making few mistakes afterwards, he set the field something to do to beat his 76. H. Vardon began steadily with a 4, but required three putts on the two succeeding greens, and dropped another stroke by heeling his drive to the fourth hole into the burn. The

sixth hole also cost him a stroke too much, but, with 3 3 4, he completed the outward half, after all, in 37. Coming home, his putting still left something to be desired, and his round totalled up to 79, his partner, C. W. Pope, actually beating him by a stroke, he also having turned in 37. Another ex-Champion in Herd was, however, seen at his best. Out in 37, he came home brilliantly in a like figure, and his score of 74 was not equalled by anyone in his section, although it was narrowly approached by W. McEwan. The wind had now chopped round to the West, and fallen appreciably, so that the anticipation was that some sensational scoring would be recorded. Massy was the outstanding personality in his section, and he delighted a large company with superb play. His only mistake going out was at the Himalayas, a hole which cost him a 5, although he had been only a little over the green with his tee shot. Turning in 35, all went well with him until he missed a short putt on the fourteenth green; but he immediately atoned by laying his approach to the fifteenth dead, and in the end he equalled Herd's fine round of 74. E. Ray, although he began rather slackly, came within a little of being bracketed with Massy. Indeed, he would have been had he not taken a 6 to the dreaded Alps hole. R. Thomson had also a capital card of 75, but it was appropriately left to Mr. R. Andrew, the Scotch International and local crack, to put everyone in the shade. Out in 36, he took hole after hole coming in at its proper figure until the sixteenth. Playing his approach to this hole rather cautiously, he failed to hole a 4ft. putt, but got the stroke back when he ran down an awkward putt for a 4 at the seventeenth, after being over the green in two

with his iron. A fine, straight shot to the home hole rolled close up to the pin, and, when he holed the putt, thus equalling H. Vardon's competition record of 72 for the course, he received an ovation. Mr. J. Graham came next of the amateurs with 77 (37 out, and 40 in), and Mr. J. Ball kept well in the running with 78. Wednesday was a lovely day, with a fresh breeze from the East, and the late starters on the previous day began their second round with every prospect of returning good scores. Pulford set the pace with a 78 (39 out, and 39 in), steadiness being the characteristic of his play, and it was not until Massy finished, an hour and a half later, that he was deposed from premier position, although Mr. John Ball, after an inauspicious beginning (the second hole, where he was badly trapped, having cost him no fewer than 6), made a gallant bid to do so with a 77 (40 out, and 37 in). Massy began well with a 4 and a 3, but he heeled his second to the Cardinal into the burn, and dropped a stroke in consequence. A too strong approach to the next hole lost him another stroke, but, playing steadily afterwards, he turned in 38. Four well-played holes followed, but he sliced his drive to the fourteenth into a garden, and lost the distance. The remaining holes were taken in "one above 4's," and his round of 39 made his qualifying aggregate the good one of 151. Cawsey, with a 78 (38 out, and 40 in) drew level with Mr. Ball, and Leaver, with a 76 (37 out, and 39 in) went one better. Ray and Robson, who were partnered, proved splendidly matched. Both reached the turn in 37, but had bad holes coming in. Although Ray got over the dyke at the twelfth with his second, he required four putts, and his score was further handicapped with a like figure at the succeeding hole, where Robson, strangely enough, had a 6 also, thanks to getting into long grass off the tee, and topping his third into a bunker, after regaining the fairway. These, however, proved their last mistakes, and, with cards of 78 and 76 respectively, they stepped into a prominent position. Much was expected from Mr. R. Andrew after his record performance on the previous day, but he dropped strokes

on the first and third greens, and played the seventh hole badly. Turning in 39, he came home in a similar score, and so had the honour of leading his section for the second day. T. Ball, with 82, fell somewhat below his first day's display, but his partner, Thomson, had an excellent 76 (36 out, and 40 in), and this enabled him to tie with Massy for second place. The wind became a little fluky as the day wore on, but the scores were slightly better than in the forenoon. Of the leaders on the previous forenoon, Jones started first, and fairly excelled himself during the greater part of the round. His figures to the turn were, 4 2 5 4 3 4 4 4 = 34, but, just when he seemed likely to do a phenomenal performance, he fell away badly, taking 6 to the fifteenth, 5 to the sixteenth, and 6 to the seventeenth. He wound up a fitful round with a 4, his total being 78, and his aggregate 156. Hepburn greatly improved his position with a 74, compiled as follows: Out, 4 3 4 4 4 4 3 4 5 = 35; in, 4 4 5 6 5 4 3 4 4 = 39, and Captain Hutchison and Braid handed in cards of 79 in quick succession. Braid was not happy on the greens, being short with his approach putts until the ninth hole, when his ball raced over the green and toppled into a bunker, costing him a 6 for the hole. He, however, came steadily home in 40, having a congenial partner in the veteran J. Kay, whose score was 81. Mr. Maxwell, who holds the record of the links at 66, came to such hopeless grief at the third hole, that he disfigured his card with a 12, and his round of 90 placed him outside the qualifying list. Gaudin and J. H. Taylor equalled Hepburn's fine card of 74, their details being—Gaudin: Out, 4 3 5 4 3 5 4 4 4 = 36; in, 5 4 5 4 4 4 4 5 3 = 38. Taylor: Out, 4 3 4 4 3 6 4 4 5 = 37; in, 4 3 5 4 4 4 3 5 5 = 37. Gaudin played well at every point, and Taylor's only mistakes were at the sixth and home holes, his tee shots to which were bunkered. Williamson and young Arthur Grant kept easily in the place of hope with 76 each, but H. Vardon cut matters rather fine so far as qualifying was concerned. Putting two successive shots on to the railway, he topped his card with a 7. A 4 followed because of his taking three on the green, but, except that he would not give his putts a chance, there was little to find fault with in his play afterwards until the fourteenth hole.

He again required three putts here, and missed a shortish one on the next green also. He was badly bunkered with his second to the Alps, but made a great recovery, only to fail at another short putt. Three putts were required on the home green, and his aggregate was the high one for him of 162. His partner, Pope, was 160, his powers of recovery being very pronounced. He took 8 to the Cardinal, and 6 to the fourth hole, but did not let his misfortunes disconcert him. Herd fell away from his first essay to the extent of seven strokes. He looked like registering a good half round, when he got into trouble going to the eighth, which cost him a 6; and he was again in difficulties two holes later, losing two strokes in consequence. His round was thus swelled to 81, and his aggregate to 155. Hard on his heels came W. McEwan, whose steadily-compiled 78 gave him an aggregate of 153 and second place to Taylor. Beginning by holing a four-yarder for a 3, he followed this up with a twelve-yards' one for a 2, got down a steal nearly the length of the fifth green for another 2, and hit the pin with his approach to the ninth hole. Thus, he reached the turn in 33. After taking a 5 to the tenth hole, he ran in another long putt for a 3 at the eleventh: but he then fell away, taking three putts on the twelfth and fifteenth greens, and his round totalled up to 74. Ball was only a stroke behind Sayers at the turn, but he was a trifle unsteady afterwards. Still, his card of 76 kept him well to the fore for a long time, although it was soon excelled by D. Kinnell, T. Simpson, and Jones, each of whom went round in 75. Herd, after a rather slack start with a 5, settled down to a telling game. Out in 35, with 3's at the second, fifth, seventh, and eighth holes, he came home steadily in 39, and so drew level with Sayers. As things were going, 77's by Coburn, T. Vardon, and Aveston were regarded as of little account, and, when H. Vardon finished in 79, it was recognised that his chance of gaining a third Championship at Prestwick had for this season been extinguished. He putted with little confidence, and his driving lacked its usual sting. Immediately in his wake F. Robson, a rising Cheshire player, had been doing splendidly. Out in 35, he continued to play well, and, with 37 in, equalled the record of 72, as Mr. Andrew had done on Tuesday. His figures were: Out, 4 3 5 3 4 4 3 4 5 = 35; in, 4 4 5 4 4 5 4 4 3 = 37; total, 72. Braid took the majority of the spectators with him, and treated them to a magnificent display. A deadly approach enabled him to head his card with a 3, and with par figures at the succeeding eight holes, he reached the turn in 33. Continuing at the top of his game, he did not make the semblance of a mistake until the fifteenth. Here his ball slipped past

the hole in a trial for a 3, and he missed a short return putt. This stroke was, however, recovered when he ran down a six-yards' putt for a 3 at the Alps, and, with a 3 to finish, thanks to a deft little chip from the rough on the left, he established a fresh record of 70. It, however, did not last for an hour, E. Gray, of Littlehampton, creating a genuine surprise with a wonderful return of 68. The outward nine holes were taken at the exceptionally low figure of 31, and he capped a great performance by getting down a long putt for a 3 at the home hole. His figures were: Out, 4 2 4 4 3 4 3 3 4=31; in, 4 4 5 4 4 4 4 5 3=37; total, 68. J. H. Taylor played an excellent half round of 35, but his luck then turned, and he required 44 for the inward half. He was bunkered from the tenth tee, and badly punished at the sixteenth, where his fine recovery from the hazard on the line, which traps only a good shot, took him into one of the newly-made bunkers beyond the green. He had also the hardest of luck with his putts, and altogether fared in a fashion which he did not deserve. Mr. John Ball did himself justice with a 74 (36 out, and 38 in), and Mr. J. Graham concluded a sensational forenoon's play by registering a 76 (37 out, and 39 in). The leading positions at this stage were: E. Gray, 68; J. Braid, 70; F. Robson, 72; B. Sayers, A. Herd, and Mr. J. Ball, 74; and D. Kinnell, R. Jones, and T. Simpson, 75.

Rain threatened in the afternoon, but it fortunately held off, and the fortunes of the leading players were followed with keen interest by a company of several thousands. Massy bettered his forenoon round by one stroke, taking 37 out, and 38 in, but his aggregate of 151 was quickly beaten by Sayers, whose second card was 76 (36 out, and 40 in), and by the latter's partner (T. Ball), who went out in 38 and came home in 35, aided not a little by a brilliant 3 at the tenth. Kinnell also handed in a 73, in which appeared no fewer than six 3's. T. Simpson and Jones, as in the forenoon, could not be separated at 77. Williamson improved his prospects with a 75, and Herd repeated his 74 of the forenoon. H. Vardon and Taylor, however, with 78 and 77, were thus early regarded as hopelessly out of the running, a novel experience for these

famous exponents of the game. Robson fell away from his previous essay to the extent of seven strokes, but, on the other hand, W. Toogood and Ray bettered theirs by five and eight strokes respectively, Ray's 71 being the lowest score recorded in the afternoon. His details were: Out, 4 3 5 3 3 4 3 4 4=33; in, 4 5 5 4 4 4 4 5 3=38. For the greater part of his round Braid seemed likely to nearly approach Gray's record score. Putting faultlessly, as long putts holed at the fourth and sixth holes testified, he turned again in 33, and fortified his position by taking the next three holes in 5 4 3, his effort at the dyke hole, where he carried the green with his second, and holed his putt, evoking great enthusiasm. At the succeeding hole, however, he fell away, pushing his second with his cleft into the rough, and, failing to reach the green with his third, required 6 to the hole. A 3 at the fourteenth atoned for this lapse, and he completed another great round in 72, his wonderful aggregate of 142 remaining unchallenged. J. Edmundson, the Irish Champion, and T. Watt, the old Bridge of Weir professional, showed great improvement with cards of 72 and 73, but Mr. Ball and Mr. Graham deteriorated to the extent of four and six strokes from their first returns. At the close of an extraordinary day's play, the leaders were Braid, 142; Gray, 147; D. Kinnell and Herd, 148; T. Ball, 149; B. Sayers and Ray, 150; and Massy and Robson, 151.

With the issue narrowed to a very small compass, the final stages were decided on Friday under unfavourable conditions. The weather had broken down overnight, and a gusty South-Westerly breeze brought in from the Firth of Clyde frequent showers of rain. The order of start was as follows:—

Little interest was taken in the play until Massy and Pulford went out. Both played with exceptional steadiness until the seventeenth hole, where Pulford had a 4, but Massy, who pulled his drive, took three to reach the green. He putted carelessly, and holed out in 7, but the marker, not having noticed that he had failed to put in the ball with the back of his putter, marked him down as having taken only 6. The last hole was halved in 4, and their scores were returned as Pulford 74, and Massy 76. T. Ball and Edmundson also went round in 76, and Mr. J. Ball played a steady round of 78. H. Vardon showed something like his old form. Helped by 2's at the second and seventh holes, he turned in 35, and came home in 39. Herd was a stroke better than Vardon going out, but, driving badly coming home, allowed 6's to creep into his card at the tenth, twelfth, thirteenth, and fifteenth holes, and so swelled his total to 79. Leaver did well with 75, but Kinnell, who had been in such fine form on the previous day, could not do better than 80. Simpson, however, kept up his form with a 76, a return which was equalled by T. Vardon and Mr. J. Graham, and excelled by Ray, who turned in 36, and came back in 39. Gray, the record holder, on the other hand, spoiled his chances by taking 83 (38 out, and 45 in). Braid for a time looked like cracking up. He was short with his approach to the first hole, and came sadly to grief at the third. He pushed his cleek shot from the tee into the rough, and failed to carry the Cardinal bunker with his second, played with the same club. His ball lay well in the hazard, but, in attempting to get home with an iron, he hit the sleepers, and his ball rebounded out of bounds. Dropping another,

he struck the barricade again, and took 8 in consequence. He required three putts on the succeeding green, but holed a long putt for a 2 at the fifth. He turned in 39, but came home in 38, his grand powers of recovery being shown at the tenth hole, where he was in the bents off the tee; at the twelfth, where he pulled his second almost into the burn; at the thirteenth, where he laid his approach close to the hole, after being far short of the green in a 2; and at the Alps, where he holed a long putt for a 4, after pitching weakly from the rough to the left of the hole. A neat pitch to the home hole gave him a 3, and his round was 77, a better return than at one time seemed likely. Gaudin kept in the place of hope for a minor prize with a 75 (36 out, and 39 in), and Taylor registered a 76. At the close of the forenoon's play, Braid, with an aggregate of 219, held an advantage of six strokes from T. Ball and Ray, while Herd and Massy came next with 227.

Although it was generally conceded that Braid could now scarcely be prevented from winning the Championship for a fourth time, and so equalling the feats of the Morrises (father and son), the late Willie Park, and Harry Vardon, the fortunes of the favourite players were followed in the afternoon with the keenest interest. The breeze continued fluky, but the rain had ceased. Massy and G. Pulford were the first couple to attract attention. The Frenchman reached the turn by steady play in 38, but it was felt that his chance of retaining the title he had so gallantly won at Hoylake had gone when he took 7 to the eleventh hole. Meantime, T. Ball had been doing splendidly immediately in the rear. His golf to the turn was irreproachable (all 3's and 4's), but he fell slightly away, coming home against the wind. Slicing his drive to the eleventh into rough country, he took three to reach the green, and dropped a stroke in consequence. 5 was also his figure for the three succeeding holes, and a stroke more was required for the difficult fifteenth hole, *en route* to which he lost two strokes in a bunker. The remaining holes were, however, beautifully played in "one above 3's," and his card of 74 gave him an aggregate of 299, or one less than the return, which had won H. Vardon the

Championship when last it had been played at Prestwick. A feature of his play was the straightness of his driving and approaching, and this youthful Cheshire professional has surely a great future before him, given a continuance of health. Mr. John Ball fell slightly away, his round being 81, but his partner, Mr. R. Andrew, the hero of the qualifying competition, registered a capital score of 77. A little later H. Vardon stepped into second place with a 75 (36 out, and 39 in), but had straightway to make way for Herd, whose 75 (35 out, and 40 in) gave him an aggregate of 302. C. H. Mayo also handed in a 75, but the effort came too late to be of any profit to him. A company of several thousands followed Braid and Jones, and the Scotchman delighted them with his play, as also, in a lesser degree, did his partner, whose putting was much admired. Braid made only two slips during the course of a great finishing round of 72, but reference must be made to the power of his second shots to the third, tenth, and thirteenth holes, all of which he took easily in 4, and his lovely approach to within two yards of the fourteenth hole with a 3 to round it off. When he finished with four steady 4's, he received a remarkable ovation from the crowd, which thickly lined the fairway between the eighteenth tee and the green, but an attempt by some of his fervid admirers to carry him to the Clubhouse in triumph was not too successful. Ray, playing under considerable difficulty behind him, did wonderfully well in registering a 76 (38 each way), and met with a fitting reward in the third prize. J. H. Taylor also made a bold bid for a prize with a 75, but *proxime accessit* was all that could be said of him, so great a leeway had he left himself to make up. The presentation of the Championship Cup and Medal and other prizes was made by Mr. David Maitland, Captain of the Prestwick G.C., and this pleasing function concluded a week's golf, which will long be recalled because of the phenomenally low scoring all round and Braid's wonderful aggregate of 291, which excelled the previous best made at Sandwich by Jack White in 1904 by no fewer than five strokes.

THE IRISH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1908.

IN the seventeenth Irish "Native" Championship, which was decided at Portmarnock on Monday, May 18th, and the three succeeding days, it was practically a case of, "L. O. Munn first, the rest nowhere." In the absence of H. M. Cairnes and H. A. Boyd, holders of the Championship in the two previous years, he started a hot favourite, and never was confidence better justified. Meeting in the final A. B. IRISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP, 1908.

THERE was a considerable diminution in the entries for the leading event of the Irish golfing season, held at Newcastle, County Down, on Tuesday, September 1st, and the three succeeding days, the holder (J. D. Brown) being only challenged by a field of ninety-seven, a prominent absentee being the veteran J. Ball, who has so frequently graced the meetings of the Golfing Union of the Sister Isle with his presence. If a trifle breezy, the weather on the opening day was bright and genial, and not unfavourable from a playing point of view. L. O. Munn, the Irish Native Champion, was much fancied to win outright, but, to the consternation of his supporters, he was beaten cleverly by F. E. Davies, of Milltown, in the first round. He failed to approach his usual good form, and, in addition, had wretched luck coming home, losing his ball in the gorse from the eleventh tee, and finding a long drive from the fourteenth tee badly trapped in a turf dyke. This was, however, the only surprise in the round. Only three of the second round results call for comment, these being the defeats of H. E. Reade and H. A. Boyd (Irish ex-Champions) and J. D. Brown (holder), their conquerors being A. H. G. Prentice (Musselburgh New), H. D. Gillies, the English International, and A. R. Aitken, the Scotch International. The tussles between Prentice and Reade and Gillies and Boyd were exciting to a degree, Reade losing through missing a short putt at the home hole, while Boyd, after standing two up at the fifteenth hole, was beaten at the nineteenth. On the other hand, Aitken's win over Brown was expected, but the margin would not have been so pronounced had the latter been in anything like his usual form. The wind blew strongly on Wednesday, and punished those players who failed to keep the line. Yet all the results were pretty well "according to Cocker,"

excepting the defeat of Aitken by D. Grant, one of two entrants from the United States of America, who putted with great accuracy. Aitken was four down at the tenth hole, but kept the game going until the eighteenth, where he missed a shortish putt to square the match. The outstanding tie in the fourth round was that between J. F. Mitchell, runner-up in 1904 and 1905, and Gillies. It was all to play for at the turn, but the former then forged ahead, and won on the sixteenth green. Form came out fairly true on the third day of the competition, when the weather broke down, and H. M. Cairnes and Mitchell, the respective hopes of Ireland and Scotland, were left to contest the final on Friday, September 4th. It was recognised that the players were wonderfully well matched, and play turned out quite in keeping with expectation. Mitchell led by a hole at the turn, and, after six successive halves, pocketed the sixteenth and seventeenth, and finished the forenoon round with three holes in hand. Try as Cairnes liked in the afternoon, he could make no impression on his rival, who played a steady, careful game. Four up at the turn, and five up two holes later, Mitchell ultimately gained an extremely popular victory at the sixteenth hole. In presenting him with the Championship Cup and Medal the Earl of Shaftesbury paid him a high compliment on the play, and expressed his pleasure that his trophy would soon be in the keeping of such a historic Club as the Royal Musselburgh. MR. J. F. MITCHELL.

IRISH OPEN AMATEUR CHAMPION, 1908.

MR. MITCHELL, who is certainly one of the most graceful of present-day golfers, was born at Colombo on May 14th, 1876, but has lived most of his life in Edinburgh. He was educated at Stewart's College, and learned his golf on the Braid Hills course. He quickly became proficient, and has been recognised as one of the strongest players in the East of Scotland for a number of years. He has thrice been in the final of the Irish Championship, and he took first place in the open stroke competition which preceded the Championship at Portmarnock in 1903. His other notable successes are his winning of the Midlothian Championship at Mortonhall in 1900, of the old Silver Cup of the Royal Musselburgh G.C. in 1907, and of the open stroke competition at Silloth last year. He has only been able to take part thrice in the Amateur Championship, and was then beaten by such good players as Messrs. J. L. Low, J. H. Maxwell, and C. E. Dick. He aided the Alliance Assurance Company to win the Insurance Trophy played for annually at Duddingston, and has been twice in the "semi-final" of the annual tournament for the *Dundee Evening Telegraph* Cup. Mr. Mitchell, who stands about 5ft. 9in. and weighs over 13 stones, plays well with all his clubs, but is particularly good with his cleek and irons. Indeed, his fine cleek play had much to do with his victory at Newcastle last September.

MORE GREEN ARCHITECTURE.

BY MR. JOHN ANDERSON.

LAYING out a golf course is a one-man job, and if it is to be a success that man must be an enthusiast. He should be ready to listen to suggestions, of which he will receive plenty, bad, indifferent, and good, and to adopt such of the latter as will fit in with the general scheme he has decided upon.

A Committee, especially a large one, seldom perform this kind of work well, unless there is among them a master mind controlling and directing. The reason is not far to seek. A Committee is usually composed of men who know little of the subject, probably from never having taken any interest in it, and even when they do possess some knowledge, their ideas are invariably so diverse, and each maintains his own so persistently, that nothing can be arrived at except by compromise. An attempt to overcome differences of opinion by calling in what is intended to be expert assistance is generally a failure, sometimes because the so-called expert does not deserve the title, and almost always because the real expert is tied down in what he is wanted to do. The so-called expert commonly called in to advise is, in a majority of cases, some scratch player of the Club, or of a neighbouring Club, whose efforts have been previously directed to acquiring proficiency in playing the game, and who most likely is but an indifferent judge of what a good links ought to be, having never given the subject proper consideration. It is astonishing how few golfers do take any real interest in this subject, if one may judge by the variety of opinions expressed, even by leading players. Nearly everyone has his own best links, and in the selection seems to be influenced to a great extent by personal experiences. Real expert advice is not always easily got. There are only a few golfers—amateur and professional—whose opinion is worth having, and even in their case it is too much to

expect that by one short visit to a strange course they can obtain more than a superficial knowledge of its possibilities. It is the man on the spot familiar with every foot of the ground who has the best knowledge of this. Outside expert advice is valuable as bringing in a fresh mind, but is not very helpful beyond suggesting general outlines, leaving details to be filled in locally.

It is always desirable to keep in view a certain general plan of the course and also a certain particular plan of each hole, not only as it will stand by itself, but also in relation to the others, and according to these plans the laying out should be done.

If possible, it is desirable that the two halves of a course should have the same "par." The "par" of a first-class course may be taken at 72, or an average of four strokes per hole. Thus, the "par" of each half should be 36. But, while this is desirable, it is by no means essential, and many splendid courses have a difficult outgoing and an easy incoming half, and *vice versa*.

Where possible, the first hole made should be a short one, *i.e.*, one that can be reached from the tee by even a moderate player in one stroke. A short first hole has the effect of regulating the start and preventing after congestion through the green, as, of course, the preceding players must hole out before the succeeding couple starts. All the same, it is remarkable how few courses start thus—of the Championship courses Muirfield is the only one, and there the first hole is not really a short one.

Ideas as to the most desirable lengths of holes vary considerably. My idea is that the 18 holes should be of the following nature:

Short holes capable of being reached from the tee by an average player	2
Holes capable of being reached from the tee only by very long strokes	2
Long holes requiring 3 strokes to reach the green	2
Holes requiring 2 long strokes to reach the green	4
Holes varying from a drive and a pitch to a drive and a full	8
Total	18

The last-mentioned class of hole has come in for a good deal of condemnation, but I think somewhat unjustifiably. It is much easier to play a full shot up to a green than to play three-quarter and half shots and pitches. A full stroke requires only to be kept straight, while the shorter strokes require not only straight play, but also judgment in distance.

The first two or three holes should be fairly easy, so as to enable a player to get into his stride before taxing his skill greatly, but the last three or four should be difficult, so as to provide a good finish to a close match. They should be so laid out as to tempt a man who is, for example, 2 down and 3 or 4 to play, to risk something to obtain an advantage, and he should get the advantage if the stroke is successful. If the last holes are plain, with nothing in them, the match is as good as won by him who has the lead.

To settle the position of the putting greens should be the first consideration. The sites should be as natural as possible, and their situations should suggest not that the hole is placed so many yards distant from a tee, but rather that a definite stage in the game has been reached. The situation should be such as to suggest the green. A site naturally unpromising—if another is not convenient—can usually be improved at very little cost, in such a way as to make all the difference between good and bad. Relatively to the greens tees should be placed and should face the line of play—not necessarily the hole. Tees can be altered if desired without much cost, and in this respect differ materially from putting greens. Relatively, also, to the green should be placed the hazards. Once they are down, any alteration is costly; hence, great care should be exercised in placing them. There is no subject upon which experts differ more widely than placing hazards. I believe that the shorter the approach to be played the nearer may the hazards be closed in to the green, and that some should even be put close up to the edge of it.

In mapping out the position of hazards I have found it useful to work from a small plan of the hole—from tee to flag—according to scale, upon which the line of play and

the distances from the tee have been marked. Keeping in mind the character it is desired to give that particular hole, and any natural features (which should also be laid down on the plan), the places where good strokes are to be safe from punishment should be determined. They will, of course, be considerable in area, and can be shown by "latching" on the plan. These ascertained, the position of hazards can be sketched out relatively to them, utilising as much as possible the configuration of the ground. Once the plan is completed to the architect's satisfaction, it can be transferred to the ground, marking out the site of the hazards with pegs, or whitewash, or something of the sort. Bunkering should be done according to a plan, and not in a haphazard way. The above mode has this advantage—that the sketch plan gives a good general idea of what the hole will be like when completed. It may, no doubt, be necessary to make modifications as the actual work on the ground progresses, but this will not affect the general scheme.

Hazards should be made effective—not mere make-believes—and should not exact a greater punishment than loss of one stroke, in getting out, apart from loss of distance. They are best placed rather at the sides than in the centre, but the positions should be varied to give the different holes distinctive characters. Hazards to be of any use must be of considerable size. Sand bunkers are certainly the fairest form of hazard, where practicable, but large sand bunkers cannot, owing to the expense, be made everywhere. If the nature of the ground is such as to draw a ball towards a particular spot, a considerable area may be served by a comparatively small sand bunker suitably placed; but otherwise a small bunker is not very effectual, as it can only punish a few out of many bad strokes, and, however well it may be situated, it will certainly come in for condemnation by everyone who is punished by it, and whose adversary with an equally bad shot has escaped. On inland greens recourse must be had to other forms of hazards. When natural hazards are present, the architect is fortunate, and it is unnecessary to say anything about them—there they are, and it is for

him to make the most of them—if need be, supplemented by artificial means.

It is by imitating nature that the best artificial hazards can be made. Even at seaside links, where the chief hazards are sand-bunkers, such bunkers on the flat, similar to the usual sand-bunkers found on inland greens, form but a small portion of the hazards. The dunes, and hillocks, and hollows are the chief hazards, rendered all the more formidable by being sandy. It is not possible to make hazards of the same nature nor of the same magnitude on an inland course, but it is possible to create something like the same type. Even a level expanse of ground may be converted into a good hazard as extensive as may be desired by breaking it up into a series of hillocks and hollows, which should be made to resemble nature as much as possible, and need not be eyesores. The hillocks should be high enough to catch half-hit and topped balls. Some of the hollows may be filled with sand; but even where this is not done they are nearly as good as sand-bunkers and require a stroke to extricate the ball. If the ground be sown with coarse grass, whin, broom, etc., the hazard is made all the more formidable. Clumps of coarse grass, whin, broom, bushes, rushes, heather, etc., not too thickly laid down, make good hazards in themselves. Trees are unfair, because the branches spread out at a height to catch a well-hit ball; but the same objection does not apply to low-growing bushes, which a good shot ought to clear. It is only right to say that hazards, which may punish a shot to the extent of making the ball unplayable, are best placed at the side and well out of the line of play. With regard to hazards near the hole, sand-bunkers are the best, anything entailing an unplayable ball should not be placed there, and such hazards are best placed so as to offer temptation to the player rather than to punish obviously bad shots. If the bunker be so placed as to give some advantage if safely negotiated, every golfer makes it a hazard for himself, because he is tempted to take a risk to gain this advantage, knowing full well that, if his opponent takes the risk safely, he has lost an opportunity. On the other hand, a bunker placed only

to catch bad shots is purposely given a wide berth by everyone.

Although very often considered so, hazards in the direct line of play and into which a good shot may get, cannot really be considered unfair, so long as they are visible. If the hazard is seen, it should be avoided; it is there to be avoided, and the golfer who gets it has himself to blame. In this way it is now becoming more common to find hazards placed to guide the line of play in a certain direction, and give scope for what has been called "thinking golf."

The possibilities of almost every golf course are enormous, and yet it is quite the exception to find any intelligent effort towards improvement. Practically anywhere the game may be made interesting, and made to call for resource and skill. It is common enough to hear of holes and courses being lengthened, as if Clubs were ashamed to admit their course does not measure as many yards as St. Andrews, but it is not very common to hear of any real endeavour to develop and render interesting the course a Club presently possesses.

This must not be regarded as a plea for the duffers course. Every course ought to be laid out from the point of view of first-class golf, and that has far more relation to proper laying out than to lineal measure.

THE WELSH AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP MEETING, 1908.

THE Fourteenth Annual Meeting, held under the auspices of the Welsh Golfing Union, at Southerndown, from Thursday, August 27th, to Wednesday, September 2nd, will long be recalled for the wretched weather conditions which obtained practically throughout. Wind and rain swept in from the sea almost continuously in pitiless fashion, and the gale rose to such a pitch on the evening of Monday, August 31st, that the caddies' shelter was demolished, and considerable damage done to the roof of the Club-house. The two opening days were devoted to the Inter-Club Championship. Scoring was again by holes, two points being added for each match won. In the first round Porthcawl beat Newport by twenty-eight points to twelve, and Radyr, Swansea Bay, Barry, Southerndown, Brecon, Glamorganshire, and Ashburnham received byes. In the second round Radyr beat Swansea Bay by thirteen points to twelve, Brecon and Ashburnham scratched to Southerndown and Glamorganshire, and Porthcawl gained a lucky victory over Barry, thanks to the fact that one of the latter's team, failing to turn up, mulcted his Club in a penalty of twenty points. In the "semi-finals," on the second day, Glamorganshire beat Porthcawl by twenty-one points to thirteen, and Southerndown got the better of Radyr by twenty-three points to six. The final tie did not turn out so close as anticipated, for Glamorganshire retained the Championship by ten points. Subjoined are details of the final play:—

Some extraordinary golf was seen in the first round of the final stage on the afternoon of Monday, August 31st. G. S. N. Carne was three up at the fifteenth against A. T. Gibson, but the latter pocketed four holes in succession, and so won his way into the second round. L. A. Phillips (holder) was three down at the fourteenth hole, but he squared the match at the home hole, and won at the first hole out. Dr. Joscelyne was four down and six to play, but beat D. S. N. Carne by a putt, and Lieutenant Barry was only beaten at the nineteenth hole by C. H. Turnbull, who had led him by four at the fourteenth. Play on Tuesday forenoon did not prove very interesting, but the "semi-finals" after luncheon were exciting to a degree. Hunter was two down against Renwick at the sixteenth, but would not admit defeat till the twentieth, where his putt for a half lipped the ball. Still more prolonged was the tussle between Phillips and Duncan, who finished the round all square, after halving the last six holes. Other four halves were then called, but Phillips

was hailed the winner at the next hole in virtue of a good putt. The weather on the closing day showed considerable improvement, but the play was fitful. Renwick won the first five holes off the reel, and turned five up, but Phillips had the game squared at the sixteenth. Renwick thereupon reasserted himself, and carried over a lead of two holes to the afternoon. Phillips had his deficit wiped out at the third hole in the second round, but Renwick then drew right away, and easily regained the title which he had lost at Porthcawl in the previous year. GOLF IN BOMBAY.

[From the *Bombay Gazette*, October 5th, 1908.]

GOLF, barren as it is of sensational or spectacular features, is never a game of the multitude, and golfers are as a class a retiring community. But, even so, it is informing to the point of surprise to learn that the historic pastime has been played on our maidans for over half a century. Indeed, most probably the Royal Bombay Golf Club is the oldest institution of the kind in India.

The annals of golf in an organised form here date back as far as 1842. It is highly possible that the game had been pursued individually and after a spasmodic fashion from an earlier period, for it has lonely fascinations all its own, but it was on January 9th of that year that a meeting was held in the Fort, under the presidency of Mr. H. H. Glass, C.S., at which the Bombay Golf Club was duly established. Thus was golf placed upon a recognised footing among the few outdoor recreations of that day, and it seems to have had an ardent and regular following for the ensuing five years. Then suddenly it dropped out of favour, and a break occurs in the records which continues till 1855. In that year an effort at resuscitation was made, but the charms of the game appear to have appealed to only an enthusiastic very few, with whose inevitable passing the playing membership decreased until the Club flickered out of existence in 1861. There is now another hiatus of nine years in the minutes, when an entry states that, on November 16th, 1869, "Messrs. Robert Stevenson and Edward Morris in concert with other energetic admirers of 'the noble game' reconstituted the Club under the name of the Royal Bombay Golf Club." The gentlemen who made this third attempt were animated by a virile zest, which bequeathed a heritage of sustained popularity for golf in Bombay among "men of cunning understanding," and,

especially since the incorporation of the Club with the Gymkhana on the formation of that body in 1875, it has enjoyed a firm and dignified status in the list of the city's sports and pastimes.

Apropos the inception of the Bombay Golf Club, there occurs a page in the records of the Royal Blackheath Golf Club which is noteworthy and illuminating as an illustration of the feelings of kinship that bind the votaries of the game the world over. Under the date August 6th, 1842, it is engrossed:

"The Club, having noticed that a Golf Club had been established at Bombay, ordered a bumper to be filled to drink success and perpetuity to the Bombay Golf Club, and directed the Secretary to communicate this notice to the new Golfing Society, and send a copy of the laws of the Blackheath Golf Club, with the intimation that their Captain was *ex officio* an honorary member of the Blackheath Golf Club—which he did in the following manner:

"SIR,—At the monthly meeting of the Blackheath Golf Club, held at the Green Man Hotel, Blackheath, on Saturday, August 6th, the attention of the Club was drawn by their Secretary to the announcement of the establishment of a Golf Club at Bombay, which caused the most heartfelt satisfaction.

"It was resolved that the Blackheath Golf Club do immediately congratulate their countrymen on the formation of a Golfing Society at Bombay, and transmit to them forthwith a copy of the laws of the game and the regulations of the Blackheath Golf Club (believed to be the oldest Golfing Society in the Kingdom), with the expression of the Club's most anxious wishes for the prosperity and perpetuity of the Bombay Golf Club; and, at the same time, to intimate that the Captain of the said Club is *ex officio* an honorary member of the Blackheath Golf Club. . . .

"Steam communication brings you at a come-at-able distance, and, when something more comes to be known of the prowess of your members, it is possible that challenges from one Club to the other may be given and taken, when each will become better acquainted with the

respective links; and, whenever it suits the Bombay Golf Club to send a deputation of its members to throw down the gauntlet on Blackheath, they may be assured that it will be gladly taken up, and that, when the toils of the game are over, hospitality shall reign triumphant for the remainder of the day. . . .”

Circumstances have not yet favoured the acceptance of this genial invitation of sixty-six years ago, but golfers are a patient, hopeful fraternity, and, perhaps, some day—? However, the Bombay Club sent a similarly cordial acknowledgment, offering six months' accommodation to any deputation Blackheath might send, and persuasively explaining that there was an excellent fifty-four miles' stretch of desert between Cairo and Suez, on which the voyagers might “keep up their form” *en route*.

Vi et Scientia is the invigorating motto of the Royal Bombay Golf Club, and the drivers' ideal, “Far and sure,” is its watchword. These are neatly appropriate to great wide expanses of country, but they are ambitious axioms to preserve in the centre of a large and enveloping city, and the game has to be played here under conditions that would daunt any but doggedly zealous and resourceful adherents. The course, which is a nine-hole one, lies over the Esplanade and Marine Lines' maidans, and, as these are uniform flats, open to the whimsical pleasure of the public, and cut by a busy thoroughfare, imagination may picture the perplexing difficulties which the Honorary Secretary and his colleagues of the Committee have constantly to face and somehow overcome. The most serious menace which has ever threatened the Club was in 1886-87, when the voracious builder swallowed up the Eastern and Northern portions of the original course, but an ingenious extension was made over the West maidan, and the golfer still clings tenaciously to what remains available of his old site and its vicinage. Polo, hockey, football, and cricket are all played on the ground, to its general detriment as a golfing space, and the only period of the day when members can steal a match is between the hours of 6.45 a.m. and 9.30 a.m. But even the sum of these and other discouraging inconveniences seems to stimulate

rather than tend to quench the ardour of the playing members, who may be seen driving and putting unobtrusively in the early freshness of any morning, warily heedful of those grim little "gunnie" bunkers.

The Royal Bombay Golf Club, as already stated, is now merged in the catholic-sympathied Gymkhana, and its interests are administered by a Committee of six, which consists of a Captain, an Honorary Secretary, and four others. All members of the Bombay Gymkhana, and none else, are eligible for the Royal Bombay Golf Club, and it is a healthy fact that, in 1906, the membership of the Club had so increased—there are at present seventy playing members—that a division into senior and junior classes had to be made. The most ancient trophy that is competed for is the "Forty-Twa" Medal. This is a silver medal which was struck in commemoration of the formation of the Club in 1842, and it is subscribed for by golf-playing members of the Gymkhana. The Blackheath Challenge Gold Medal, which was presented by the Royal Blackheath Golf Club in 1842, was, unfortunately, the subject of a theft five or six years ago, but the donors have generously replaced it by another similar handsome award. Altogether the following are annually contested for:—

1. The "Forty-Twa" Medal, subscribed for by golf-playing members of the Bombay Gymkhana.

2. The Blackheath Gold Challenge Medal, presented in 1856 by the Royal Blackheath Golf Club.

3. The Wimbledon Silver Challenge Cup, presented by the London Scottish Golf Club in 1878.

4. The Calcutta Silver Challenge Medal, presented by the Calcutta Golf Club in 1881.

5. The Madras Silver Challenge Medal, presented by the Madras Golf Club in 1882.

6. The MacDonalld Challenge Cup, presented by Dr. D. MacDonalld in 1897.

7. The Golfers' Challenge Cup, presented by the Royal Bombay Golf Club.

8. St. Andrew's Gold (Senior) and Silver (Junior) Medals.

9. St. George's Gold (Senior) and Silver (Junior) Medals.

In addition to these competitions, there are several others, open also only to members of the Bombay Gymkhana, which are played for during the annual Golf Week, which generally occurs at the end of September or the beginning of October. These meetings, it may be mentioned, have been held from obscure times, and they have always aroused keen interest. During the Golf Week of 1908, as many as 75 per cent. of the playing members participated in the different events. The invariable programme comprises a two-days' scratch competition, a two-days' handicap competition, and a two-days' handicap competition for foursomes.

AMATEUR CHAMPIONSHIP OF INDIA, 1908.

A FIELD of thirty-six took part in the Fifteenth Annual Championship meeting, held over the Tollygunge course, Calcutta, in the last week of the year. A. Mann (holder) headed the qualifying list with scores of $83+77=160$, B. Sinclair being second with $79+86=165$. In the second round of the final stage, however, the holder was beaten by four and two, although his conqueror, D. S. Scroggie, of Carnoustie fame, had been seventeen strokes behind him in the *stroke competition*. Sinclair also fell before Scroggie in the "semi-finals," but only by a hole, but the latter won the final bout against E. H. Townend by four and three.
